Chartley was a settlement recorded in the Domesday Book in the Hundred of Pirehill and the county of Staffordshire.

Owned by Earl Algar, it had a recorded population of 9 villagers and 6 smallholders. The area was eight

and a half plough teams (A "ploughland" was the unit of area that could be cultivated by a single eight-oxen plough team in a year). Other resources were a 10 acre meadow and  $1 \times \frac{1}{2}$  league woodland.

There were once two watermills on the estate, for grinding corn, which were served by two lakes and was originally a deer park. Today it is home for the Chartley cattle, which have been brought back from Scotland.



The Castle, motte and double bailey, (similar to Stafford Castle) was built by one of the Earls of Chester, about 1100, as a safe stop-over for their journeys to places such as Tutbury. It was rebuilt in 1220 by Ranulph de Blondeville, 4th Earl of Chester, who died in 1232. It then passed by marriage to william at Ferrers, 5th Earl of Derby. It remained

in the Ferrers family until 1453, when it was passed to Walter Devereux, through his wife Anne de Ferrers.

Through his wife, Walter also became Baron Ferrers of Chartley in 1461. Walter Devereux, 8th Barron Ferrers of Chartley, died at the Battle of Bosworth in 1485 fighting for the Yorkist Army (under Richard III) and his lands were confiscated by the Crown.

Chartley Manor: Walter Devereux's son, Walter(!) successfully appealed





Walter Devereux, 10<sup>th</sup> Baron Ferrers of Chartley, 1<sup>st</sup> Viscount Hereford, and Lieutenant of Stafford, died in1558. He is buried at St. John's Church, Stowe. Washington Shirley, the 5<sup>th</sup> Earl Ferrers and Deputy Lieutenant of Staffordshire died childless in 1778. Just a few years later, in 1781, the old manor house was destroyed by fire.


**Hopton Village Hall** can be booked through the Hopton & Coton Parish Council website. The cost is just £10 per hour.


We are always hopeful that each year will bring new members to support the club and secure its future!

### The Birthday Bell

On Sunday September 7<sup>th</sup> the 400<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of *Number 5 bell* was celebrated at All Saint's church. During the service the bell was rung for the congregation to hear and then Rose Pemberton, tower captain, outlined the history of the bell.

### It was cast in 1625 by Robert or Richard Purdue of Bristol.



The bell was returned to Loughborough to have a crack repaired following restoration work by John Taylor Foundry in 1963.

This historic bell (that first sounded in the year Charles 1 became King!) weighs 300<sup>kg</sup> (47.24<sup>stones</sup>) and has a diameter of 77.47<sup>cm</sup> (2 ft 6½ inches).

The restoration work had been funded by the 6<sup>th</sup> Earl of Harrowby for bells 4,5 and 6, the only ones existing at the time.

In the afternoon a quarter peal of 50 minutes continuous ringing added to the celebrations. The enthusiastic ringers of Sandon church, (the youngest being 8) hope to be ringing this bell for many years to come!





### Staffordshire Police, Sandon sub-section



Many police stations were built throughout the county during the 1940s, 50s & 60s with Sandon police station being built

1960 on what was a garden that had been tended by the local school children decades earlier. Originally Sandon station was issued with a police motorcycle (PC Gordon Love was the first officer to take up the the post within the new station) Following a serious police motorcycle accident PC Love was moved to Stone police station & Sandon station was thereafter issued with a patrol car. Duty officers, PC Gordon Love 1960-1963, PC Mick Geraghty 1963-1968, PC Max Shelley 1968 until his retirement in 1989. The ladies of **Stowe WI** had their monthly meeting on **Tuesday September 9**<sup>th</sup> and after a brief formal meeting, they had a talk by *Gill Sykes* on **Two Powerful Ladies of Staffordshire & Derbyshire** To begin, Gill spoke about **Bess Of Hardwick** 1527 - 1608 who was a clever businesswoman and

architect. She married very young and was widowed shortly afterwards. Her second husband, Sir William Cavendish, was 20 years her senior and he had built Chatsworth. On his death he left his entire estate to Bess. She built Hardwick Hall with more glass than wall - to emphasise her wealth!

Gill then spoke about **Emily Meynell** 1840 - 1904, and the similarities in her life to Bess of Hardwick and how they progressed in a Man's World. Emily married Hugo Meynell Ingram who was 18 years her senior. He had Hoar Cross Hall built. They had no children and on his death she became an obsessive and neurotic widow who spent many years in mourning. She had the church near Hoar Cross Hall built in memory of her husband. Emily wanted this Anglo-Catholic Church to look like a cathedral.

It was a most fascinating talk about these 2 women who had been so successful in what was a very much a man's world. Alison gave the vote of thanks. Meetings are held in the Village Hall at 7.30 on the second Tuesday of the month. *Guests and new members are always welcome.*


### Looking after our Heritage

You may have a house full of devices that are not at all fazed by the challenge of adjusting the time later this month - BUT it's worth checking your car clock, microwave or oven, central heating programmer and any grandfather clocks or other vintage timepieces you've got ticking away!

So this year, 2025, BST ends on Sunday October 26<sup>th</sup>.

At 2.00<sup>am</sup> the clocks go back to 1.00<sup>am</sup>—giving us an extra hour in bed or at least a chance to pretend we're early for once!
