"Well," said the second little boy, "I'm so tough, I can wear out a pair of jeans in a day."


"That's nothing," said the third boy. "When stay with my Granny and Grandpa, I can wear them out in just one hour."

Letter from Revd Antony Dutton, Rector



It feels like it has been a particularly violent year. Our media has been saturated with images of destruction from Gaza. There was a surge of violence in Syria and continued strikes in Yemen. In America there have been the tragically regular shootings in schools and places of worship, and there was the assassination of Charlie Kirk which threatens to cause further division. In recent weeks, we have seen the antisemitic attack in Manchester when Jews were murdered on Yom Kippur. And these acts of violence are just the ones that make it into our news cycle. In recent years, the two conflicts responsible for the loss of the largest number of innocent lives have been in the Democratic Republic of Congo and South Sudan.

There are very few images of these places in the press – if any. There are no protests filling British streets, no calls for boycotts.

In Nigeria the spectre of Islamic State has not gone away. The numbers are some 125,000 Christians murdered since 2009, with 7,000 massacred in the first 220 days of 2025. There are suggestions that Christians are now the most persecuted religion.

I realise that this is not a cheery way to start the Rector's letter for the edition of this magazine which covers the beginning of the Christmas season. You might have picked up this copy hoping for a bit of festive cheer, a reminder of what we will be celebrating at St Mary's: the baby Jesus lying in a manger with lots of big-eyed animals peering into the manger in adoration. Maybe you'd have settled for secular Christmas, all trees and lights, mince pies and mulled wine, Santa and snow. A veritable winter wonderland. Unfortunately, I've snapped you back into the real world, with all of its violence, murder, and bloodshed. Christmas is special. It is heart-warming and magical. God comes down to earth and becomes one of us. Jesus, the light of the world, enters the darkness and the darkness could not overcome it. Wonderful. But just the day after we are reminded of the cost of this Incarnation: St Stephen stoned to death. Another two days on and we remember the Holy Innocents, all those children who were butchered by King Herod in his efforts to try and ensure that the King of the Jews was killed. Our response to the love of God was to resort to human violence. God's response was to submit to that violence and defeat it with his love. Faith in the God who became one of us at Christmas has so often led to earthly pain, persecution, and suffering in the pursuit of eternal glory and to bring about the coming of the Kingdom. For the saints, who we celebrate at the beginning of November, being called by God has meant being incarnate in the world, in the middle of all its violence, cruelty, and brutality. The saints have confronted this violence and courageously remained faithful to their calling, in order to bring the Christ child's peace, light, and hope into those dark places.

So, in defiance of this violent world, I hope you might come to St Mary's this Christmas and celebrate the joy of the Incarnation and remind ourselves that the light will always triumph over the dark and look to the future with renewed hope. The diary lists the many varied things that are happening over the next two months, including Advent when we prepare to receive this light (and usually forgotten by a world that begins to celebrate Christmas in October). There are social events to help put us in a festive mood, including our Christmas Fair and a Christmas Quiz, plus all the liturgical activities of the church. One final thing. It's the perfect time of the year to invite people to St Mary's. Publicise our events, extend an invitation to family and friends. Tell them of the palpable joy and peace that they could experience at Nine Lessons and Carols or at the Crib Service. Everyone is welcome.

so that there will be an increase in those drawn to join us, having an even greater





CHRISTMAS – Wreaths & Panto History





The circular shape is a symbol of immortality with basic wreaths being associated with life, rejuvenation and renewal with additional natural materials used to symbolise victory, honour and achievement. In some countries, wreaths, worn on the head or body, are still used today by students and athletes, to signify success and triumph.

In pre-Christian Europe, evergreen wreaths played a prominent role in winter solstice celebrations with Pagan cultures believing that evergreen plants, which remain lush and green throughout the winter, held powers of protection, fertility and rebirth.

As Christianity spread across Europe some pagan customs and symbols were incorporated into Christian rituals and celebrations. It has been suggested that this has been intertwined with Christian theology with the circular Christmas wreath representing eternity and the evergreen foliage symbolising the promise of eternal life through Jesus Christ.

The wreaths we make at home start with a base of some sort, be it wire, straw or wood. This is then covered with a moss base and then small overlapping bunches of evergreen material, such as fir or spruce being wired onto the moss ring. These evergreen rings can then be enhanced by incorporating different colours and textures including tree ivy, holly and trailing ivy to give extra richness and add additional meaning. You could add holly to symbolise immortality or pinecones for long life and prosperity. Adding herbs not only

provides a fragrance to your wreath but further meaning, rosemary for remembrance, sage for good health and juniper for life and hope. Many modern wreaths can include cinnamon sticks, dried orange slices and even tree baubles, in fact anything you like.

Finally, don't forget a luscious bow to complete your decoration. As a tip to keep an existing wreath lush and longer lasting, you can take it off the door and lay it onto wet grass for an hour or so. This will hydrate the moss and keep the evergreens fresh. Whether hung on doors, windows or mantels, the wreath

serves as a symbol of welcome and hospitality, inviting guests to share the joys of the

season and to feel at home in the presence of loved ones.

Janet Edwards, Handbrid Christmas Panto tradition and origins

Christmas brings entertainment, especially Pantomime, which has its roots in ancient Greek and Roman theatre, where actors used mime. In the 16th century, this evolved into the Italian Commedia dell'arte, street theatre, which included physical comedy. This travelled to England in the 18th century when the Italian performances were adapted, leading to Harlequinade which combined comedy, music and dance. By the end of that century, the shows were incorporating fairy tales and nursery rhymes, with cross dressing e.g. Principal Boy being played by a woman and comic Dame by a man. In the very early days however women were not allowed to perform. When I was a kid, there were always a section of the performance that featured three characters on a bench and a ghost behind them, who would tap their shoulder in turn; all the kids would shout, "It's behind you", the reply being, Oh! no it's not! I remember a screen would be lowered down to the stage with these words on it - 'Why does a brown cow eat green grass, and only gives white milk?' Everyone would sing it together and then a competition to see which half of the audience could sing the loudest. The best Pantos, in my opinion took place at the London Palladium. In 1956, I saw Aladdin, starring Norman Wisdom, who during the show played a drum solo. Did you know that Widow Twankey is named after a cheap Chinese tea of inferior quality from the Tuan Key region of China, possibly implying that she is past her best. Many great performers have trod those boards, such as Max Bygraves, Harry Secombe, Charlie Drake, Dick Emery, Arthur Askey, Una Stubbs and even Cliff Richard to name but a few. I saw Cinderella on ice, when Frankie Vaughan came down the stairs, singing 'Give me the moonlight' in his top hat and tails. I don't know what that had to do with Cinderella! For those of you who are old enough to remember the Billy Cotton Band Show, with his opening cry of Wakey! Wakey! I went to his Christmas show where fake snowballs were hurled into the audience and we had great fun throwing them back! Russ Conway and Mrs Mills were his pianists. Modern Pantomimes are not the same, although the Rock and Roll versions at Theatre Clywd have talented musicians who swap around with the instruments and can play anything!


in July. The team, including father and granddad, rang to mark the occasion. It will be a few years before he is ready to pull on a rope!

Learning the ropes: 3 months in



Coming from a musical family, and playing 2 instruments, I was naturally very keen when my mum said I could pick up bellringing **and** start my volunteering section for my Silver Duke of Edinburgh award. I went in with zero knowledge of bellringing (I didn't even know that the bells are attached to wheels), and some of the jargon like "bob", "doubles" and "dodge" can still seem Greek to me but I can begin to appreciate the complexity and technicality it offers. Where I used to wonder "why can't they just ring an even-rhythm scale?" I now find myself impressed by what used to seem a random sequence of strikes be it at the Cathedral or going past St. Mary's. I have to thank Fiona for the patient and thoughtful lessons - twice a week during the holidays! - because I can currently just about ring rounds (descending scales) and am beginning to understand change ringing, even though I only started in the summer holidays. Bellringing is not only a physical skill (plus climbing the tower stairs every session) but a

precise art that hones your listening, brains, and coordination. And for those who wouldn't consider themselves musical, I was pleasantly surprised how the skill has only a vague familiarity with playing instruments in using one's ears and developing technique yet all with no musical knowledge required.

A Cancer Diary: Finding Faith

Chapter 2 By Bells

It seems fitting that I write this next chapter, as my two boys begin theirs. The chaos of getting them ready for university brings a lovely ordinariness to my days. And it's a welcome relief from the relentless uncertainty of cancer and another couple of weeks spent on NHS wards. I will admit that I lost faith again as I was lying in my hospital bed with consultants standing next to me saying they didn't know what to do. It's not what you need to hear when the Critical Care team are hovering to whisk you down the corridor! The quest to discover what faith means to me began as I realised that, ultimately, I would rather have faith than fear when the inevitable happens. My dad had a very deep faith: whilst I envied him his certainty, I didn't properly understand it. The intellectual rational me sees a rather large barrier: I genuinely don't know if God exists. I am a people person. I find the modern world a bit of an issue in many ways: I appreciate the efficiency of doing things remotely, but I much prefer to be in the room, talking to a real person. If a friend moves house, I find it really hard to talk to them until I've visited them at home: when we chat, I always ask which room they're in so I can see them in my mind's eye. It makes it feel real, particularly as I can't get out and about as much these days. I think I feel the same about God. There's a big part of me that wants to believe he is there - but because I haven't met him, I find it a really difficult concept. Maybe because I'm neither spectacular nor a sinner so I'm 'under his radar'. Ordinary in the extreme. But I do know that I never leave church - His house, if you will - without feeling better.

In the last weeks, I think I've found a starting point: in a childish way, I can believe in a Holy Spirit: gently hovering in nature - in the clouds, in a sunset, above the sea, in the woods; through joy when I'm singing; in family and friendship. It's a much easier thing for me personally to imagine a Spirit as a tangible reality. And I so like to think there are guardian angels, who we can choose to lean on in those lonely hours when you don't want to burden those closest to you. So that's where I'm starting. Full credit to Revd Antony for not putting his head in his hands as I put this to him! But does this mean I'm any less worthy when I get to the pearly gates? I know I have Christian values: my morning mantra isn't to be perfect: it's to be better than I was yesterday, always be kind and to look for the good in whoever I might see that day. But I'm still working out if I'm a Christian in the religious sense.

Time is my biggest uncertainty right now. This is not a negative! I appreciate every minute of every day. I don't waste minutes feeling sorry for myself – every second is precious, and negativity is, frankly, far too

much like hard work. But I feel the race against time to get myself in a place where faith has a definition for me. That's my own pressure - but its strangely enjoyable. So I'm doing my homework with the Reverand Antony, and getting my thoughts in order reading through poems, sermons, and researching faith through both art and in music. But I'll leave you all with a film quote I've always loved: "Faith is about what you think and feel - not about what you know". So, for now, I'll start with expressing faith through the ordinariness of life, and how I feel day-to-day. And as I wave my boys off on their new chapter - hoping they'll work hard and play hard in equal measure - I'll be working on Chapter 3! To be continued...

C Towndrow Design







CHESTER OLD DEE BRIDGE






