



Vicars Message

"Blessed are the Peacemakers for they Shall be called Children of God"

~Matthew 5:9

I write this message looking ahead to Remembrance Sunday, that day in the year where we bring to mind those who have served and lost their lives for their country in both the First and Second World Wars, as well as all other conflicts in recent times.

children of God"



Toy Appeal





The Nicene Creed: The Person of the Holy Spirit

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son He is worshipped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets.

This month we are considering what the Nicene Creed says about the Holy Spirit.

'We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life': The original version of the Nicene Creed ended simply 'We believe in the Holy Spirit.' However, the phrase 'the Lord, the giver of life' was added to counter the teachings of Macedonius (Bishop of Constantinople), who viewed the Holy Spirit as a creation of the Son. The Holy Spirit is part of the Trinity who shapes us, according to Christ's image, through His fruit and gifts: 'the Spirit gives life...we are being transformed into His image with ever-increasing glory, which comes from the Lord, who is the Spirit.'(2 Corinthians 3:6,18).

'who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son He is worshipped and glorified': In the late 6th century the Latin churches added the phrase 'and the Son' (the Filioque Clause), which was rejected by the Orthodox Churches. Augustine described the Spirit as 'love proceeding' from the Father and the Son, so we can know God: 'When the Advocate comes, whom I will send to you from the Father, the Spirit of truth who goes out from the Father, He will testify about me.' (John 15:26).

The Creed is clear that the Holy Spirit is due equal status and worship with the Father and the Son, as a distinct divine person: 'May the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God, and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you all.' (2 Corinthians 13:14).

'He has spoken through the Prophets': Why does the Creed include this activity of the Spirit? It is not just referring to the OT prophets, but the whole of Scripture. He has inspired Scripture, so that we have God's word communicated by human writers: 'All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness' (2 Timothy 3:16). When we read the Bible, the Spirit enables us to hear what God is saying to us.


Church of England partnerships of £11m will benefit nearly half of parishes

Nearly half of parishes across the Church of England will be able to benefit from £11m of investment in partner organisations dedicated to sharing the Christian faith, new figures show. A range of traditions, activities and organisations will be supported through the funding, from expanding an Anglo-Catholic mission network to using social media content to share the gospel message. The partnership aims to strengthen local mission by equipping the Church in five ministry areas. These include outreach and engagement with children, young people, and their families; establishing new worshipping communities; enhancing the effectiveness of digital evangelism and discipleship; addressing pressing missional challenges; and collaborating with networks to extend their reach and share learning and resources. The investments made by the Church's Strategic Mission and Ministry Investment Board (SMMIB) are expected to strengthen mission in around 45 per cent – 5,500 – of Church of England parishes.

Exploring Prayer Journaling

Different Ways to Pray

Prayer journaling offers a variety of approaches, and there is no single "right" way to engage with it. The most important aspect is to personalise your journaling experience and discover what helps you feel most connected to God. Prayer can be for intercessions; a person or situation that you want to talk to God about and ask for his advice. Reflecting on an inspirational quote or bible verse.



Why this particular verse or saying. Bring it to God as you doodle around it. If drawing and doodling aren't your thing, then write a letter to God telling him your thoughts problems worries and gratitude's. If you want to add decoration, try stickers or stamps,

Prayer journaling is honestly just about finding what works for you—it's meant to be personal and can look completely different from one person to the next. Some days you might want to write out a letter to God like you're chatting with an old mate, while other days you may prefer to jot down a few thoughts or even just a single word that's on your heart. There's no right or wrong way to do it, so just let your

journal become your own space for connecting with God, however that feels most natural to you.

Praying in Colour

You might also find it helpful to include prompts or questions in your journal to guide your prayers on days when you're not sure where to begin. For example, you could start by asking, "What am I grateful for today?" or "Who needs my prayers right now?" These little nudges can open up meaningful conversations with God and help you stay engaged in your journaling practice. If you enjoy working with colours, consider incorporating bright shades and doodles into your journal. Using markers to express your prayers as art can be liberating and allows your creativity to play a role in your spiritual practice.



Doodling and Creativity


Doodling is not simply a way to pass time; it can help you focus your thoughts and engage your heart during prayer. There is no need for your sketches to be perfect—the goal is to allow your creativity to become part of your conversation with God.

Having a Conversation with God

Prayer journaling can feel like speaking with a close friend. It is not just about talking at God, but also about sharing what is on your mind and heart and being open to what God may communicate in return. It involves an ongoing, two-way dialogue.

Listening

Remember to take time to listen. By slowing down and creating space in your journaling, you may experience guidance, encouragement, or a sense of peace. Listening is as powerful a part of prayer as speaking.
