

Reverend Clifford's Weekly Blog 'The Swan'

The Swan

Well did you pick up that two Saturdays ago I made the mistake of sending out two newsletters at the same time; if you didn't you might have thought I didn't send anything out last Saturday, check your emails and if you are following my little collection of blogs from my time in Lincolnshire over the summer it is there somewhere.

Meanwhile this is the last title in that series, The Swan.

Before I start Cathy and myself have just enjoyed the last of our holidays this year, this time camping at Norman's Bay just down from the bay from Eastbourne. There might be some blog ideas coming soon from that week as well but not a series like I now finish from that other camping holiday. All holidays close together to make the most of the weather before the colder and darker evenings creep in, it can get cold under canvas.

Back in Lincolnshire our tent was pitched on an open site surrounded by woodland areas where we watched many various birds and other wildlife. A woodpecker that tapped away in the early hours right above our heads, consuming all the bugs it could from under the bark of a pine tree. Different finches singing so brightly and then the ducks. Just to our left in the woods was a large pond/lake and each day the ducks with two ducklings strolled across the pitch seeking anything the other campers could provide them with. I guess this is just one reason we love camping so much and have enjoyed years of it in so many various locations, it allows you to get closer to nature, and given the strange noises of a night sleeping right beside it, there have been times

when you just lay there thinking what on earth is scraping at the canvas, truth just nature, all harmless certainly in the UK unless you have seen the beast of Cliffe/Medway. I joke because the house we rent out which will be our retirement home had an incident a couple of weeks ago.

My lovely tenants texted me to inform me that a fence panel had been pushed down and one of my small fruit trees had incurred some damage and that they thought a large animal had done this. Are there bears in Hoo, what kind of beast roams the suburban back gardens? Truth, age and rot combined with a little wind took down the fence panel, and the one small branch broken on my pear tree was probably the result of a football hanging around the garden, I did chuckle and simply dropped in another new panel, see if the beasts get that one.

Yet there are some large creatures that we live beside, and it certainly isn't a duck, but one of our biggest waterfowl the splendid swan. As I came out of the toilet block on site and was returning to our tent I was met by a beautiful swan. He or she stood in front of me displaying its full majestic qualities, it wasn't there before I went for my wash but here it was now. I slowly and respectfully walked past it and returned to my tent and told Cathy. The swan remained there hanging around for a while as we got ready to go out for the day. Then suddenly there was a huge slow flapping noise as the swan tried to take to skies, it ran the length of the pitch between the tents and caravans, it was trying desperately to gain the lift and updraft it requires to allow a bird so big to take off. Despite its best efforts there simply wasn't enough room and if it had managed to gain lift it would have crashed into the wooded area before it. Dejected it gave up for now and started to way up its options. A bit later in the day on our return the swan had worked out that the pitch was longer to the left of our tent and so it gave it another go. This time it ran hard flapping its wings, gaining speed running between the trees beside us into the next open pitch area beyond. A little uplift was gained, and we kept our fingers crossed it would have enough energy and room to take off. It suddenly left the ground and just managed to pass over a hedge at the other end but clearly the energy required was to much as it landed in a sheep field beside the campsite. After that we didn't see it again, but I am sure on the third attempt it must have found the airspace it needed to go back to wherever its family and other swans were.

It made me think, what do we need in our lives to find the perfect uplift, so that we might soar above the things that hold us down. The psalmist writes: Ps 103: 5 He 'who satisfies your desires with good things so that your youth is renewed like the eagle's'. then Ps 139: 9 'I rise on the wings of the dawn', because verse 8, 'if I go up to the heavens you are there.' And Isaiah 40:31 who writes, 'Those who trust in the Lord will renew their strength; they will soar on wings like eagles; they will run and not become weary, they will walk and not faint.'

I wonder have you ever felt like that swan, for all your best efforts you just don't seem to have enough room to find the updraft you need to rise above the things that hold us down. Like the swan we can look for alternative paths that might give us the space and freedom we need. Are the trees to tall and the hedges to oppressive.

I thought as I watched the swan, about the times in my own life when the effort to rise up has seemed overwhelming and remembered how in each case God has quietly been there as it were blowing under my wings so that I can find the power to rise above those things that hold us down and back. I give thanks for a life in Christ Jesus reflecting on the words Paul uses in Colossians 3: 1 'Therefore, since you have been raised with Christ, strive for the things above, where Christ is seated at the right hand of God'.

Jesus gives me the focus to find a new path, to set aside the trees from the woods so that there is room to conquer and rise above the gravitational powers of this world that pull us down, that ruffle our feathers.

Somewhere that swan is enjoying the freedom of the Lincolnshire fens, because it knew if it kept trying, if it put its faith in the wings that gave it uplift it would find a way out of our campsite.

Jesus offers us something similar, sometimes we need simply to come back to him again and again for he will raise us up in the end.

I didn't get a photo of our swan, but I give you a heron from our bike trail, wonderful sculpture along the path of the old Woodhall Spa railway.


