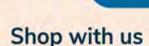

### RECTOR'S CORNER

### Dear Friends,

As I write, the rain has finally arrived - the first proper rain we've seen in months. My poor parched lawn, which has looked more like straw than grass all summer, is already beginning to green again. It's amazing what a little refreshment can do - bringing new life, fresh growth, and a sense of renewal. Perhaps it's also a reminder that we too need refreshment: time to pause, to drink deeply of God's Spirit, and to be renewed in faith.

Autumn always brings with it a sense of preparation. The fields are gathered in, the evenings draw closer, and the rhythm of the year shifts. And then, of course, the first hints of Christmas creep into the shops. It does seem to come earlier every year, but rather than grumbling, perhaps we can smile and remember that the Church is always preparing for Christmas, not with tinsel or wrapping paper, but with prayer and discipleship: preparing room for Christ in our hearts, so that He might be born in us afresh.

With that in mind, there are a few opportunities for spiritual refreshment coming up. We'll be starting a confirmation group this term, using the excellent 3-2-1 course. It's just four evenings long, but a wonderful way to go deeper into the Gospel, whether you're preparing for confirmation yourself, or simply want to refresh your understanding of the faith.

We're also beginning a men's group, a chance for fellowship and for rolling up our sleeves with some projects together. Later in the term we'll also be running an Advent group, giving us space to slow down and reflect, as we prepare for the season of hope. Each of these is, in its own way, a chance to let God water our thirsty souls and bring fresh growth.

A practical note too: our Access and Amenities Project continues to move forward. After careful research, we're intending to combine proven, efficient systems with a new type of infra-red heating, which will give instant warmth in the North Aisle. These are important decisions, but all with the same aim: creating a space where people can be welcomed, warmed and refreshed.

And finally, a call for help! We're looking for volunteers to run and organise the Quiz Night. It's always a highlight - full of fun, laughter, and perhaps a little friendly rivalry - but it does need a team to make it happen. If you can lend a hand, even in a small way, please do get in touch.

So as the rain refreshes the ground and life stirs once again in the garden, may we also be refreshed in spirit, preparing ourselves not only for the changing season, but for Christ Himself.



# ETCHINGHAM TRUST FOR SPORTS AND RECREATION

The village has a magnificent facility in our two Village Halls, the larger of which we share with the School, but which is available at all times outside school hours. Broadly that means after 5 p.m. in the evening, at weekends and in the school holidays. The downside is that they are costly to run.

The buildings are managed as one and the Trust pays its fair share of the costs. Normally, as agreed in the original Lease documents, the Trust meets 28 per cent of the cost of running the building. While it is a great help to the Trust that the building is managed by the School, the Trust obviously has to manage the bookings and running of the halls (outside school hours for the larger) and there are also management costs associated with running the Trust. The result has been that in the years since 2015 the halls have only been in profit when the NHS was making use of them during Covid and have rarely broken even. The Trust itself is running at a steady annual loss. That is why it has long operated a "100 Club" and has organised a number of very successful talks, sometimes in conjunction with other charities, to help cover the deficit. However, there are other organisations in the village that have a need to raise money and not every talk can be for the Trust's benefit.

While the halls are well used during the week, they too often stand empty at weekends and during the summer, although an ideal venue for parties, functions and conferences. The Bleacher seating and curtaining arrangements were designed to enable excellent dramatic productions as those who have attended the Christmas plays in the past will bear witness.

With our reserves dwindling, it is probably time to point out that we are now in sight of that danger point at which the challenge to the village will be "if you don't use it, we shall either lose it or have to subsidise it collectively".

Frankly, the best way forward is for families in the village to make more use of the halls than they do at present. Children's parties are particularly welcome. But there are other ways in which villagers can help, not least by supporting the talks the Trust organises to raise funds. They are always well advertised in the E-bulletin and in this Magazine. Better still, buy shares in our monthly lottery, the 100 Club.

Further than that, consider if there are ongoing activities that you would like to help organise. A cinema club has been mooted, but we would need people to help organise its activities on a sustainable basis. In their turn, the Trustees are looking to organise more functions. We have had to postpone the Autumn Craft Fair through unforeseen circumstances, but have it in mind for the coming year and thereafter, if it is a success, annually.



# FARMING IN PALESTINE: FOCUS ON GAZA

Over five millennia, Gaza's historic old town and port have been repeatedly occupied, besieged, destroyed and rebuilt. Farming Gaza's coastal soils has required skills honed over generations, with crop varieties adapted to cope with the saline conditions. Today, Gaza's infrastructure lies in ruins, with water severely polluted, and its soils razed, compacted and contaminated with heavy metals. Remarkably, farming continues amidst the rubble and temporary shelters.

Dr George McAllister is a researcher and Burwash resident, specialising in post-conflict food systems recovery. Since 2020, she has been working in Gaza with over 300 women producers - herders, farmers, fishers and processors - to support a shift towards food sovereignty. This talk aims to share stories of food and farming, and explore some of the history of Palestine.

# A little bit of village history (written for the Annual Parish Council Report in 2023)

I am writing about the Tuesday Club as we are one of the few 'clubs' left in the village. Another is the Etchingham Military and Aviation Club, but unfortunately there are only two or three active members remaining. There is also the Etchingham Improvements Committee, which sadly has far fewer members than previously.

In a copy of the Parish Magazine for February/ March 2015 there were many more groups in the village, some of which I list below: Beaver Cubs and Scouts, Brownies, Guides, Etchingham Under-Fives and Etchingham Under-Fives Baby & Toddler Group, Darby and Joan, Etchingham and Fontridge Cricket Club, The Village Choir, The Royal British Legion and Rother Valley Ladies. There was also a Mobile Library. How sad that all these have disappeared.

Many years ago, when I was a child my mother belonged to the group which was then called Ticehurst and Etchingham Young Wives. In a previous time my grandmother Weston belonged to a similar group, The Mothers' Union. Apparently during war time, to help the war effort, the Old Village Hall was used by them to can and bottle fruit and veg. A lot of jam making also went on. My mother told me that there was someone there who made sure the correct amount of jam was made for each batch.

I'm not sure where the meetings were held, maybe the Old Village Hall. I first belonged over forty years ago and at that time it was called Hurst Green and Etchingham Young Wives. Our meetings were always the second Tuesday of the month and were held at Ladyfield in the High Street. Mrs. Ransom, who lived there then, was our leader and, at the start of the meeting, she would always read something from the Bible followed by the Lord's Prayer. This was a real coming together of both villages with a printed document giving the committee names and all the events planned, together with who would be supplying the supper for each meeting.

When Mrs. Ransom moved away the meetings also moved, to the Rectory where Father Fred (Butler) and his wife Nora lived at the time.

Several other members hosted meetings after that: Greta Crane at Brookside Farm and later at Balmain, and Julia Barrow, our leader at that time, welcomed us to her home as well. Before the Old Village Hall was demolished, we held several meetings in the Annexe. Barbara Revell was a leader for many years.

In 2011 Julia stepped down and I was voted in as new leader. I am still in that role in 2023. Today our meetings are held at the Etchingham Club when we are not 'out and about'. We are very grateful to the club for allowing us to use their lovely refurbished premises.

The decision to rename ourselves 'The Tuesday Club' was made quite a while back because members were feeling they had to leave if they were widowed or their children had grown up, so it was renamed and opened up for any woman to join; single, married, divorced – it didn't matter.

My mother had also been a member of the Women's Institute, name changed to Rother Valley Ladies later, for over 70 years. She joined when she was only 14 years old. The long existing Darby and Joan Club also changed its name to The Friendship Club. Sadly, neither of these two groups survived the Covid period.

Over the years the Tuesday Club has had many varied evening meetings:- at the Cherry Tree pub with a two course meal, the landlord told us about his previous work in Forensic Investigations in the area of road traffic incidents; - a visit to Bodiam Castle, on the same evening as the local fire crew were practising using their hoses from the moat (not the usual fire hydrant) resulted in 'threats to spray us with water!' but we still made it across to the Castle pub for another lovely meal; there was an annual bowling competition in Tunbridge Wells with a small trophy to be won and yet another great meal to follow.

Pippa Dealey, who lived and went to school in Etchingham, but is now better known from Bargain Hunt and Dickinson's Real Deal on television - and now has her own local antique business - has also spoken at a meeting.

Helen transported us to Australia with her Down Under demonstration with five vibrant floral arrangements, featured above, inspired by the colours and spirit of the country.

Her son and grandson live there and her grandfather and father both spent time in Australia after the Second World War.

Alongside flowers, Helen shared stories of the country's culture and history; it has one of the longest beaches in the world, the vast Ninety Mile Beach and the tradition of early shop closures so people can head to the sea.

We learned that Australia's population is around 27 million, with nearly a million Indigenous Australians. Australia Day, on 26th January, marks the arrival of the First Fleet in 1788. Broome, in Western Australia, once a pearling hub, had divers risking sharks and the deadly blue-ringed octopus. Surprisingly, bees are said to cause more fatalities in Australia than any other creature!

Other curious snippets: Australia runs the world's longest train (4.57 miles long with 682 carriages and 8 locomotives); eucalyptus trees by the BBQ help deter mosquitoes; and while Perth is just 2½ hours from Bali, Sydney is five hours away.

Helen also visited the Western Australian Flower Club - one of just four clubs in the State, serving two million people, and found it shared the same warmth as ours.

A colourful afternoon, full of flowers, stories and sunshine from the other side of the world.

### **ETCHINGHAM NATURE NOTES**

I am writing this on the 25th August, after one of the driest long periods on record. The effects of this are surprising in many ways, including trees, shrubs and plants either dying or at least looking like doing so. Leaves are falling very much as they normally do in Autumn, the grass is growing very slowly (not that this is entirely a bad thing - it needs mowing less often!), and we are walking on fallen acorns under every oak tree.

The most surprising thing has been the number - and variety - of fungi growing in the woods, when the ground is so dry, and I certainly expect fungi mostly in damp weather. We have had some big parasol mushrooms and various smaller ones, some very white and some quite black.

I had a very interesting report from Paul Stott, who had been watching two Green Woodpeckers feeding (on ants) on his lawn. As well as feeding, they also exhibited "anting", where they rubbed the ants into their plumage, presumably to help get rid of parasites. He also reported having had more (black?) ants than usual and several evenings worth of flying ant swarms. We have also had lots of ants, especially flying ants. Paul did also mentioned having lots of bullfinches.

We have been overrun with spiders, getting them everywhere in the house, in unprecedented numbers.

On the 14th August, as we drove along Sheepstreet Lane, my wife (Barbarann) spotted a peregrine falcon on the roadside - something we don't see at all often.

### THE REAL SCIENCE

"Ornamental gourds and hybrid garden squash should not be eaten. Some cucurbits are toxic and contain cucurbitacins, substances that are highly irritating and bitter. After ingestion, these can rapidly lead to digestive pain, nausea, vomiting and (sometimes bloody) diarrhoea, or even severe dehydration requiring hospitalisation. These substances, which are not destroyed by cooking, are naturally produced by wild cucurbits to repel predatory insects such as caterpillars.

This is the case with ornamental gourds such as colocynths, all of which are considered toxic, available commercially (sometimes in the fruit and vegetable section) for strictly decorative uses, and which should not be confused with edible squash.

This is also the case with certain edible squash grown in the garden vegetable patch, which become unfit for consumption as a result of wild hybridisations. This phenomenon occurs when inedible and edible varieties coexist in the same or in neighbouring vegetable patches, and the seeds are harvested and re-sown year after year. But beware! The inedible gourds that result from this hybridisation look exactly like edible squash, except that they have a bitter taste, unlike the edible varieties, which have a neutral or slightly sweet taste."





### LAST OF THE SUMMER WINE



It is 6.20 a.m. on a Bank Holiday and I was hoping to watch an old Time Team about Sutton Hoo on my lap top, cuddled up with the dog, while the dog food for the day was cooking. Alas, this part of Sussex has run out of juice: no electricity, so no internet. It's too chilly to go gardening, the iron is electric, the bedroom is still too gloomy to read so I'll have to revert to writing on my fully charged lap top: about another type of juice - grape juice!

My first taste of wine was in Cahors, France, aged seven during a seven course meal which went on way into the balmy, cricket humming night, with the smell of drying tobacco and ripe Cantaloupe melons wafting through the open windows as we worked our way through rillettes, local fish, garlic drenched French beans, local duck, orange fleshed melons and a whole array of cheeses. My guardian, a Scot from Inverness, (and a history teacher in a London comprehensive) was fed up with ordering grape juice for me and his daughter, so he gave us local Cahors wine with water - and it is still my favourite by miles (kilometres), followed by a certain Hungarian blood-red wine.

If you had told me then that I would end my days surrounded by vineyards, I wouldn't have believed you but Hampshire, Sussex, Surrey and Kent are now producing amazing wines and the French champagne houses have started buying large tracts of land in Sussex. It might be worth living to 100 after all just to celebrate with Sussex "champagne"!

The Romans were growing vines on the slopes of the South Downs behind Ditchling and now, once again, vines are back. The photo above is taken from Streat near Ditchling looking towards Queen Victoria's V on the South Downs. In 1979 I lived in Victoria Cottage below the V and the first vines were being planted: everyone thought the farmer was nuts and now look!

Vines are even being grown to supply 'crops' of grapes to supply local wine makers. We have Vines Cross just down the road, of course. Hidden Spring Vineyard is on Vines Cross Road, Horam. In 2015 the vineyard was expanded, removing the remains of the campsite and planting over 24,000 vines of 5 different varieties across 13 acres, gradually maturing into the amazing vineyard you see today. They do great tasting tours, so there's no excuse for not going to try it out!

According to my Facebook feed you could spend an entire holiday going from vineyard to vineyard, enjoying tours, tastings, wandering between the vines or enjoying gourmet hampers offered by many of the local vineyards: the original Nyetimber estate is located in West Sussex but they own vineyards across nine separate sites in the South East, including Sussex, Hampshire and Kent.

Chapel Down, the leading and largest English vineyard near Tenterden (only 30 minutes drive away) owns, leases and sources from over 1,000 acres of vineyards in South East England, of which 750 acres are fully productive. You could visit Sedlescombe Organic Vineyard on the way at Cripps Corner, Robertsbridge and then proceed to Bodiam Oastbrook Vineyard, or Carr Taylor in Westfield.

Otherwise, head south to Alfriston and the coast where you can visit the huge Rathfinny Estates, which boldly claim: "Our low-intervention, traditional method, vintage Sussex Sparkling wines are a true expression of our terroir. Produced from hand-harvested grapes that are whole-bunch pressed and patiently matured."

The same chalky soil of which Champagne is so proud is also key to Sussex's success - the two regions are connected by a huge bedrock of chalk running under the English Channel. Many believe that this imparts a distinctive character into our wines and is part of what makes Sussex so unique. There are now almost 150 vineyards in the Sussex Winelands – the largest concentration of vineyards in any county. If you're looking to visit a Sussex vineyard for a tasting, a tour or a bite to eat, these exceptional estates are a great place to start. Red wine lovers: try Heppington Red from the Canterbury area or venture to Balfour Winery near Staplehurst who also produce a fine red wine. Going West, stop off at Roebuck Estates near Petworth via Bluebell Vineyard Estates. Want some art too? Then head for Artelium, Streat Lane, Hassocks, where they strive to combine Art, culture, outdoor dining and Sussex wine - has to be my favourite as that's where the photo above was taken from and where we first picked grapes for our Landlord Farmer turned Viticulture innovator - who was so right and ahead of his time. Ridgeview Estate Winery is nearby in Ditchling so these two could make up a day trip!

Anyway, after years of living with a Muslim, I'm drunk after even one large glass ......two glasses and I have a hangover. I did go to University in Montpellier and made a point of studying Viticulture in depth. Gris de Listel, sardines from Sete port cooked over vine cuttings, lettuces hand-picked from the garden, fresh tomato salad and cherries straight off the tree...... In the old town red wine was 1 Franc a glass, invariably with free oysters from the 'etangs' served from plastic bags, opened with a pen knife and drenched in hand squeezed lemon juice .....why did I ever come back to England? I remember now, to marry a Dutchman who had a wine cellar full of Pomerol and Gevray Chambertin.

My daughter has set up home with a trainee Sommelier ...... I hope they are promoting Sussex wines too - wine must run in the blood.

Please drink sensibly: go for quality not quantity. Going to do a tour? Take one non-drinker to drive just in case you get carried away or better still hire a gite on site, as many of the vineyards offer accommodation too. The best enterprise: Shuttle and Vine, who will pick you up from Brighton Station and drive you to and from your vineyard(s) of choice. There's a huge boost to the Sussex economy creeping across our chalk terroirs and sandy nooks!

Lastly, OCTOBER IS SUSSEX GOOD FOOD MONTH ...... Get some pairings going, please. Researching this was so difficult, I kept reading the restaurant menus ....... have a look, but check your credit card first!

# Waiting For Kick-Off, Blisters, Portacabins and Cyber Attacks

As I sit down to write the September article, we are in a sporting state of limbo. The Womens' EURO tournament has finished with a dramatic victory for the Lionesses, the Lion's rugby tour is over following the 2-1 defeat of the Wallabies and the Test match series between England and India has reached its nail-biting crescendo. Now, with the exception of a few pre-season friendlies, there is a long two weeks before the Premier League kicks off. Given that Brighton and Hove Albion got all of their transfer business done early in the summer, there is not a great deal to report. In such scenarios, I would usually resort to trailing through on-line football sites to get ideas and shamelessly plagiarise articles by proper journalists about obscure footballing facts, traditions or footballing events around the world. However, fortunately, this time you have been spared reading about bizarre pre-match rituals, outer Mongolian training methods, the price of pies at stadiums around the globe or any other such drivel dredged from the bowels of the internet.

A few weeks ago, I got chatting to one of our members, who, unbeknown to me, had first-hand, inside knowledge of the Albion, before the current glory days of the AMEX Stadium and Premier League football. Back in the 1990s, Mary worked as a chiropodist and, like so many other loyal, stoic Albion supporters, she went to the Goldstone Ground to watch the inexorable decline of our beloved old club, as it was asset-stripped and left for dead by the reviled Archer-Bellotti ownership regime. However, for Mary, one trip to the Goldstone and a spur-of-the-moment decision allowed her to be part of Brighton's rise from the ashes. Rather than me telling her story, Mary can tell you in her own words....

"Where and when it all began..... I was minding my own business in the North Stand at the Goldstone when a friend said, "There is a request in the programme for a Chiropodist as the one they had has just died". They all said "Go on, you're a chiropodist, you can do it."

I said, "No, no, no way." But they convinced me to go and speak to Malcolm Stuart, the Albion's Head Physiotherapist, after the game. He took one look at me and said, "You're hired, but we can't pay you, we have no money. But you will get some kudos!" That started at least 15 years (and as many managers in charge) of being the club's chiropodist.

Then the dreadful day came in 1997 ..... the end of the Goldstone Ground. The medical equipment, such as it was, was put in a shed somewhere. The University of Sussex gave us the use of a disused squash court and the weights, treatment beds, etc. were put up there...not much light, no water, no phone, but Malcolm and I did our best to raise spirits. Then three portacabins were put up near the playing fields. These were pushed together with a gap in between, a gap from which unpleasant smells wafted. The bottom field was to be the training ground, which, in my opinion, was more suited for raising sheep. However, we made the best of it and I visited there on a Monday afternoon and I also attended the lads before "home" games at Gillingham and, eventually, Withdean.

There were a lot of laughs there and I really enjoyed it. I can remember arriving at the start of the season. As I parked my car, a whistle came from nearby bushes..... "Mary, don't give us away". The lads were supposed to be doing a cross country run and, you guessed it, a little while later they came out puffing and limping looking like they had run the distance.

Another memory that makes me smile is Malcolm's rescued greyhound, named Rooney, who kept escaping and running round the fields with Malcolm in hot pursuit trying to catch him. The lads all came out and lined up cheering him on. I heard one of them say "Shall we help him?". The response was a resounding "No". I was very busy there and so many people turned up for help with foot problems - not just the players. Friends of the "Board", most of the Managers, ground staff, you name it, plus a well-known actor from The Bill, all turned up for treatment.

I was once asked to attend the club as the FA was sending someone down to check on how we were looking after the feet of the youngsters. Another time I recall a man from Hastings on the coaching team who was notorious for believing a woman had no place in a football club. He came to me with an ingrowing toenail and a crowd of players came in surrounding the bed saying "Give him pain Mary" or words to that effect, few of which I can repeat here. I could go on.....but no names mentioned so no rules broken. As Malcolm Stuarts said all those years ago, I have received "kudos" from my work at the Albion and it's the privilege of having some part in keeping this special club going in our darkest hour. And LOOK AT THEM NOW!!!"

Speaking to Mary about her experiences at Brighton and Hove Albion, emphasises the phenomenal transformation of the club since the abyss of the late 90s. Portacabins in muddy fields, squash courts for treatment rooms, matches played in Kent or in converted athletics tracks and battling to stay in the football league is a long way from the state-of-the-art Elite Football Performance Centre, AMEX Stadium and Premier League football the Albion now enjoys. If any 'new' Brighton supporters ever get complacent or feel entitled to top 10 finishes and European football, just send them to Mary and she will remind them where the club has come from and how lucky they are to support the club in its present glory days.

Seeing as we won our only competitive game in August, let's hope the saying isn't true!





## Wild about Burwash

We have been busy picking apples for our fourth year of Wild About Burwash apple juice. Most fruit trees have fared well despite the hot, dry Summer so we're seeing a plentiful harvest. Thank you to all who offered apples from their gardens and orchards, and to volunteers who have helped pick, collect, deliver and co-ordinate the whole project. If you would like to know when the first pressing is ready and how to buy some of this delicious local juice, please email us. We sell it in packs of 6, litre bottles, with a 2 year shelf-life, with all profits helping us to do more for the environment locally.

In early August, a small group spent the morning with Helen Proctor of the Sussex Botanical Recording Society in the Bateman's "Donkey Field" orchard recording wild flowers and grasses before the annual cut. We found 70 different species which are now uploaded through iRecord to the Biodiversity Records Office which helps monitor data at both national and parish level.





Volunteers continue to monitor the River Dudwell, checking the water quality (monthly) and the state of the river bank (quarterly), noting changes to the vegetation and sightings of any wildlife. Simon Forster and Julian Kenny were on hand at the Burwash Community Market last month to share more details on the project (see page 39).

They have kindly offered to help Wild About Etchingham and Hurst Green start their own testing for both the Limden and the Rother rivers. If you would like to be one of 10 regular volunteers (once a month for about an hour), please get in touch with Fiona at: wildaboutetchingham@gmail.com

We ran another iRecord session at the annual autumn clearance of St Philip's churchyard in Burwash Common. If you'd like to learn more about how to help make sure your flora and fauna sightings throughout the year are registered, let us know.

In September, 15 lucky members attended the Ancient Tree Walk at Bateman's with Kev, their Ranger and Doug, our local Tree Warden. This enjoyable training session explained the techniques to estimate the age of a variety of trees; those which are considered ancient, veteran or notable will be added on to the Woodland Trust's Ancient Tree Inventory. It proved to be a very popular event and we were oversubscribed so plan to run another one in the Spring.

following the Parish Council Meeting on 9th September

#### Councillors

Terry Johns and Julie Lynn have joined the Parish Council. Terry previously served on the Council until he had to take 'sick leave' and we are pleased that he is now able to be part of the Council, once again. There was to have been an election for the remaining position and a number of you indicated that you would welcome this but, as Julie was the only candidate, she was duly elected and we welcome her to the Council. David Appleyard has resigned from the Council and we thank him for his contribution to the work of the Council.

#### Community Build Project – a fresh start

The Steering Committee for the Project (formerly called "The Hub') held its first meeting in August and agreed the way forward, with a Mission Statement:

Our mission is to lead the successful planning, design, and delivery of a new community building that meets the needs of our community—today and for future generations. We are committed to working transparently, inclusively, and responsibly, ensuring our decisions reflect the shared values and aspirations of the people we serve. Through careful stewardship of resources, open collaboration with stakeholders, and a focus on long-term sustainability, we will create a welcoming, accessible, space that fosters connection, learning, and wellbeing across the community.

It was considered that the Terms of Reference needed further discussions but if you go to the 'Community Build Project' on the Burwash Parish website, you will see all the documents which relate to this project including the Communications Strategy which explains how we want to engage the Burwash community and stakeholders.

The Committee will also be establishing a Working Party of councillors, parishioners and stakeholders to address specific areas of the project.

#### The Neighbourhood Plan

The excellent Plan which was developed by Councillors and Parishioners now needs to be updated in the light of Government directives. A Steering Group is being formed to carry out this revision. If you would like to be part of the discussions, please contact Emma.

#### **Traffic & Transport Working Party**

There is continuing concern about traffic at the 'pinch point' outside the Hairdressers, with cars and lorries mounting the pavement, causing damage to the historic pavers and more importantly, creating a hazard for pedestrians and those living along that stretch of road. The County Safety Officer has advised that 'it is not deemed to meet the criteria' for protective bollards but the Council does not accept that nothing can be done to make this area safer and will be taking the matter further with the Safety Officer.

#### **Stiles and Metal Gates**

A resident has asked the Council to look into replacing all wooden stiles in the parish for metal gates and we will be looking at this. However these are the landowner's responsibility to maintain.

#### Flying the Flag

A resident has asked us to consider flying British Flags. This matter came up some time ago when we replaced the Council's flagpole from its site near Dudwell View, to the Council Rooms. It was, at that time, agreed that the Union Jack or St George's flags should be flown to mark special events, such as Remembrance Days but that the East Sussex flag would be flown at other times.

The next Council meeting is on 14th October. This will be too late for the Parish Matters - which aims to keep parishioners informed of Council decisions - to be included in the Village Magazine. You will still be able to read the Parish Matters for October, if you sign up to the Burwash e-bulletin, or pick up a copy from the Parish Office.

#### **BURWASH NOT SO YOUNG CLUB**

Despite the humidity nearly two dozen members assembled at the Village Hall for our meeting on the 17th July with the author Chris McCooey as our guest speaker.

Three of our members rendered apologies and a fair list of birthday greetings were given. Cake providers were rapidly arranged for our next meeting. On the 21st August we held our Annual Garden Party in the beautiful garden of a local lady who befriends the club. Our September meeting was moved back a week to 25th September and we were grateful to Phyllis Stevens for sharing her first hand experiences of the Chelsea Flower Show.

Madam Chair Isabella introduced our speaker, Chris McCooey, who apologised for being a tiny bit unsteady as he was suffering from 'Peripheral Neuropathy' and with humour checked that his audience could hear him. He introduced himself with a couple of funny jokes. He was born in Tunbridge Wells in May 1949 and grew up in Kent. Since 1986 he has been a full-time non-fiction writer and had brought a selection of books with him for us to buy should we wish. He was relaxed in sharing one of his early books, 'Freelance'.

Chris is a person who excels at telling stories, in a very engaging manner. He is a skilled story teller who captivates his audience with his narrative. Raconteur/Author might be a better term for him as he possesses the knack of crafting and delivering anecdotes in a way that is both interesting and amusing. He likes to write about real people and places. His books have interesting titles like 'War, Women, and Weather' and 'Birds, Beasts and Bacchanalia'. He attended Oxford College (created in 1249) and for his dissertation wanted to submit a book on 'Smuggling', after being told it was not academic enough 'Geography of Smuggling' was not grand enough either. He found himself in the College photo standing next to Bill Clinton with whom he got on very well.

He went to Japan for a year's visit and stayed for 10 years. He returned with a wife and a Cannon Camera. He still has the Camera (!) he said, but not the wife. This illustrates his relaxed, almost casual, way of talking to his audience. He also has a son and daughter of whom he is immensely proud and he is in fact, on good terms with all his family.

Chris likes to visit local Churches where he always finds interesting historical snippets. There was one particular Church where he spotted a basket of cooking apples with a sign that said 'take only one apple God is watching' - close by were some homemade biscuits with a sign which said 'take as many as possible, God is watching the apples!' He also recounted an interview with Malcolm Muggeridge and his wife, Kitty such a lovely local couple. Malcolm was not only an early vegetarian but a really nice person. Instead of taking his usual notes at his interview Chris took a microphone and recorder. They got on well but when Chris got home he found he had failed to record anything as he had NOT turned on the microphone. When he eventually had the courage to ring Malcolm to confess - his life was made easy as Malcolm asked Chris when he would like to come again as he himself never trusted technical equipment! Chris was a 'Samaritan' for 15 years, a fact of which he is quite proud and also a Bee Keeper. He sadly no longer keeps bees as since 1990 English hives are being attacked by Varroa for instance. The Varroa Mite and tracheal mites alongside other viral disease produces chronic bee paralysis. The tiny mite attacks the bee (often their legs) and sucks the juice out of them. This devastating destruction can be dealt with by the use of hard chemicals. When the bees fly back to the hive they brush the lip of the hive and this combats the mites, etc. To Chris this is not working alongside Nature anymore so he has given up keeping bees with some sadness, although his direct neighbour has lots of hives and keeps Chris in honey.

There were many jokes and little anecdotes as he went along, so it really was a relaxed afternoon full of laughter.

Our next meeting is on the 16th October. The subject is "Commonwealth War Graves' and the speaker is Jane.

#### **POETRY CORNER**

The writing is on the wall when September comes. Summer is over. Which is why there can only be one poem for this issue: To Autumn by the Romantic poet John Keats (1795- 1821). Published in 1820, the Ode's imagery-laden three stanzas offer a sensuous description of the season in all its seductive bounty, as well as its inescapable foreshadowing of departure and endings.

Personification is the central dramatizing device in the poem's tri-partite structure. Autumn is at first represented as an intimate co-conspirator of the prime celestial mover and shaker – 'Close bosom friend of the maturing sun'. Together they 'load and bless', 'bend with apples', 'fill all fruit with ripeness', 'swell the gourd' and 'plump with hazel shells'. The direct address to the season intensifies in the second stanza; the question casts it as a harvester fatigued by agricultural labour – 'sitting careless', 'sound asleep', 'drowsed with the fume of poppies.' The final stanza opens with the speaker imagining a questioner who has a more predictable preference for springtime.

This notion of the 'songs of spring' is then gently dismissed in the encouragement to Autumn to 'Think not of them, thou hast thy music too.' The reason for this is that Autumn will strike the beautiful notes of the compellingly visual ('barrèd clouds'), colour ('rosy hue' and 'the red-breast') and touch ('light wind'). At the same time, however, there is no getting away from Autumn as a harbinger of changes that must be faced, the sounds that must be heard – 'wailful choir where the small gnats mourn', 'full-grown lambs' that 'loud bleat', 'Hedge crickets sing; and now with treble soft/The red breast whistles...'

Keats' poetic achievement in his Ode To Autumn is to dramatize an irresistible argument about why autumn is worth noticing, worth relishing. Yes, it is bittersweet as we see and hear the 'gathering swallows twitter in the skies'. What this poem invites us to do, as we reflect on the turn of the year, the slow spin of the seasons, is to savour the privilege of our own place within it.

#### **TO AUTUMN**

Season of mists and mellow fruitfulness, Close bosom friend of the maturing sun, Conspiring with him how to load and bless With fruit the vines that round the thatch-eves run: To bend with apples the mossed cottage-trees, And fill all fruit with ripeness to the core; To swell the gourd, and plump the hazel shells With a sweet kernel; to set budding more, And still more, later flowers for the bees, Until they think warm days will never cease, For summer has o'er brimmed their clammy cells. Who hath not seen thee oft amid thy store? Sometimes whoever seeks abroad may find Thee sitting careless on a granary floor, Thy hair soft-lifted by the winnowing wind; Or on a half reaped furrow sound asleep, Drowsed with the fume of poppies, while thy hook Spares the next swath and all its twinèd flowers; And sometimes like a gleaner thou dost keep Steady thy laden head across a brook; Or by a cyder-press, with patient look, Thou watchest the last oozings hours by hours.

Where are the songs of spring? Aye, where are they? Think not of them, thou hast thy music too — While barrèd clouds bloom the soft dying day, And touch the stubble-plains with rosy hue. Then in a wailful choir the small gnats mourn Among the river sallows, borne aloft Or sinking as the light wind lives or dies; And full-grown lambs loud bleat from hilly bourn; Hedge-crickets sing; and now with treble soft The red breast whistles from a garden-croft; And gathering swallows twitter in the skies.

#### **GEOFF CAIRNCROSS 1943 - 2025**

I first met Geoff in 1970 when I started playing cricket for Burwash Weald Cricket Club. My first game was in Hastings and afterwards we went to The Cutter to have a drink on the sea front. I remember how very welcoming Geoff was to me, a new young bloke who could play a bit.

He lived at Burnt House Farm then but later, when he married Gill, he lived in his mother's old house and never moved again, or even wanted to.

Lyle, Russell & Geoff were the mainstays of the playing field and I soon started to help them by doing whatever I could. Geoff knew where all the springs and drain runs were and which ones needed rodding. He did most of the maintenance on the mowers and the tractor, with me passing him the spanners. He took on wicket preparation, including marking out, when Lyle retired and I used to help him and learnt about pitch preparation from him. He was very thorough: he would dig out individual weeds with his penknife. He also organised the picking up and burning of the annual hedge cutting.

He loved cricket but hated actually playing. He used to love listening to Test Match Special on the radio. Geoff thought 'Cricket should be played in whites' and he hated what he called 'pyjama kits' - his name for kits with two much colour.

He knew all the wild birds, their songs and where they nested, probably from his boyhood hobby of egg collecting. If he didn't know a bird, then it was an LBJ (little brown job). He was also an expert mole catcher as many of the Burwash Common locals will testify.

He worked up at the Seaview chicken factory and quite often at the weekend we would cut up a load of pallets with either his or my chain saw, usually him cutting and me holding to steady it with the saw often very close to my fingers but I had complete confidence in him and still have all my digits! This was a useful morning's work as we both had solid fuel Rayburns. We even shared a large frozen turkey one Christmas by cutting it in half with his bushman saw.

He was a very good vegetable grower, so good in fact he used to put excess crops outside the house for anybody to help themselves. Mind you, he used to say that he hated gardening.

In the '70's Geoff, Lyle, Pip, Phillip Gregory, Mike Oakley and I often used to go to watch Brighton play at the Goldstone ground. Latterly though his interest in football tailed off - too corporate I suppose!

He loved eating out, so I shall miss our midday pub lunches with good old Gill and Geoff. **RIP Geoff!**
