FROM THE VICARAGE

On June 8th the church celebrates Pentecost – if you can believe it, we are 50 days past Easter Sunday (which feels like yesterday to me!)



The feast of Pentecost celebrates the time when the Holy Spirit descended on the Apostles in the form of flames, giving them the power to heal people, forgive sins, to speak many languages and to have the courage to share the Gospel all around the world.



Celtic theology often portrays the Holy Spirit as "An Geadh-Glas," or the wild goose, symbolizing its untamed, unpredictable, and often courageous nature. The Wild Goose is an image of a dynamic and joyful Holy Spirit who leads us on unexpected journeys into spiritual growth.

Christians believe that the Holy Spirit is still active in the church today – helping us to become the family that Jesus wants us to be. But how to we know if the Holy Spirit is active in our church? Well, the Bible tells us that we will know that we are full of the Holy Spirit by our 'fruits.'

Not a banana or a coconut, not even a bunch of grapes – the fruit of the Holy Spirit is love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control. Perhaps you memorized them at Sunday school or learned a song that helps you remember all of these attributes. But when we find ourselves being loving and gentle even despite ourselves, perhaps we are experiencing the Holy Spirit working through us.

During May, we at St Mary's started thinking about something called a 'Mission Action Plan' – without the jargon, we want to know where we are aiming to go and have a rough plan of how we're going to get there!



Our plan isn't just the work of the congregation. We'd also love to hear what the local community would like to see from our church – a summer fete, new outreach methods, or something completely new? You can let us know your thoughts by messaging us on Facebook or emailing me, Rev Lizzie, using the email found on the front inside cover of this magazine.

We're also listening for the voice of the Holy Spirit speaking to us and moving our church out of our comfort zone and into new and exciting things!

So, as we celebrate Pentecost on June 8th, let us pray for an outpouring of the Holy Spirit upon our parish of St Mary's. May we be filled with love, joy, peace, and all the fruits of the Spirit as we discern God's path for us. As we embark on creating our Mission Action Plan, we invite you, the wonderful people of West Moors, to share your dreams and ideas for our church. We look forward to hearing from you, and as ever, we invite you to join us for worship on Pentecost Sunday and every Sunday and Wednesday at 10am.

There was a DRAGON in Rev Lizzie's box!





PILGRIMAGE TO IONA... A THIN PLACE

Soooo, Alan and I read in the Diocese of Salisbury 'Grapevine' back in June of 2024 that the suffragan Bishop of Sherborne, Karen Gorham was looking for pilgrims to join her on a pilgrimage to and around the Isle of Iona off the end of the island of Mull which is, in itself a 45 minute ferry journey from Oban on the South West coast of Scotland.

We signed up along with 40 others; the date was now set. All we had to do was await the week after Easter 2025, pack appropriate clothing - think shorts, woolly jumpers and waterproofs, walking boots and flip flops (unless you are Alan who can't manage the latter!). In other words, be prepared for all eventualities!

First things first, we had a bit of homework to do about pilgrimage, understand something about St Columba who landed on Iona in AD 563 with 12 companions; and on a practical note get to Glasgow for the appointed day ready to meet fellow travellers in time to stay at the Premier inn overnight and catch a coach to Oban to start our journey in earnest.

I was never the best at doing homework so the two books we purchased about the Saint lay in the bottom of my bag until the return journey (mainly as they were written in Old English by a man called Adaman who lived about a century after Columba, then re published in the 17th century - not my kind of bedtime reading!!!). But, suffice to say it was not critical it turned out!



If you have watched any of the pilgrimage journeys on the TV recently you will know that it is about walking and meeting with people as you journey to a spiritual or holy site. In our case this was lona; both the Abbey with its ecumenical community and the sites on the small island such as the ancient nunnery, St Columba's bay and the Celtic crosses carved out of large pieces of stone

which are in various places on the island. It took us about 8 hours to get from

Glasgow to Iona on a coach-ferry-coach-ferry sandwich followed by a body workout walking from the island port of Fionnphort to the St Columba hotel. Unlike on the TV pilgrimages we had the luxury of incredible food, en-suite bathrooms and in our case an amazing sea view.

Our 6 days on the island were punctuated 12 hourly with prayers in the Abbey at 9am and 9pm. The abbey is on the site of St Columba's abbey but was completely rebuilt in the 12th



century by benedictine monks who followed after Columba. Their building was damaged during the Scottish reformation and the dissolution of the monasteries. The current building was rebuilt from a ruin in 1899 by George McCloud, a minister from Glasgow who saw benefit in upskilling people to relieve poverty in Glasgow at that time. Men and women came to the island for a period of time to help with the rebuilding and this helped begin the ecumenical work of the lona Community.



The worship in the abbey was very thought provoking at times and it was obvious that the lay members of the community put a great deal of thought and planning into the structure of the worship which was appreciated by the many pilgrims visiting from all over the world, and Ruby Wax!

We undertook several pilgrimage walks whilst on the island. I would like to tell you this was a great hardship, with terrible weather and very difficult terrain but that would not be quite right! We had amazing, sun-filled days with clear views and just enough rolling hills down to the coast to make our walking very enjoyable with sea air and clear skies. St Columba's bay had a large pebbly beach and at sometime a labyrinth had been made. You pick up a stone and work your way through the pebble maze until you get to the centre. As you walk towards the centre, possibly going in the wrong direction at times you might say your prayers or when you get to the centre and add your pebble, drop with the pebble whatever burden you may be carrying.

Overall Iona is a place of Celtic spirituality and a "thin place" for many people. This means that it feels as though heaven is very close to you, perhaps as you do when you are in church or out on a walk in a place you know and love. Iona is a place where faith and practical action are joined. Where God and Christ are seen in the everyday, in the landscape, in the people you are with and in the work you are doing, be it fishing, cooking, sewing, sowing or harvesting. This Celtic spirituality is found all the way down the western side of the UK, in the highlands and islands, Cumbria, in Wales and in Cornwall (and also in Northumberland). It is a simple spirituality which is not fussy or formal but profound in its simplicity.

I leave you with a Celtic prayer:

God of all ages, Jesus, yesterday, today and forever

Spirit breathing life since the dawn of creation

Give us courage to walk new paths with you

Open our eyes to the endless depth of your mystery. Amen

One Sunday just after Easter we were asked in Church for Our Most Memorable Moment of Easter. Some thought perhaps like me, 'I can have chocolate, wine or cake!', but then in a more serious moment, thought like myself of the joy that was felt on Easter morning arriving at Church, in the sunshine to a beautifully decorated Church, everyone greeting each other, 'Happy Easter'. The last time I had been in Church was Maundy Thursday evening when I had left a dark, bare, silent Church. Easter morning was such a glorious contrast.

For many years I have looked forward at Eastertide to a programme on BBC 'The Pilgrimage'. It started back in 2018 when a few well-known faces from the world of entertainment, all with different faiths, some with none, take on the pilgrimage. The first was to Santiago de Compostela, the Cathedral dedicated to St James the Great. Since then different pilgrims have travelled to other pilgrim sites in The Vatican, Istanbul, Portugal, Wales and Scotland. This year they crossed the Austrian and Swiss Alps to the Monastery of Einsiedeln to see the Black Madonna.

It is really interesting to hear the discussions the pilgrims have with each other along the way. One pilgrim this year was Harry, who had won The Traitors. Sadly he had not impressed me but hearing him talk, to other pilgrims, happy to tell all he was a devout Catholic, I very soon changed my mind, especially, when on a steep climb he offered to carry Helen's rucksack. Although Helen was no slouch - she had celebrated her 70th birthday on the journey.

This is something I have learnt recently that people I have found difficult, after spending time in their company I have changed my mind. So the 'moment' I have learnt around this Eastertide is to be much more tolerant.
