From Father Chris

We got there! - now what?

October 2025 sees us reach a goal many thought impossible – the final payment on the mortgage we have carried, month by month, for fourteen years. For all this time, the first €1050 of Chaplaincy income each month has gone towards repaying the cost of buying the site and buildings at Hommëel. We got there! – well done everybody!

The purchase wasn't made on a whim, but in pursuit of a vision embraced by the Chaplaincy at that time, a vision encapsulated in the sign on the wall: 'The Anglican Centre'. The vision had two facets. The first aim was to provide a physical base for the Chaplaincy, an aspiration expressed as wanting 'a place of our own'. The second was to provide a place of encounter and discovery, where people could meet these *unfamiliar Anglicans*, to find out more about how we express our faith and how we live it.


How has that vision fared during this long haul? Over the past fifteen years the Chaplaincy has changed, and the world has changed as well. Interest in organised religion has continued to decline, the world has become more pressured, society more fractured. We are more and more at home using the internet – sometimes it seems everybody (except me!) has a 'smartphone'. Our meetings were already starting to go online even before Covid forced us to do this to keep the church running. Online meetings lose in terms of personal contact, but save a huge amount in terms of travel time and expense. Then of course there was the social impact of the pandemic, while Brexit made life harder for second home owners and potential settlers. Every one of us has been affected by these issues.

The life of the Chaplaincy has certainly been impacted by all of these things. All new churches enjoy an early period of rapid growth followed by a time of consolidation: the purchase of the buildings marked the beginning of our consolidation stage. Lack of funds for ministry led to a formal leadership vacancy lasting more than ten years: vacancies often last a couple of years, but our vacancy was so long that we were in uncharted territory! Thankfully we had other ministers prepared to offer help and support through that time. Brexit and Covid struck our Chaplaincy as hard as any in terms of numbers and support, and the UK expat population of our territory has dropped by around 30% in seven years. Finally of course we endured a dreadful period when storm damage left us facing more than a year with an unusable wrecked hall still costing us $\in 1050$ a month just for the mortgage alone.

Visions evolve to meet the challenges of the time, and the times have changed a lot since we began the mortgage. We've been through a lot to get here! We have completed the mortgage, we have restored and reopened the hall, after 11 years we have a Chaplain in post. What are the plans – what are the prospects? How has the vision adapted? Shifting so much of our activity online inevitably means fewer physical meetings needing a hall. With this trend affecting so many activities in our communities, overall there are now too many halls on offer chasing too few users. One aspiration – that the old presbytery might become a home for a Chaplain – is not within the scope of our finances even if the idea still appeals to some.

Our little Chaplaincy here has some unique features – trust me, it is *not* normal for the local RC Bishop to attend the licencing of a new Anglican Chaplain! - and one of these unique features is the way our presence in the commune at Hommëel has become integrated as part of local village life. People love that the church is so alive and welcoming, and our use of the Salle and presbytery certainly contributes to that sense of integration. As we move forward we need to discover how the Anglican Centre can contribute to our wider mission, but at its heart it remains what it was conceived to be -A place to meet Anglicans, and a place for Anglicans to meet.

Father Chris' Licensing



After a very long wait, the licensing of Chris as our chaplain finally took place on Sunday 7th September in a lovely service in the Gratot-Hommëel church. Many of our ecumenical partners were present and it was a particular delight that Mgr Cador, the Roman Catholic bishop of Coutances and Avranches, was able to attend and could give the final blessing. Sadly our archdeacon, Peter Hooper, could not be with us due to a family bereavement but his place was ably taken by the area dean of north-west France, David McLeod. Our lay ministers all participated and members of both congregations were present, so there was a real feeling of family.



A description of the form of the service was given in last month's magazine, so there is no need to repeat it here; suffice it to say that all ran smoothly, the singing was joyful (ably accompanied by Freddy Dhombres, our regular organist), the prayers were fervent, the departing music, Widor's Toccata played by Fr Ben Woodley, was uplifting – and the refreshments served in the hall afterwards were appreciated by all.

A very big "Thank You" to all who helped to make the afternoon such a memorable occasion – and to Fr Chris, of course, for being willing to take on the official role of Chaplain at last. We are so glad to have you.

7th September was a wonderful day for all of us. I wish to offer my personal thanks to all who organised, worked for, and supported my Licencing as your 'new' Chaplain. Despite relatively short notice, and an unavoidable clash with another event, the service and reception went very well. There were some positive contacts, but overall we had a poor reward for the effort expended. We are now pondering some less labour intensive ways of making ourselves visible, possibly using display boards, and looking to having a welcoming presence at Hommeel Church again next September but without trying to offer refreshments.

Stewardship and Gift Day 2025

Many thanks to Adrian Grainge, who planned and led our Stewardship Renewal Sunday recently. It's too early to judge the success of the event, but on reading the leaflet it was striking to realise how near we are to meeting our goal, to be able to fund a Chaplain long-term. From all sources we need to increase income by 10% this year, then a further 10% next year! This is so achievable!

Christ Church online

Our re-vamped online presence on *A Church Near You* continues to draw interest: in the past year our pages have been viewed more than 22,000 times, an increase from 16,000 a couple of years ago. Our primary communication route is our weekly Friday Focus, sent to all on our mailing list. Data Protection rules require us to keep these details up to date, and we have identified around 30 names where we need to seek consent to retain them in our lists: all have been contacted recently, and asked to respond within a month if they wish to have continuing contact.

Celebration of the 1700th anniversary of the Council of Nicaea





The ecumenical service commemorating the 1700th anniversary of the Nicene Creed was held at Coutances Cathedral on Sunday, 28th September.



The event was presided over by Bishop Mgr. Cador and led by Marc Hodara, who

oversees ecumenism in the diocese, with representatives from various Churches in attendance.

Chris, the "brand new minister" of the Anglican Church, as described by Marc Hodara, was invited, along with Donna. Chris contributed to the service by providing, in French, a learned commentary on the Nicene Creed, focusing particularly on the Holy Spirit.



A number of members from each of our congregations also attended. The celebration closed with a hymn to the very familiar tune of "Thine be the glory". Afterwards we all gathered in a nearby café for a celebratory cup of tea / coffee.

Expressing our Care

Churches are so used to thinking of money as the scarcest resource, but for us the shortage is actually human resources of time and above all energy. The recent Chaplaincy Council had a very honest conversation and recognised that we lack the resources we need to be the reliably caring Church we aspire to be: honesty is always the starting point for good ministry. As Church Leader Fr Chris is assigned the formal duty to watch over the Church and care for it – for now he will be the co-ordinator for pastoral ministry and care enquiries, aiming to delegate tasks to other people wherever possible. This unexpected new role will obviously mean less time available for other work, and we are assessing how the change will affect our overall goals for these three years.

Information for travellers – New EU Entry/Exit system (EES)



From this month, under this new system, non-EU nationals (including UK nationals) visiting the Schengen area, will be required to create a digital record at the border. This includes submitting biometric data (fingerprints and a facial image).

However, UK nationals with rights under the Withdrawal Agreement will be exempt from EES registration, provided they hold the correct documentation. To qualify for exemption, UK nationals residing in France must present a valid residence permit. If you hold a five-

year permit, it may be coming up for renewal – renewals of such residence permits are currently being processed by local Préfectures.

Minister's message

What have you read today?

Obviously you are reading the Chaplaincy magazine but have you read anything else, or what else do you expect to read? To be more specific, have you or will you read your Bible? Do you read it every day, is it important to read it every day and if so why?

Well, clearly I believe it is or I wouldn't be writing this - but why?

One of the main ways we can get to know about God and to know God for ourselves is by reading His word, it is His main way of talking to us. If we want to know Him better, what He is like and what He wants us to be like, it is by learning from the Bible.

Jesus knew his scriptures very well and often quoted from them, the Apostle Paul also frequently quoted from what we refer to as the Old Testament and Peter, who was just an ordinary working man, still knew and quoted from God's word.

Daily bible reading is an extremely good habit to get into, along with regular prayer times, but where to start? You can read right through the Bible in one year and can find reading plans on line to help with this, which gives a good overview of the whole Bible, parts you may never have read before (how much do you know about Ezekiel or Titus or Philemon for example). This is strongly recommended if you have never done it before.

For regular ongoing daily reading there are a number of plans for this too, the advantage being that you read a short passage with notes to help explain it in more detail and to point out things you might have missed. I use one from the Good Book Company which I find helpful but there are many others; why not ask other people what they do?

Whatever path you choose I highly recommend that you get into the habit of reading your Bible every day and get to know our God and Saviour Jesus Christ better and to love Him more.

Why not start right now?


