Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

I'm hoping that we will see an amazing outpouring of mission during our Faith and Fun events that are coming up. By the time you're reading this, we'll have had our



chocolate bingo and pizza tea evening, our family fun day and our Songs of Praise across the benefice. These events have been run as part of our parish Renewal Programme and to contribute to the Diocesan Vision 2026, but the reality is that mission is an ongoing, everyday thing which is the responsibility of us all. Because who doesn't want people to know about the Jesus and how he can transform our lives in the way he does.

A few years ago the following cartoon was in The Church Times and it made me smile because although of course it was intended in a tongue in cheek way, it actually reflects the reality for many of those coming to a church for the first time.



Richard and I were worshipping at several different churches before I started with you as vicar and at one of them I was roped in on week one when I was asked to join their choir practically before the service had even ended. But being ignored is just as bad too!

Before we came to Freckleton and Warton as we moved from Langho where we were very settled and happy, we had some of those questions from the cartoon, such as 'will I find friends here?', 'will anything odd happen?' going around our minds too. So, what must it be like for those for whom it isn't already a familiar and comfortable environment?

In my last parish when we moved into the village we went to the doctors to register. Easy, I thought, I'm an intelligent grown up, I know what to do and I know where the doctors is, it's the big building on the main road in the village that has a massive doctor's sign on it! But I was totally thrown to find a closed surgery, nobody answering the door and no information to be found anywhere on the outside of the building as to what on earth was going on. We were soon rescued by a friendly local who pointed us in the direction of Whalley Surgery as the Langho one had been closed for quite some time! Because of course the assumption was that everyone knows the score so what's the problem?

Except they don't ... It's the same with church, we need to look at everything from a newcomer's perspective. You know what time the services are without a notice board - they don't! You might know your way around all those fiddly pages in the service book, especially the old BCP books that flip from page to page but do they? You know what's going on with the children's play areas, where the toilet is etc.

All of our services, be it Sunday morning, baptisms, weddings and funerals are the 'shop window' of the Church; first impressions matter lots! That means that every encounter someone has at Holy Trinity or St Paul's has to be one where the quality of welcome and worship is of the highest order leaving them feeling loved by God and by us and wanting to come back to experience more.

After my licensing service lots of my friends and clergy colleagues went out of their way to comment on how genuinely and warmly welcomed they felt that night. I find that so encouraging as it's obvious that those who have felt called to the office of sides person take their responsibilities seriously. But it doesn't stop there, it extends beyond the greeting at the front door and everyone else in church clearly realises the importance of welcome.

So, thank you for understanding the importance of this and doing it so well and taking the importance of the furthering of the Kingdom of God seriously and appreciating that it's a task we share together, united in our love for Christ. And I pray that those who heard Bishop Jill speak over the faith and fun weekend or heard the testimonies given at the Songs of Praise event may have had some seeds planted or watered by God so that they may be a step closer to knowing him.

As the sun shone down on our gathering everyone there enjoyed great fellowship, chatting and laughing in the warm afternoon sunshine. The sherry trifle I had to finish was divine. (thank you Audrey for making this treat. It reminded me of the ones my gran used to make). A big thank you to Rev Tracy for making the day so pleasurable.

I know many of you are aware that Joyce is now arranging the flowers in church, and from the positive comments I have heard, these displays have been a welcome addition to our church. Our nativity set has also been lovingly restored by Wendy who has spent many weeks restoring missing fingers, horns and pieces of robes to these figures then, repainting and varnishing them so they look like new. During the service there was a presentation of Long Service Certificates by Brenda Squires, Kirkham Presiding Member and Susan Willoughby, Blackburn Diocesan President. Grace from Freckleton Mothers' Union was awarded a 60-year service award, which is a fantastic achievement. She received a certificate and a beautifully engraved glass ornament.

Our meeting in September was held on Wednesday the 17th; it began in Church with a Eucharist, and continued in the Village Hall. Rev. Tracy kindly agreed to talk to us about her very interesting life and journey of faith.

Tracy began attending church between the age of 6 and 7, influenced by a kind neighbour, Mrs Livesey, and from this very young age she knew that God was calling her. At the age of 9, through sheer determination, she became a server, even though she was younger than she should have been and not confirmed, as was the norm.

Throughout her teenage years she continued to fulfil her duty as a server and would run from the church service to the stables, two of the most important things in her life, church and horses. She wasn't always a vicar but remembers the exact time and place, at the age of 27, while listening to a sermon about Africa, that became a turning point and the start of her path to ordination. She worked as a Civil Servant for 10 years and as a secondary school teacher for 13 years.

Her first ministry was at Langho and Tracy believes that God has always put her where he wants her. She had the joy of marrying couples that she had taught while she was teaching, and of baptising their babies. There was also the intense sadness of carrying out funerals of friends and people that she had known for a very long time. As she said "There are certain families that touch your life forever".

Then in 2023, when St. Paul's in Warton and Holy Trinity in Freckleton were without a vicar, the Bishop spoke to Tracy about our churches. He believed Tracy would be a perfect fit and, as a Church, we are very glad that Tracy and Richard, her husband, came to Warton. Tracy works extremely hard for our communities, working between the two Churches and ministering at both St. Paul's and Freckleton C of E schools.

She is always busy but always finds time and works tirelessly to make our worship interesting.

We have recently had some visitors to our Mothers' Union group, which is wonderful. If you would like to come and join us, even if you would just like to give it a go, you would be very welcome.

Our next meeting is on Wednesday, 22nd October at 2pm – it is a talk by the RNLI. Then, on 26th November, Jo Houghton will be doing a candle making demonstration, with the opportunity to purchase gifts.

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Our Churchyard

Our Churchyard pre-dates the current Church building and has graves that date back to the mid 1700s. Unfortunately time, and our Fylde weather, is not kind to gravestones and memorials. Following a tragic incident where a young child was killed by a falling gravestone, our Churchyard memorials have recently been inspected.

The inspection has indicated that a significant number of memorials require attention to ensure their safety, this is going to require professional work and make take some time. Although the PCC has a duty of care to ensure safety in and around the Church, ownership of memorials rests with the families of the deceased and the PCC is limited in the actions that it can take. In the coming months, the PCC will be trying to contact relatives to discuss the condition of affected memorials, to discuss remedial action.

In the short term, warning notices will be placed in the Churchyard and affected memorials will be marked. The majority of the affected graves are in the 'old' Churchyard however, some newer memorials are also affected. Everyone

visiting the Churchyard is advised to exercise caution when moving amongst graves. In particular, children should not be allowed to play in the churchyard, dogs should be kept on leads and under no circumstances should memorials be pushed leaned on or climbed.



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
WARTON HISTORY SOCIETY

SECRET SANTA & THE SUPER SACK OF SOCKS

For the past 3 or 4 years we at Saint Paul's and Holy Trinity have put together small Secret Santa parcels for local people who are homeless.

We do this through two separate charities:

The Foxton Centre in Preston is a daytime shelter & advice centre for rough sleepers on the streets. They can get a free breakfast, a shower & change of clothes & can meet various experts for advice. Our parcels therefore have to meet their particular needs.

We usually send items from this list (wrapped & labelled please...Foxton Centre man/lady):

- sweets, chocolate, biscuits, other treats
- toiletries
- warm hat or scarf or gloves
- anything else appropriate

Harbour House in Lytham & its sister house in Fleetwood are both run by the YMCA. They provide small, self-contained flatlets for homeless young people. They can access education & advice & do have a home to live in.

Suitable items for these young people would be from this list, again, wrapped please with label saying Harbour House young man/young lady:

- sweets, chocolate, biscuits, other treats
- toiletries
- pack of cards or small game
- photo frame
- anything else appropriate

Please do not spend more than about £4 - £4.50 on each parcel.

There will be boxes at the back of church for the parcels. St Paul's will organise transport.

PLUS...this year I thought it would be a nice treat for all the Foxton people to have clean socks for Christmas day. The aim is to fill a Santa sack with men's & women's new socks. We already have 15 pairs...could we make that about 50 - 60? Please keep them in their original packaging but unwrapped & unlabelled & pop them in the sack, also at the back of church.
