### STEEP FLOWER SHOW 2025

The end of the summer in Steep is marked by the village flower show – now over one hundred years old and still a popular community event. This year, not even a burst water main could dampen the mood. Thanks to Bedales' water tank, the show could go on!

We had more entrants than ever this year and were delighted that so many entered multiple classes that's the way to win! The diversity of entries in all the classes was outstanding and we are proud that we have so many elements in our show: traditional fruit and vegetable classes alongside bakery, crafts, poetry, photography and children's classes. It was especially wonderful to see how many children entered, perhaps due to Ellie Thackrey's innovative separate children's schedule that was distributed to local schools. We're hoping to build on this next year and welcome even more younger entrants. The guest of honour was Katy Watson, who is a garden designer, gardening mentor, writer, and the new country garden expert on Alan Titchmarsh's Gardening Club, season 2, 2025. She gave a touching and heartfelt speech, awarding the 'Best in Show' prize to a garden in a seedtray which clearly benefitted from its

young gardener's green fingers.

We put on the flower show primarily as a community event for the village but, due to the generosity of those who donate their time, cakes and willingness to wash up, we usually make enough money to give some to local good causes. For example, we gave Steep School a chicken run a couple of years ago and this year helped them to refurbish the garden there. We've given money for plants at the Steep war memorial garden and have helped the Adhurst allotments in Sheet with buying equipment after a break-in. Lots of people asked for the recipe for the orange and almond cake which also happens to be dairy- and gluten-free

### Orange and Almond Cake

2 oranges

225 caster sugar

1 tbsp honey

6 eggs, separated

300g ground almonds

### For the syrup and topping:

4 more oranges

2 lemons

6 cardamon pods

Star anise

3 tbsp sugar

Flaked almonds

- 1: Boil 2 oranges for an hour to an hour and a half in a pan of water. Grease and line a 23cm / 9in cake tin.
- 2: Heat the oven to 170C. Drain, then pulp the oranges with a stick blender.
- 3: Mix together the egg yolks, sugar and honey. Fold in the ground almonds and orange pulp.
- 4: Whisk the egg white and fold them into the mixture. Pour into the cake tin and bake for an hour.
- 5: While the cake is baking, make the syrup: peel the upper layer of the oranges, remove any pith and chop it into fine strips. Boil them in water for a few minutes until softened. Put

them on a cooling rack to dry out and sprinkle them with sugar. Put the juice of the oranges and lemons in a pan with the star anise, cardamon pods and sugar and boil for until it is reduced to a syrup. Toast the flaked almonds lightly.

5: When you take the cake out of the oven, leave it in the tin. Leave it to cool for a few minutes, then poke it full of holes with a skewer or toothpick and then pour over the syrup through a sieve. Sprinkle over the toasted almonds and orange peel.

### STEEP PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish Council met on 17th September at Steep Village Hall. At the start of the meeting, councillors acknowledged the resignations of Freya Simpson and Paul Garstin. The Council thanked them for their time and contributions to the running of the Parish.

We are also delighted to welcome Cllr Andrew Inkley, who was co-opted at the beginning of the meeting. Andy brings new skills, enthusiasm and fresh perspective to the Council, and we look forward to working alongside him.

Cllr Charlotte Duthie has stepped up as Vice Chair, while Cllr Alison Driver continues as Chair of Planning. Responsibilities across footpaths, roads, and the War Memorial have been refreshed, ensuring local priorities remain well supported.

Updates were shared on traffic concerns in both Church Road and Steep Marsh. The 20mph scheme for Church Road is nearing completion and further ideas are being explored to help address heavy vehicle use in Steep Marsh. Engagement with residents and landowners will be key to finding practical solutions.

Works have now begun at the land neighbouring the Village Hall on Church Road, and residents are reminded that if they have any issues relating to the site, they should speak directly to the site manager, Doug Logan: 07799 364735 or



## A PIECE OF STEEP SCHOOL HISTORY

Hunt carefully among the creepers on the walls of Steep School playground and you'll find a modest little plaque that reads:

"Foundation Stone laid by the Rev. G. Taswell, April 1st 1875."

Who Rev. G. Taswell was, and why he chose to lay the foundation stone on April Fools' Day, we may never know but 1875 was 150 years ago, and the school has been celebrating its anniversary with much enthusiasm.

children had come to expect.

Since then, a number of enthusiastic and energetic Headteachers have initiated dramatic changes. These include a new classroom, a fully equipped assembly hall, and a more than doubling of both pupil and staff numbers. To visit the school today is a revelation, as many villagers discovered during the recent open day celebrating 150 years.

Two Heads deserve special mention for their part in bringing the school into the 21st century. Helen Wilson worked tirelessly to secure the school hall, and Lou Romans, who joined in 2005 with special responsibility for the infant classes, retired this



There are many people in the village old enough to remember the school's 100th birthday in 1975, and if they visit today, they marvel at the changes they see. In those days, there were fewer than 50 children on roll, only two full-time teachers, and a classroom that had to be cleared daily for school lunches. It was a happy school, but it was beginning to lack the facilities that parents and their

summer after 20 years of service, 15 of those as Headteacher, with over 100 children now on roll.

If the Rev. G. Taswell were to visit the school today, he would surely be proud to see the fruits of his labour in laying that foundation stone on April Fools' Day 150 years ago. The Governors are currently in the process of appointing a new Headteacher, who will inherit a flourishing and happy family school.

## THE AUGUST BANK HOLIDAY WEEKEND

As the newsletter is a historical record of what goes on in Steep and Stroud I think the particularly busy August Bank Holiday weekend this year deserves special mention. It was a weekend of glorious weather - a bit too glorious for our dry gardens some might say - and that was the backdrop for a range of events and activities. At Bedales we had the traditional Steep Flower Show – as good as ever with its wide range of entries, great music and bustling tea tent - plus of course lots of people for this great village community event. Others will wish to say more no doubt, but once again I was amazed by the organisation and by the huge number of helpers.

Meanwhile, down the hill by the Harrow a **cricket match** was in full swing.

Sunday was Hands Around the Church day, another brilliant community event, and a truly historic one at that, with over two hundred villagers present to hold hands and form a chain round the church to celebrate its 900th anniversary, all photographed from a drone above. Once that was over we all retired to the rear of the churchyard where refreshments a plenty were laid out and so it went on... Anne Grove had baked a huge cake decorated with Rollo Wicksteed's Steep 900 logo, and I must say it tasted as good as it looked.

The event was organised by the

charity the Friends of Steep Church, supported financially by our parish and district councillors. Marshalling over two hundred people was some challenge, ("a bit like herding cats" I heard someone mutter), but Trevor Hines and Jonathan Lubran, in overall charge, kept benign control, and thanks to the organisation and a great bunch of helpers it all came off brilliantly.

As a postscript, as we left in the early afternoon I said to Susie our vicar, who had already earlier taken Holy Communion at Stroud followed by morning service at All Saints', "now we can all flop"; but there was no flopping for her; she was straight off to the Froxfield cricket afternoon followed by officiating at a Hymns and Pimms service in St Peter's church.

There were other events going on round about of course, and in Petersfield Town Hall the Petersfield Arts and Crafts Society held its annual exhibition, while throughout the county we had Hampshire Open Studios and we had one Open Studio on our own doorstep, held over the weekend in Stroud Village hall. This for me was the perfect setting for an imaginative exhibition of crafts, produced by a collaboration of local artists - paintings and drawings, textiles, decorative glass, jewellery, basket work, wall hangings - all beautifully displayed. As with the other village events, a lot of hard work had gone into this exhibition, which had as a super plus at the end - a cup of tea!

But it was a great challenge, and a great sense of achievement at the end, and I hope the audience enjoyed it as much as we in the choir did.



### **AUTUMN DELIGHT**

Pears are delicious now. Have a go with this recipe.

200g butter
300g golden caster sugar
4 large eggs
75g plain flour
50g cocoa powder
410g pears
100g plain dark chocolate (70% cocoa solids)
25g flaked almonds (optional)
cream or ice cream, to serve

- 1. Heat oven to 190C/170C fan/gas 5. Lightly grease a roughly 20 x 30cm shallow ovenproof dish. Put the butter in a large saucepan and place over a low heat until just melted. Remove the butter from the heat and stir in the sugar until well combined.
- 2. Whisk the eggs together in a large bowl. Gradually add the eggs to the butter and sugar, beating well with a wooden spoon in between each

addition. Sift the flour and cocoa powder on top of the egg mixture, then beat hard with a wooden spoon until thoroughly combined.

- 3. Pour into the prepared tin or dish and nestle the pears into the chocolate batter. Put the chocolate on a board and cut into chunky pieces roughly 1.5cm with a large knife. Scatter the chocolate pieces over the batter and sprinkle with almonds, if you like. Can be frozen at this stage.
- 4. Bake in the centre of the oven for 30 mins or until the mixture is crusty on the surface and lightly cooked inside. Do not allow to overcook, as the cake will become spongy rather than gooey in the centre. Serve warm with cream or ice cream

TO FREEZE if required. Wrap the cooled, unbaked pudding tightly in foil, label and freeze for up to 1 month. To serve, unwrap the pudding and bake from frozen as above in step 4 for 50 mins.





### Steep 900

Our celebration of the founding of All Saints' Church is nearing the end of the year. The Friends of Steep Church had an ambitious plan to take aerial photographs of the church with parishioners and friends holding hands to encircle the church. The Sunday of the August bank holiday turned out fair and the registered participants arrived to be marshalled into groups and receive their instructions. People happily held hands with strangers as we were manoeuvred around the church. Photographs were taken including some with Susie in front of the north door. We admired Anne Groves' marvellous cake with its golden cockerel and enjoyed wine and lunch. It was wonderful to gather in such numbers, over two hundred people took part and we have enjoyed seeing our church from a new angle.

The Steep Lecture, though an annual lecture was also this year part of our celebration. Bishop Jonathan, who preached at our patronal festival to start our year returned to give his first lecture. Refreshments were served in the evening sunshine outside and then everyone took their places inside. The Bishop told us that church attendance figures in the Diocese were slowly creeping up and how young people were searching for something more than the material world. He spoke movingly of asylum seekers so anxious outside their Southsea hotel and stressed that Portsmouth is a city that welcomes

the stranger. A question from George Tullis about bishops sitting in the House of Lords revealed that Jonathan had just received his invitation to be one of the twenty four Bishops in our Parliament.

#### **Services**

We have had two All Age services, one on the 24th that included a baptism. Graham Madgwick, our reader preached using a long mountaineering rope. This was carried to the back of the church by young helpers and then we spread it round the congregation. We must trust in God just as climbers have to trust each other on the rope. Susie baptised Iona Philips, great granddaughter of Andrew Routh and the baptismal party then took part in the Hands around the Church after the service. Graham also gave the talk at our regular All Age service on the 7th September. Pippa led us in an interactive bible reading when we had to choose good above evil. Graham amazed us with his skills at cutting a sheet of paper so a volunteer could step through the paper. The children made fortune tellers out of paper and Balthazar Thackrey read out prayers he had written. It was wonderful to involve everyone in the service. Sue led the Parish Communion service on 14th September with Susie preaching on how much rejoicing there is in heaven over the sinner who repents. She painted a wonderful picture of people in heaven wearing party hats! The service was followed by the AGM of the Friends of Steep

Church when Susie was able to thank them for the support they give.
