

Dear sisters and brothers,

I am delighted to be able to share with you today an update on the work that has been taking place around the Called Together diocesan vision and strategy.

I am sure you'll remember that back in March, we were able to announce that the National Church, through the Strategic Mission and Ministry Investment Board, had awarded us a grant of almost £11 million to invest in our vision and strategy to **change**, **serve** and **grow**, as we seek together to serve the Kingdom of God in the Diocese of Rochester.

People have been wondering, of course, what's been happening since then? And the short answer is, a great deal.

Much work has been taking place over the spring and summer to finalise the details with the National Church concerning the vision's expected overall outcomes, what the national team are expecting of us, the governance structures for managing this very significant investment, and the process for reporting on the way the work is going.

All of that has been necessary so that we could finally draw down the funds that have been promised and begin the first phases of this ambitious and hope-filled plan for the entire diocesan-family.

The good news is that all this is now in place - after a great deal of work behind the scenes - enabling us to start mobilising the programme of work that will help us to:

- · Grow and sustain confident mission-focused leaders, both lay and ordained
- Nurture faith in the next generation
- Use targeted investments to encourage and support growth and to resource other parishes through that learning
- Strengthen those parishes who are especially facing financial and missional challenges by coming alongside them, and
- Meet our commitments to growing safe and healthy churches that are diverse, inclusive and that allow everyone to experience the fullness of life that Jesus promised



Reverend Clifford's Weekly Blog 'Imagine'

Imagine

John Lennon once sung in his last verse:

Imagine all the people
Sharing all the world
You, You may say I'm a dreamer
But I'm not the only one
I hope someday you'll join us
And the world will live as one

I don't want to imagine his first verse:

Imagine there's no heaven It's easy if you try No hell below us

Above us, only sky

Imagine all the people

Livin' for today

I personally believe that many of the worlds problems are triggered by a new population that really do believe yet alone imagine the first verse, take away either or both heaven and hell and all we have is earth.

As I see it the problem with no heaven is it removes hope.

If you only have heaven then the problem is that with no hell is it removes consequences and thus responsibility.

Today many are just living for today, it's a self-indulgent world, take what you can, make what you can whilst you can, because tomorrow may never come and if this is all there ever is; you might as well make the most of your own desires.

We are literally stripping the earth bare with little regard for our grandchildren and theirs. Just today as writing we have been warned that the carbon we are putting into the atmosphere is far greater than we imagined and it's too late to turn back the clock of its effects. The UK is being warned it needs to get ready for a minimum 2% rise in temperature by 2050 but more likely a 4% rise; for at present, we are not prepared for the consequences of that. Already water each summer and now in other seasons is scarce as our population continues to rise by just under half a million a year. These are the UK problems, traditional crops and wildlife being replaced by more Mediterranean varieties, whilst I might enjoy this climate, the truth is it will change much of what I know.

If we are to survive long term as a human race we all need to wake up to that last verse, we need to learn to share the world and live as one. I believe unlike John Lennon, that if we focus on heaven and hell and take on the consequences as being real then we might be able to start seeing real change. Until then the conflict we see all around the world with nature and with ourselves will continue because we have under valued its worth.

Our value of life is shocking; this week thank God we have seen the return of hostages to Israel both those alive and those who have sadly died. My genuine prayer is for lasting peace, but it seems we value life depending on which side of the boarder we live, are we really shocked that the IDF have killed in just two years @ least 67000 people mainly women, children and the elderly, that whole cities have been reduced to nothing but rubble. I'm not sure we understand those figures, so let's imagine.

Imagine all the people living in a world like this:

You turn off the M20 from London the capital city for Cuxton and Halling, you pass through Snodland and then the devastation begins, a few houses are flattened at first then more and more destruction as you follow the north side of the river Medway for the next 15 miles to the edge of the Thames. As you cross over the M2 down into Strood everything is gone, a continuous pile of rubble, there's no life because everyone has been killed. Up to this point the population was about 20000 all gone. Now through the debris you head out up the hill through Frindsbury and Wainscott it's the same everything and everyone is gone total population 36000 people, its okay it's only a number.

A survivor tells you they have flown a drone over Hoo and out across to Grain and there again, no one is left, a peninsula of rubble and tumble weed blowing across the marshes. Theres an eery silence but for a few birds still singing in the air.

Your journey continues as your destination is not yet met, the B2000 always a deadly road now deserted, the passage for once is clear, Cliffe Woods gone, every hamlet abandoned.

Closer you approach the last village at the end of the road that goes to nowhere. Cliffe to is flattened and not a soul survives, the death toll is now for the entire population of all these wards in North Medway up to 69083 yet still it is just a number in other parts of the world that have never even heard of Medway.

Imagine the size of the graveyard that needs to place each at rest, **imagine there's no heaven** for 69083 is simply as I say just a number, **imagine there's no hell** that number falls on no ones shoulders of blame, it's just what we do, pass through without a name.

I paint a grim picture that is not our reality, but it is someone's today, the grieving is still real, the numbers unbelievable and that is just in one place, one conflict that has destroyed Gaza, around the world other conflicts devour human life and its settlements because there are those who can't **Imagine sharing all the world.**

The numbers I have used here are the official population numbers for the whole of the Medway north of the river, they help to give us a stark view of what many have faced over the last two years.

Let's pray there is a heaven and that each name is known to God rather than them just being a statistical number. Hell isn't a nice concept or place, but if there is a heaven then there must be equally a hell where those who only see numbers rather than names are accountable for mindless actions.

Can we pray that the **dreamers** become the peace makers, and that they rise up to govern our world with justice and mercy, can we pray that we stop blaming God as John Lennon was and take on board the message God gave us through Jesus, that love is what is important above all things in our lives, that reconciliation and forgiveness replace hatred and revenge. **Imagine living in a world like that** as we pray for continued peace, **imagine all the people with nothing to kill or die for, imagine no religion** but a life built on FAITH, **imagine a world with no more greed, so no more hunger, a brotherhood of man.**

John Lennon was a dreamer the Son of Man is a reality if we allow him.
