# An invitation to members of Christ Church and to our wider community

At 16h30 on Sunday, 7<sup>th</sup> September, at Hommëel Church Gratot in the presence of Mgr Gregoire Cador, Bishop of Coutances and Avranches, of fellow clergy, and representatives of other Christian communities in la Manche,

the Venerable Dr Peter Hooper, Archdeacon of France, Monaco and Switzerland on behalf of The Rt Revd Dr Robert Innes, Bishop of Gibraltar in Europe will license Revd Fr Chris Probert as Chaplain of Christ Church la Manche.

The service will be followed by a reception in the hall RSVP by 1<sup>st</sup> September if possible, to help with the catering

#### What happens at a Licensing and Installation?

After opening preliminaries Fr Chris is presented as new Chaplain. Two Bible readings (chosen by Fr Chris) are read, one in French and one in English, and the Archdeacon preaches a sermon. Here and throughout the service we sing carefully chosen hymns – we've been practising the tunes, and, in the case of the one hymn in French, practising the words as well!

The legal formalities are now completed: Fr Chris makes the Oaths and Declarations required by Church Law – that he is loyal to the teachings of the Church of England, and accepts the authority of the Bishop. The Licence, signed by the Bishop, is read aloud, then handed to Fr Chris as a sign of the authority conferred on him as Chaplain.

The service then becomes a celebration of Ministry – not just of the priest, but the ministry of the whole Christian community. During this part of the service the new Chaplain is presented with symbols of his responsibilities – keys, a Bible, water, bread and wine.... Prayers of intercession follow, ending with the Lord's Prayer (printed in French, but can be said in either language). Mgr Cador will give the final blessing, then after a final reading and dismissal we hope to persuade Fr Ben Woodley to send us on our way with musical fireworks!

#### It has been a long time!

Christ Church has been without a licensed priest in the role of Chaplain since the summer of 2014, so this service marks an important step forward towards our future as a vibrant family of faith serving this part of Normandy. We hope every member, friend and supporter of our community will wish to be present.

# **Tuesday Evenings on Zoom**





# Minister's message



Wow, is it really September already? The year seems to be flying past. I don't know if that is an age thing or the fact that as our lives fill up we become more conscious of the time that has passed. The fact that there is more of it behind us than there is in front of us. Our lives are like seasons. Me, I think I am entering the Autumn years. Spring has long gone and summer is waning as Autumn takes priority.

This year our summer has been long and hot starting way back at the end of Spring. Autumn is looking a little similar although the temperatures have dropped and there is a little more rain. A much needed commodity

to enable a good harvest. And talking of harvests, normally the field behind my house grows corn, however this year the famer planted wheat. It survived well during the long hot summer, and drought like conditions and produced a good crop. We can look forward with renewed hope to an exciting long and colourful Autumn of praise and thanksgiving.

## A saint to inspire us

There are so many big important days this month – Feasts of the Church or locally important days like  $7^{th}$  September and our Stewardship Renewal Sunday on  $21^{st}$  September, that I thought I'd talk about a seemingly minor figure in Christian history, yet one whose influence is still felt today. I'm talking about St Jerome, whom we remember each year on  $30^{th}$  September.

Jerome was born *Eusebius Sophronius Hieronymus* around the year 342 in Dalmatia, in modern Croatia. He first encountered Christianity as a student in Rome: Christianity terrified yet fascinated him – he worked through his fears and was baptised. At that time Church leaders in Rome were concerned that the flood of new Christians after the Freedom of the Church under Constantine had led to a disastrous lowering of spiritual standards - more Christians hadn't meant better Christians! With the zeal of the convert, Jerome immediately embraced the strictest form of his new religion, and soon became an inspiring Christian writer and spiritual guide.

Like every true Christian, Jerome consecrated his own gifts and abilities to the service of God. Jerome's natural 'bent' was as a linguist, and in 382 he moved from Rome to Bethlehem, there to begin the greatest and most lasting project of his life.

The Church at Rome at that time was changing: services were still in Greek, but Latin was becoming the daily language for Roman Christians. North African Christians worshipped in Latin from the beginning, but there had never been a single consistent translation of the Bible into Latin, Different books had been translated by different people, but the quality was a bit patchy. Since Latin was clearly 'the language of the future', Jerome was given the important task of producing a complete accurate Latin Bible. Jerome was no dry academic – his passion and longing was for ordinary (literate) Christians to be able to study the scriptures for themselves.

Jerome started off from the existing books (*Vetus Latina* – *'Old Latin'*) to create his 'Vulgate' ('common' Bible), but he soon realised he needed to go back to the original language to be certain that his version was the most correct form possible. For the New Testament he turned to the oldest Greek manuscripts he could find, and where necessary he compared them with other ancient translations such as the Aramaic New Testament, called *Peshitta*. He had finished the four Gospels within two years, though it's not clear how many other New Testament books he translated himself.

Jerome's biggest challenge was the Old Testament, where he had a much more complicated problem on his hands. Up until then Christians had always used the Greek version of the Old Testament, called the *Septuagint* (named after 70 scholars involved in translating it). To be consistent to his principle of going back to the original language, Jerome needed to learn Biblical Hebrew (easier in Bethlehem than Rome!) and translate from the Hebrew versions he believed were older than the Greek. Just to add to the challenge, the Greek Old Testament contained books beloved by Christians, not accepted by the Jews of the 4<sup>th</sup> century AD, and with no Hebrew originals from which to translate! He was flummoxed, so he went back to Pope Damasus to ask what to do with these books.

The books stayed in the Latin Bible, but there has been slight uncertainty ever since about these 'extra books' in the Greek Old Testament, and in some Bibles today you find them put together in a section called 'The Apocrypha' (meaning 'hidden').

Jerome was a 'difficult' personality, but he found a place where God could use his skills and talents to be a blessing to others. As we remember Jerome we thank God for all who work tirelessly to enable the spiritually hungry to be fed by the Holy Scriptures. We pray for those workers, for Bible teachers and for all who encourage ordinary Christians to explore the Bible for themselves. As we recognise their dedication, may we never take for granted the privilege of having the Bible in our own language and the freedom to share the Bible and its message with others!


