

Honouring our war dead

The Commonwealth War Graves Commission is a global leader in commemoration. Founded by Royal Charter in 1917, it works on behalf of the Governments of Australia, Canada, India, New Zealand, South Africa and the United Kingdom to commemorate the 1.7 million men and women from the Commonwealth who lost their lives in the two World Wars.

Their mission is to ensure those who died in service, or as a result of conflict, are commemorated so that they, and the human cost of war, are remembered for ever.

We have been asked to place a commemorative plaque honouring the five army personnel that are buried in St John the Baptist churchyard and commemorated by the CWGC.


We would be pleased to hear from anyone who may have family connections with any of these men so that we can honour them appropriately. Please contact the Church Warden, Chris Rogers.

They were:

- Lance Corporal B Hollins of the 6th Btn. North Staffordshire Regiment who died on November 12th 1915.
- Private Samuel Leigh of the Army Veterinary Corp who died on March 16th 1915.
- Private Arthur Plant of the Sherwood Foresters (Notts and Derby Regiment) who died sometime in 1921 and who is recorded as a post-war death.
- Lance Corporal Edward Francis George Matthews of the King's Shropshire Light Infantry, 4th Btn. who died on July 9th 1944.
- Sapper Joseph William Bond of the Royal Monmouthshire Royal Engineers, 101 Army Field Coy. who died on May 3rd 1947.

RIDWARE HISTORY SOCIETY

Monday 3rd November: Berenice Wilson: Anglo Saxon Women

Local resident and member of The Ridware History Society, Berry's research is on Anglo-Saxon women 1050-1150ish.

Using mostly the Domesday Book as her main source she is able to piece together the life stories, vignettes as it were, of the English women who managed to ride out the vicissitudes of the Norman Conquest with their landholdings still intact.

Staffordshire exemplars include Godgifu of Madeley who held a quite substantial group of holdings around Moddershall; Aki's sister, who may have been a hermit or a nun at Stone; and last but not least to Lady Godiva who may have spent time in Kings Bromley.





Farmers' Harvest Festival Service

On Harvest Festival Sunday evening, over 200 people; local farmers, local residents and well-wishers, gathered at Higher Coley Farm in Little Hayward to celebrate a rather special harvest festival.

For the past 17 years, Rev Geoffrey Staton, a regular visitor at St John the Baptist leading our Sunday services, has officiated at this unusual Service of Thanksgiving in the large open barn generously loaned by the Bagot family for this special occasion.





This year was even more special as it was the last time that Geoffrey would be officiating. Age catches up with us all.

A moving sermon, hearty singing and quiet prayer and contemplation characterised a service appreciated by all who attended.

This included a number of our congregation members who turned out to support Geoffrey's swansong.

The collection was donated to St Katherines Hospice and raised £5000.

1st November - All Saints' Day, the feast day of all the redeemed

All Saints, or All Hallows, is the feast of all the redeemed, known and unknown, who are now in heaven. When the English Reformation took place, the number of saints in the calendar was drastically reduced, with the result that All Saints' Day stood out with a prominence that it had never had before.

This feast day first began in the East, perhaps as early as the 5th century, as commemorating 'the martyrs of the whole world'. A Northern English 9th century calendar named All Hallows as a principal feast, and such it has remained. Down the centuries devotional writers have seen in it the fulfilment of Pentecost and indeed of Christ's redemptive sacrifice and resurrection.

The saints do not belong to any religious tradition, and their lives and witness to Christ can be appreciated by all Christians. Richard Baxter, writing in the 17th century, wrote the following:

He wants not friends that hath thy love, And made converse and walk with thee, And with thy saints here and above, With whom for ever I must be...

As for my friends, they are not lost; The several vessels of thy fleet, Though parted now, by tempests tost, Shall safely in thy haven meet....

The heavenly hosts, world without end, Shall be my company above; And thou, my best and surest Friend, Who shall divide me from thy love?*

1,255 ancient English churches were dedicated to All Saints - a number only surpassed by those dedicated to the Virgin Mary.

Light and Truth

Much as I'd prefer not to think about Christmas presents and cards until the week before Christmas, the reality is that as soon as Bonfire Night and Remembrance Sunday are over, I must procrastinate no longer! Poor Advent. It's lost in the mists of time, its season of spiritual preparation for Christmas overtaken by ever exotic Advent Calendars, their numbered windows promising expensive 'treats' to help us to get through the stress of Christmas preparations. I've even seen a cheese-a-day Advent calendar. Seriously, who thought of that one?

Instead of moaning about the commercialism of Christmas, here at Lichfield Cathedral we do all we can to keep the Sundays of Advent special, beginning with the hauntingly beautiful Advent Carol Service. But then we go 'full bling' with the Christmas Light Show and the Christmas Tree Festival. They're ever popular, a seasonal 'must' in many people's diaries. And at the heart of both, is a search for the light in the midst of the darkness. Physical light in the long nights of winter. And spiritual light in a world which feels chaotic and dark.

One of my favourite worship songs is 'Christ be our Light' by the Roman Catholic songwriter Bernadette Farrell. It's beautiful. If you don't know it and have access to the internet, do search for it. You'll soon be singing along to its gentle tune and meaningful lyrics.

Longing for light, we wait in darkness. Longing for truth, we turn to you.

This is why, I think, so many people turn to the Church at Christmas, on the shortest days of the year. Our ancestors prayed that the sun would return. We search for the Son - the one who is the Light of the World. Even those who don't yet know him for themselves. But light and truth are in short supply *at the moment* - and in the Church we know both.

Many the hearts that yearn to belong. Let us be servants to one another, making your kingdom come.

So many people are lonely at Christmas. So many are searching for somewhere to belong. As Christians we belong to one big family, made brothers and sisters through our baptism. Who might we 'serve' this Christmas by simply inviting them to 'come and see'? Invite them to a carol service, or a social event at church, or bring them to their cathedral to see the Christmas Trees or Christmas Light Show. You might make someone's Christmas, and it might be for them the first step to joining the church and finding faith. The worst that can happen is that they say no, so what's to lose?
