Rachel writes . . .

In the middle of September a small item of news caught my attention - the story of three elderly nuns in Austria. An article on the BBC website started with these sentences:

Three Austrian nuns in their 80s have run away from the retirement home where they were placed and gone back to their former convent. Sister Bernadette, 88, Sister Regina, 86, and Sister Rita, 82, are the last three nuns at the Kloster Goldenstein convent in Elsbethen, just outside Salzburg. They regained access with the help of former students and a locksmith. Church authorities are not happy - but the nuns are.

Two things struck me. The first was the obvious joy of the nuns, the feel-good power of the weak or powerless overcoming the powerful leaders of the church.

"I am so pleased to be home," Sister Rita said. "I was always homesick at the care home. I am so happy and thankful to be back."

How could anyone not find delight in their story?

And yet the second thing that struck me was the range of vocabulary in the articles. On the one hand, there was the jubilation of the nuns and their supporters - but on the other, as the BBC article noted, the church authorities were not happy, and the words they used included *incomprehensible and disobedience*.

Whenever we watch the news on tv or read articles online we are faced with terrible things going on around the world - the horrors of war and the suffering of people in war zones seem never-ending - what are we supposed to do? Do we keep looking, or do we look away, feeling powerless?

We are living in a time when people often have completely opposing views of what's going on in the world, and it can be exhausting just listening to forcefully-expressed views. Of course there are always two (or more) sides to a story, different ways of looking at things. And as Christians we are called to be generous, to love people we disagree with, to listen to what people have to say. And yet, exposing ourselves to things that distress or disturb us, things that leave us feeling powerless or despairing, is not what we are called to do.

I once asked my spiritual director how I could love my neighbour, if I didn't like him or her. Was it a call to allow myself to get hurt? She replied with a different way of framing 'love your neighbour'. She asked me, in any situation, *what is the loving response?*

If I listen to someone who is convinced about conspiracy theories or other wild ideas, am I not confirming what they believe? Is that a loving response? If I listen to hateful words and ideas, even if they don't hurt me personally (but have the capacity to hurt others), is that a loving response? And if I expose myself to distressing or disturbing things, is that a loving response towards myself?

There is so much going on in the world that calls us to pray, to seek the good around us. As we read in Proverbs 4:23:

Keep your heart with all vigilance, for from it flow the springs of life.



BOOK REVIEW

MRS PALFREY AT THE CLAREMONT

On a rainy afternoon in January, the recently widowed Mrs Palfrey arrives at the Claremont Hotel in London to spend her remaining days. Her fellow residents are a mixed bunch, magnificently flawed and eccentric living off crumbs of affection and an obsessive interest in the hotel menu. It is the 1960s and a new society is taking shape. The Claremont symbolises a class and a way of life heading for oblivion.

One day Mrs Palfrey goes out for a walk and has a fall. She is rescued by a handsome young writer named Ludo. To save face in front of the other residents Mrs Palfrey pretends that Ludo is her grandson "Desmond". Her daughter lives in Scotland and although the real Desmond lives in London, he never visits.

A novel full of gentle humour and social embarrassment. Although it is about loneliness, it is also about ageing, loss and vulnerability and the importance of family. Elizabeth Taylor is an excellent writer with amusing insights to a bygone age.

The Girl With the Pearl Earring by Tracey Chevalier An historical novel set in 17th-century Delft, Holland. The novel was inspired by painter Johannes Vermeer's *Girl with a Pearl Earring*. Chevalier presents a fictional account of Vermeer, the model and the painting.

Notes from an exhibition by Patrick Gale When troubled artist Rachel Kelly dies her family have more than the usual mess to clear up. She leaves behind an extraordinary body of work – but she also leaves a legacy of secrets and emotional damage it will take months to unravel. This is a story of enduring love, and of a family which weathers tragedy, mental illness and the strain of living with genius.

The Story of Art (without men) by Katy Hessel How many women artists do you know? Who makes art history? Did women even work as artists before the twentieth century? This is **HERSTORY** the history of art as it's never been told before.

Whistling for Elephants by Sandi Toksvig Dorothy, ten, has distant father and a depressed mother. She is confused about her gender identity and doesn't fit in. When the family moves to Sassaspaneck, New York in 1968, Dorothy has to make her own way. She comes across a small, faded zoo on the outskirts of town, she gets to know the eccentric group of women who live there and discovers a world way beyond the one she has glimpsed so far.

Turner by Peter Ackroyd A brief, factual account of WJM Turner's life. Where are the sketches his dad sold in the Barber's Shop for 3/6 when Turner was a child - find one and you might have your own Fake or Fortune mystery to solve!

The Goldfinch by Donna Tartt The story of 13-year-old Theodore Decker, and the dramatic changes his life undergoes after he survives a terrorist attack at the Metropolitan Museum of Art that kills his mother and results in him coming into possession of Carel Fabritius's painting The Goldfinch.

The Food of Love School of Cookery by Nicky Pellegrino Luca Amore runs a cooking school in a Sicilian mountain town. He's taught many people how to cook the dishes passed down to him by generations of Amore women. As he readies himself for yet another course he expects it to be much like all the others, but there is a surprise in store for Luca. This time there are four women booked in, each one is at a turning point in her life. Sparks fly, friendships are made, secrets and stories are shared. Nothing will ever be the same.



MY LIFE IN THE CHOIR by Gina Clarke

When I was very young my Auntie Mabel looked after me and took me to the nearby Methodist Church and we said bed time prayers together.

But when I was about eleven I joined the Girl Guides, Mrs O'Dowder, who kept ducks and allowed them to swim in the nearby pond, took the pack to the Church of England. I loved the service and decided with my friend Hazel Greateorex to join the choir. Girls were now allowed to join. Choir practice was on Friday evenings.

Life in the Church of England Choir with my friend Hazel Greateorex.

For Choir Practice on Friday evening and Sunday am and pm every choir member received 5 shillings every quarter. We always wore robes the boys sat on one side of the choir stalls the girls on the other. The bells were rung by the choir boys. The choir boys used to swing on the ropes. One day they were still swinging when the vestry doors opened, the vicar was coming from his vestry and we were robed ready to go down the aisle.

We both ran quickly through the churchyard to the vestry on dark evenings for choir practice and the evening service. We had two services on Sunday morning and evening and a good number of worshippers in church for both services. Weddings were lovely. We had a very good view from the choir stalls and were paid for our services.

Harvest Festival was also good. The steps up to the choir stalls were decorated with apples, the boys put their cassocks over the apples and stuffed apples into their pockets during the sermon.

On V.E. Day and V.J. day there was a special service at the war memorial for both wars and each name was read out. My Uncle was killed at the Somme and died in my favourite Uncle's arms. We will remember them all from World War 1 and World War 2




