The 'All Angels' were added in 1969 when Gabriel and Raphael were included with St Michael.

134 For all the Saints (omit v 4,5 and 6)

Rev William W. How, writer of this lovely hymn, was ordained in the Church of England in 1847. He became Suffragan Bishop in east London and then Bishop of Wakefield. He worked among the destitute in the London slums and factory workers in Yorkshire.

128 Fight the good fight

John Monsell was born in Londonderry and served as a chaplain and rector of several churches in Ireland after his ordination in 1835. He came to England in 1853 to became rector of Egham in Surrey and was rector of St. Nicholas Church in Guildford from 1870 until his death (caused by a construction accident at his church). A prolific poet, Monsell published his verse in 11 volumes and this is one of his 300 hymns.

94 Come, let us join our cheerful songs

This hymn, one of many written by Isaac Watts, celebrates the joy of worship and worthiness of Jesus

564 Ye holy angels bright

The writer of this hymn, Richard Baxter, was born in Shropshire in 1615 and took Holy Orders in 1640. He was for some time chaplain to one of Cromwell's regiments. At the Restoration he became chaplain to Charles II but was expelled from the Church of England and imprisoned for his nonconformist beliefs.
