

# October letter from the Archdeacon of Hereford





silage is being cut and in others harvesting continues. When we were in Devon the celebration of Harvest took place across our villages from the end of August through to early October. Here in Hereford the pattern is similar, and our rural multi parish benefices are now beginning to celebrate Harvest.

The modern harvest festival celebrations that we know today was introduced in the Cornish parish of Morwenstow in 1843 by Revd Robert Hawker. Hawker was quite the eccentric and also on occasions was reputed to have dressed up as a mermaid! He invited his parishioners to a Harvest service as he wanted to give thanks to God for providing such plenty. However, this was to counter the festivities and merriment of much more ancient pagan celebrations, and he was keen to turn his parishioners towards a Christian celebration of harvest. The Christian Harvest celebrations that Hawker wanted to connect with were based on what he saw in the Old Testament, and he drew on the Jewish festival of Sukkot or feast of Tabernacles.

"You shall keep the Feast of Harvest, of the first fruits of your labour, of what you sow in the field.

You shall keep the Feast of Ingathering at the end of the year, when you gather in from the field the fruit of your labour." Exodus 23:16

Even today with modern farming methods It is still an opportunity to give thanks to God for his provision for us and an opportunity to share with generosity the riches we have received. Paul was very clear in his teaching that generosity begins in our hearts and is a reflection of the gratitude we have towards God for what he has done for us. Generosity is not something we have to be coerced into but instead it is something freely given. We perhaps need this reminder because our wealth and belongings ultimately belong to God, and we are simply stewards of what we have.

"So, I thought it necessary to urge the brothers to go on ahead to you and arrange in advance for the gift you have promised, so that it may be ready as a willing gift, not as an exaction. The point is this: whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows bountifully will also reap bountifully. Each one must give as he has decided in his heart, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver."

2 Corinthians 9:5-7

Our harvest services should reflect this attitude of generosity because it points to what is at the heart of our faith that God has given us new life in Jesus freely and without condition. This is the grace of God at work in our lives. However, as Christians we are also called to work in God's harvest field. Jesus in his teaching told the disciples that they were called to be labourers in the Kingdom.

"When he saw the crowds, he had compassion for them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd. Then he said to his disciples, "The harvest is plentiful, but the labourers are few; therefore, pray earnestly to the Lord of the harvest to send out labourers into his harvest."

Matthew 9:36-38

As disciples we are called to share the good news of the Kingdom and to help bring in God's harvest of new followers of Jesus. These are the disciples that Jesus calls us to make in the Great Commission, and it is part of our role not simply to make converts but to mentor and coach the next generation. We need to see the harvest not just in terms of crops, fruit and vegetables but as a spiritual reality that sees us offer the story of Jesus to a world in need.

## Caring for God's Acre:

Putting your meadow to bed for the winter!

It's often thought that encouraging wildlife into churchyards or cemeteries is a case of leaving them to go wild and stopping management. Actually, this is not the case. Many of the species and habitats found in burial grounds have been present for the decades or even centuries that this special place has been cared for. These plants, animals, birds and fungi will have been

widespread in the farmed landscape of the past. If you want to maintain or increase wildlife in your local churchyard or cemetery then the best thing to do is to continue this traditional work rather than making a big change and leaving things unmanaged. Most churchyards are a mix of grassland with individual trees or groups of trees which can be thought of as small woodlands. There may well be some patches of scrub as well. It is the grassland that needs regular management if it is not to change its character, and we can look to the history of churchyards for clues on how to do this.

We know that churchyards were kept open and accessible as they were always important community spaces, used for outdoor services, for archery practice, markets and fairs as well as for burial. There are records of a hay crop being taken which formed part of the vicar's stipend and of grazing after the hay was cut. For much of history, grass was an important energy crop, so a meadow would be cut at the height of its growth in summer, when the bulk of the nutrients are above ground, and any cut grass would be dried as hay, raked up and taken to feed animals in winter. Small patches of meadow, such as that found on verges and in churchyards, might not seem worth 'farming' now but would have had value back in the day. The wonderful shows of wildflowers that we see in our churchyard meadows are made of plants able to thrive in these conditions, able to survive cutting and grazing. Meadow plants tend to be perennial, these can survive the winter, often living for many years. Perennials do not actually need to flower or set seed although doing so will allow them to increase in number. There are a few meadow plants that are annuals and don't survive over winter but these, such as yellow rattle, tend to flower early prior to the hay cut, so can grow each year from the seed that has fallen.

Another difference between old fashioned systems and our modern world is mowing machines. These are relatively recent inventions and have become more efficient over the years, able to cut grass really short and very uniform. Again, if you want to increase the flowers, pollinators and wildlife generally, having a slightly longer sward, perhaps cut less often can make a big difference as short-stemmed plants like clovers, daisies, cat's ear and speedwells can then flower. Things were generally less tidy in the past. As well as a more uneven sward, there would have been edges and corners that didn't get cut, so places for animals to withdraw to following grass cutting, and to shelter in over winter. Thinking in this way can help to make meadow management easy to understand.

Let the grass grow long for 3 or 4 months over the spring and summer. Follow this by a summer cut and rake (you can make hay if you like or just remove the cut grass). Don't worry about cutting flowers: the plants will survive, and some

species may regrow and flower again. N.B. If you don't want to cut particularly late flowering species such as scabious or knapweed, then cut the bulk of the meadow and leave some flowery patches till later on.

Keep grass short over the autumn and winter, the time when it might have been grazed in the past. You'll probably use a mower for this. Again, do not leave grass cuttings in situ, try to collect them all up and remove for composting.

Remember that, as far as nature goes, we are now a bit too tidy! Set the mower blade high and leave some rough edges or corners. These tussocky corners will contain coarser grasses such as false oat grass and cocksfoot, plants with hollow stems such as hogweed and dead flower heads – all really good places for insects, amphibians, reptiles and small mammals to hide, hunt and hibernate over winter.

So what can you do in October? Not much actually. The hard work should be over! You can make sure that all meadow areas have been cut, raked and are now short, ready for the winter, and can leave any rough corners and dead flower stems as they are, rather than being messy they are a vital resource for the winter.

and the rain held off, in fact it was a perfect afternoon to enjoy all seven churches, each one looking fine and welcoming.







#### Autumn

A tiny bit of Matthew Arnold's poem Rugby Chapel which sums up Autumn quite well I think. A very popular Victorian poet, he was the son of the famous Headmaster of Rugby School.

The autumn-evening. The field Strewn with its dank yellow drifts Of wither'd leaves, and the elms, Fade into dimness apace, Silent;

Yes we are in October and it really is Autumn now. Those winds that brought down all those leaves last month were just playing with the seasons. Now we have a month which slowly gets darker each day, until that brief respite when we award ourselves, that short-lived lighting on the last Saturday/Sunday night of October (27<sup>th</sup>/28<sup>th</sup>).

So what might brighten our lives through this 10<sup>th</sup> month of the year that used to be the 8<sup>th</sup> month (*octo* gives it away) but survives anyway in a very colourful way. Because he invented the Christmas crib scene - he put some figures outside his home in Grecchio with the help of his friend, Friar John. Many life-like cribs appear all over the world today and many a home brings one out to mark the festive season. (I have a lovely crib I bought in Palestine on one of my trips to there, working as a journalist.)

Later in October we also have St Luke, the patron saint of doctors and best known for writing one of the four gospels. He is also associated with St Luke's little summer, a weather phenomenon which sees a brief spell of warm temperatures around his feast day on the 18<sup>th</sup> October. Our guest speaker, John Hughes, provided an illuminating insight into life working at the Depot in the 1950s, liberally peppered with some very amusing stories of the characters he worked with!



91-year-old John entertained us for almost an hour, then spoke to a number of people who had relatives, or knew people, working at the depot around the same time; some bringing their own photographs to show him and share their memories.

Our guest speaker Patricia Hodgkiss has had a lifetime interest in wartime aviation history, since being bombed by the Luftwaffe as a babe in arms in Birmingham. Her research into crashes on and around Brown Clee led her to establishing the memorial in memory of the many airmen lost on England's deadliest hill.

meeting of the new programme. The format for the year remains the same, but we have some new and exciting speakers to look forward to. Our first speakers on October 9th are Jill and Alun Whitehead, who live and work on Aulden Farm which is in a very small hamlet in Herefordshire. ## Molecule of the Month: GABA Receptors




Our brain is made of something like 60 to 90 billion nerve cells; they are constantly talking to each other. Each of those nerves might make contact with around 10,000 of its neighbours; in some brain regions the figure can be well over 100-fold greater than this. This poses a problem; can you imagine trying to hold 10,000 conversations at the same time?



Sometimes, we need to silence some voices in order to hear others. Of course, that is not an analogy that can be taken too far, but the general principle is true; to process information properly, we need to be able both to switch on to the important inputs and switch off the distractions. Nerves in the brain have this ability. Some nerves specialise in exciting, switching on their partners, but others are inhibitory; they switch off the nerves they connect to. By co-ordinating the on- and off-switching, the brain can order its activity.

Inhibitory nerves in the brain release a special chemical to instruct their neighbours to switch off; gamma-amino butyric acid. For obvious reasons, this is abbreviated to GABA. GABA works by binding to a "receptor" on the surface of the nerves. This is a protein that recognises GABA and is known as the GABAA receptor (the subscript "A" distinguishes it from another, biochemically distinct receptor for GABA). It is made of five smaller proteins that pack together like the staves in the wall of the barrel. Normally these smaller proteins, the "subunits" of the GABA receptor fit tightly together. However, when GABA binds they move apart, to open up the inside of the barrel. This means that charged atoms can





pass through to either enter or leave the nerve cell. In the case of the GABA receptors, this makes the inside of the nerve cells more negatively charged which means it is harder for them to become activated.

Overactivity in various brain regions can cause many diseases and conditions. One example is anxiety. For many years this was treated with drugs called barbiturates (readers of a certain age may remember these; I recall them as being a favourite therapy of the late Dr Wilkins in Highley). These worked by activating

GABAA receptors and reducing anxiety; however, it is easy to overdose on them. A major step forward came in the 1960s with Valium and related drugs (the benzodiazepines); these also work on the GABAA receptors but are much safer. Whilst benzodiazepines are not much used these days, they revolutionised treatment for anxiety disorders when they became available. (continued on next page)

We still have much to learn about the GABAA receptor. The biggest issue is that, whilst the receptor itself only has 5 subunits (the sides of the "barrel"), the body actually makes around 30 different proteins which can come together to form a functional receptor. The exact composition depends on the cell that makes the receptor. This matters because the way the receptor responds to drugs depends on the individual subtypes that come together to make it. Very recently, a study has been published using sections of brain removed from individuals with severe epilepsy. It has been possible to identify the composition of the different GABAA receptors in these people. They have been shown to have 12 different types of receptor. The study used a special type of microscopy called cryo-electron microscopy to take pictures that showed the structure of each of these in molecular detail. This provided a surprise. When the scientists looked at the pictures, they could see that there was also a drug bound to the receptors. It turns out that this lamotrigine, an agent widely prescribed to people with epilepsy. Previously it was thought that this worked by binding to proteins that cause nerve cells to become active; inappropriate activation of nerves is what underlies epilepsy. Lamotrigine certainly does act in that way. However, the paper now shows that in addition, it also activates GABAA receptors, shutting nerve cells down.

## Be a Hedgrow Hero!

**CPRE Shropshire's Hedgerow Heroes** project has funding for a fifth year and we will be planting a further 4km of new species-rich hedgerows into the Shropshire countryside as well as running hedgelaying workshops for beginners and hedgerow management sessions for farmers and landowners in the Ludlow and Clun area. We will continue with our hedgerow arts workshops with local Shrewsbury artist Andrew Howe.

Over 4 years, we have planted 24km of hedgerows with the help of our fantastic volunteers and have gone on to farms, smallholdings, school sites, community fields and even cemeteries, amounting (amazingly) to around 100 sites now in the county.

The benefits of hedgerows - We plant a mix of species based around a core of Hawthorn and Hazel. These can include Field Maple, Plum, Crab Apple, Spindle and Guelder Rose, all providing blossom and fruit or nuts for insects and birds. We encourage some trees to be allowed to grow and mature as hedgerow trees. Occasionally we plant fruit trees in the hedgerow, like heritage apple and Shropshire plum.

Eventually once the hedgerows mature, they should become brilliant wildlife corridors, providing shelter and foraging for small mammals, birds and insects. As well as providing bounty and shelter for wildlife, well-managed hedges provide great resources on-farm, offering shelter and shade to livestock in wind, rain and sun and they can help to prevent run off and spraydrift.

**The planting sessions** - We plant hedgerows between early December and March. Our sessions run from 10am to around lunchtime over the winter on weekdays and

weekends. We supply hot drinks and refreshments for volunteers during the morning. Experienced volunteer leads run the hedge planting sessions, so anyone who has not planted before is shown what to do.

The whips (hedgerow saplings) are sorted out into big mixed species bundles at the start of the session so volunteers have their own bag to work through. Our planting groups can be as small as 8 or 10 or as large as 30+ It can be an amazing sight looking up from your planting and seeing a line of hedgerow steadily developing either side of you and the feeling of group satisfaction when it's all safely in is quite something! Volunteering for hedge planting is a great way of meeting like-minded people and doing something really positive and practical for nature and the wider countryside and the sites are often in glorious parts of the county with great views! We provide the tools (tree planting spades) and are delighted to welcome families, but children under 16 must be accompanied by a responsible adult. We have welcomed several Duke of Edinburgh students over the years, completing their community work hours.

One thing we have learned over the years: hedgerows have the capacity to link up landscapes, but through this project, they have also linked up many people and communities.

In a complete contrast to last month the earth is undergoing a second spring and defying description with its greenness and verdancy. Things are growing so fast its almost possible to see inches being added to the grass just by standing and watching. And all the while we are celebrating the harvest and seeing a huge number of acorns and apples and damsons, in fact absolutely everything is appearing in such huge volumes it's difficult to keep up. Freezers are running out of space, shelves are bowing under the weight of so many jars of jam and there is some thought of bottling fruit as we may have seen done as children. There is after all a limit to how many plums can be eaten at one sitting...really there is albeit that some try to defy this...how unwise!

With that thought of abundancy in mind please remember our foodbanks are still in need of donations either in cash or kind (www.cleoburyfoodbank.co.uk). And places like the Hands Together Community Fridge in Ludlow where you can take food donations and help reduce food waste, its open to all, just check their website to see how this works. (handstogetherludlow.org.uk).

Just a reminder about the vacancy for the new Rector. The closing date has now passed and the required process is underway. There isn't much more to say at this point except that we are all of course hoping for a positive outcome. The PCCs in the Benefice are all involved and as soon as there is something to say I am sure we will hear about it, hopefully in these pages, next month.

We also gathered in number to pay our respects to Chris Tibbits at his funeral on 24<sup>th</sup> September at Stottesdon. A church packed with family and friends, many from the rail industry, raised the roof in celebration of his life. The gap he leaves will be difficult to fill.

'Meanwhile' as he and Clare would say 'we continue to strive for a flourishing Christian presence in our parishes, our two schools and the wider communities we serve, please;

- Cherish and support the volunteers who work so hard to sustain the church here -the Church Wardens, the parish reps and the members of the PCCs.
- Remember to thank the volunteer visiting clergy who are routinely and willingly facilitating our Sunday worship and other services as needed'.
