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# LETTER FROM THE CURATE Rev'd Elizabeth Burren

I'm writing this in late summer, the sun is still warm, and the trees are just beginning to show a bit of gold. I love the turning of the seasons, and the first hints of Autumn are reminding me that it will soon be a full year since I arrived in the churches of the Teign Valley and Haldon Hill. It's been a



joy to get to know the people and communities here and to be part of the rhythm of life in these villages. Each one has its own character, but what has been universal has been the warmth and generosity of the welcome.

My first service here was Remembrance Sunday in St James' Christow, and I remember feeling grateful to the church family there for helping me to feel at home and to understand what they needed from me on this important day. This spirit of openness and co-operation continued in all of the six churches and villages of the Teign Valley and I am glad to have been formed by the people of this place. There is a strength and continuity in these villages which I haven't experienced before, a real sense of community and a willingness to show up and get involved, and I hope I can find this, or bring it with me, wherever I find myself in the future.

I recently spend a day on Dartmoor with my husband and son, and at one point we stood on Haytor, and could see Exmouth where we lived for 30 years, the Teign estuary where we live now, and across to Belvedere Tower which overlooks the valleys and hills where I currently work. Peter and I are in the process of looking for our next job in the church, and this will mean moving away from these places where we have lived and loved and been nurtured. Seeing them all laid out in front of me gave me a new perspective, and helped me to resolve my feelings about moving on in life. The people and places that I love in Devon are part of me now, and will go with me into the future just as the relationships, challenges and joys of a new life in a new place will become a part of who I am.

What helps you to look forward, and back, and to reflect on your journey through life? Life's big events - a change of job, a house move, a bereavement, or a new birth are all natural moments to reflect; but the changing of the seasons can also prompt a more regular review of memories and future hopes.

As church leaders we are taught to reflect often on what we are doing and how it is going. What can we learn, what might we do better next time? It's such a helpful habit, not just for church leaders, but for everyone. It can be so easy to drift through life feeling as if we are making little difference, but when we look back at where we were a week, a month, or a year ago we can see where God has been at work. It's the little things, the everyday acts of kindness that can easily go unnoticed, that add up to making a difference in the world.

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### Neighbourhood Plan Meeting



# SHILLINGFORD ST GEORGE HARVEST SUPPER MONDAY OCTOBER 13TH

The annual Harvest Supper is being held in the Village Hall on the above date. The harvest makes a significant contribution to our everyday lives and has been celebrated by communities in England for hundreds of years with a variety of events such as feasts and fairs. Harvest time involves not only cutting wheat to make our bread but provides a whole array of other crops, including the fruits and vegetables that we expect to see in the shops.

The church celebrates the harvest with a Harvest Festival which is being held on Sunday 12<sup>th</sup> October. The Harvest Supper is a Community Event organised by the church for the community of all ages in the villages to celebrate the harvest. In some rural areas, larger villages need a marquee because so many villagers take part in the Harvest Supper and in the smaller villages the Village Halls are full.

### JAZZ IN SHILLINGFORD TWO – AN EVENING WITH PETE ALLEN

### SATURDAY 29TH NOVEMBER 2025

This event is being held again this year following a very successful evening last year and following requests for a repeat performance. The venue will be the Village Hall in Shillingford St George and has been arranged to raise funds for St George the Martyr Church in Shillingford St George.

Pete has had his own band for over 45 years playing traditional jazz. In the past his band was the most featured band of its style on a host of popular Radio 2 programmes including the Terry Wogan Breakfast Show and Friday Night Is Music Night. The band also made regular appearances on television for BBC Pebble Mill and other television channels. Overseas tours included the USA, Germany, Denmark and Holland. The current band will be performing at the No.1 jazz venue in London.

Over the years Pete has played alongside many USA jazz legends and UK jazz stars including the late Kenny Ball and Acker Bilk. He has released over 100 recordings. This summer the band has played at the Bude Jazz Festival.

This event is Pete's solo music show with him playing live against specially recorded orchestrated backing music. He will play a variety of musical styles suited for clarinet and saxophone and it is a presentation of his multi-instrumental playing and singing. This is an opportunity to see and hear the skill and talent of a high calibre musician who will bring the Village Hall alive with the sound of jazz.

In view of the success of last years event, tickets are likely to be in demand and early booking is recommended.

### Dragon Bell Temple, Shillingford St George

Hello, My name is Willard, I would like to briefly introduce myself and what I do. I moved into Shillingford St George mid-August.

I am the prior of Dragon Bell Temple, which is a charity, and I am a Buddhist monastic / priest (a Reverend), ordained in 1995, Willard is my given

monastic name. The temple was founded in 2002 and has been at various locations in Devon ever since. I took over from my predecessor in 2020. The temple has moved over from Drewsteignton where it has been for the last five years.

You are most welcome to drop to just to say hello, have a cuppa, or a look at how we are gradually transforming the bungalow into a temple. Whether you are mildly curious or seriously interested in what we do, please come by. It might be best to call ahead, though you can chance it, I am mostly here and free weekdays.

The temple has a website with a calendar of regular events including formal introduction sessions for people interested in exploring our practice. It is easy to arrange introductions at other times to suit. Our main practice is a form of silent seated meditation together with precepts of moral behaviour. Our tradition (Soto Zen), teaches that all beings are Buddha Nature and what we call 'practice' is a way to actualise this. The qualities of our true nature manifest as compassion, love and wisdom.

I am glad to have landed here in Shillingford, mostly because of the generous and friendly welcome from people, as well as the beautiful area. The bungalow and it's setting are lovely. The location in Devon is well suited to our small congregation and should also be easily accessible for new people too. I hope to be a good neighbour and that Dragon Bell will be a positive and quiet presence in the life of the village and area. I will live in the temple in The Willows and people will come for meetings, mostly at the weekends. Some sessions are available on Zoom for people further afield.

To put into a nutshell what we are about – to live a full life through transforming whatever obstacles that appear within ourselves and seem to prevent us from doing so, ceasing from doing harm, doing only good, being good for others, and hopefully leaving our patch of the world a little better than how we found it. Respect, gratitude and generosity of spirit are at the core of Buddhist practice. It is not about having funny ideas about the world, or about identity, or politics.

The tour of the castle was most enjoyable and exciting! It was a pleasure to have Mark as our guide. Each room in the castle had been splendidly renovated or revitalised and in keeping with its character. The views were spectacular from each window on each floor. Even the people who were unable to do the stairs for the tour were kept happy, sitting in comfort or perusing the history panels that were cleverly placed around the walls of the ground floor.

The refreshment table (organised by Samantha and her team) was waiting for us after the tour and was a delight to see. The tea and cakes were delicious. Mark gave a talk and explained that the transfer of ownership of the Haldon Belvedere and grounds had been made to Devon Historic Buildings Trust and the top floor luxury penthouse holiday apartment has been relaunched for short breaks and group visits were now restarting.

### FORESTRY COMMISSION MAMHEAD - WELLBEING TRAIL

If you enjoy a walk in the country you may wish to try this trail or others through the forest at the Forestry Commission site at Mamhead.

Spending time amongst the trees and really noticing nature is scientifically proven to boost our mental and physical health. Follow the trail to take a mindful walk through the forest that invites you to really relax. The wellbeing trail at Mamhead is a 1 mile/1.6km route around the woods on a wide, flat, smooth, hard packed gravel surface. The trail is suitable for all weathers and for wheelchairs and buggies.

There are also gentle walking trails that take you along wide, flat, surfaced tracks. Explore varied forest habitats and discover one of the finest views of Devon overlooking the River Exe estuary and Exmouth. Choose from two distances of 1 mile or 1.5 miles that start

from and return to the car park. Both loops are clearly waymarked and there are resting points along the way. These trails are suitable for pushchairs, wheelchairs, and mobility scooters. On the way try and find the 18th century Mamhead or Haldon obelisk near the view that was built to help ships navigate the Exe estuary. It's no longer much use for that surrounded by trees but it's a nice focus for a walk in the quieter eastern edge of Haldon.

Car parking charges are £1/1 hour or £2/2 hours – card only. There is a Teign Bean site selling coffee and cakes that is there for 7 days during the summer and open until 4 pm but only Wednesday to Sunday in the winter and open until 3 pm. There are picnic benches to enjoy alfresco refreshments amongst the pine trees. There are longer walks that I normally do through the quiet forest if you feel adventurous.

### 7.30pm in Shillingford Village Hall What can a graveyard tell us about Georgian Exeter? Exeter Dissenters' Graveyard



# THE TALK WILL BE GIVEN BY DR. IAN VARNDELL Members and visitors are all welcome

A patch of land smaller than two tennis courts located just outside Exeter's city walls became a burial ground for protestant dissenters for just over 100 years. Around 2000 people were buried there before it closed in 1854. Ian Varndell will tell us about the origins of the site and the non-conformist congregations who paid for it; he will describe how and, more importantly, why it has been conserved. A small group has been researching the lives of Exeter's dissenting families and he will finish with stories of three Exonians who were buried in "Saints Rest" – giving us a glimpse into their lives more than two centuries ago.

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### The Discombes of Pengellys Farm, Shillingford Abbot – Part One.

In July 1918, Messrs. J. Hannaford and Son, auctioneers of Exeter and Chulmleigh, offered outlying portions of the Haldon House Estate for sale by auction, at the Rougemont Hotel in Queen Street, Exeter. The properties were in Exminster and Kenn parishes, about 335 acres in total, and were being sold by the trustees of the late James Fitzgerald Bannatyne, Esquire who had died in 1915 at home in *Haldon House* at 82 years of age. His son Major James Fitzgerald Bannatyne, of The Hussars, had inherited his father's estate, but had died the following year, during the Great War; his daughter Mary Bannatyne had married Ludovic Heathcoat Amery of *Knightshayes Court*, near Tiverton, but he had also been killed in 1918, in France, and so her late father's estate was being sold off.

Frederick John Discombe, the young farmer who was already tenant, purchased Lot 1 – the freehold dairy, grazing, sheep and corn farm of 161 acres known as *Pengellys* - for £8,300. At that time Pengellys, which was at Lower Shillingford (now known as Shillingford Abbot) was still in Exminster parish. Frederick John Discombe also bought Lot 5, which he was leasing, for £1,125; it was described as grazing or feeding marsh adjoining Exeter Canal, in the parish of Exminster.

Frederick Discombe, the son of farmer John Discombe and his wife Mary, had been born in Kenton in November 1888, and had grown up there on *Helwill/Helwell Farm*. He was their only son, and had two sisters, Maud and Amy. When the census was taken in 1911, he had been aged 22, still living and working on the family farm in Kenton.



In April 1915, Frederick Discombe had married May Burrington at St Martin's parish church in Exminster. Both the Vicar of Exminster and the Vicar of Kenton participated in the marriage ceremony. The wedding celebrations were described as quiet, owing to the war; nevertheless the *Western Times* newspaper claimed that much local interest had been shown in the wedding, and described it in some detail. This photograph, sent as a copy in 2010 to the current owners of *East Pengellys* by Frederick and May's grandchildren after their visit to the farm, shows the couple on their wedding day.

May Burrington was the only daughter of the late George Rowe Burrington, a well-known farmer of *Towsington* in Exminster, and his wife Julia; she had been baptised in June 1891 in Exminster parish church. She had two

brothers—Reginald and John—who also became farmers, but her only sister Margery had died at 2 months of age. May's family had been connected with the parish of Exminster since the early 1700s. Her new sister-in-law Maud Discombe was one of her bridesmaids, Frederick's cousin William Haydon Discombe of *Wolfsgrove* in Bishopsteignton was his best man, and the newspaper reported that the couple had

received over 100 wedding presents!

In 1913 previous tenant John Carpenter had retired from farming at *Pengellys*, and had gone to live on a farm in Brampford Speke with his nieces, where he died in 1915, so perhaps it was his son Reginald who gave up the tenancy of *Pengellys Farm* in 1915. Frederick and his new wife must have taken over soon after they married, and their daughter Barbara was born at *Pengellys* in May 1916.

In January 1918, before he had purchased the farm, Frederick had to appear before the Wonford Petty Sessions Cm ourt at the Castle of Exeter to give evidence about a fire on *Pengellys* which one of his labourers had left burning in a hilly field at night. Under the Defence of the Realm Act, a British emergency law passed in 1914 that granted the government extraordinary powers in order to protect the nation during World War I, there were restrictions on public activities such as lighting bonfires and fireworks. Police Constable Endacott judged that the fire's reflection could have been seen as far as Lympstone and Topsham. Frederick told the court that the fire had been lit on his instructions, but that he had thought the fire had been put out at 5 o'clock – apparently the wind freshened in the evening and revived it – so he was very sorry. His employee David Leach was obviously considered the guilty party and was fined the hefty sum of 10 shillings.

In 1919, the Discombe and Burrington families became even more closely related when Frederick's sister Maud married May's older brother John Burrington, and moved to live with him at *Towsington*.

An advertisement in the *Exeter and Plymouth Gazette* in September 1918 reveals that Frederick Discombe was not only running a dairy and raising sheep, but was selling seed wheat – he offered a clean and good sample of "Benefactor" seed wheat – and he continued to sell seed wheat of different varieties through the 1920s.

For many years, the Discombes remained a family of three. Their daughter Barbara was mentioned in the paper as a small child on at least two occasions, as a donor to the Exeter Farthing Breakfast Fund through the *Exeter and Plymouth Gazette* newspaper office. In March 1921, Barbara donated 44 farthings, and in December 1922, another 100 farthings – though she was under 7 years old at the time, so perhaps she'd had some adult help. The Exeter Farthing Breakfast Fund had been started in about 1901 by Mr. and Mrs. Abram Davey and carried on by their daughter, Mrs. Ellen Tinkham. It had been set up to give poor children living in Exeter's West Quarter a breakfast (often the only decent meal they had), and the farthings paid by the children were matched by donations from benefactors.

Barbara was sent to The Maynard School, a private girls' school in Exeter. And towards the end of 1928, when she was 12 years old, her mother May finally gave birth to a second child – a son. No doubt this was the cause of much celebration. He was named John, after his grandfather John Discombe of *Helwell Farm*.



### **Roman Maths**

Be glad you were not at school in Roman times! Just to recap, Roman numerals are not like ours, letters represent numbers:

I means 1, V means 5, X means 10, L means 50, C means 100, D means 500 and M means 1000.

Notice that the numbers used most often (I to L) are easy to carve onto stone monuments. C and D are less easy but were also used much less often.

If a Roman wanted to express a larger number, he simply appended the extra bits, in decreasing order, to the **end** of his number. So 37 was written XXXVII. 52 was written LII, 266 was written CCLXVI.

If the same Roman wanted a smaller number, he placed the unwanted bits **before** his last number. So 9 was written IX, 29 was written XXIX and 54 was written LIV.

Suppose we want to add 278+368. We place the numbers in columns beneath each other and add each column. Easy!

278 328 606

How did our Roman schoolchild add these two numbers together? Not easy at all... He has to add CCLXXVIII to CCCXXVIII.

He must write all the letters in a long line, largest first:

**CCCCLXXXXVVIIIIII** 

Then, starting on the right, he must combine according to the rules:

IIIII = V CCCCLXXXXVVVI VV = X CCCCLXXXXXVI


XXXXX = L CCCCCLLVI

CCCCC = D DCVI

There we have it! CCLXXVIII + CCCXXVIII = DCVI
