"While cherishing our traditions, we see the need for change" - We always see the need for change, but alter anything at your peril.


"Plans for church renovations are in hand" - The building is in imminent danger of collapse.

Despite widespread unemployment our Hollinfare Society were delighted to announce that for the first time all five lads undergoing rehabilitation after borstal had each secured jobs.

One of the lads, Kevin, had to make two journeys by bus to reach his place of work - a farm in Daresbury where he was assisting with the potato harvest and the slaughtering of turkeys in preparation for the Christnas market.

All were keen supporters of our newly-formed HYPO youth club and attended church services. All had arrived at the vicarage with little more than the clothes in which they stood and our vicar, Tony Corble, appealed to parishioners not to throw away unwanted clothes and instead donate them to the society.

Noelle Atkinson, leader of our netball team, held a disco to raise funds for the girls' playing kit.

Richard John Bailey and Helen Louise Morris were baptised, Michael Paul Atherton and Maria Farrimond were married and there were funeral services for Ann Blundell and Edith Annie Williams.

We also heard of the death of Annie Robertson, nee Jackson, who had taught in our day school for almost 40 years. As a child she lived at the mission house in Rixton and in 1918 she married Walter, son of a farmer at Rixton New Hall.

They set up home in Warrington but Annie continued to teach the children of our village until the mid-1950s.

The Cawley enigma


As we all know, there is a stained glass window and a plaque installed in our church during the 19th century in memory of members of the Cawley family of Glazebrook.

But there is something intriguing about them. The south wall window, pictured on our front page, was presented to church by the children "to the glory of God and in memory of William and Nancy Cawley" and depicts Jesus - Salvator Mundi (the Saviour of our World) above two angelic figures - along with St John the Baptist who bears a cross and St Paul who has a Holy Bible and a sword in his hands. It is dated 1885.

The plaque records a legacy of £300 (worth more than £20,000 today) given by William as an investment for the interest to provide successive

churchwardens help with expenses year afer year. The payments are still being made. But it also records that William died on July 25 1886. Can it really be that the window was installed before he died?

Where our harvest gifts go to...

The gifts were then collected by representatives of the Irlam and Cadishead Foodbank which was established in September 2016.

The foodbank now have lots of local volunteers, spearheaded by six trustees in conjunction with the Trussell Trust and several local churches.

They moved from Boundary Road Methodist Church to to St Joseph the Worker RC Church in Cutnook Lane, Irlam, three years ago.

To make the foodbank more successful, however, they still need more volunteers and resources from the community and local businesses.

Donations are received on Monday afternoons, between noon and 1.30pm and they distribute food parcels to clients each Tuesday morning between 9.30 and 12.30pm

Rev Bernard Clark

We were all saddened to hear of the death of Rev Bernard Clark last month.

On the creation of the united benefice of Hollinfare and Glazebury in 1994 Bernard was licensed as its first incumbent by the Rt Rev Michael Henshall, Bishop of Warrington, at a service here at St Helen's on February 12.

At that time, Bob was our Area Dean; his team also included Revs Alan Litton and Wilf Alexander.

Bernard had left the ministry eight years earlier to become chief officer of Age Concern in Wirral where he led a staff of 15 and 150 volunteers.

Bernard served part of his curacy at Winwick St Oswald's, working with Rev Canon Lawton, and continued it as a member of a team of four at Hindley All Saints.

He became a parish priest at Hindley and later at St Barnabas, Warrington, and St Philip's Westbrook.

He then began working for Age Concern while his wife Kathleen was employed as a social worker with the Church of England Children's Society at Century House in Farnworth. In Wirral, Bernard was able to conduct Sunday services at more than 20 churches.

A house in Meadowbank Gardens, Glazebury, became a vicarage and those in School Lane and adjacent to All Saints were sold. Bernard and Kath became enthusiastic supporters of our Sunday School and organised memorable weekends for the children and teachers in Llandudno and Mellor in Derbyshire.

Born in London in 1933, Bernard was evacuated to the countryside during the Blitz - in his case South Wales.

He was eventually allowed to return home and remembers vividly the V1 "doodlebugs" exploding in his neighbourhood while crouching in a Morrison shelter.

He supported Middlesex CCC from the days of Denis Compton and Bill Edrich and he was especially knowledgeable about classical music and its creators. He became a convert to rugby league and Wigan in particular while at Hindley.

Before ordination Bernard was employed by a regional hospital board, ultimately as a senior administrator. For National Service he joined the RAF, initially being stationed at Padgate and took part in NATO exercises in Germany.

Bernard was inspired to the ministry by a friend, Alan Wilkinson, who became canon theologian at Portsmouth Cathedral and he was trained under a scheme created by the then Bishop of Southwark, Rt Rev Mervyn Stockwood. We express our deepest condolences to Kathleen and the family.
