LETTER TO THE EDITOR

THE NEXT ARCHBISHOP OF CANTERBURY

According to reliable information, the person who fills this post is due to be announced as this magazine goes out to you i.e. the end of September or the beginning of October. The Roman Catholic Church and the Church of Wales both managed to pick leaders in a matter of weeks. The former does this by calling together all Cardinals and they meet, as you will know, until they have picked one of their number to be Pope. The Church of Wales likewise gather together their bishops who pick one of their number to lead them and be Archbishop. Both systems rely on a group of electors getting together quite quickly after the post is vacated and stay together until they have settled on a candidate. No consultation with the wider membership is employed.

However, the Church of England does like to include its members in big decisions and consultation takes time. In addition, as the established Church, the sovereign and the Prime Minister are both involved. In fact, King Charles III can only sign papers relating to the Church of England when he is physically in England which for example precludes him

doing so when at Balmoral or the Highland Games. The Prime Minister has also been a bit busy with the war in Ukraine, the fighting in Gaza, a cabinet reshuffle and other big matters of state. So it has taken time to select a new Archbishop of Canterbury. In the meanwhile, "Each of us has a mission in life. We act as if we choose but we are sent just as Jesus was (John 17.18). Once we start living our lives with that conviction, we will soon know what we were sent to do." These are the words of Henri Nouwen on page 133 of the book *Henri Nouwen: In My Own Words* edited by Robert Durback and published by DLT in 2002. *Richard Graham*

NEWS FROM OUR MPS

Update from Tessa Munt, MP for Moorlinch, Stawell, Sutton Mallet and Greinton



I hope you have had a wonderful summer.

In my last update, I shared my concerns about waterway maintenance and future flooding in Somerset. I attended the South West Association of Drainage Authorities (SWADA) emergency meeting about the situation with the Environment Agency and when Parliament returned in early September, I requested Ministerial intervention.

Over the summer, I visited several local charities and organisations, including the Somerset Armed Forces Cadets who were on camp in Hampshire, Prickles Hedgehog Rescue and I learned about the Somerset Wildlife Trust's restoration

projects. It's a privilege to recognise the efforts of those who volunteer, support and take responsibility for so much

For many of us, the closest hospital can be miles away and big changes are afoot. I attended the Committee meeting when community hospital bed closures were discussed and have had further discussions with NHS Leaders, seeking reassurance that patients and carers will receive improved services at the time changes are made, rather than relying on promises that more will come "soon".

Further afield, I met cancer specialists at the Royal Marsden Hospital working with the latest Radiotherapy machines – amazing! I've pressed the Government for years to update NHS machines.

I'm running surgeries across the area, so please come along. A full list is available if you call or email me. The most local are:

Ashley Fox, MP for Middlezoy and Othery

Parliament has been back a few weeks since the summer break and I've got straight to work – speaking in the Commons and meeting residents, businesses and groups across the constituency.

In Westminster, I took part in the Bus Services Bill debate. I urged Ministers to go further than their proposals and strengthen the Bill so communities like ours finally get the reliable, affordable services we need.

Buses are a lifeline for many in Somerset. They connect people to work, college, health appointments and more. Yet for too long services have been unreliable, expensive, or



simply non-existent. Too many villages remain cut off without a car. Even where routes exist, evening provision is poor. For example, the last No. 16 bus from Bridgwater to Langport leaves at 5.15pm – far too early for anyone commuting. I also highlighted the long-standing lack of a usable bus stop at Bridgwater railway station, a simple fix that Somerset Council should have delivered years ago.

Seasonal timetables are another concern. While summer services meet tourist demand, local people are left struggling in winter. The No. 20 is a prime example – reduced frequency and no Sunday timetable mean fewer residents can rely on it. On top of this, the Government's decision to scrap the £2 fare cap and replace it with £3 has imposed a 50% increase in costs on passengers across Somerset.

This isn't new to me. Earlier this year I met First Bus after many of you responded to my constituency survey raising issues of reliability, poor connections and lack of evening routes. While improvements have since been made – later-running 21s to Burnham, a Sunday B1 service and work on a Bridgwater Transport Hub – we must go further.

That's why I'll keep pressing the Government to act. Reliable, affordable, year-round bus services are essential to keep our villages and towns connected.

SKY AT NIGHT OCTOBER

Planets


Having passed its closest approach to Earth last month Saturn is now visible at nightfall and sets at 5am. Jupiter rises around 11pm unmistakable because of its brightness and is well placed for observation during the early hours. Venus which is much brighter than Jupiter rises at 5.30am.

Constellation

Autumn evenings are a good time to observe the Constellation of Cassiopeia the Queen, high in the northern sky. Look out for 5 bright stars that form a W or M depending your direction of view. Cassiopeia is what is known as a circumpolar constellation as it circles the North Star Polaris, never sets and so is visible somewhere in our sky all year.

Phenomena

We have the first of the year's Super Moons - on the 7th look as the Moon rises at 5pm for the best effect. On the night of 21st/22nd look out for the Orionid



meteor shower caused by debris from the tail of Halley's Comet. On the morning of the 26th British Summer Time ends and we put our clocks back one hour at 2am to Greenwich Mean Time. *Paul Adamson 01823698156*

FARM DIARY

This is written for non-farmers who live surrounded by farmland.

In the Field. In early September, with rain finally softening the ground, we managed to sow lots of grass seed and the oil seed rape. Last year, the rape was scrapped entirely, in a first, due to dry conditions at sowing followed by too wet conditions that drowned the seed. This year there has been adequate rainfall so far but not excessive amounts. Long may that last. Also sown in this year's good conditions were a field of stubble turnips and also one of kale; both to give us a crop in the ground over winter, provide grazing for our sheep and provide an entry for spring sown barley. This latter crop is used to help clean the fields of a pernicious grass weed called black grass – referred to before. By the time of publication of this magazine, these crops will have greened up and will be highly visible.

Labour's Tax on Family Businesses and Farms. In a Daily Telegraph article dated 2 September 2025, Hannah Boland wrote that the chairman of the UK's largest chicken supplier has claimed that Labour's tax raid on farms is pushing thousands of British farmers to financial ruin. He added that anything that encouraged farmers to quit the industry was crazy. The previous Labour Environment Secretary, Steve Reed, said that Labour was aiming to boost self-sufficiency arguing that food security is national security. This contradicts the Chancellor's actions which has encouraged lots of farmers to cash in and give up and many others to reduce their planned investment. Family businesses in other industries are facing the same dilemma and reducing investment. To pay the tax business owners will have to sell the 'tools' of their trade. There is a consequent loss of jobs and food security. Only one government cabinet member has ever run a business, this author has been told. *Richard Graham*

SOMERSET COUNCIL'S TRANSPORT PLAN: PUT BUSES FIRST Draft for consultation

The consultation period was recently extended until 28 September 2025 and we were urged to read the Draft Transport Plan and to comment. It can be found here https://somersetcouncil.citizenspace.com/active-travel/copy-of-local-transport-plan-2025/

Undoubtedly, there is much to be welcomed in the Draft Transport Plan. It identified the challenges facing Somerset very well and very succinctly. The issue is how most effectively to address them.

The Draft Transport Plan states "65% of Somerset emissions are from cars, 35% from goods vehicles. 70% of emissions on journeys of more than 5 miles and less than 50 miles. Hence there is a need to encourage a modal shift from cars to more sustainable transport modes like active travel and public transport."

Whilst active travel is a good alternative for shorter journeys, not many are going to walk or bike on journeys of more than 5 miles ... especially in all weathers! If we are going to achieve a modal shift from cars then it is going by bus.

Bus travel is not currently given the priority in this Draft Transport Plan that it warrants in terms of how a modal switch from cars to buses will help tackle pollution, congestion and carbon emissions in Somerset. *Condensed article from Somerset Bus Partnership*




OTHERY BOOK READING GROUP

Well-liked and well-known, Barnaby is a man who always tries to do the right thing. Perhaps married life isn't quite as blissful as it once was and perhaps the family didn't turn out quite as expected but Barnaby is still a good man in a difficult, complicated world.

Twenty-year old Lenny Barnes, paralysed on the rugby field, is about to make that world so much more complicated. Lenny's decision will rip apart the delicate web that binds together Barnaby, his family and his community. Past, present, future, wives, lovers and children – all their secrets will be snatched up and scattered for the world to see.

What do you think of when someone mentions slavery? For many of us, it will be an image related to slavery from times gone by, but slavery still takes place today and it could be happening near you. That is the message that campaigners want us to share on Anti-Slavery Day, which this year takes place on Saturday, 18 October, ahead of Anti-Slavery Week.

It is a message that an event held at St Mary's Church, Bridgwater will be sharing loud and clear. *Hidden Voices* is holding an art exhibition on the theme of 'the hidden market' from Friday, 17 to Sunday, 19 October.

Hidden Voices has partnered with two art groups, the Minehead-based Sparrows Project and Chard-based Vera ArtSCM. They're contributing various forms of artwork and there are also plans for a live performance piece on the opening day, Friday 17 October.

Organiser Julia Holder-Shephard says, "We hope people will come along and see how we're all part of one society, responsible for each other.
