

#### REMEMBRANCE

Following the 80<sup>th</sup> anniversaries of VE Day and VJ Day, the act of visiting the lives of those listed on the 1939-45 War Memorial inside All Saints' Steep is both poignant and relevant. Last year we touched upon the fate of two such soldiers, both of whom died of wounds in Italy.

Another local man to suffer mortal wounds was William Maurice Baldwin-Upton, who was serving as a Driver in the Royal Army Service Corps (R.A.S.C.) at the time of his death in Cyrenaica, Libya, on 7 August 1941. The son of Harry and Alice Upton, he was baptised at All Saints' Steep in July 1916 and likely attended the local school.

Without knowing his exact subunit, it is difficult to ascertain in which action William received his fatal wounds, but it seems probable it was during the famous siege of Tobruk. Boxed in by Rommel's 'Afrika Korps' from April to November 1941, the garrison endured regular artillery bombardments, in addition to costly visits from the Luftwaffe. In his supporting role as a Driver in the R.A.S.C., William would have been charged with bringing up ammunition, food and water to those manning the outer perimeter of the town's defences. That work - involving moving about in the open - would also have made him vulnerable to enemy mines.

He is buried in Tobruk War Cemetery, where his Commonwealth War Graves Commission headstone bears a fitting epitaph chosen by his loved ones: 'Not Forgotten at Home'.

Another resident of Steep followed in William's footsteps: he was

Osborne Frederick Cottrell, who was employed as a chauffeur and gardener and living at Bowyers Place Lodge. On the outbreak of hostilities, he enlisted in the Hampshire Regiment and was posted to the 1st/4th Battalion, in which he was promoted to Lance-Corporal.

In September 1942, his unit was based at St. Martin's Plain Camp, Shorncliffe, where it was preparing for active service in the Middle East and undertaking 'field exercises'. Tragically, in one such exercise on the 26<sup>th</sup> – and as later reported in *The Folkestone Herald* - Osborne received fatal injuries. He had been charging in the middle of an assaulting section when the soldier behind him tripped on his rifle butt and unintentionally threw his live grenade to his front.

The ensuing inquest heard that Osborne - who 'was well-liked as an N.C.O. and comrade' - was semiconscious in the immediate aftermath of the accident, but that he was dead by the time an officer of the Royal Army Medical Corps arrived on the scene: the cause of death was a dreadful wound in his back.

In common with William Upton, he was 25. His Commonwealth War Graves Commission headstone at St. Mary's, Liss, also bears an epitaph chosen by his loved ones: 'His Life a Beautiful Memory, His Loss a Silent Grief.'

Today widespread conflict continues to cause just such grief and that is a matter for grave concern - not least for those who wear The King's uniform.

Lest we forget.

## STEEP AND STROUD NEWS

#### STEEP PARISH COUNCIL

Debora Harding Councillor, Steep Parish Council

The Parish Council met on Monday 6th October 2025 in the Village Hall, and were joined by four members of the public. A vacancy was filled by Debora Harding who was co-opted onto the Council – Debora brings a wealth of professional expertise to the Council. We have one more vacancy to fill. County Cllr Russell Oppenheimer submitted a written report, on revised grant funding, local-government reorganisation, and winter gritting routes.

## Roads, speed and hedge trimming:

Following residents' concerns, the council are working with Hampshire Highways to complete implementation of the new 20 mph limit on Church Road. A Speed Indicator Device (SID) proposal has been submitted to Hampshire Highways, while Cllr Howard explores a small traffic-camera survey in Steep Marsh, pending dataprotection clearance. Meanwhile, a hedge at Hayes Cottages is obstructing the path. Once ownership has been established, a reminder will be sent to cut this back. Hedges should be maintained at 1m back from the roads for access, safety and visibility.

## The Common, finances and future work:

The Bonfire and Fireworks Event agreement was discussed including the timing, clean-up and safety so the

paperwork could be signed by both parties.

It was agreed to appoint contractors Arborlec to handle the entrance-improvement works, overseen by Cllrs Askew, Duthie and Harding. We give our thanks to Chris Budd and Paul Marston for taking the time to supply their quotes.

The Council's finances are in good shape. These funds cover regular running costs and future village projects. Cllr Inkley was added as a bank signatory, and the Homestart grant application will be discussed at the November meeting.

#### STROUD PARISH COUNCIL

Tom North Councillor, Stroud Parish Council

The Parish Council held their latest meeting on Tuesday 15<sup>th</sup> September.

The Parish Council was pleased to hear that Hampshire County Council has announced that, from Spring 2026, residents will be able to recycle some of their household food waste. They estimate that 30,000 to 50,000 tonnes of food waste will be collected from Hampshire households. This will be recycled through anaerobic digestion, a process where bacteria break down organic matter to produce valuable by-products such as renewable gas and organic fertiliser.

The council discussed the idea of updating the Parish Plan. This was last updated in 2013. We are likely to consult on what to include in a new addendum throughout the coming winter and spring.

Concern was raised regarding the continued flooding of the A272 opposite the car and motorbike garages. It was agreed to continue to work with Hampshire County Council and landowners to prioritise the drainage issues for both safety reasons and to avoid damage to the new road surface.

On the back of recent conversations about improving the social facilities for local teens, the possibility of establishing a monthly Youth Club was explored. The village hall has kindly agreed to donate at least one evening a month for free and the Council agreed to support with expenses. There is a large TV that could be used for Films/Gaming etc. To make this a reality we would need volunteers/parents to run the evenings. #### STROUD COMMUNITY GARDEN

The gardening team have been hard at work this month levelling the hall lawn and laying new grass seed. The grassy area near the wildflower patch in particular had become rather rough and uneven, due in part to a large number of wasps who had burrowed into the earth this summer. The wasps are now gone and the area is looking much better already. Levelling the area was heavy work and we'd like to thank Dave Coole, Philip Wellstead, Paul Dunning, Sam Howe and Tom North for helping out. Many hands make light(er) work! For those of you using the hall gardens, just a gentle reminder to please avoid going on the grass and stick to the pathways for now to protect the new grass seed.

Many of you may also have noticed a change to the area around the gas tanks. Calor Gas visited this month to clear the area around the tanks and to lay gravel. This is to make access to the tanks easier both for delivery drivers and in event of an emergency. Unfortunately this means that one of the wildflower areas has now gone, but we were able to save many of the plants still growing there and re-plant them in the other wildflower patch. Thanks again to Dave, Oliver and Glen who leapt into action, salvaging our remaining wildflowers!

The gardening jobs never end! The next project is to tackle the overgrown flowerbed to the rear of the hall which has become something of a jungle.

The team will then be pruning the trees and hedges as required, planting spring bulbs, and sourcing and planting some new fruit trees.

We always welcome extra help. No gardening experience required - just a willingness to get stuck in! You don't need to be involved with every project either; you can simply help out when you have time. STEEP 900 CELEBRATION WALK: All Saints', Steep to All Saints', East

On Saturday 11th October a group of 10 walkers together with with 3 dogs set off from All Saints' Steep to All Saints' East Meon as part of the 900 celebrations. The aim of the walk was to remember and retrace, in part at least, what our forebears would have had to regularly do in order to attend church in the years prior to 1125 when Steep Church was first built. Our 6 mile route took us via Ridge Common Lane to Stroud Mission Church and thence mostly by footpaths via Ramsdean to East Meon. Although Autumnally fresh, we were blessed with fine weather and it was dry under foot. The walkers arrived in good spirits soon after Noon having enjoyed fine views, sights of

both wild and farm animals as well as fulfilling companionship throughout.

On arrival we were welcomed by the vicar of East Meon, Tony Forrest, and others who had not been able to do the walk, and all enjoyed restorative refreshments and cake before being given a brief history of the church. Finally, Tony Forrest lead a short celebratory service to acknowledge our forebears and that noted, in particular the influence of St Wilfred in the development of Christianity and the church in this wonderful part of England.



## **RON'S NOTES**

#### Butterflies and other Moths.

I thought long and hard about this title. As I understand it, butterflies are merely day-flying moths, having separated from moths as an early branch of the moth evolutionary family tree. The evolution of moths and butterflies is both ancient and exceedingly complex, but the idea that butterflies are really early divergencies from ancient moths appears well established.

We had Butterfly Conservation's 2025 Big Butterfly Count during July and August where we counted the butterflies seen from a standard list during 15 minutes and of which there were eight counts undertaken in Stroud parish and ten counts in the much larger parish of Steep. The ten species variously recorded in Stroud were Large White, Small White, Meadow Brown, Gatekeeper, Common Blue, Red Admiral, Peacock, Comma, Speckled Wood and Jersey Tiger Moth. The seven species recorded in Steep were Large White, Small White, Meadow Brown, Comma, Brimstone, Common Blue and Ringlet.

Stroud Village Green has seen a wide variety of species over the years that did not appear during the count including the pretty little Small Copper, Small and Essex Skippers, Large Skippers, Holly and Common Blues,

Painted Lady, Brimstone, Small Tortoiseshell, Green-veined White, Marbled White, and Ringlet. In previous years there has been a large show of Marbled Whites but recently, hay cutting has occurred early when they would be emerging, and numbers have been reducing and I saw none this year.

A species that we have seen only once in our garden was the **Brown Hairstreak** and our neighbour, had a spectacular **Purple Emperor** that landed on his garden lounger a few years ago. **Orange-tips** occur regularly in the spring and early summer and the footpath through Furzefield Copse is a good place to see them.

Standout species in our own garden this summer were two spectacular moths: Jersey Tiger and Hummingbird Hawkmoth.

Jersey Tiger, a large spectacular butterfly-like moth occurred for many nights at our moth recording light trap and also feeding from our Buddleia butterfly bushes. Dart-shaped at rest with black wings crossed by broad bright white or cream streaks and, when disturbed, showing brilliant red underwings. When flying, they flash brilliant red, black and white/cream as they strongly flap their large wings. First recorded on the Isle of Wight as a migrant in 1935 and not again in Hampshire until 1987 in Fareham. More recently they have been

recorded across Hampshire where it is most likely now a resident breeding species.

Humming-bird Hawk-moths were regularly feeding by day from our Buddleia bush flowers. These large bulky moths hover to extract nectar by unfurling and extending their very long proboscis deep into flowers. Apparently, these moths migrate to the UK in summer from Southern Europe and North Africa and were first recorded in the UK in 1834 and are now widely distributed as a migrant across the UK and across Hampshire. They have been recorded over-wintering, and some are thought to breed in the UK.

#### A STING IN THE TAIL

Years ago my husband decided to keep some bees. He bought hives and a colony, joined the Petersfield and District Beekeepers Association and learned how to look after them. I bought a bee suit and helped out. Each year they gave us a fair bit of honey and we were fascinated by the whole process.

When the worst happened and my husband died in 2009 I carried on looking after them for a couple of years but I found it demanding work on my own. With a heavy heart, I took them to a beekeeper in Cockshott Lane but some of them had other ideas. Their new home was less than a mile away as the bee flies and a few came back and moved in behind the

barge board at the end of my roof. They were too high up to be collected so there they stayed.

One day my neighbour came round in a great fright, saying her drive was a-buzz with flying bees. She wasn't exaggerating but I reassured her that they were swarming and much too busy to sting and would shortly disappear. Sure enough, fifteen minutes later they'd gone.

A few remained though and once again they multiplied and the colony flourished for many years, unbothered by human interference. At one point the gardener was convinced they were wasps and should be exterminated. They were so high up it was hard to be sure but I stuck by my bees and the pest control man agreed that they behaved like bees so we left them alone.

They swarmed fairly regularly, twice this year, and by early August there seemed to be virtually no activity. To me they'd been a reminder of happier times when we had hives in



the garden and two of us looking after them so I was slow to admit that this time it was final. But there was worse to come. The barge board, their chosen home, was detaching from the guttering and was about to fall off. Builders came and scaffolding was needed to reach it. They managed to clear the sticky remains and repair the damage – but it left me with a very expensive bill.

## FINGER FOODS FOR BONFIRE NIGHT

Mini -Toads in the Hole, Prawns in the Hole and Veggies in the Hole

Preparation: 2-3 tspns sunflower or olive oil in the bottom of each cup of a deep 12 hole muffin pan. Place pan on a baking tray.

#### Ingredients:

85 ml milk

1 egg

50g plain flour

12 mini cocktail sausages (or 12 prawns to make a seafood version or 12 baby carrots for a veggie version)

- Preheat the oven to 180c/gas mark 6. Put half a teaspoonful of oil in the bottom of each cup of a deep 12-hole muffin tray. Place the pan on a baking tray.
- Pour the milk into a mixing bowl, add the egg, flour and a pinch of salt and whisk until smooth. Pour

- into a jug.
- 3. Put the muffin pan in the oven for a minute to heat until the oil is very hot. Remove from the oven and fill the little cups to about 2/3rds full (they rise in the oven!). Pop a sausage into each cup and bake for 20 -25 minutes until golden brown, well risen and crisp. Take them carefully out of the baking tray and pop on a plate or tray

Serve with ketchup or mustard sauce for the sausages.

If you are cooking prawns use tartare sauce and with baby carrots, for example, a thick cheese sauce with a dash of Worcestershire sauce would be nice.





**GLUT** – (*noun*) an <u>excessively</u> abundant supply of something.

It would seem that many of the residents of our villages are suffering? from a glut of garden produce.

Boxes, baskets and bins of apples, pears and other foodstuffs are appearing at the pavement side with notices exhorting passersby to "Help Yourselves" with additional advice – cookers, eaters.

So what to do with this excess produce?

Well, there are a wide range of options including juicing (don't forget to sterilise the resultant juice unless you want fruit wine or a fur growing on top and don't forget to sterilise containers), jelly (buy a good quality muslin bag or a clean pair of stockings and some suitable "sticks" to support the bag over the bowl), compote, (try using honey, golden syrup or maple syrup and add other ingredients ginger, spices and eat with yoghurt, ice cream or clotted cream and always refrigerate), jam, (reduce the fruit to a minimum of water and use as little sugar as possible - again sterilise everything and top the jars with a circle of waxed paper and pop a cover - we use off cuts of printed cotton and an elastic band or string), chutneys (as for jam but for additional flavour use Balsamic vinegar and caramelised shredded onion plus anything else you fancy or go mad and add fresh chillies), pickles (with other fruits and vegetables - carrots, courgettes, tomatoes – you choose) and finally, but not least, apple crumble (add oats and chopped nuts to the topping), apple tart (or tarte tatin with maple syrup and brown sugar), apple snow or one of our favourites - Farmhouse Apple Cake from a 1970's Reader's Digest book of Cooking with Apples. Or Pears.

Or if eaters, wash the fruit and get your dentures working.

Box loads of quince – the headmaster of Bedales always seems to have a surfeit - can be transformed in to Quince Jelly or chutney – delicious with cheese or baked ham.

Bins full of grapes can be transformed in to juice or better still, wine.

So don't walk past the offerings, get your cookery books out or, as is done these days, Google it and enjoy delicious treats you could never buy in supermarket or store.

And as a postscript, I note it is a MAST YEAR this year. So what is a Mast year?

Every few years, some species of trees and shrubs produce a bumper crop of their fruits or nuts. The collective term for these fruits and nuts is 'mast', so we call this a mast year.

The main producers this year are Oaks – there are acorns everywhere and Horse Chestnuts.

So The Cricketers' conker festival should be well stocked and wait until next spring when gardens throughout the villages will be sprouting oaks, horse chestnuts and in our case, walnut trees.

#### **Services**


