PLAXTOL LOCAL HISTORY GROUP

The History of Firefighting in Kent

Our speaker Clive Bradburn was a firefighter who joined the service in 1963 age 15, and spent 26 years there, retiring in 1989. He is now a volunteer at the fascinating Kent Firefighting Museum, West Kingsdown. Clive has a Plaxtol family connection; his great, great, great grandmother was Mrs Hayman, the subject of the well-known, unforgettable photograph of her sitting in her Dux Lane cottage kitchen. She had 18 children; sadly 6 died.

During the 1666 Great Fire of London the fire was controlled by fire breaks, including the defensive destruction of threatened houses. The first fire brigades were set up in Victorian times by insurance companies, to reduce their losses. They owned their own fire engines and trained their crews. The Museum has an excellent collection of fire marks found on houses who had paid insurance. Gradually towns began to have their own engines. A historic red horsedrawn fire engine with brass fittings called the "Bromley Steamer" is the crown of the Museum's collection. It would take 20 minutes to get the steam up at the rear of the engine ready to pump water. We were shown round glass containers called

fire bombs, kept in the house filled with water. Other exhibits were hand pumps, leather buckets, hose carts and hooks for pulling down houses.

The Fire Brigades Act of 1938 required every Council to provide adequate fire service. The 1939 start of war marked the birth of the National Fire Service. Clive was very excited to be allowed to attend his first fire, helping to clear up and with his photograph in the local newspaper. Most of us will remember the 1968 nine-week fire brigade strike, with Army-manned "Green Goddess" old fire engines being called into service. Historically firefighters could be called to any emergency (fires, floods and cats in trees), via a red telephone in the station.


Clive Bradburn's talk was illuminated by personal anecdotes of successes and tragedies. The Kent Firefighting Museum is a gem, and fun for children who can enjoy climbing freely on an old fire engine.

Routine Testing Programmes

Bowel Cancer Screening

Men and women aged 60 to 69 every 2 years. People over 70 can request a screening kit by calling the Freephone helpline 0800 707 6060.

Breast cancer screening

All women aged between 48 - 73 will be invited every 3 years. This is a rolling programme which means it invites women from GP Practices in turn; not every woman received an invite as soon as she is 48 but she will be invited before her 53rd birthday.

Cervical Screening

All women between the age of 25 - 64 are eligible for a free cervical screening test every 3 to 5 years.

Age group (years):

Frequency of screening:

25 First invitation

25-49 3 yearly50-64 5 yearly

65+ Only screen those who have not been screened since age 50 or have had recent abnormal tests.

Abdominal Aortic Aneurysm Screening

Men over 65 are more likely to have an abdominal aortic aneurysm (AAA). The NHS AAA Screening Programme invites men for screening during the year (1st April - 31st March) that they turn 65. Men over 65 who have not previously been screened or diagnosed with an aneurysm can request a scan by contacting the Kent & Medway AAA Screening

Programme on 01227 868775 or by emailing kent.aaascreening@nhs.net

Influenza Vaccination

Annual 'Flu' jab for at risk groups and over 65s.

Shingles Vaccination

Healthy individuals aged 70 - 79 are eligible, and those aged 60-70 will become eligible in stages over the next 5 years, becoming fully eligible at 70. Additionally, anyone aged 50 or over with a severely weakened immune system is eligible.

Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV)

RSV vaccination is offered to protect against RSV, a common virus that can cause serious illness in babies and older adults. The vaccine is recommended for pregnant women (at least 28 weeks pregnant) and for adults aged 75 - 79.

Prostate Screening

The NHS doesn't offer routine screening for prostate cancer, but men aged 50 and over can discuss PSA testing with their GP. If a man has symptoms that suggest prostate cancer, a GP will likely perform a PSA test and potentially a digital rectal examination (DRE).

NHS HEALTH CHECKS

The NHS Health Check programme aims to help prevent heart disease, stroke, kidney disease and certain types of dementia. Everyone between the ages of 40 - 74, who has not already been diagnosed with one of these conditions or have certain risk factors, will be invited (once every five years) to have a check to assess their risk of heart disease, stroke

and kidney disease and will be given support and advice to help them reduce or manage that risk.

If you're in the 40-74 age group without a pre-existing condition, you can expect

to receive a letter from your GP or local authority inviting you for a free NHS Health Check. Don't worry if you haven't got your invitation yet, as you will be invited for one over the next few years.



Flu Clinics for all patients of <u>Borough Green Medical Practice</u> who are *eligible to receive the influenza vaccination, will be run on <u>Saturday 4th October and Saturday 11th October 2025</u>. Clinics are available to book now on 01732 883161.

*Eligible patients are:

- aged 65 or over on 31/3/2025;
- Patients aged 18-64 patients who suffer with:
 - Asthma (and are on current repeat medications) or COPD,
 - Diabetes,
 - Kidney disease,
 - Liver disease.
 - Heart Disease.
 - Neurological/Stroke patients;
- a BMI of 40 or more;
- · a compromised immune system; or
- on certain medications.

Our speaker, Elizabeth Knight, came aptly dressed in period costume to talk about the life of Jane Austen. Elizabeth has been a volunteer at Jane Austen's Chawton home (now a museum) for over ten years. This year is the 250th anniversary of

Jane's birth in December 1775. Jane was the youngest in a family of six brothers



and one sister. Her father George served as a Rector and also ran a boys' boarding school, so Jane had access to a well-stocked library from an early age.

Jane Austen is recognised across the globe, falling just behind Shakespeare in the popularity stakes. Jane's life was short, dying at just age 41 in Winchester in July 1817. Nonetheless she wrote six novels: Sense and Sensibility, Pride and Prejudice, Mansfield Park, Emma, Northanger Abbey and Persuasion. Austen's novels have never been out of print, probably due to the fact that her work is timeless, and the characters still relevant and relatable today.

FROM YOUR MEMBER OF PARLIAMENT

I have a strong desire for more buses serving our community. One of the ways you can ensure our bus services are as good as they can be is by letting me know any issues or concerns you may have. I am always interested to hear the experiences of anyone who uses our local bus routes, including our children.

That's why I run a School Bus Survey each year. With the new academic year having now started I have opened my 2025 survey to find out which services are working well, and which need improvement over the first few weeks of term. If you, or someone you know, has children of secondary school age, please ask them to complete my annual survey so they can have their say. I would also like to hear from anyone who has children of secondary school age who could get the bus to school, but chooses not to. Why is that, and what would make you consider getting a bus to school instead of another transport means?

Autumn is always a tricky time for any parent, with our children going into a new school year and sometimes a new school entirely. This brings a change to the routine and our travel plans too. With this being the case it's more important than ever to let me know your thoughts so that I can raise these with the relevant operators and Kent County Council. I meet regularly with our local bus companies and I am able to raise these issues with them directly.



SHIPBOURNE FARMERS' MARKET

The summer is well and truly over when it comes to food, so it's the month to rediscover the delights of colder weather eating with all the wonderful harvest of ingredients at our disposal. Our fresh fruit and vegetables are at their best. Onions, leeks, beetroot, carrots and tomatoes are all full of flavour at this time of year whilst the wonderful array of squashes and pumpkins offer so much more for the cook than just as lanterns for Halloween. Root vegetables such as parsnip, swede and celeriac are all wonderful roasted or mashed and perfect with new season's game. Use them in soups, stews, curries and pickles for rich seasonal colour and taste. Kentish cobnuts, walnuts, hazelnuts and chestnuts have been harvested try them now when they are 'wet' and discover a whole new intensity of flavour. Use in autumn salads or scattered on meringues and in fruit compotes - delicious.

We have a much larger variety of apples at the market than at supermarkets so try different varieties. Bramleys for cooking – it's definitely crumble season - and making into chutneys and jellies to enjoy through the winter. The later ripening varieties are good for keeping so you will be able to enjoy from now until next summer. Plums will finish soon but autumn fruiting raspberries are still available.

Much of our seafood is at its best caught from colder waters so as the sea temperature drops this month, fish just gets better and better. Sea bass, haddock and Dover sole will be fishing well. Remember the better the quality of the fish, the simpler it needs to be cooked.



The changing season heralds a longing for richer, more comforting meat dishes and it's the start of

the game season with pheasant appearing once again at the market. Use it as chicken – cubed breast meat works perfectly in curries, stir fries or just marinate the whole breasts and cook on the griddle. Lean and tender, it suits quick cooking methods such as frying and grilling. Try with mushrooms, the perfect partner for seasonal game.

Stall Update: We are delighted to welcome new stallholder Liz Reid to Shipbourne Farmers' Market. Liz is a baker, preserver and recipe developer and will be offering a selection of her delicious homemade savoury and sweet pies. Her first week at the Market saw her sell-out in the first hour and her delicious menu included dauphinoise potato and caramelised onion pie, honey and mustard sausage rolls, mixed berry fruit pies and the "Shipbourne" pasty.

Finally, (and just whispering the "C" word in October) we are excited to announce our first Shipbourne Farmers' Market Christmas card competition. Open to children aged II and under, entries can be posted in the box at the Market until the final October Market on 30th October. COOKERY CORNER

SILKY SQUASH RISOTTO Serves 4 / not too tricky

Ingredients

- I butternut squash (1.2 kg)
- I bunch of fresh marjoram (20g)
- · Rapeseed oil
- 1.2 litres vegetable or chicken stock
- I onion
- · I stick of celery
- 300g Arborio risotto rice
- 150ml dry white wine
- ½ a lemon
- 50g parmesan cheese
- I knob of unsalted butter

Method

- Preheat the oven to 180c/350f/ gas 4. Scrub the squash (there's no need to peel it), carefully halve it lengthways and de-seed, then chop into 2cm chunks (the seeds can be roasted and sprinkled on top).
- Place the squash in a roasting tray, pick and chop most of the marjoram leaves, then toss with I tablespoon of olive oil or rapeseed oil and a pinch of sea salt and black pepper. Roast for I hour or until soft and caramelised.
- With 20 minutes to go on the squash, simmer the stock over a low heat. Peel and finely chop the onion and celery, then place in a high-sided pan on a medium heat with ½ a tablespoon of rapeseed

- oil. Cook for 10 minutes, or until softened but not coloured, stirring regularly, then stir in the rice to toast for 2 minutes.
- 4. Pour in the wine and stir until absorbed. Add a ladleful of stock and wait until it's been fully absorbed before adding another, stirring constantly and adding ladlefuls of stock until the rice is cooked. It will need 16-18 minutes.
- Remove the squash from the oven and mash up with a fork, leaving some chunky pieces. Stir through the risotto about halfway through.
- When the risotto is done, add enough extra stock or boiling kettle water to make the risotto oozy, then finely grate in the parmesan and beat in the butter.
- 7. Cover the pan, turn off the heat and leave to relax for 2 minutes. Stir, season and plate up sprinkling the remaining marjoram leaves and roasted seeds on top. Delicious topped with tenderstem broccoli or crispy pancetta.

BRAIN MATTERS...

Exercise Matters...

With a whirl and a gust we're thrust into autumn and start our journey into shorter days and cooler nights. It's a time to buckle down and focus on school, work and life. Attention may start wavering so how do we pull ourselves back on task?

Cuteness! We've all seen those cute animal videos of kittens, puppies and ducklings and so on pop up, and we might disregard it as part of the scroll of doom. However, several studies have shown that spending some time watching cuteness helps to boost our focus, narrow attention and improve task performance. You may be wondering how? Well viewing cute kittens and puppies lights up the same pathway for motivation, bonding and emotional focus by activating our dopamine pathway. Research showed that those that viewed cuteness videos briefly before a task were more accurate and careful in their work as well as better in fine motor tasks and visual detail tests. They also

made fewer mistakes and were more careful with their hands.

How does the dopamine pathway do this? Essentially it helps nudge our focused engagement. It's not about emotion or sentiment; it's a measurable short-term change in the brain. This focus hones in on our base instincts of social and survival impulses. What's fascinating is that a 30 second scroll can be

more effective than coffee in boosting our attention when we're tired or feeling distracted. As the brain recognises cuteness it subtly increases mental attention. It helps to not only calm our systems but also to enable a greater focus. Furthermore the results were replicated not just in those who were animal lovers or parents - it spanned adults of all ages. This links up with with fact that it's a natural tendency we can all tap into.

So the next time you're feeling a bit bogged down by work, a task or just life, take a pause and give yourself a cuteness break.

AN EXTRACT OF THE PARISH COUNCIL MINUTES Tuesday 21 Aug 2025

(Full Minutes can be found at www.ightham. org or by emailing the Clerk) REPORTS FROM COUNTY COUNCILLOR & BOROUGH COUNCILLOR:

County Cllr Rayner reported that on local government reorganisation (LGR), the current administration has announced that they would like a countywide unitary authority, with a mayoral authority within it, combined with 3 sub-divisions. They have not specified what those divisions would be. However, they are likely to be similar to previous proposals. Medway has put forward a 4-unitary model with some changes; TMBC a West Kent Unitary comprising Tonbridge & Malling, Tunbridge Wells, Sevenoaks and Maidstone. The proposals will be considered by the Minister in November and are

currently taking up all resources at County Hall. Cllr Rayner raised concerns that

there has been no consultation with the public and there seems to be minimal appetite for public interest. A decision isn't due until Spring 2026 which leaves little time for organising the new arrangements for May 2028 commencement. Cost hasn't been mentioned and with KCC already having £1bn debt, it is a concern. Cllr Emmett said that he had contacted KCC regarding Old Lane and hadn't had a response so would be contacting Maidstone Magistrates. Cllr Rayner said that he would be happy to be a witness if required. Cllr Betts reported that with LGR, there was uncertainty in TMBC capital projects planning. TMBC is looking at what can be achieved before reorganisation takes place. Projects such as the Angel Centre and new temporary housing at Bluebell Hill are in jeopardy unless contracts can be organised quickly.

Cllr Betts reported that there is a second phase of the West Kent Rural Grants Scheme which offers matched funding up to a maximum of £20k. There may be further rounds of funding until the money runs out. TMBC offices are being refurbished at Gibson East, Kings Hill and staff have been moved into Gibson West.

All mechanical and diagnostic work carried out by Qualified automobile engineers Once completed, Gibson West will be sold off; it is a listed building and costs approx. £1/4 million to run each year. A recent survey of residents to determine whether Tonbridge should have a separate town council showed 72% were in favour, 23% opposed and 5% were unsure. Only 12% residents voted. TMBC will be meeting next week to discuss the next steps. Cllr Rayner reported that the Minister had just announced that there would be no new councils until LGR.

Cllr Betts announced that a new Enforcement Officer had started at TMBC.

Cllr Betts reported that he had information on litter, following a query raised by Cllr Mitchem: The budget for 2025/2026 is £1m which covers street cleaning, litter picking, bin emptying, highways sweeping and flytipping. Areas are zoned according to a national code. Cllr Betts was unsure of frequency. The greatest challenge for rural areas is safety of litter pickers where there are no footpaths. Cllr Holden commented that these are the areas that residents are concerned about and risk their own safety cleaning up.

There will be a meeting to discuss the Local Plan next week; Cllr Betts estimated that the call for sites (Reg 18B) would happen in October. Cllr Willingham asked Cllr Rayner about the sale of KCC offices. Cllr Rayner said that the refurbishment of Invicta House has been halted, and it will be sold off making savings of

MATTERS ARISING

Highways & PROW Matters: HIP update - The 20mph scheme at Oldbury is currently with the Head of Service at Highways awaiting sign off under delegated authority and we should hear about the next steps soon. We had enquired about sites to erect pedestrian warning signs on A227 but have been informed that there isn't enough publicly maintainable verge to allow additional signs. The traffic calming scheme on A227 will therefore include a realigned junction warning sign near Field House, vegetation cut back, SLOW markings on the carriageway and a 'pedestrian in road warning' sign near The Limes.

Old Lane: Highways have informed us that there is likely to be a prohibition of motor vehicle restriction along the full length of Old Lane except for residents' access. We have passed on information about the current use, and this has been passed to the maintenance team.

Ightham Common 30mph scheme: Highways have carried out a review and have circulated proposals for a 30mph scheme on various roads at Ightham Common to include: Common Road, Copt Hall Road,



Back Lane bus stop: update - The Clerk is meeting a contractor next week to get a cleaning quote. If it can't be cleaned it was suggested that we try and get some new perspex. The Clerk said that there was a current KCC grant available for replacement or refurbishment of bus stops. Cllr Mitchem said that she has an alternative contact who could do it and has also suggested cleaning the back of the Village Hall which is covered in algae.

Allotments: Cllr Emmett reported that there was a tree down at the allotment but he would deal with it.

Recreation Ground: Playground repairs - The Clerk will contact Wicksteed to carry out equipment repairs. The Clerk has ordered a new gate latch and Cllr Emmett offered to fix it. The Clerk will contact Tyrrells about the fence repairs and has spoken to the groundsman about weeding the wetpour. We need to soil and reseed the play area and by the tennis courts; Cllr Holden suggested contacting Planet Plants for a quote. Surfacing quotes: The Clerk has received recommendations from other Clerks and will pursue them. Village Hall: We have had a quote to clean the back of the building for £150; for consideration at the next committee meeting. Update on the rebuild: discussed under Part 2. The Clerk will set up a meeting of the Village Hall Committee.

Oldbury Annexe: New lease – The Clerk has emailed the Chair of Governors as we have heard nothing further on the lease. The Clerk was asked to write and say that the building couldn't be used until the lease had been signed and the insurance is in place.

Archive: Replacement archivist – We have had one expression of interest. The Clerk reported that the archive room and lower hall needed some refurbishment and will raise this with the Village Hall Committee.

TMBC ASB Enforcement Team: The Clerk said that the ASB team would patrol Oldbury once term starts to look at parking. Parking at at weekends at the Plough was also raised and it was noted that the parking spaces at the front of the pub had been removed. The Clerk was asked to check whether planning permission necessitated the provision of parking spaces.

Churchyard: Update – Cllr Hall said that he would write to the Warden to follow up on the schedule of work at the churchyard for Anthony Edwards as we haven't received anything.

POLICY & FINANCE

The Clerk reported that we are now legally required to have both a GOV.UK website and email addresses in time for our next audit. She has spoken to an organisation recommended by KALC who can help and they have provided the background information and a guote. The Clerk will circulate this for discussion at the next meeting. Review of: Financial Regs/Standing Orders/ Emergency Report - Clerk to review and circulate. The Clerk reported that the fixed rate tariff for the Pavilion was coming to an end on 9th September and will call EDF to find out what the best available tariff is thereafter.

We received 6 PLANNING APPLICATIONS and objected to 1. TMBC approved 3 applications.

AOB

Cllr Mitchem has reported a car parked on A227 outside Fir Cottage for the last month, to TMBC and police.

Cllr Holden asked what was happening with the Amhurst as he had seen lights on. No-one had any information.

Cllr Hogarth reported another leak on Bates Hill.

Cllr Hall reported overgrown hedges along Ismays Road and the damaged dog bin and salt bin on Coach Road; the Clerk has reported this.

Cllr Gunson said that we should query the response by KCC to our report that the new bollards on Common Road are too big. KCC have said that they are compliant whereas several councillors have said that they are dangerous as they block traffic sight lines.



A child's christening service is very honest about the reality of good and evil, and Hallowe'en can be a good time to talk about those things and how the love of Jesus can be a 'Light in the darkness' for everyone.

The word 'hallowe'en' actually means 'the eve of all hallows' day' – in other words, the night before the church's festival celebrating All Saints.

A Saint is sometimes thought to be an exceptionally holy person – someone really special, who did extraordinary things because of their faith in God.

The famous saints are all amazing examples of what it's like to live God's way. But in the Bible, St Paul calls all Christians saints – a saint is simply a friend of God, who seeks to live their life according to God's purposes. When someone is christened, they truly become a Saint, so All Saints' Day is a celebration of the whole family of God.
