THE CROSS OF NAILS

"We also rejoice in God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have now received reconciliation". Romans 5:11

Some of you may have seen me wearing a small silver coloured cross on one of my jackets.

I bought the cross from Coventry Cathedral when I was visiting my son, who lives near Coventry.

There's an interesting story behind the cross which I'd like to share with you.



On the night of 14 November 1940, the city of Coventry was devastated during an air raid and its Cathedral destroyed. Shortly afterwards three nails from the bombed roof timbers were taken and formed into the shape of a cross. The Cross of Nails has developed into a powerful symbol of peace and reconciliation around the world. Those involved in this work look to the cathedral as their touchstone. The cathedral's International Ministry seeks to reach out to those involved and to share the healing work of God's kingdom throughout the world.

THE ADVENT WREATH



Sunday 30th November 2025 is the start of Advent when churches will have the Advent Wreath in place with its 5 candles representing the Sundays in Advent and Christmas Day. The modern version is a reminder that in medieval times Advent was a time of fasting during which people's thoughts were directed on the second coming of Jesus and though that is forgotten these days, the Advent Wreath can act as a reminder, primarily in the lead up to Christmas.

In 1839 a Protestant Pastor, Johann Hinrich Wichern, using an old cartwheel, decorated it with evergreen leaves (to remind us of God's eternal love) and then decorated it with 19 small red candles and four large white ones. Every morning a small candle was lit and then on the Sunday a white one. The idea was to deal with the impatience of children anticipating Christmas. Nowadays we just have the 'Sunday' candles, representing, hope, peace, love and joy.


"GRIEF IS THE PRICE YOU PAY FOR LOVE"

Rabbi Earl Grollman (1925—2021) and was a prominent 'Grief Expert'. Grollman began studying grief as a young rabbi, frustrated that he had not been taught in seminary how to help his congregation in times of mourning. Grollman was the rabbi of Beth El Temple Centre in Belmont, Massachusetts for 36 years before his retirement in 1987. He became a nationally recognized expert on grief even as he led the congregation, writing many books including "Living When a Loved One Has Died".

Grollman travelled to Oklahoma City after the dreadful 1995 bombing, to speak to survivors and offer presentations on grief. He helped survivors after the 9/11 attacks as well, and he travelled to the sites of some school shootings to counsel those who lost loved ones. Among the insights he shared with the bereaved was his adage, "Grief is the price we pay for love."

24/7 Carers' Helpline

Our helpline is often the first point of contact for carers looking for support or information.

Caring can be isolating, making it harder to find out about services or discuss difficult feelings.

Sometimes it's easier to talk to someone outside your situation without feeling judged. You may be new to caring or have been caring for many years.

Our confidential helpline provides:

- Emotional support and a listening ear
- An opportunity to focus on your needs as a carer
- Details of what support is available to carers
- Information for professionals
- Information about a wide range of services and how to access them
- A chance to discuss changes in circumstances such as getting aids and adaptations or respite care You may have a specific question or feel lonely and would like a chat.

You may not even know what to say when you phone. If so, we can help guide you through the conversation.

This service is available 9am – 5pm weekdays.

Outside these hours, calls to the helpline are redirected to Careline so carers can receive support 24/7. This could be for an emergency which can't wait until the next working day.

Money Matters

Knowing which benefits you can claim as a carer and how to do this can be complex and confusing. Many carers are not receiving the financial support they could have because of this.

Our Welfare Benefits service aims to overcome these barriers by providing a dedicated service to carers living in Bolton, offering advice, assistance and practical support. It offers:

- The opportunity to discuss issues around welfare benefit issues
- Information on specific benefits and who may be able to claim them
- Help with filling in welfare benefit forms
- Signposting to other organisations
- The service can help with the following benefits:
- Carers Allowance and Carers Credit
- Council Tax reductions
- Pension Credit
- Attendance Allowance

LEADERS IN TRAINING!


Horwich Parish Church CofE School (HPCS) has a leadership scheme for the pupils. They have a variety of teams and councils and pupils are elected to different roles within those teams and councils—this gives them a good experience of elections and leadership to help equip them for the wider world. They recently staged an election to elect new members to the school Pupil Leadership Team—campaigns, ballot boxes, polling station etc.

Head teacher Debbie Mills said, "Horwich Parish is an inclusive school where all are welcome. We

NORTHERN RAIL'S 'HELPING HAND'


TRAIN operator Northern has launched a new service to provide information and guidance for anyone who needs a helping hand when travelling by train.

Available through **WhatsApp on 07779 914800** from 6am to 11pm, seven days a week, a dedicated travel support team is on hand to assist customers with everything from journey planning and disruption updates, to resolving issues with pre-booked assistance. The service will be run by a brand new team – many of whom have lived experience of travelling with disabilities.

Open to anybody who needs help, the team will be able to help with a wide range of queries, and are able to provide realtime assistance to help resolve any unexpected situations. A CONVERSATION BETWEEN GOD AND ST FRANCIS

GOD: Frank, you know all about gardens and nature. What in the world is going on down there? What happened to the dandelions, violets, thistle and stuff I started eons ago? I had a perfect, no-maintenance garden plan. Those plants grow in any type of soil, withstand drought and multiply with abandon. The nectar from the long lasting blossoms attracts butterflies, honey bees and flocks of songbirds. I expected to see a vast garden of colours by now. But all I see are these green rectangles.



ST. FRANCIS: It's the tribes that settled there, Lord. The Suburbanites. They started calling your flowers "weeds" and went to great lengths to kill them and replace them with grass.

GOD: Grass? But it's so boring. It's not colourful. It doesn't attract butterflies, birds and bees, only grubs and sod worms. It's temperamental with temperatures. Do these Suburbanites really want all that grass growing there?

ST. FRANCIS: Apparently so, Lord. They go to great pains to grow it and keep it green. They begin each spring by fertilizing grass and poisoning any other plant that crops up in the lawn.

GOD: The spring rains and warm weather probably make grass grow really fast. That must make the Suburbanites happy.

ST. FRANCIS: Apparently not, Lord. As soon as it grows a little, they cut it, sometimes twice a week.

GOD: They cut it? Do they then bale it like hay?

ST. FRANCIS: Not exactly, Lord. Most of them rake it up and put it in bags.

GOD: They bag it? Why? Is it a cash crop? Do they sell it?

ST FRANCIS: No, Sir. Just the opposite. They pay to throw it away.

GOD: Now let me get this straight. They fertilize grass so it will grow. And when it does grow, they cut it off and pay to throw it away?

ST. FRANCIS: Yes, Sir.

GOD: These Suburbanites must be relieved in the summer when we cut back on the rain and turn up the heat. That surely slows the growth and saves them a lot of work.

ST. FRANCIS: You aren't going to believe this, Lord. When the grass stops growing so fast, they drag out hoses and pay more money to water it so they can continue to mow it and pay to get rid of it.

GOD: What nonsense. At least they kept some of the trees. That was a sheer stroke of genius, if I do say so myself. The trees grow leaves in the spring to provide beauty and shade in the summer. In the autumn they fall to the ground and form a natural blanket to keep moisture in the soil and protect the trees and bushes. Plus, as they rot, the leaves form compost to enhance the soil. It's a natural circle of life.

ST. FRANCIS: You'd better sit down, Lord. The Suburbanites have drawn a new circle. As soon as the leaves fall, they rake them into great piles and pay to have them hauled away.

GOD: No. What do they do to protect the shrub and tree roots in the winter and to keep the soil moist and loose?

GOD: And where do they get this mulch?

ST. FRANCIS: They cut down trees and grind them up to make the mulch.
