Autumn, Harvest and Generosity Week

Autumn is well and truly with us now. The summer heat has faded, youngsters are back in school, the deer are roaming around Bradgate searching for acorns and the squashes and pumpkins are ready on the allotment. In church the Harvest festivals are underway. There are numerous school harvests that need attending by our ministry team alongside those held in church.

At Harvest time we think about all that we have to be thankful for and living in this country our list is endless. There's the wonderful water board who despite the dry year still provide fresh clean drinking water at the turn of the tap; or the NHS providing care when we need it with out having to prove we can pay for it; there are schools that teach our children, grandchildren or even great grandchildren free of charge and don't forget those dustbin lorries that prowl the streets in our village every Monday. The list goes on. We have so much to be thankful for in this country

But harvest is not just about saying thank you to God, but also about what God wants us to do with the things he has given us. Stephen Cottrell, Archbishop of York, points out that "Our faith starts with the most generous gift of all – God's gift to us of life itself and new life and new hope in Jesus Christ. What we call

'generosity' is just our response to these great gifts... This is what Generosity Week is all about." In our benefice we are thinking about Generosity during the first 2 weeks of October

Jesus talked about what it meant to give generously. In the Bible, there is a story about how Jesus was standing outside the Temple with his friends, watching people come and give money... Many rich people donated large sums to the Temple. Then a poor widow came and put in two coins that weren't worth very much. Jesus told his friends that her contribution, even though it was less money, was worth more than what all the rich people gave. They could afford to give large amounts, but she gave almost all she had to live on. For her, it was like giving everything Luke 21:1 - 4

Not everyone has a lot of money to spare. Jesus' story about the poor widow is a reminder that how much we give is less important than our attitude about giving. Money isn't the only thing to give either. We can give to God, and each other, in three ways: our time, our talents, and our treasure (money).

Time

There are lots of ways we can spend time helping others, whether with our young people or helping with Fair Cuppa, whether at Groby Sings or at Tasters. Generosity also matters to the people we love. Small rituals of spending time together within families are important – going for a walk, praying together at bedtime, listening to what was good and bad about each day – are ways of being generous to each other. Also, who among our friends and family might need us to spend special time with them? Is there someone who's lonely or sad? How can we help them?

Talent

We all have talents whether as accountant, baker or carpenter. Whatever it is, that talent could be used to help others. Tasters need another regular baker just once a month. If you're good at making people feel welcome, maybe you can help by being one of the welcomers and sides people occasionally. Sunday school need a regular person who will sit in just to listen, and I am sure we all have a talent to sit!

Treasure

Harvest is a time when we can reassess how much we can give to the church. As gift aid secretary I am always amazed by the generosity that is seen in this benefice, and I thank all of you who prayfully think about your giving to your church. However, I also realise it is easy to set up direct debits and then forget about them. The last few years inflation rates have increased our bills and our giving hasn't kept pace with them. So consider this a gentle reminder to look at your giving, does it need to increase?

Many of us wish we could give more but cannot currently afford to. A legacy is a no risk way of giving because it doesn't take effect until after death. Some of us may find ourselves in the situation. where the next generation is no longer relying on us for financial support. In those cases I would like to encourage you to think about including a bequest to St Philip and St James church whether Groby or Ratby in your Will. If you would like to explore this further please speak to any of the ministry team and they will support you in this.

To pass on a legacy is to pass on the faith of the church and the faith that is within us. We have received a treasured place from previous generations, and are responsible for handing it on to the next. The church, like the world it serves, is not just for us now – we are given the privilege of being responsible for a sacred place where God has been found, and which we then hand on to others.

Rector's Ramblings

I am indebted to the person who shared on Facebook their sermon for Holy Cross Day, which we celebrated on Sunday 14th September, on which I base this rambling as I reflect on what I see around the country and the questions and comments I have heard. For, ironically, the the cross has been everywhere of late. Painted on zebra crossings and miniroundabouts, hung from houses and carried in streets by thousands upon thousands in demonstrations organised by particular people who we call the far-right. This cross is of course the cross on the national flag of England, the cross of St George, but alongside this wooden crosses have been carried in demonstrations. All this to appropriate the cross as a symbol of power and sadly, in the current climate, thereby to inflame racial tensions and create division.

But for me this is to misuse and misunderstand the cross. Some of you may remember me using, a number of years ago, the poem 'High and Lifted Up', by Studdart Kennedy, one of my favourites to which the Facebook sermon also alluded. It is a good reminder of the real meaning of the cross when we look towards the end of the poem:

God, the God I love and worship, reigns in sorrow on the Tree, Broken, bleeding, but unconquered, very God of God to me. All that showy pomp of splendour, all that sheen of angel wings, Was but borrowed from the baubles that surround our earthly kings. Thought is weak and speech is weaker, and the vision that He sees Strikes with dumbness any preacher, brings him humbly to his knees.

But the word that Thou hast spoken borrows nought from kings and thrones.

thrones,
Vain to rack a royal palace for the echo of Thy tones.
In a manger, in a cottage, in an honest workman's shed,
In the homes of humble peasants, and the simple lives they led,
In the life of one an outcast and a vagabond on earth,
In the common things He valued, and proclaimed of priceless worth,
And above all in the horror of the cruel death He died,
Thou hast bid us seek Thy glory, in a criminal crucified.
And we find it - for Thy glory is the glory of Love's loss,
And Thou hast no other splendour but the splendour of the Cross.

For in Christ I see the martyrs and the beauty of their pain,

And in Him I hear the promise that my dead shall rise again. High and lifted up, I see Him on the eternal Calvary, And two pierced hands are stretching east and west o'er land and sea.

On my knees I fall and worship that great Cross that shines above, For the very God of Heaven is not Power, but Power of Love.

This is the cross we as Christians need to reappropriate. As Paul puts it in 1 Corinthians 1:18 'the message of the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God' – and the power of God is in Christ crucified for love of us all. This cross is not one of power or exclusion. This is the cross of sacrifice and love. Let us remind everyone that 'the very God of Heaven is not Power, but Power of Love' and seek always to conquer hatred with Love that we may be the truly Christian country we are proud of.

Riffat's Recipe

Palak Paneer (Pakistani Style)

Ingredients:

For the Spinach (Palak):

500g spinach (palak), washed and chopped

1 green chili (adjust to taste)

2 cloves garlic

Water (for blanching)

For the Gravy:

2-3 tbsp oil or ghee

1 medium onion, finely chopped

2 tomatoes, finely chopped

1–2 green chilies (slit or chopped)

1 tbsp ginger garlic paste

½ tsp cumin seeds

½ tsp coriander powder

½ tsp red chili powder (adjust to taste)

1/4 tsp turmeric

Salt to taste

¼ tsp garam masala (optional)

Paneer:

200–250g paneer (cubed; you can fry them lightly if preferred)

Optional: 2–3 tbsp cream or 1 tbsp yogurt (for richness), Fresh coriander for garnish

Instructions:

Blanch the Spinach:

Boil water in a pot, add spinach leaves and 1 green chili.

Blanch for 2–3 minutes until wilted, then strain and immediately transfer to cold water (to retain green colour).

Blend into a smooth puree with 2 cloves of garlic. Set aside.

Now prepare the Masala:

Heat oil or ghee in a pan. Add cumin seeds and let them sizzle.

Add chopped onions and sauté until golden brown.

Add ginger garlic paste and cook for 1–2 minutes until the raw smell disappears.

Add tomatoes, green chilies, salt, and powdered spices (red chili, coriander powder, turmeric). Cook until oil separates and masala is well-cooked.

Add Spinach Puree:

Add the blended spinach to the cooked masala.

Mix well and simmer for 5–7 minutes on medium heat. Add a splash of water if needed.

Add cream or yogurt at this stage for a richer taste (optional).



Add Paneer:

Add paneer cubes and let them simmer in the spinach for 5 minutes. Sprinkle garam masala and stir gently.

Final Touch:

Garnish with fresh coriander or a drizzle of cream. Serve hot with naan, roti, or jeera rice.

Tips: You can lightly fry the paneer in oil or ghee for a firmer texture.

This is the twelfth recipe that Riffat has written for our magazine, but because she has taken a new post, it is also sadly the last. She has added two pudding recipes for November and December.

For future months, maybe one of the magazine readers would like to submit something, not necessarily a recipe, but perhaps a piece of local history, or a local walk, something that our readers might find interesting?





News from The Meek Family in South Arica

And God is able to bless you abundantly, so that in all things at all times, having all that you need, you will abound in every good work 2Corinthians 9:8

Unexpectedly, Steve and I were asked to speak at Church about what we do. Consequently, there is a notice each week outlining basic needs and times for anyone to help. Kert, a new member has helped a couple of times. And now Alta, our Sunday school Leader comes each morning; strangely enough, she drops off her son at 6am to serve coffees at a pancake stall situated inside the Mother Church grounds, while we three then serve the homeless at the kerb outside!

The Ywam team continued to come every Thursday, finishing at the end of September. The Birthday celebration was a lovely joyful time with the extra help, plenty of birthday cake and balloons. Individuals could pluck gold and yellow balloons from the transformed bush next to our table; the group of homeless at the railway station now display 'BIRTHDAY' balloons and those at the White House 'HAPPY'! I made a savoury rice dish which was transformed by the trimmings and spare vegetables from a Church fundraising of 600 chicken braai and salad. Hannah made the birthday cards.

The Lord 'multiplied' other meals. Tuesday was planned to serve apple & cinnamon porridge and sandwiches with the coffee. But Innovation for The Blind donated a bucket each of cooked beef bredie (stew) and chicken in sauce. Although it meant an earlier start, we cooked rice, added vegetables. And although porridge had all the added vitamins etc, a meaty meal was much more appreciated on such a stormy rainy cold morning. there was plenty for those arriving to enjoy. And the rain stopped for the duration of service!

On the Thursday, a hearty meal of 'Cowboy beans' was made with 20kg of roast and boiled potatoes, 5 kg fried onions, BBQ spiced cabbage (3), sweet potatoes, 3 kg polony cubed, 20 tins of beans, and a tomato sauce I made to bind all together. It was to be served with slices of bread and coffee. Then, the evening before, 180 Burger King bread rolls were donated. I decided to use these amazing sesame seeded rolls by making polony and chutney/salad rolls (lettuce had also been donated). The meal was good before but now on Thursday morning the guys were excited by the Burger King rolls. 85 rolls and meals were served. The rest of the rolls were used for breakfast the next day Friday when Steve and I drove around with a car full of men and women's clothes and shoes. We found the people where they slept.

Jean's mum has moved her second-hand shop into Worcester and decided she wasn't going to sell clothes anymore. She donated 17+ sacks to us. They were truly 'good as new'. Unused and over-sized items were passed onto Innovation's charity shop; baby clothes to Mother Church and Emergency foster care; home wear for the church bazaar and fancy dresses for a charity that provides for Matric Balls etc so those in need have a choice.

Provision and Praise.

It was a multiplication of 'more' and 'extra'; cherry on the cake! Thank you Lord.

There have also been donations of cans of peaches and a farmer filled a bakkie with tubs of Blueberries for Ywam to use. The porridge will be purple and fruity and I now have peaches to accompany jelly for a summer celebration! 'more' and 'extra'.

On the 10th September, we hosted Intercessions at Ywam, displaying prayer stations about our work. we highlighted themes we pray each morning when going into Town:

Holy Ground, appointed place Loving kindness, tender loving care Sharing gospel, life style and discipleship

Provision, nutrition & praise

Protection & praise

The Word, bibles and verses in English, Afrikaans and Xhosa

Mourning

Who am I? birthdays

These are themes for the people we serve as well as for ourselves as 'servants' and as a family.

In the middle of The Glory Hall, we stood the large wooden cross and chairs encircling. On each chair was a board, pen and a Prayer request or message from a homeless person. Ywam students and staff could read and reply with prayers or verses or whatever. 'The Word' table had verses, crafts, pens etc to make cards or whatever for the homeless. The day before I had told them about the Ywam meeting and asked if anyone wanted those attending to pray or send a message to them. At Breakfast the next day, 50 people either received their replies or a card, message or verse.

Cherry on the cake!

The local newspaper has been highlighting those living on the streets in a series of articles of differing opinions. It's been three years since we began looking for premises or land for a Night shelter or somewhere off the streets to serve meals.

We still need to hope and trust as we wait and serve; not forgetting the thanks and praise.
