

Recently, I had the great delight of worshipping at St Lawrence's in Church Stretton, a beautiful 13th century church, where my fellow curates and I spent the day learning together and listening to what we felt God was saying. We took time to reflect on the service and how the sermon, (which was amazing!) had challenged us.

However, it was during the intercessions that I felt God had spoken to me directly. The lady leading the prayers mentioned how God uses 'the ragbag' of our lives and how nothing is wasted with Him. Recycling at its best! But what did she mean by the word 'ragbag'? Well, these are the areas in our lives that cause us hurt or pain, where things don't go the way we think they should, or takes us away from God. However, she went on to pray how He can use these areas of challenge or stress to reshape and recreate us. For if we did not have challenges in our lives, then where is our need for God?

As a crafter and the daughter of a dressmaker, this really spoke to me as my mum always had a bag full of off cuts of material that she would use to patch knees on jeans or create beautiful applique and I, myself, love to create things out of items that would normally end up in landfill. Nothing goes to waste!

It made me wonder how many of us think that those 'rags' in our life are where we are meant to dwell and because of them, we are destined for the dustbin. It made me reflect on how, when things don't go right in our lives or we hit troubled times, we may feel we are not worth anything and God wouldn't want to know us because we are not perfect or useful. But we would be wrong!

For as I said earlier, God can use these times for his greater good. When I lost my mum nearly ten years ago, I went through a bout of depression. Each day was a battle just to get out of bed, and I felt nothing would ever be right again in the world. I truly believed life was not worth the effort and everything was a fight. But as I went through the grieving process and with the support of my wonderful family, little by little life became bearable again.

I look back on this very dark and difficult time as a time of personal formation and truly believe I went through this so I could have some understanding of what others maybe experiencing and hopefully be able to help them on their journey through those hard times, encouraging them that life is hard but it is worth the effort. We must remember that we can't always do thing in our own strength and to call on our loving God.

I read a prayer whilst writing this and would like to share it with you now. It's called Grace for a New Day.

Heavenly Father, thank you for waking me up to a new day. I trust in Your word, just as Numbers 6: 24-26 "The Lord bless you and keep you: The Lord make His face shine on you and be gracious to you: The Lord lift up his countenance on you and give you peace." Today, I come before You, laying down my worries, my challenges, and all the uncertainty about the future. I trust in Your perfect plan and timing for my life. Even when I don't understand, I know You've already made a way for me. Lord, fill my heart and mind with Your peace. Let this day be a blessed one, refreshing my body, soul, and spirit – because I know my life is in Your hands. In Jesus' name, I ask for wisdom, strength, and joy to move forward in Your grace. Amen!

As you tidy your garden for winter...

Gardens are preparing to go to sleep, but next Spring will soon be here. So why not consider some changes now:

- ~ Install a water butt now, to store up the winter rain for the Spring.
- ~ Reduce the hard standing in your garden. Instead, let rain soak into the soil, rather than go down a drain.
- ~ Plant something tall to create shade in your garden next year the soil will remain wetter.
- ~ Put in more plants the more you have, the more protection they give the ground. Try to use native species, as your local wildlife depends on them.
- ~ Consider adding a pond it will be a great boost to your local wildlife!

St Mary's, Billingsley

We had our final evening service of the year on September 14th, our harvest festival. Despite torrential rain all afternoon, nine of us turned out to celebrate the somewhat difficult harvest this year. The decorations in the church relied a lot on local apples; the fruit trees have coped with the drought much better than the cereals and the grass crop.



Refreshments after the service included scones served with damson jam made with local fruit. We now move to a single service a month the 8am communion on the 4th Sunday of the month, until next April when the lighter evenings allow the 6pm service to resume.

Amanda and Dave Prescott held a brief service in the church August to mark VJ Day, when the bells were rung. We hope to have a similar, lay-led service in November for Remembrance Sunday.

Unfortunately we have had to remove the large fir tree to the east of the church. A number of large pieces had fallen from this and the tree surgeon thought the only option was to cut it down. It is always sad to remove trees, but we had little option as it was potentially dangerous.

St Bartholomew's, Glazeley

Glazeley now has a new heating system. The old, wall-mounted heaters were becoming increasingly problematic, with around half the elements not working and issues with them tripping the power supply. They have now been replaced by under-pew heaters, which are the recommended option for small churches. My initial impression is that these are much more effective than the wall heaters. We are very grateful to the Shropshire Historic Churches Trust for a grant to allow this work.



We were also supported with a grant administered by the diocese specifically for new heating. Work has also been completed at the back of the church, where we had to replace the floor; where the plaster had to be replaced has now been painted. We are grateful to the diocese for a grant they administered to allow us to do this work. We will now think how best to organise the new space, with suitable cupboards and a table.

As I write, we are looking forward to our harvest festival on 21st September. Lyn Parnaby left her local history exhibition up for much of August and this attracted a lot of interest. It provided a fitting back-drop for our Patronal festival in August (ie St Bartholomew's Day). St Bartholomew's Day is often associated with the massacre of French protestants in 1572; we marked the day with a cake and sherry.

Letter from Westminster

August began with the sad news that more than a hundred jobs could be lost after food producer Kerry Group Plc launched a consultation on plans to close its factory in Burford. Kerry Group has been a significant employer in the area for many years. I know that this situation will be worrying for many local families with relatives that work there. My team and I will support anyone affected by this decision.

On 14th August 2025, 250,000 young people in England collected their A-Level results. Many students also collected results for their T-Level qualifications. More young people collected their GCSE results on 21st August 2025. As such, I would like to open by celebrating the achievements of young people across South Shropshire and further afield.

I want to ensure every young person in South Shropshire has access to high-quality education, training, and employment opportunities that will enable them to excel in life. So, on 19th August 2025, I was delighted to welcome Employment Minister Alison McGovern MP to discuss these issues with me and key local partners at the JobCentre Plus in Bridgnorth. By working together, I believe that we can unleash rural prosperity and boost employment prospects for our residents.

15th August 2025 marked the 80th anniversary of Victory over Japan (VJ Day 80). This is the date that finally brought the Second World War to an end after six years of bitter conflict across the globe, including in the Far East. To mark this special occasion, I visited Bridgnorth Cemetery, which is the final resting place for 15 First World War and 18 Second World War casualties. It was a humbling experience to pay tribute to those who paid the ultimate sacrifice for our freedom. As a veteran, I will always support those who serve our country in the Armed Forces and their families. In Parliament, I called on Veterans Minister Al Carns to ensure support for veterans benefits residents in rural areas like South Shropshire. Al Carns MP confirmed that existing organisations in South Shropshire will be apply to able for the funding.

I am committed to supporting our local communities in South Shropshire. As part of this, I want to ensure that older and disabled people can live with the dignity and respect that they deserve. It was excellent to recently visit Arden Grange Care Home in Ditton Priors and Care of Excellence, a home-care service based in Ludlow. The staff who make up the paid social care workforce provide an invaluable service to our community. I am committed to supporting them as they help elderly and disabled people.

I am very concerned about crime in rural areas like South Shropshire. I was delighted to catch up with representatives from West Mercia Police, who are bucking the national trend when it comes to tackling crimes like shoplifting.

Nationally, police numbers have dropped by 1,316 officers over the past year and the number of new recruits has plummeted by 17 per cent. At the same time, a further 1,800 police jobs are at risk due to funding constraints and shoplifting has gone up by 20%. More investment in rural areas could make real inroads into these issues. I will keep pushing for a fair share of police funding in rural areas like South Shropshire.





Back from my holidays and with the temperature outside having significantly dropped it was great to get back to The Severn Centre to preside over the September meeting of Highley Parish Council. We had lots to cover and as always we used the full evening to discuss various matters affecting the village and it's residents.

Following the unfortunate destruction of the bus stop in the centre of the village at the hands of a supermarket delivery lorry we have taken the decision to hold a public consultation covering bus stops across the village before deciding on whether a replacement is better where it is or whether there is a more suitable location elsewhere. The consultation is set to begin at the relaunch of the Community Drop In which is being held at The Severn Centre on September 26th. We saw so much benefit from previous Community Drop In sessions and I'm really glad we've managed to keep them going. I'll be at the relaunch officially opening the first one and I hope to see many of you there!

This month I was pleased to be able to get some time to talk to Councillor Alex Wagner, Deputy Leader of Shropshire Council, about their plans to revitalise partnerships with Town and Parish Councils as well as how they would like to devolve certain powers from the Unitary Council to more local control in the future. I'm keen to ensure Highley remains visible to those in Shrewsbury and they don't forget we're here, being involved in these sort of initiatives will make sure we're at the forefront of any changes and able to have a say rather than having things done to us.

We've had to reschedule our October Parish Council meeting which is not something we do lightly but, as Highley has been shortlisted for Shropshire's Best Kept Village and the awards ceremony clashed with the Parish Council meeting, simply had to make a change! I will be attending the awards along with my Vice Chair Councillor Pinches and our Clerk Alison Palmer. Keep your fingers crossed because I would absolutely love for us to win it!



Working together for the people of Highley



Operation Christmas Child



Each year St Mary's Church co-ordinates sending as many shoeboxes as we can, crammed with small gifts, to Operation Christmas Child, run by the charity *Samaritan's Purse*. It is a hands-on way to bless children in need across the world by filling shoeboxes with toys, personal care items, school supplies, and fun gifts as a way of showing that people care about them.

These shoeboxes are distributed across second and third world countries such as Eastern Europe (eg Ukraine, Moldova), South America and Africa as a demonstration of God's love in a tangible way to children in need around the world.

Last year St Mary's Church delivered over 40 boxes to the collection point in Bridgnorth. They are then taken to a central checking point, sealed and sent on their way to bring some smiles and happiness to children in far-flung countries.

Samaritan's Purse is also involved with delivering medical assistance, helping to lift families out of poverty, working with vulnerable girls and women at risk, introducing clean water enterprises and international crisis response across the world.

In 2000, Pastor Ed Dobson was diagnosed with motor neurone disease, a degenerative disease with no known cause or cure. Sharing his ongoing struggle to be thankful while living with an incurable condition, Dobson writes:

'There are many things for which I am not grateful! I can no longer button...my shirt. I can no longer put on a heavy jacket...[or] raise my right hand above my head. I can no longer write...[or] eat with my right hand. I eat with my left hand, and now even that is becoming a challenge. And over time...these challenges will get worse...So what in the world do I have to be grateful for? So much. Lord, thank you for waking me up this morning...that I can still turn over in bed...that I can still get out of bed...that I can walk to the bathroom...that I can still brush my teeth...that I can still eat breakfast...that I can still dress myself...that I can still drive my car...that I can still walk... .The list goes on...I have learned...to focus on what I can do, not on what I can't do. I have learned to be grateful for the small things in life and for the many things I can still do.'

What do you have to be thankful for? 'Give thanks in all circumstances.'

All in the month of October

It was:

750 years ago, on 27th Oct 1275 that the city of Amsterdam in the Netherlands is traditionally considered to have been founded.

200 years ago, on 25th Oct 1825 that Johann Strauss II, was born. This Austrian composer is best known for his waltzes, including *The Blue Danube*.

125 years ago, on 20th Oct 1900 that the American aviation pioneers the Wright Brothers made their first untethered glider flight at Kill Devil Hills, in North Carolina.

100 years ago, on 13th Oct 1925 that Margaret Thatcher, Baroness Thatcher, was born. She was the first woman Prime Minister of Britain (1979-90). (Died 2013.)

90 years ago, on 12th Oct 1935 that Luciano Pavorotti, Italian operatic tenor, was born. Considered one of the finest tenors of the 20th century and one of the most commercially successful of all time. (Died 2007.)

80 years ago, on 12th Oct 1945 that US Army combat medic Desmond Doss became the first conscientious objector in US history to receive a Medal of Honour for heroic actions. He saved the lives of 75 men during the Battle of Okinawa. The film *Hacksaw Ridge* told his story.

70 years ago, on 20th Oct 1955 that *The Return of the King*, the third and final part of J.R.R. Tolkien's *The Lord of the Rings*, was published.

65 years ago, on 12th Oct 1960 that, at a meeting of the UN General Assembly in New York, the Soviet leader Nikita Khrushchev is reported to have removed his shoe and pounded his table, in protest at a speech by another delegate.

60 years ago, on 8th Oct 1965 that the Post Office Tower (now the BT Tower) in London was officially opened. It was the tallest building in the UK until 1980.

50 years ago, on 9th Oct 1975 that the IRA detonated a bomb near the Ritz Hotel in Piccadilly. One person was killed and at least 20 injured.

40 years ago, on 1st Oct 1985 that riots broke out in Toxteth in Liverpool and Peckham in London. Five days later (6th Oct) Met Police Constable Keith Blacklock was killed in the Broadwater Farm housing estate riot in Tottenham. He was the first British constable to be killed in a riot since 1833.

Also 40 years, on 26th Oct 1985 that the Australian government returned the ownership of Uluru / Ayers Rock to the local Pitjantjatjara people, on condition that they lease it to the National Parks and Wildlife Agency for 99 years and allow it to be jointly managed.

25 years ago, on 26th Oct 2000 that the BSE Inquiry Report was published in the UK. It concluded that the BSE (Mad Cow Disease) epidemic was caused by the use of infected meat and bone meal in cattle feed.

20 years ago, on 3rd Oct 2005 that Ronnie Barker, TV comedian, actor and writer, died. Known for *The Frost Report, The Two Ronnies, Porridge, Going Straight* and *Open All Hours*.

15 years ago, on 13th Oct 2010 that 33 Chilean miners who had been trapped underground for 69 days following the collapse of the San Jose copper-gold mine were rescued. Around one billion TV viewers around the world watched them being pulled to the surface one-by-one, in a specially designed capsule.



The true cost of AI - Tom

I was interested to read Karen's article last week, about saving water by deleting old emails. Data storage does use a massive amount of energy and water to cool the hot servers that store the information. It is also true of AI. Many older data centres are incredibly inefficient, and companies can be spending more money keeping servers cool than the cost of powering the equipment in the first place. For each question that you ask Chat GTP, it takes about a pint of water to cool the server to provide an answer (BBC Rare Earth website).


Data centres that store all your photos and old emails have been shown to generate about 3.7% of global greenhouse gas emissions. Aviation stands at about 2.4%. In fact, data centres' energy consumption is estimated to double over the next 5 years. It is undoubted that the benefits of AI will become an essential part of the next stage of human development, but it doesn't mean that we can't make an impact on the amount of carbon going into the atmosphere.

Have a digital clear out. Store your photos on an external hard drive. When buying equipment, look for those without the unnecessary sensors, that send unseen and unused data into the cloud. We bought a new washing machine the other day, and went for the most energy efficient, but chose the most basic there was. I don't need my washing machine connected to wifi. It has a delay timer, and I can workout when I need to put it on. I could even look out the window and try to read the clouds to work out whether it will be a good idea to hang it on the line!


Similarly, I don't need to ask Chat GTP questions, if the answers to those questions are already sitting on my bookshelf, or in a recipe book in the kitchen.

Toothbrushing - manual or electric? Damian

If you want a wealth of discussion about the latest gadgets and the nitty gritty behind their eco credentials, then take a listen to the 'Sliced Bread' podcast on BBC sounds. They recently dissected whether using an electric toothbrush is better for your teeth than a manual one. It turns out that there is very little difference in the quality of the clean between the 2 and it can depend on how you use them. Again, there is little difference between the circular brushes and the side to side models. So if your electric one has come to the end of its life, then recycle the battery unit, and consider getting a manual brush with a removable head (like Yaweco or similar). You could even brush with your left hand and stand on one leg to improve your balance!
