

Churches also serve as a learning resource for schools, providing physical space and historical context for subjects like religious education.

Shared Identity:

Churches establish schools that promote Christian values and provide education with a spiritual foundation.

Curriculum Integration:

Religious education is a core part of these schools, with curriculum designed to explore faith, Christian values, and the teachings of Christ.

Collective Worship:

Church schools often hold joint services with their local church, integrating their worship practices to foster a sense of community.

Community Projects:

Churches and schools can partner on community projects like supporting the elderly or decorating the church.

Festivals and Celebrations:

Schools can participate in church festivals, such as bringing harvest gifts to church for a joint celebration, and school choirs can share in Christmas and Easter services.

Joint Productions:

Churches can host school events like concerts, plays, and Christmas productions, expanding the reach of these school activities into the wider community.

So, let us hope and pray that our own links with our church school will develop in the future in ways that benefit our young people and help them to grow, spiritually and emotionally, as they journey through their lives.

A look back in time.....

There was a time when the streets of Britain held a quiet kind of dignity—rows of red-brick terraces, clipped hedgerows, and corner shops where everyone knew your name. You'd hear the rattle of the milk float before sunrise and the echo of children's shoes scuffing pavement on the way to school. Union Jacks fluttered modestly from garden poles, and neighbours exchanged gossip over fences or shared tea on front steps. Life moved slower, but it moved together. There was pride in tidiness, in keeping up appearances, and in the rhythm of daily routine.

Double-decker buses groaned through city streets, while on market days the air filled with the cries of traders and the scent of fresh bread. Pubs were bustling hubs of local life—where laughter, debates, and stories flowed as freely as the ale. People dressed smartly, even for ordinary outings. Whether in the misty lanes of Yorkshire or the cobbled corners of the East End, there was an unmistakable sense of Britishness—rooted in courtesy, community, and a shared post-war resilience that stitched the nation together.



Though much has changed, the memories remain: of lamplight on wet stone, of chimney smoke curling into grey skies, and of a country that, for all its faults, held its head high. The Britain of back then wasn't perfect—but it had a charm, a character, and a collective spirit that still tugs at the heartstrings today.

It was, in many ways, proper British - and for those who remember it, irreplaceably so.

A Hymn for all generations

Long before Cat Stevens made it a global hit, the words to **Morning Has Broken** were quietly penned by a woman who believed in the beauty of simple things.

Eleanor Farjeon was born in 1881 in London to a family of writers, musicians, and dreamers. She had a way with words that felt like sunlight on paper—gentle, lyrical, full of hope. Known for her children's books and poems, she created enchanted worlds for young minds to explore. But it was one short hymn, tucked into a 1931 church songbook, that would leave her most lasting legacy.

Set to a haunting old Scottish melody called "Bunessan", her poem, Morning Has Broken was a celebration of dawn, rebirth, and gratitude. It quietly made its way into the hearts of schoolchildren and churchgoers in England—but it was still far from fame.

Then, in 1971, something extraordinary happened. A young singer named Cat Stevens discovered the hymn and was captivated by its message of peace and new beginnings. He recorded it with tender

vocals and a memorable piano arrangement, and the world listened.


The song soared to the top of the charts and became a spiritual anthem for generations.

Eleanor Farjeon passed away in 1965, never knowing that the words she once wrote to honor the freshness of morning would one day rise again—sung around the world, cherished by millions, and carried like a prayer on the wind.
