This appearance comes the day after the official launch of the book giving attendees one of the very first chances to hear about the new release. Richard Cooper-Knight's *Death and Service 3* series explores the experiences of local soldiers and communities during the First World War, weaving together vivid historical research and personal stories. SKY AT NIGHT November

Sunrise Sunset

Moon Phases

Planets

Saturn rules the first part of the evening in the southwest setting at 2am followed by Jupiter rising in the east at 8pm. Jupiter is much more conspicuous than Saturn being so very bright. Look for it close to the Moon on 6 November. Venus is still a morning object but disappears in the Sun's glow by the end of the month not to be seen again until next year.

Constellation

The Pleiades or Seven Sisters star cluster, part of the constellation of Taurus the Bull, is prominent looking high south at this time of year. This little cloud of stars, easy to spot with the naked eye, is quite deceptive as the few stars you can see are only a very small part of the 1,000 stars which actually make up the cluster. Excellent in a dark sky area a pair of binoculars will give you a spectacular view.



Phenomena

On the 5th we have the biggest and brightest supermoon of the year then on the 6th look for the Moon to the right of the Seven Sisters star cluster (as mentioned

previously). The Leonid meteor shower is on the night of 17th/18th and with the Moon out of sight at this time it's an opportunity to spot some of the fainter meteors.

NEWS FROM OUR MPS

Ashley Fox, MP for Middlezoy and Othery

Getting Housing Right for Our Villages

We're seeing more and more planning applications for housing developments in our villages. While each individual application might look reasonable on paper, their cumulative effect risks changing the character of rural communities beyond recognition.

I'm not opposed to new housing. We need more homes so that young people can stay local, families can grow, and older people can downsize without leaving their communities. But it must be done properly. Development must be proportional, sustainable, and supported by the right infrastructure - roads, schools, healthcare and community facilities. Take Woolavington for example. There are currently several proposals pending for some 450 new homes. That's a huge number for a village of its size. Residents already face pressures on local roads, GP surgeries and school places. If these applications all proceed together, the cumulative impact will be immense. It's not fair to ask small villages to carry large-scale growth without the necessary support to go with it. That's why it's essential that the Council looks at all these plans together, so that their cumulative effect is fully taken into account.

Developers also need to play their part. If a project isn't viable once the full cost of local services is factored in, then it's simply the wrong project for that location. Local people



shouldn't be left with congested roads, oversubscribed GPs and shrinking green space because of poor planning or unrealistic land deals.

Somerset deserves housing that strengthens communities, not overwhelms them. Growth should be guided by what our towns and villages can reasonably sustain, not by how much land developers can promote. We must build homes that fit the place, match the infrastructure, and enhance the life of the communities they join. That's the kind of housing policy that truly serves villages like Othery, Middlezoy, and the whole of Somerset.

Update from Tessa Munt, MP for Moorlinch, Stawell, Sutton Mallet and Greinton

I was delighted to discover, when my team did a count, that I've held well over 100 surgeries across the constituency since the election last year. I love using local pubs, coffee shops and community cafés, as the buzz means conversations can be held in private in a local venue. The Ring O' Bells in Moorlinch hosted a recent surgery, after which David and I enjoyed our pub supper.

Since my last update, I've spent more time in Somerset, as Party Conferences keep MPs away from Westminster for three weeks.



Last month, I was honoured to be voted in as Chair of the All Party Parliamentary Group for Flooding and Flooded Communities, hitting the ground running meeting the Association of Drainage Authorities, representatives from Councils and agencies in Eastern England and addressing the Flooding Resilience Conference 2025.

I've used the Conference break to visit businesses and charitable organisations and one particular problem faces us all locally. Our Hospices offer end-of-life care, services and support for those who need it, but most Hospices receive only 26% of their funding from Government and consequently are hugely reliant on fundraising and donations for the majority of their income. I'll be pressing the point in Westminster that unless there is a fairer funding deal for the vital end-of-life care services that Hospices provide – which, after all, relieves pressure on the NHS, GPs and hospitals too – our local Hospices will be forced to scale back some services, directly harming local people when they face one of the most challenging periods of their lives – clearly the last thing any Hospice wants to do.

If you'd like to come and discuss any concerns, a full list of my surgeries is available when you call or email me, but this is your most local: Friday 7 November from 6pm to 7pm at Ashcott Village Hall.

FARM DIARY

This is written for non-farmers who live surrounded by farmland.

In the Field. Good news. At the beginning of October when winter cereals are traditionally sown in this part of the country, we sowed a lot and it was followed by rain. This author did witness triticale sown on a Friday, have I Imm of rain on the Saturday and have roots half an inch long by Monday morning. It was up in rows all over the field by mid-October. The soil was warm. Triticale is an animal feed cereal which is a wheat and rye cross. The grains are very similar to that of wheat. We are using it in our rotation in lieu of beans. The latter we cannot organise to give consistent yields and thus financial output. With regards weed control in these crops a thick and well-established crop is the best weed control. The crop outcompetes the weeds. So, in many fields we are off to a good start. Lambs are going to market regularly and fetching between £130 to £150 per 45 kg animal live weight.

2025 harvest. According to reports in many newspapers, farms have suffered their second worst harvest on record. According to the man from Openfield who markets our grain, the picture is very varied with some farms in the southwest doing very well and others all through the range down to some doing terribly. It just depends where the rains fell and did not fall. Other factors are involved as well of course.

BrewDog. According to Patrick Galbraith in the Daily Telegraph of 3 October, this company, having bought a large Scottish estate of over 9,000 acres, kept it for five years and has now sold it again. They had planted trees on it which largely failed but were described as going to help the brewer with its net zero credentials. The buyer is a rewilding company called Oxygen Conservation. Neither of these companies would ever pay inheritance tax. If a private family or person bought the estate, they would be paying this tax on it every 40 years or so according to the legislation coming in April 2026. It is strange to have one rule for some land another for other land.

Caroline was a former actress and liaison to the French consulate. Her world was changed when Hitler's army invaded Poland in September 1939 and then set its sights on France.

The lives of three young women are set on a collision course when one is sent to Ravensbrück, the notorious Nazi concentration camp for women, one works there as a doctor and the US citizen tries to help. Their stories cross continents: from New York to Paris, Germany and Poland, as the story is told of those whom history has forgotten. Feelings about the book were mixed and provoked strong discussion. Part of the subject matter is distasteful: some readers failed to finish the book, whilst others found it a page-turner. Despite the story of the women in Ravensbrück being little told, it could be considered that stories of the Holocaust have been endlessly recounted and that there are more contemporary horrors to consider. On the other hand, if it were read as a true history, it could be thought that the love interest is just a frivolous addition, as it is not strictly historical.

All agreed it was not light reading. Certainly it was thought provoking and the majority were pleased to have had the opportunity to read it.



BISHOP'S LETTER LET'S WALK INTO THE LIGHT



A story that's often told in our churches comes from the fourth chapter of John's Gospel. It tells of Jesus, in the blinding heat of midday meeting a Samaritan woman at the well in a town called Sychar. The woman is hoisting up heavy buckets of water in the hot sun. She's there because she's a woman with 'a reputation' and it's the only time of day she can avoid the muttering of her neighbours who meet at the well at cooler hours.

In an extraordinary encounter, Jesus sees deep into the woman's heart. Through their conversation Jesus brings about her healing and restoration into the community from which she is estranged. It's a story of life, possibility, new beginnings

and forgiveness.

The woman at the well is not the only Biblical story set in Sychar. There's another, contained in the 34th chapter of the Book of Genesis. This is a tale of terror that's

never heard in our churches; the rape of a girl called Dinah. It's a dark, nasty tale of violence that wrecks the life of individuals, families and the entire community. So we don't speak about it. We keep it hidden.

Sometimes people say to me of safeguarding "It's just a tick box exercise" an onerous compliance requirement. Rather I would say that our work in safeguarding asks fundamental questions about the kind of places we want our churches to be. Just like the Bible passages I've mentioned, we can be places of hiddenness, silence, and hurt. Or places of life, new beginnings and restoration.

Accounts like the Makin review have shone light on our story. We've also been working hard to bring about change. While we cannot be complacent, I am intensely proud of all that was revealed about safeguarding in Bath and Wells by our independent audit that happened earlier this year. This told us that we are moving towards a much better story. So let's build on the momentum we have created. Let's walk into the light.
