# **Thought for the Month**

To everything there is a season and a time for every activity under heaven.'

(Ecclesiastes 3:1)

Which is your favourite season?

It might be Spring - the season bursting with hope. After the long dark days of winter, comes the melting of snow and all the signs of new life, with buds on the trees, the bright colours of spring bulbs and the return of birdsong.

Or is it the warmth of the Summer, with its longer days and time to explore the countryside, swim in the sea, or sit in the garden and read?

It may be that Autumn is gold for you! With the leaves of the trees turning to an amazing array of colours – red, yellow, amber and gold, before softly dropping to the ground. With the crops safely gathered in, it is the season of both Thanksgiving and of Remembrance.

Then there is Winter. Although in many ways it is the hardest of all seasons, the long dark nights offer time to sit around the warmth of a log fire and the season is brightened by the decorations and joyful celebration of Christmas!

Whatever your favourite season, the Reverend Tim Eady, former Rector of Brighstone, offers these thoughtful reflections on the importance of each season:

There is something inevitable about the link between the changing seasons of the year and the development of human society.

Each season has its own particular feel, depending upon the weather, length of daylight hours, and in most societies, the continuous cycle of ploughing, sowing and reaping the land.

Twenty-first century western society is unusual, in that for the majority of us, the direct link between the annual cycle of seasons and the basic process of staying alive is not as significant as in earlier centuries.



It is perhaps equally inevitable that the cycle of religious festivals should be influenced by the changing seasons. The pattern of feasts and festivals in the Old Testament is primarily agricultural. Agricultural festivals punctuate our own Christian year, although today Harvest Festival is the only one to which we pay any significant attention. The Christian Church has developed its own pattern of festivals, based upon the foundational events of our faith, for the most part following he life of our Lord from birth to His final departure from the earth, but it too uses the changing seasons to provide pictorial language to help us understand their full significance. Hence Christmas falling in midwinter, speaks of the promise of new hope breaking in to the darkness of human existence. Easter, with its message of resurrection, falls on the Jewish feast of First Fruits in the spring of the year when we are surrounded by the evidence of new life. Pentecost, the Jewish harvest festival, is when We celebrate the harvest of the Spirit in our lives.

The Christian year tells a story. Just as the Jewish year tells the story of escape from exile, the giving of the law and foundation of a nation, so too the Church's year tells the story of God's dealings with humanity, through the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Each season has particular characteristics. There are times of waiting, penitence, sadness and immense joy. In the same way that much of our lives are routine and humdrum, there have to be 'ordinary times' between the festivals, in order for the festivals to stand out as significant.

However, we must remember that ultimately, all seasons are of equal importance, and it is essential that we worship God at every time of year. After all, Australians manage to celebrate Christmas happily in mid-summer, and Easter in the autumn.

We are called to live as the people of God every day come rain or come shine. The Christian year, like so many other things, is there to assist us, but not to become a straight-jacket. If it gets in the way of worship, then, like anything else, it is time to reorder our priorities, and remember Jesus' teaching that worship should be 'in spirit and in truth' (John 4).



# A report of their September Meeting Quilting - with Jane Wilshaw

Jane Wilshaw accompanied by her daughter, Sian, gave us a fascinating talk about how she had created her beautiful quilts and the stories behind them, showing us slides of her work and bringing along a wide selection of quilts. Jane began quilting whilst working overseas, where she developed her skills, alongside other likeminded friends. Using a special type of sewing machine, Jane created some amazingly intricate designs using several different quilting techniques, with a wide variety of fabrics. The fabrics included silk, wool, cotton, netting, lace, feathers, threads, in fact anything that would help her to create the effect she desired - even

We were all astounded at the intricacies of Jane's work – the attention to detail, the variety of finishes, the richness of the colours and the combination of quilting styles and patterns. She showed us a selection of bed quilts, tablecloths, table runners, cushion covers, wall hangings; not only using textiles but sometimes enhancing her work by applying paint directly onto a quilt or cushion. Jane also personalised her work using photos.

We learned that 'batting' was the middle layer of a quilt and comes in different thicknesses depending on its purpose. In a hot country, a lightweight batting was used because of the extremely hot temperatures, whereas here in the UK wool might be chosen for added warmth. Another quilting term, 'Flying Geese', describes how triangular fabric pieces are applied to resemble geese flying nose to tail in formation. These pieces were also used to edge a quilt or a banner or to form part of a pattern or picture. The term 'Block of the Month' (BOM), referred to the creation of a square block of quilting. Each quilter in a group would place four different fabric samples into a bag and then swap their bags with another quilter. Quilters would then use those fabrics to create their own unique 'block'. Jane said how difficult it was sometimes, to part with favourite fabrics, but always fascinating to see what her fellow quilters had fashioned. One particularly interesting gift Jane made was a picnic set for a friend. It comprised; a tablecloth with a plastic underside, napkins, plate holders, a cutlery wrap, and a matching carry bag to hold all the items - and big enough to hold food too.

Jane's quilts are simply works of art; and we were all so delighted to see such a beautiful selection of her work and to hear the stories behind each design.

### **Eco Encouragement**

During recent years, we have seen an increasing number of unusual and extreme weather events. We have become more aware of the increasing evidence of the dangers caused by plastics and long-lasting chemicals, causing pollution that endangers both human health and all other life on the planet.

It is important to be aware of these huge challenges - but facing these constant negative headlines can lead to us feeling overwhelmed. We can become paralysed by despair and feel unable to take action. These climate challenges are significant, yet many developments are taking place that can give us real hope for the future.

Marine protected areas are expanding. The United Nations High Seas Treaty became law in 2025. It provides a legal framework to protect marine biodiversity in international waters and aims to protect 30% of the world's oceans by 2030. It is the world's first treaty to protect and conserve marine biodiversity and restore ocean health. in international waters. The High Seas Treaty This shows what the world can achieve when we come together for the common good of our ocean, which covers 70% of the planet.

"This is the most significant victory for ocean protection and restoration I have ever witnessed," said Ariana Densham, a senior campaigner at Greenpeace. "Campaigners, coastal communities, small-scale fishers, scientists, and ocean lovers everywhere can hold on to this moment as proof that when millions of voices demand change, we can achieve what once seemed like a distant dream."

Following an international treaty, The Montreal Protocol, nearly 99% of ozone depleting substances have been phased out. As a result, the damaged ozone layer is being replenished. The hole in the ozone over the Arctic is expected to be fully healed by 2045 and the Antarctic hole by 2066.

Although many species are still endangered, conservation efforts are succeeding in bringing back species from the brink of extinction. Recent success stories close to home include include the reintroduction of Sea Eagles to The Isle of Wight; the replanting of seagrass meadows that has allowed seahorses and cuttlefish to thrive in The Solent. The key to the seahorse comeback was cultivating an environment where seagrass would thrive. Water voles have returned to parts of England and Wildcats have been reintroduction to the Scottish Highlands.

Government support has increased funding to farmers.

"This helps to support the transition towards a more productive and environmentally sustainable agricultural sector; enabling farmers to prioritise the

nature friendly farming changes required to cope with the challenges of climate change. These include better wildlife management, tree planting, peatland restoration and flood resilience. A healthy and productive soil is the most valuable asset on the farm and is critical to the long-term productivity. A thriving soil life underpins the whole food web, essentially supporting more visible farmland wildlife such as birds and mammals. Healthy soils produce healthy plants that are more resilient to pests and disease, require fewer inputs and save money. A well-structured living soil is less susceptible to soil erosion and more permeable to water, reducing the risk of drying out and water logging.

It is estimated that the value of natural insect pollination to the UK farming industry is £690 million per year. The cost of replacing insect pollination in the UK is estimated at £1.8 billion per year, which is not an economically viable option.

The 'Pasture for Pollinators' project trialled leaving un-mown strips in the herbal leys to extend the flowering period. If these un-mown margins are not left, when crops are cut, (e.g. for silage), the local landscape can go from 'feast to famine' for insects overnight. By sowing diverse **legume and herb mixes** into farm grassland, and ensuring that mowing management allows them to flower, an excellent source of pollen and nectar for insects can be created." Martin Lines, chief executive of the Nature Friendly Farming Network,

"Increasing funding and prioritising nature-friendly farming will help put agriculture on a more sustainable footing and enable the changes required to continue feeding our nation as climate change presents ongoing challenges,".

We need to carry the momentum of these successes forward and channel our collective energy into driving even greater progress. Together, we can turn hope into action and build a healthier, more sustainable world for generations to come.

Title: Reasons for Hope

Last month (October 2025), a world-famous primatologist and anthropologist, Jane Goodall died. Throughout her life she inspired many people to respect the natural world and to take the dangers threatening our planet seriously.

As a child, Jane's father gave her a toy chimpanzee. Jane named this toy chimp, *Jubilee* and said, "her fondness for it sparked her early love of animals."

In 1960, Jane joined the work of Louis Leakey, studying primates in their natural environment. 1962 Jane Goodall, who had no degree, went to the University of Cambridge. She was the eighth person to be allowed to study for a PhD at Cambridge without first having obtained a bachelor's degree

The Book of Hope focuses on Jane Goodall's "Four Reasons for Hope": The Amazing Human Intellect, The Resilience of Nature, The Power of Young People, and The Indomitable Human Spirit.

"Chimpanzees, gorillas, orangutans have been living for hundreds of thousands of years in their forest, living fantastic lives, never overpopulating, never destroying the forest. I would say that they have been in a way more successful than us as far as being in harmony with the environment." - Jane Goodall

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
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
