

Letter from the Vicarage

As I write this, a cold wind and intermittent rain sound against my study window. Autumn has definitely arrived. Not all doom and gloom of course, there are also beautifully coloured autumn leaves to crunch through on walks along the Tissington trail (or elsewhere).

At the end of this month, on Sunday 30th November, we launch into Advent. Advent is a season of expectation and preparation, as the church prepares to celebrate the coming (*adventus*) of Christ in human form, and also looks ahead to his final coming as judge at the end of time. We start our celebrations of the season with a combined Benefice service at Fenny Bentley at 11:15 on Sunday 30th November, and also Christmas crafts in a church decorated for Christmas in Parwich at 3pm. Part of our new Group of 7 churches, Biggin is hosting celebration of carols round the tree at the Village Hall at 6pm on the same day. I do hope you will join us at one of these events.

A few weeks ago in collective worship, I led the children of FitzHerbert school in a meditation on autumn leaves. We slowed down and looked at the leaves shape and colour. We reflected that, like the leaves, we were all uniquely shaped, all given different gifts but God loves us and uses us as we are. This week I was struck by a Newspaper article talking about truth requiring us to slow down¹. It commented how the 24-hour news cycle and social-media algorithms keep us in constant reaction. "We are encouraged to take sides before we have paused to think – mistaking certainty for being right". It may feel uncomfortable to pause. "Humankind cannot bear very much reality" said the poet T.S. Elliot in the Four Quartets. This is true, but spiritual maturity may begin in the willingness to say, "I do not know", and listen again. Humility is not timidity or weakness: it is the courage to stand before the vastness of reality – and before God – without trying to control it. One moment of wonder at creation each day remind us that we do not make truth: we serve it.1

Why not prepare for Advent and the whirl of Christmas with a moment of appreciating the wonder of creation each day in the next month, perhaps crunching through those autumn leaves.

Dean Peter writes... Season of Creation: St Francis

In the church calendar early autumn brings with it the Season of Creation. It is a five-week period beginning on 1st September. Many churches throughout the diocese of Derby will have kept the season in some way, even if it was simply by keeping harvest festival.

The season ended on 4th October and this is the day the Church of England calendar commemorated St Francis of Assisi. The popularity of St Francis has grown. Not only did the late pope take the name Francis but many seek to follow St Francis' example in the way that he relates to creation. He is the patron saint of the environment movement and influences many in the secular world who care deeply about global warming and its consequences.

St Francis grew up in Italy, in the later twelfth century, as part of wealthy, merchant family. At the age of twenty he was badly injured in a local war, and became seriously unwell. During this time, he gathered friends around him and began to live simply in community. He had a vision of Christ who was inviting him to 're-build my church'. At the time he saw a ruined church building in front of him but his vocation was not to restore the material fabric of damaged buildings but the restoration of the spiritual and human fabric of the church, so that it might advance and grow in different ways. May people across the world follow his example in the way that they set out to be disciples of Jesus, not least because of the attractiveness of his vision for God's creation.

St Francis was a poet, and his most famous poem draws out how he sees the relationship between human beings and the created order. It begins:

O Most High, all-powerful, all-good Lord God, All praise is Yours, all glory, all honour and all blessings......

Praised be you my Lord with all your creatures, especially Sir Brother Sun

Who is the day through whom You give us light And he is beautiful and radiant with great splendour Of You Most High, he bears the likeness

Praised be you, my Lord, through Sister Moon and the stars

In the heavens you have made them bright, precious, and fair

Praised be You, my Lord, through brothers Wind and Air.....

Praised be you my Lord through sister water So useful, humble, precious, and pure..... (from Catholic Online, 2022)



The key point is that Francis sees human beings in a kinship relationship with all creation. Later he refers to 'our sister, Mother Earth, who sustains and governs us'. It is a relationship of fellowship or community, a given mutual relationship that requires nurturing. To take care of nature is to create community including the relationship between human beings across the globe.

In his encyclical letter, Laudato Sí, named after the first Italian words of St Francis' poem, the late Pope Francis taught the importance of 'integral ecology'. This means that true environmental sustainability includes reconciliation and restored relationships between human beings. Fractured human community will mean the continuing of a broken world, the failure of care for the environment and the ongoing disruption of our biological ecology.

This insight links us to the most well-known part of St Francis' life, that moment when two years before his death in 1224 he received the stigmata, the marks of crucifixion on his own hands, feet, and side. It was Francis' wish to know only Jesus Christ and him crucified that appeared to take form on his body. Francis knew that it was only in and through the suffering of creation which includes the brokenness of human community that God in his Son Jesus would save the world.

May I commend St Francis to you, his poetry, his profound thinking on God's creation and his conviction that in the sufferings of God we will find not only wisdom but also our redemption.

O God, you ever delight to reveal yourself to the childlike and lowly of heart: grant that, following the example of the blessed Francis, we may count the wisdom of this world as foolishness and know only Jesus Christ and him crucified, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

Community Fire Safety – November 2025

Now we are into the cooler weather here are a few facts and tips to keep you safe:

Heating your home.

Central Heating Systems

• <u>Have your Boilers, Fires, Flues and Cookers inspected and tested by a 'Registered Service Engineer'.</u>

Open fires.

- Be careful when using open fires to keep warm. Make sure you always use a fire guard to protect against flying sparks from hot embers.
- Make sure embers are under control and properly put out before you go to bed.
- Keep chimneys and flues clean and well maintained.

Heating your home (portable heaters).

- Do not use extension leads for portable heaters.
- Always unplug electric heaters when you go out or go to bed
- Try to secure heaters against a wall to stop them falling over.
- Only use gas or paraffin heaters in well-ventilated areas.
 Heaters consume oxygen so you could suffocate if a room is not properly aired.

Using electric blankets.

- Unplug blankets before you get into bed, unless they have a thermostat control for safe all-night use.
- Store electric blankets flat, rolled up or loosely folded to prevent damaging the internal wiring.
- Have your Electric Blankets tested every 3 years by an approved Contractor /
- Replace your blanket when it is more than 10 years old.

If the electricity fails.

Be prepared Keep a torch and batteries handy, where you can find them.

Alternative lighting

• If you have to use candles or matches always take special care. Make sure candles are secured in a proper holder and away from materials that may catch fire – like curtains.

- Put them out completely before leaving the room or going to bed.
- Use a snuffer or a spoon to put out candles. It's safer than blowing them out when sparks can fly.
- Keep a mobile phone handy so you can still make an emergency call if there is a power cut.

Bonfire and Firework Displays

If you cannot attend an organised display and intend to go ahead and hold your own bonfire party, the Derbyshire Fire & Rescue Service asks that you follow the attached safety ad.

What does the Law say?

- > Fireworks cannot be let off between 11pm and 7am.
- ➤ Except Bonfire Night when they can be let off until midnight. And special occasions- New Years Eve, Diwali, and Chinese New Year, when the curfew ends at 1am the following day.
- ➤ It is illegal for anyone under 18 years of age to buy or carry fireworks.
- ➤ Throwing or setting off fireworks in the street is also illegal.

 Safety Guidance.
- Only responsible adults should deal with fireworks
- Keep fireworks in a closed metal box and take them out one at a time
- Follow the manufacturer's instructions on each firework. Read the instructions by torch light and not a naked flame and always buy fireworks from a reputable source
- Light fireworks at arm's length using a safety firework lighter or fuse wick.
- Stand back after lighting.
- **NEVER** go back to a firework once lit, it may go off in your face
- Keep a bucket of water handy
- Collect used fireworks with care, douse with water and bury them or place in a metal container
- Keep children under control
- Keep pets indoors
- Take care with sparklers young children should not handle these
- **NEVER** throw fireworks
- **NEVER** keep them in your pocket

If you wish to build your own bonfire please follow this guidance:-

- Site the bonfire well away from houses, garages, sheds, fences, overhead cables, trees and shrubs and well away from your fireworks
- Don't pile your bonfire too high, rather keep adding to it to keep the size reasonable much less chance of it getting out of control that way.

When lighting the bonfire please follow these safety tips:-

- Before lighting, make sure there are no animals hiding inside
- Be careful when building the bonfire, so it does not collapse once lit
- Don't burn foam filled furniture, aerosols or tins of paint or bottles
- **NEVER** ever use flammable liquids paraffin or petrol to light the fire
- Keep everyone, especially children, away from the fire.

In case of an emergency.

- <u>In case of emergency, have a mobile phone available to call the emergency services.</u>
- Keep buckets of water, a garden hose or a fire extinguisher ready.
- When the party is over, pour water on the embers before leaving.

Home Fire Safety.



The vicar wrote last month:-

Firstly, a very big thank you

- to the residents who open up the church every day so visitors can see our lovely church and meet with God there – much appreciated as we know from the visitors book,
- to those who clean the church, and
- to all who help to maintain the church and churchyard in many ways.

However, as a church body we are struggling with:-

- **People:** the number of residents who come to church services and are part of a worshipping community is not enough to support the parish church in its primary purpose which is the practice and advancement of the Christian Religion. (There are only five people on our church electoral roll and we have no church wardens).
- **Finance:** money reserves are dwindling as we pay for insurance, fuel and short-term maintenance. We are currently paying only a token amount of our share due to the C of E Common Fund which is what pays for clergy and frontline mission and ministry.
- The **Building**: we need both to maintain it and to build a long-term vision of how we might best configure it to serve future community needs.



VACANCY FOR PARISH CLERK AND RESPONSIBLE FINANCIAL OFFICER (RFO)

Parwich Parish Council serves a small rural community and is seeking a motivated and enthusiastic person to take on the post of Parish Clerk and Responsible Financial Officer serving seven Parish Councillors.

Parwich is a picturesque limestone village located in the White Peak area of the Peak District National Park, approximately seven miles north of Ashbourne and the ideal candidate will have an interest in the local community.

The Clerk is responsible for ensuring the Council meets its statutory duties, preparing agendas, taking minutes, dealing with correspondence, liaising with contractors and local government officials, managing accounts and the financial obligations of the Council, organising audits and the administration of the Parish Council website, publicity and social media.

Ideally, the candidate will have:

- some knowledge of the procedures of local government and/or the role of the Clerk, although training is available.
- administrative experience and be IT literate and competent in the use of Word and Excel.

This is a part-time permanent position for 9 hrs per week, mainly working from home. Attendance is required at all Council meetings which usually take place in the evening at Parwich Memorial Hall, plus any extraordinary meetings as required. There are no meetings in August and December.

The salary will be calculated according to the National Association of Local Council (NALC) rates dependent upon qualifications and/or experience but will be in the range of LC1 SCP 15 – LC1 SCP 22 (currently £15.56 -£17.47).


With Clare Greenwood's help Scopes4SEN developed and installed the unique Tissington Solar System walk. A fun and educational walk for young and old.
