

A Zimbabwean adventure

We have recently returned from a mission to Zimbabwe. It was a fantastic experience! I was able to offer some teaching to young people; my wife, Danni, provided free eye tests, and our children simply embraced the culture and made lots of friends with local youngsters.



Thank you so much to everyone who supported our mission. I will be giving a detailed report of our activities at St Benedict's Horning, at 3.30pm on **Sunday 26th October** everyone is welcome.

Fundamentally, the one thing that really struck me was just how happy Zimbabweans are. Their life is so very different to British life; everything appears to be far more relaxed in the sun-soaked openness of Southern Africa. In Zimbabwe, materialistically, life is really tough. Most of the local people do not have much money; they certainly do not have many possessions. They live in houses that lack running water, and the electricity can literally come and go at any moment! Yet despite all of this, I witnessed countless numbers of happy people, from toddlers to pensioners. I observed people singing and dancing, smiling and laughing, folk simply enjoying their life and embracing a new day on God's earth.

Of course, there is always a risk in a column like this that poverty becomes 'romanticised'. That is certainly not my intention. Poverty is real; it is damaging, and it results in illness and death. However, poverty can also teach us some valuable lessons. Our society is drowning with possessions. We work every hour that we can to ensure that we have the funds to buy a new

house or a new car, but is that really what our lives our about? Is that really our legacy? Most Zimbabweans own very few items, yet the way they choose to live their lives provide us with some much-needed wisdom. The people of Zimbabwe do not rush around; they do not chase the clock, preferring instead to do things at their own speed. They prefer to chat and to take things easy, they resist creating a congested diary and their forced materialistic poverty results in a lifestyle that shields them from the temptations of possessions or being chained to a smart phone. Poverty is real and it is hard. However, it can also help to focus the priorities of life. Those priorities are ultimately not houses, cars, or possessions.

In Zimbabwe, I encountered lots of wonderful and inspiring people who would say that their priorities were: God, family, friends, health, and embracing every single day and being grateful for what they have received. Zimbabwe is often referred to as a 'developing country', whilst here in the UK we are viewed as the 'developed country'...

Praised be Christ, Revd Ben.





Very dry August intensifies drought conditions

The total rainfall recorded for August was just 13.7mms/0.54in which is only 21% of average. The rain fell in equal measure at the start and end of the month with an almost completely dry run from the 5th to the 27th. Anticyclonic conditions predominated with a notable warm spell from the 8th to the 15th.

September started unsettled as the prevailing Atlantic flow has returned with showery, breezy but warm conditions. The total rainfall to date is 25.6mms/1.0in, which is 43% of average. The highest daily total to date is 7.0mms/0.28in which fell on the 3rd. The highest temperature to date is 25'C on the 7^{th.}

The Norfolk Punt Club's Barton Regatta is the last big Norfolk regatta of the season. 2025 delivered perfect weather for the weekend: sunshine and breeze (most of the time). Punts, White Boats and Brown Boats, Yeomen, Lasers, Toppers and Optimists: a litany of boat classes took to the water ... helmed and crewed by 10-year-olds to 90-year-olds. This is truly a family event.

River Cruisers race too. These are yachts up to 45 feet long, specifically designed for sailing on the Broads and rivers, with masts that pivot to parallel with the deck to go under our bridges. These boats can have comfortable beds and kitchens inside but they can also be formidable racing machines!

Some regatta statistics:142 boats raced over the weekend with 638 cumulative race starters: the highest on record! Wildlife Notes





Osprey: Jon Kelf

Last month I wrote about the successful nesting of Broadland's first Ospreys for some 250 years at NWT Ranworth Broad. An update from that welcome news is that we now know a little bit more about the female osprey from the Ranworth pair. It turns out that she does in fact have a blue coloured ring inscribed 2H7 so is referred to as Blue 2H7. She comes from a nest in the Vale of Belvoir (pronounced Beaver) in Leicestershire which was part of a 7-year project to re-introduce Ospreys there, her parents having been the offspring of birds introduced at Rutland Water several years ago. Hopefully we shall see Blue 2H7 back at Ranworth next spring and for many years to follow.

Recent excitement locally has been the appearance of a Black-winged Kite at Hickling which was first spotted there on the 7th September and follows one (possibly the same one) being seen recently in Gloucestershire. You may recall me writing about this species a few years ago when one was seen at Horsey. This species, which is much smaller than a Red or Black Kite, is only the size of a Kestrel but is a stunning grey bird with black wing tips. They are breeding in Spain, Portugal and even now in France so could be one of our next Broadland colonisers.

On 28th August I was pleased to see a Black Tern at Barton Boardwalk as I had missed this species in the spring when they came through on migration. This bird hung around for a while and I again saw it on the 1st September when Jon Kelf managed some distant photographs to confirm its ID. The bird was a juvenile one so did not sport the black plumage from which it gets its name but was a mixture of grey and white. Most notable was its behaviour, as being a marsh tern, they do not dive into the water for fish, but tend to pick up prey items including insects from the water surface and are far less vocal than the Common Terns we are used to seeing on Barton Broad.

On one of my wherry trips in August we moored up at Gay's Staithe for lunch, tying up to a tree as there wasn't room on the mooring. One of the passengers alerted me to a small rodent which was climbing up the stems of the Hemp Agrimony plants and appeared to be searching for food on the flowerheads. This turned out to be a Harvest Mouse, the first one I have seen locally, and was so light it hardly made the stems bend at all and we watched as it used its long tail to descend the stem before climbing another one. Enjoy the last butterflies and dragonflies of the autumn before welcoming the winter thrushes, namely Redwings and Fieldfares and the winter wildfowl.

Farming Facts

NVZ: Nitrate Vulnerable Zone

Over the summer, quite a few houses in our villages may have received a DEFRA letter, as we did, about complying with 'Nitrate Pollution Prevention' requirements.

DEFRA's definition of a nitrate vulnerable zone is 'areas of land draining into <u>nitrate polluted</u> waters, or <u>waterways</u> that could become polluted by nitrates'.

The links given in the letter lead to an informative If you enter your postcode https://environment.data.gov.uk/farmers/ you will see that a wide swathe of the NIB villages are indeed in a NVZ area, as Barton Broad is a eutrophic lake. Eutrophication (a new word to me) is characterised by excessive plant and algal growth due to the increased availability of one or more limitina growth factors needed photosynthesis, such as sunlight, carbon dioxide. and nutrient fertilizers (Schindler 2006).

As all the information contained in the letter refers to farmland, your intrepid NIB reporter donned an investigative hat and rang DEFRA to enquire why our house and garden had also received this letter. The answer was given with an element of resignation by the young employee I spoke to.

Apparently, the RPA (Rural Payments Agency) is still working from quite old data and if your house used to be on farmland, the RPA may think it is still a farm! I was assured that the 'compliance rules' mentioned are not aimed at residential houses and that there is a contact number in the letter if we no longer wish to receive farming related documents.

I did ask whether there was anything that we, as householders, need to be aware of, living in a Nitrate Vulnerable Zone, near a eutrophic lake. I was reassured that the designation of such zones is there to protect our drinking water and local environment and that, no, there is nothing we need to be unduly concerned about and there's no action we need to take.


