Letter from The Rectory ...

At the time of writing, I have completed two of the three harvest services I am responsible for this year, with the Moreton service and Bobbingworth community lunch at Blake Hall still to go.

Moreton and Bobbingworth Harvest

These two churches each have a monthly communion service so share a traditional annual harvest communion. The church will be decorated with autumn fruits, flowers and foliage plus wheat sheaves from the neighbouring farmer (whose wife has just become our treasurer – please pray for her!), and we will sing the traditional



harvest hymns accompanied by our regular organist. However, because life doesn't stay still, I'm introducing a new harvest hymn I learned a couple of weeks ago at Launde Abbey, and the harvest gifts will be imperishable foods and toiletries for 3Food4All now at The Budworth Hall. Financial gifts will be welcome too – these will go to Tearfund's Harvest Appeal to provide seeds and tools and training to rural region of Nepal, badly hit by climate change floods and landslides, where the people were already living in poverty.

Chipping Ongar Harvest

St. Martin's was a non-traditional service, though based on the new One Big Family tradition of ACTS prayers:

Adoration (saying praise to God)

Confession (saying sorry to God)

Thanksgiving (saying thank you to God)

Supplication (saying please to God)

We sang newer songs and introduced a Confession acronym based on four different vegetables:

Potato (have eyes reminding us that God is all-seeing)

Onions (bring tears reminding us that God weeps all the wrong-doing he sees in the world)

Peas (in a pod are all alike reminding us that we have all gone wrong cf Romans 3.23)

Ears (of wheat reminding us that God hears our sorry prayers and forgives us cf 1 John 1:9) We reflected on the third day of creation, when God separated out the land from the sea and commanded it to produce all kinds of plants. And we cut out paper fruit and wrote our thanks on the back before pinning them to our Creationtide tree and bringing up our harvest offerings which were piled up high on the communion table or placed in Pig. They will go to 3Food4You and The Leprosy Mission respectively, so those living with leprosy who have to beg for food will be able to grow their own. And we enjoyed the harvest decorations of autumn flowers and pumpkins.

Shelley Harvest

St. Peter's continued their new Festival Church tradition of a seasonal Songs of Praise after a bring and share lunch that had to be inside this year because of the weather. Monies were raised by selling home-made bread rolls and honey, fresh produce and the beautiful flower arrangements from the windows. Rather than traditional harvest readings, this year we chose a pilgrimage in the pews. Our guide was a set of six small 'Being A Pilgrim' cards created by faithinthenorth.org to help explore Anglo-Saxon Spirituality. Each included a bible verse, thought and prayer, and they took us on a journey from 'Enjoying the Wonders of Creation', via 'Living and Learning' about God and his world, both by 'Journeying to Special Places' and by an 'Inner Journey' of prayer and meditation, so we end by 'Finding Forgiveness and New Life' and 'Finding Where We Belong' amongst God's people, our brothers and sisters in Christ.

Gratitude and Generosity

Three very different services, but all helping us to express our gratitude to God for his generosity to us, and give us an opportunity to express our thanks by giving to others far less fortunate than ourselves. God has called us to live in such a way that we are good stewards of our environment, our skills and abilities, our experiences and our time. If you have any thoughts and suggestions on how we might do that better, whether as individuals or as church communities, please do share them with me or with any of your representatives on the Parochial Church Council aka PCC!

"We are called to give regularly, as we receive. Not as an afterthought".

Have you noticed the new trend of rounding up your card payment at the checkout with a gift to charity? Clearly it's a great idea for the charities who use it - it makes giving easy and a few pennies here and there quickly mounts up. However, it might encourage us to fall into the trap of

approaching our giving as an afterthought. Our giving is something we do with our spare change, what we have left over. This reading reminds us that if we look at things from the right perspective we should recognise that everything we have comes from God, that everything is a gift and not to be taken for granted. We therefore first consider what God wants us to do with what we have been given. It's about not offering God our left-overs, but in the language of Deuteronomy, offering God our first-fruits. And then considering who God would want us to share it with. The law specifies that the first fruits should be shared with those who have little (the immigrant and the Levite who have no land to grow a harvest on). So our thankfulness to God for all we have received is then expressed in intentional generosity. We are called, instead, to plan to give regularly, as we receive, not as an afterthought with what we have left over, and as we give we can consider carefully who are the people in our context with whom we are called to share our abundance.

Coco the Clown

Linda introduced Tania who is the granddaughter of Coco the Clown. His real name was Nicolai Poliakoff and was born in 1900 to a Russian Jewish family in Latvia. His father was a cobbler and the family were poor, so at a young age he went to a theatre to earn a little money to help ends meet. At his first appearance, he was asked to wear a wig, but on entering the stage, it fell off and the audience laughed. He liked to make people laugh, and this was the start of his career in the circus's that travelled the world, including the Soviet State Circus. He met his wife after the war, and they had 6 children. He went to Germany and got to know Bertram Mills. Coco's family joined him and later they moved to England and later became British Citizens.

Coco stayed with Bertram Mills Circus and on one occasion visited one of Bertram's children in hospital, but dressed as a clown. All the children on the ward loved it, so, wherever the circus visited, he would go to the local hospitals dressed up to entertain the children.

He also appeared on the television programme This is your Life, where many of his family & friends came for the occasion. He died at the age of 73.

Apparently, the make-up a clown used, was preserved on a round stone, and no-one else was allowed to have the same features.


