

From the ministry team

The end of September/beginning of October is traditionally when churches celebrate their Harvest festivals. It is a time to give thanks for the good provision of food and other resources, and to particularly give thanks for all those who work hard so that food is available to us, from farmers to those manning the tills at the supermarket. Many churches will collect donations of food which can be taken to a local food bank, as we recognise that there are many people who do not have enough to eat, both in this country and around the world.

The Harvest Festival recognises the important part that having good food plays in our overall well being. It reminds us that having food in the cupboards is not something which should be taken for granted and that, if we are able, it is important to give what we can to those who are struggling.

Food is very important in churches - admittedly that food is often cake and biscuits! Jesus so often gathered with other people around food (he once fed 5,000 people with just five loaves and three fish!). One of his final instructions to his closet friends was for them to remember him, and the sacrifice for us that he was about to make, by eating a meal of bread and wine - that meal is what we remember every Sunday at Holy Communion.

What food are you most thankful for? How many people are involved in making that food? Does it come from abroad? Spending time thinking about our food and where it comes from can be really eye-opening. But also, could you donate some food or money this month which supports people who do not have enough to eat?

Whatever you are doing (and eating) this month, I hope you have a blessed October.

Guardian Angels - keeping an eye on us

The teaching of Jesus encourages us to believe in guardian angels. He once said, 'See that you do not look down on one of these little ones. For I tell you that their angels in heaven always see the face of my Father in heaven.' (Matthew 18:10)

The existence of angels was suggested in various Old Testament texts, Jesus mentioned them explicitly, and the early Christians accepted their existence and work (Acts 12:15).

In England, devotion to the angels, both in Anglo-Saxon times and later, was

strong. In modern times, the great American evangelist Billy Graham has written an entire book on the existence and work of angels.

Alcuin described them as intercessors (in the 11th century Leofric Missal); Herbert of Losinga, bishop of Norwich (d 1119) specially praised them, and his contemporary, Reginald of Canterbury, wrote prayers in their honour.

Honorius Augustodunenis (d 1151) clarified the existing belief of the time by asserting that each human soul, when infused into the body, is entrusted to the particular care of a single angel, who protects both body and soul and offers prayers to God.

For many centuries Christendom was satisfied with the feast of St Michael (and all Angels), but the special feast of the Guardian Angels was introduced in Austria, Spain and Portugal in the 15th – 16th centuries. Guardian Angels were then seen as guardians of particular towns or regions, or of each individual. Pope Clement X made the feast day universal in 1607, fixing its date to 2 October.

All in the month of October

It was:

750 years ago, on 27 October 1275 that the city of Amsterdam in the Netherlands is traditionally considered to have been founded.

200 years ago, on 25 October 1825 that Johann Strauss II, was born. This

Austrian composer is best known for his waltzes, including The Blue Danube.

125 years ago, on 20 October 1900 that the American aviation pioneers the Wright Brothers made their first untethered glider flight at Kill Devil Hills, in North Carolina.

100 years ago, on 13 October 1925 that Margaret Thatcher, Baroness Thatcher, was born. She was the first woman Prime Minister of Britain (1979-90). (Died 2013.)

90 years ago, on 12 October 1935 that Luciano Pavorotti, Italian operatic tenor, was born. Considered one of the finest tenors of the 20th century, and one of the most commercially successful of all time. (Died 2007.)

80 years ago, on 12 October 1945 that US Army combat medic Desmond Doss became the first conscientious objector in US history to receive a Medal of Honour for heroic actions. He saved the lives of 75 men during the Battle of Okinawa. The film Hacksaw Ridge told his story.

70 years ago, on 20 October 1955 that The Return of the King, the third and final part of J.R.R. Tolkien's The Lord of the Rings, was published.

65 years ago, on 12 October 1960 that, at a meeting of the UN General Assembly in New York, the Soviet leader Nikita Khrushchev is reported to have removed his shoe and pounded his table, in protest at a speech by another delegate.

Also 65 years ago, on 30 October 1960 that Diego Maradona was born. The Argentine football player, manager and coach is regarded as one of the greatest football players in history. (Died 2020.)

60 years ago, on 8 October 1965 that the Post Office Tower (now the BT Tower) in London was officially opened. It was the tallest building in the UK until 1980.

50 years ago, on 9 October 1975 that the IRA detonated a bomb near the Ritz Hotel in Piccadilly. One person was killed and at least 20 injured.

40 years ago, on 1 October 1985 that riots broke out in Toxteth in Liverpool and Peckham in London. Five days later (6 October) Met Police Constable Keith Blacklock was killed in the Broadwater Farm housing estate riot in Tottenham. He was the first British constable to be killed in a riot since 1833.

Also 40 years, on 26 October 1985 that the Australian government returned the ownership of Uluru / Ayers Rock to the local Pitjantjatjara people, on condition that they lease it to the National Parks and Wildlife Agency for 99 years and allow it to be jointly managed.

25 years ago, on 26 October 2000 that the BSE Inquiry Report was published in the UK. It concluded that the BSE (Mad Cow Disease) epidemic was caused by the use of infected meat and bone meal in cattle feed.

20 years ago, on 3 October 2005 that Ronnie Barker, TV comedian, actor and writer, died. Known for The Frost Report, The Two Ronnies, Porridge, Going Straight and Open All Hours.

Also 20 years ago, from 18 to 26 October 2005 that Hurricane Wilma, the most intense Atlantic hurricane ever recorded, hit the Caribbean, Central America and the eastern USA. 63 people died. The storm caused £18.1 billion worth of damage.

15 years ago, on 13 October 2010 that 33 Chilean miners who had been trapped underground for 69 days following the collapse of the San Jose copper-gold mine were rescued. Around one billion TV viewers around the world watched them being pulled to the surface one-by-one, in a specially designed capsule.

10 years ago, on 26 October 2015 that the Hindu Kush earthquake hit Afghanistan, India and Pakistan. At least 399 people were killed, and 2,536 more injured.

Share a little light this Halloween

Some parents aren't sure quite what to feel about Hallowe'en – is it just harmless fun, or are there aspects of it that don't fit in with how we want to see the world?

A child's christening service is very honest about the reality of good and evil, and Hallowe'en can be a good time to talk about those things and how the love of Jesus can be a 'Light in the darkness' for everyone.

The word 'hallowe'en' actually means 'the eve of all hallows' day' – in other words, the night before the church's festival celebrating All Saints. A Saint is sometimes thought to be an exceptionally holy person – someone really special, who did extraordinary things because of their faith in God.

The famous saints are all amazing examples of what it's like to live God's way. But in the Bible, St Paul calls all Christians saints – a saint is simply a friend of God, who seeks to live their life according to God's purposes. When someone is christened, they truly become a Saint, so All Saints' Day is a celebration of the whole family of God.

If you'd like to mark Hallowe'en, these are some ideas that will bless others as well as being fun too.

What's happening in church? Some churches hold special events around this time of year. There might be a 'Light Party' with fun activities for children and young people – these events are a lovely way to focus on all that's life-giving and positive around All Hallows.

Some churches also have a special service for All Souls Day – a time when we remember our loved ones who have died. There might be an opportunity

to go and light a candle to remember someone – even small children grieve in their own way and may find comfort in this simple action.

Why not pop into our local church, or look up on their website, to find out what's happening in our local area?

Carve a pumpkin. Did you know that gargoyles (the scary looking faces carved in stone on churches) were originally made in medieval times to scare away evil spirits? The pumpkins with scary faces carved into them at Hallowe'en are a bit like that.

But Christians believe that you can't fight evil with evil – you can only fight evil with good, and that good will always win in the end. So why not see if you can carve a friendly looking pumpkin this year, as a sign that you and your family are going to be a force for good this Hallowe'en? (And you can always use the offcuts from your pumpkin to make delicious soup!)

You can do the same with Hallowe'en costumes. Superheroes make a great, positive alternative to scary witches and ghosts.

Give a treat. Not everyone is comfortable with the idea of children going round to neighbours' and just asking for treats. But if you don't want them to miss out on something their friends are doing, why not have a family baking session, and take a tray of cookies with you if you go out with them? Even little children can help stick a smiley face on an iced biscuit. That way, you have something lovely to give away to your neighbours, too!

Safety first. Many children's fancy dress costumes are highly flammable. Please, don't ever use real candles around your front door or in your pumpkins; use the small battery-powered candles instead. If you can afford to buy a multi-pack of these electric candles, you could lend them to your friends and neighbours.

Say a goodnight prayer. Even if you've steered clear of scary costumes, and even if your child has loved the evening, it can be reassuring to have a goodnight prayer that reminds them that love, and light, and good, are always going to be stronger than fear and evil.

The ancient service of Compline (Night Prayer) has been used as this reminder for centuries, and many of its prayers are still well known today: 'Visit this place, O Lord, we pray and drive far from it all snares of the enemy; let Your holy angels dwell with us to preserve us in peace; and let Your blessing be upon us always, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.'

Or, in a simpler children's version: 'Be with us, Lord, and take away all fear, may your angels protect us and give us peace. And bless us always. Amen.' You can use these lovely prayers any time when you need a reminder that God is with you – especially at the end of a difficult day, or when something sad has happened, or when your family is worried about something.

- Before modern printing was invented the books of the OT and NT had been passed down over thousands of years through hand-copying, so how can we be sure the copies we have today faithfully represent the original authors' words?
- How do we really know that Jesus was raised from the dead, and not something added on to the story later to give it a happy and inspiring ending?
- How do we know that Jesus really was the Son of God, and not just a good man?
- How can there be a powerful, loving God when there is, and always has been, so much evil and suffering in the world?
- · Are science and faith in conflict?

Maybe you feel in need of some answers to these types of questions. Or, maybe right now you are seriously considering what the Christian faith is all about, and this might help you address some of your concerns. Or maybe, (as we are sure you will!) you will just find all this very interesting. Whatever your reason, you will be very welcome.


Each week, we will be supporting the talk with a PowerPoint presentation, and concluding each time with opportunities for questions. The entire session will last no more than one hour.




