

Reverend Clifford's Weekly Blog 'Harvest'

27th September 2025

Harvest

Yes this weekend we celebrate in the life of St. Helen's the harvest of 2025.

Once again it has been a warm year, one of the hottest since records began and I guess traditional harvest fruits might of either suffered or blossomed from it, whilst the change in our climate allows for other crops to be grown. Personally, we have a small apricot tree that for the first time gave us small but delicious fruit enjoying the extra warmth. A small potted cherry tree produced some fruit, but it then perished in the heat.

Now we have kept recorded weather and climate records in the UK since the 1600's but they didn't really become an accurate record until the late 1800's at the turn of the 20th century. What is clear though is the world's climate whether it be increased now by our human activity has always changed with or without us. The Romans planted vineyards here in Britain then a mini-Ice age in the 14th Century changed all that, but now once again vineyards are scattered at least across the southern parts of the UK and are thriving. The climate adjusts and nature adapts and I guess we must too. What is certain is that whatever the climate is, as long as we plant for it the earth will always bring forth a harvest and if we get it right, it always produces an abundance, we have to plan and think ahead and not just do the same old thing.

It reminds me of the story of Joseph which we will be re-telling at the next Messy Church. Jospeh's success was in that he learnt how to read the weather. God gave Pharoah a dream which haunted him, and no one could describe what it meant.

Joseph was a dreamer, and he learnt how to interpret the minds messages and the messages from God, he knew exactly what Pharaohs dream was all about.

For seven years the land of Egypt would produce an abundant crop, the Nile delta giving everything it could, too much in fact. Joseph's past as the son of a nomadic tribesman called Jacob, clearly gave him a knowledge and wisdom of how to survive in the harsh wildness of the Middle East. Now it was time not just to interpret dreams but to use that early experience to save the day. Build barns, store all that was surplice for those seven years of plenty because as is common in that part of the world seven years of drought and failed crops was coming too.

What I like about this story is Pharoah trusted Joseph and invested in those barns, he put him charge of operations, a Hebrew slave, I wonder if he ever doubted him over those first seven years as the harvest did what it did best and provided Egypt with some of the best natural products in the world. It paid off because whilst other countries around the Middle East suffered great famine and people starved, Egypt had plenty, it might not have been as fresh as they would have liked but there was grain and other supplies to feed every mouth and even sell it on to other neighbouring countries. Joseph taught them how to adapt, how to look ahead, how to trust in God, his God who saved him from a life in slavery and rewarded him with the second highest position to Pharoah. If we only remember Joseph because of his colourful coat then we have missed so much of the story.

God provides everything we need through creation but creation moves and breathes, it adapts and changes, once here in Cliffe everything was under the sea, we know that because we are called Cliffe because simply there is a large chalky Cliff at the edge of our village, the chalk deposits are made up of tiny microscopic marine organisms that fell to the ocean floor. Today we have to walk down that cliff and out across the marsh to find the water of the Thames. Then there was a time just 7000 years ago when the seas receded so far back, believe it or not due to global warming that there was nothing dividing us from mainland Europe, they call it Doggerland, today the North Sea. Humans might be warming things up a little quicker, but these changes have always been with us, and we have adapted with them and continued to bring in the harvest that only God has provided. For he gave us the seed, we planted it, and He watered it and provided it with warmth, and it grew and produced its crop, and we then harvested it and then shared it with each other.

That last statement, we shared it, is something that we are not always so good at and as we tuck into our harvest lunches let us never forget those who are starving in many parts of the world, can we pray for more people like Joesph who saw the problem and was able to save the day because he knew there was plenty to go around. It is an ancient story that can teach us still so much today.

Enjoy then the harvest of 2025 as new seed is scattered for the next harvest.


