I saw cattle standing in parched fields with winter hay and silage being fed to them in August. There has been a mixed harvest for arable crops I gather, while many of our fruit farmers have done well, which is good news for them at least, an important part of the rural economy across Worcestershire. Jesus was very familiar with rural life, and spoke memorably of the harvest.



When Jesus saw the crowds, he had compassion for them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd. Then he said to his disciples, "The harvest is plentiful, but the labourers are few; therefore, pray earnestly to the Lord of the harvest to send out labourers into his harvest. Matthew 9.36-38

#### **Unexpected Visitors in Beckford....**

On Friday 5th September, Rev'd Katryn received a call from a small band of pilgrims walking from Leeds to Glastonbury, seeking permission to camp in the churchyard, or inside the church, that night. Permission was given and a little later the small contingent hove into view along Station Road, carrying two large crosses. It transpired that the group of four dedicated young men had undertaken the formidable journey, with their heavy crosses, to draw attention to the ideals of the Christian way of life and had helped various people, homeless or destitute, along the way.

Footsore and weary they happily set up temporary home inside the church and apparently slept well between those ancient walls. Supported by a back-up vehicle they produced a firebowl on which they cooked their meals in the open air, augmented by occasional visits to the Old Post Office for breakfast.

In the event they spent the weekend (there being no services) in Beckford church before moving on on Monday morning, intending a ten-mile walk to a Cheltenham church where they hoped to find refuge that night. Cheerful, stalwart and very grateful for the hospitality, they left the church in the immaculate condition in which they'd found it.



#### Charles Archer - FROM THE ARCHIVES Evesham Journal October 18th 1862 BECKFORD HARVEST HOME

We are informed by a correspondent that last year there was a great united harvest home at Beckford which it was hoped would have been continued into succeeding times, but this year the landowners and landholders could not agree to unite Mr. Robert Timbrill, Mr. Joseph Freeman, and Thos. Bluck who gave their harvest homes on the modern and improved system on Friday the 3rd inst, at the above mentioned village. On entering Beckford before morning service, the bells may have been heard on the day in question proclaiming the festival to the delighted villagers assembled for the general holiday. At eleven o'clock a procession left the Vicarage Farm, in the occupation of Robt. Timbrell carrying flags and banners inscribed with the mottoes, "Speed the plough", "God Save the Queen ", "Unity is strength", "Honesty and Progress", &c. and headed by a brass band, proceeded through the village to church where a very large congregation attended. The Reverend E. Robinson preached from 1st chap. 24th verse, The Rev. gentleman founded hereupon an eminently practical discourse, adapted to the congregation and the occasion. At the close of the service a large party proceeded to the scene of the festivities, a field in the occupation of Mr. Jas. Smith near the Vicarage Farm. The chair at the dinner was taken by Robt. Prance, Esq. of Great Washbourne, supported on his right by Rev. E. Robinson and W. E Faulkner, and on his left by the Rev. R Lambert and R. Timbrill Esq. Amongst the company were Mr. T. Bluck Mr. H. Bluck, Messrs. Messrs. W. and, J. New, Ashton; Mr. Walker & Sons, Little Washbourne ; Messrs. Attwood, Conderton; Mr. J. Freeman and Mr. F. Marshall, solicitor, Cheltenham, with several ladies and other gentlemen. After dinner the usual loyal and agricultural toasts were proposed and responded to. The health of the ladies of the ladies was proposed by Mr. T. Bluck in very appropriate and humorous speech. Afterwards the company proceeded to hear the minstrels in their model theatre erected for the occasion, and from the applause and encores which greeted the entertainment it must have given general satisfaction, especially "Old Bob" and "Sarah Ridley" and "Perfect Cure" in character. During the interval a variety of games was indulged in, in the field, including "Aunt sally," football and foot races for young boys of the age of eight and old ladies of the age of sixty. These races were under the management of those well-known sporting gentlemen, Mr. H. Bluck and Mr. F. Marshall, who gave general satisfaction in awarding the prizes, which consisted of, money, hats, gown pieces, &c. We cannot conclude these remarks without the regret expressed at the absence of several of the labourers who were debarred from taking part in the holiday through some objections or misunderstanding on the part of their masters but we trust that before another harvest is ended all discord will be at an end and at the next harvest festival we shall see a banner inscribed with the words "Friendship and Unity" and that we shall be able to head our report the "

Beckford United Harvest Festival."

# Charles Archer - FROM THE ARCHIVES Evesham Standard Saturday October 12th 1889 ASHTON-UNDER-HILL HARVEST FESTIVAL

The annual harvest thanksgiving services were held at St. Barbabra's Church on Friday, October 4th, a very large congregation being present. The service at 7 p.m. was full choral, commencing with the hymn "Come ye thankful people come." The church was very prettily and effectively decorated. The communion and altar rails were most beautifully arranged by Miss Bunchie Baldwyn, assisted by Miss. Ayliffe, with corn, vegetables, fruit, and flowers, and in the front of the rails was a monstrous loaf and several small ones, sent by Mr. Court. The pulpit and lectern were profusely and tastefully adorned by Miss. Maggie Clements; in the centre of the pulpit was a handsome cross, composed of clematis and maiden-hair fern, and floral baskets artistically arranged by Miss. Kate Clements. The font, which was the work of Miss. Bosley, was immensely admired, the top of it being adorned with a mass of white flowers and fern on a moss bed. Much praise is due to the excellent taste displayed by Miss. N. Carter in decorating the windows, the whole looked so light and graceful The pillars, arches, porch, &c., were decorated by Miss. Court and Miss N. Clements. Flowers, fruit, and vegetables were kindly sent by Mrs. Nind, Mrs. and Mr. H. Harrison, of Beckford, also by Mr. H. Boswell of Evesham. The service which was bright and hearty was repeated on the following Sunday. Mr. Burge played the harmonium. The anthem, "Blessed be the name of the Lord," was beautifully rendered by the choir, and appropriate sermons were preached by the Rector, the Rev. J. Harrison.



#### **BECKFORD WI**

Our president, Clare Henderson, welcomed 20 members and our speaker Ged Cassell. Apologies had been received from several members still enjoying their summer holidays.

The minutes from the July meeting were approved and signed. Clare then introduced our speaker for the evening - Ged Cassell to talk to us about his passion "Ancient Egypt". Ged has a master's in Archaeology and Egyptology from the renowned Manchester University.

Ged's presentation was very visual including lots of pictures from his own personal collection. For those of us who have never visited Egypt or those who have not visited extensively this really gave us a sense of the scale of the ancient Pyramids and Temples. The engineering and crafting skills were beyond belief.

Ged started by reminding us that Egypt's ancient life all revolved around "the Nile" – this being the only hospitable area of the country. He talked about the "the gift of The Nile", how the flooding of The Nile left behind fertile land which they could cultivate. Over time this led to consistent crops and farms, and they reached to point where they had excess food and were able to store it for famine years but more importantly it allowed them to trade it. This was the start of The Egyptians becoming a civilised nation.

We also learnt about The Egyptians belief system — they believed in keeping the Gods happy to ensure The Nile flooded to keep their ordered society working. They were not as focused on death as we think but they did believe that to get to the "after life" you needed to preserve the body. This is how and why The Pyramids came about. The Pyramid shape also being a sacred shape due to its ordered nature.

Ged showed us carvings of the various Pharaohs; he also taught us the correct pronunciation of Tutankhamun (Thoth Ankh Amun). He reminded us of the importance of "the Rosetta stone" discovered in 1799. When they realised the inscription was the same but in 3 scripts – Egyptian hieroglyphs, Demotic and Ancient Greek this paved the way for the understanding or the hieroglyphics in much more detail.

He concluded by encouraging us to visit as there are so many amazing sites, but we can also see and learn lots closer to home: The British Museum – Ashmolean Museum in Oxford – Highclere Castle – and various collections in Paris, Berlin and Netherlands.

Refreshments were taken and the general business of the evening was conducted. Clare then introduced our member Cheryl who had attended a recent GFWI event "the missing link" about the construction of the 3 mile missing link, (i.e. the only section that is not dual carriage way part of the A417). The trip sounded very interesting with them learning about the logistics of construction, the preservation of the landscape, costings and much more — we learnt it is costing 460 million to produce but the improvement with safety and with the increase in capacity it is a worthwhile investment.

Members of Probus Club are always interested in learning more about historical events and activities and recently we have had a number of talks on different subjects from the past.

One very major topic presented to us by Nigel Thompson was the Industrial Revolution in Great Britain in the 18th and 19th centuries. The subject matter was so far reaching that Nigel presented his talk in two parts, the first part covering the events and innovations that made this country a world leader and encompassing the period from around 1750 up to 1870. The term Revolution may seem to many people as an overstatement but when one considers the huge innovations, inventions and developments in engineering, ship building, roads, railways and bridge construction, water purification and sewerage and gas and electricity, the impact on the population of this country was immense.

Nigel's follow-up talk covered the years from around 1820 to 1920 primarily focusing on the impact that Britain's Industrial Revolution had had on the rest of the world, particularly concentrating on the United States. Examples of these included the development of motor manufacturing, the oil industry and the iron and steel business in America, all inspired by the industrial and social developments in Great Britain.

In complete contrast but exploring more of a social and human aspect of history was a talk from Angela Dunsby from Tewkesbury's John Moore Museum who presented her talk entitled History's Deadliest Deaths. Angela took us on a grisly and gruesome journey in graphic detail through the public executions attended by thousands of people, fascinated by seeing criminals die in agony and some of the more ghastly

engines of torture inflicted on those unfortunate enough to have fallen foul of the law in times gone by.



# What's happening in the cutting garden in October?



Finally we have had some rain and the garden is beginning to look green again! The flowers have all been behaving strangely in response to the heat: either late to flower or short when they arrive....however, there are now plenty of late season dahlias here now to keep me cutting.

Here are some of the things I will be up to this month so that you can garden along too...

We have an air frost date of around October 16th (which is when we can expect temperatures at night to fall below 2 degrees) The frost dates can be found on line and are worked out for each area using historical data. They are essential for guiding gardeners with their plans (although not always 'to the letter')

At this point I will be taking in to the greenhouse any 'tender' plants that don't like the cold. I have a willow leaf sage (leucantha) that will be one of them and it will be time to make way for the chrysanthemums too. They are late to flower and a relatively new addition to my garden menu but I appear to be quite successful at propagating them so have quite a few now. They are in pots so that they can be easily relocated when it gets cold.

It's a good time to stock up on any protection for tender plants in the ground too. I will be shaking out the fleeces in readiness and making sure I have enough for the new areas of garden I have created this year.

I will continue cutting dahlias as they flower there will be quite a few weeks left in them and they will keep going until we have a frost.

There will be lots of leaf fall now that we are in autumn so I will be clearing up leaves endlessly to replenish the leaf pile used to create a mulch. Leaves that remain on the lawn too long can create bald patches so I try and sweep up as many as possible.

We have had regular visits from a hedgehog that appears to have a home under the wisteria so we will continue to feed her (she likes cat food!) to fatten her up

before hibernation. The birds will also get the bird feeders replenished now.

October is a good time to plant daffodils and crocus for next spring. They look good in flower beds, pots or in a lawn. Plant them tip facing upwards in a sunny spot at a depth of 3 times the size of the bulb. Cover well and that's it.

Don't be tempted to plant tulips just yet, even though they have been in the garden centres for months. They do like it to be cold before planting, reducing the risk of tulip blight. November will be soon enough for them.

I will be sowing my first set of sweet peas! They will give an early crop for next year but can also be sown much later on (between Christmas and new year is a popular time) into 2026 so don't feel you need to rush. They do need a bit more care and attention when sown early and that's not necessarily a good thing!


Enjoy the change of season and I will see you around the village.

#### **JustMoney Movement**

Rosie Venner is a member of St Martin's Church, London Road Worcester and is also Director of Movement Building at The JustMoney Movement, a national Christian Charity which works towards a fairer, greener world.

"The charity is all about where money, faith and justice interconnects," said Rosie. "We want individuals and churches to be exploring issues like how ethical their banking is and how our tax system might be made more fair for the poorest in society." Before re-branding a couple of years ago, JustMoney Movement was known as the Ecumenical Council for Corporate Responsibility, which was established in 1989. It worked to encourage a better understanding of the power of church investments and to hold companies, particularly oil and mining companies, to account when money was invested in communities around the world.

Dick Johnson, Faith at Work Development Officer in our Diocese, and lead chaplain at West Mercia Police and Hereford & Worcester Fireand Rescue Service, has been a Trustee of the charity for a number of years. He said: "Industrial Mission played a key part in setting up and running the charity, which is why I ended up getting involved. We encouraged people to buy some shares in a company and then attend the AGM to ask questions about the ethics of their investment. This is still an approach which we take today so that we can work with companies to help them improve how money is used across the world."

Members of JustMoney Movement sit as observers on the Church Investors Group to help ensure money is invested as ethically as possible. They also have a number of campaigns which churches can get involved with including the Big Bank Switch to encourage individuals to switch to greener banks, petitioning for greener, fairer pensions and encouraging people to write to their MPs on tax justice issues. Each year the charity marks Good Money Sunday (this year on 12 October), Tax Justice Sunday (in June) and publishes their Greener, Fairer Banking Guide for Churches.



Rosie continued: "The Church still has quite a weighty voice in the investment world, where we are seen as offering a moral perspective. Locally, we can make a difference too. If all of our congregation members switched to more ethical and climate-friendly banking, , and looked at where our pension funds are investing, we would have a considerable impact as a community."

JustMoney Movement works in partnership with other charities such as Operation Noah, Christian Aid, USPG, the Student Christian Movement and A Rocha. They also work alongside the Association of Church Accountants and Treasurers (ACAT).

"Our work has many links with Eco Church as we can support churches and individuals to make greener financial choices. We want to make it as easy as possible for those who are volunteers to make a difference in their churches and decide how to apply their faith and values to their money. We'd love, for example, for churches to switch to a greener bank or to make the 'Green Investment Declaration', committing to invest at least 5% in climate solutions and telling people they're doing it. As a charity we also play an advocacy role, going back to the more ethical banks to let them know what churches need from them to be able to switch their accounts," said Rosie.

"Our ultimate goal is that the system as a whole will be oriented towards a fairer, greener economy so that people don't have to think about making a choice. However, until that time, we can offer resources to help people make ethical financial choices and write to their MP on fairer, greener finance issues; campaigning in a gentle way to promote change."

# PRISONS WEEK A WEEK OF PRAYER

Prisons Week takes place this year from 12 to 18 October.


"You learn about society by seeing how people are treated in its prisons, and it's an absolute mess in ours. The prison system is insanely broken – people here are not treated like human beings. The maximum emphasis is on punishment with only superficial mention of rehabilitation. Many resort to smashing the contents of their cells or self-harming as a way to access help. It is absolutely no wonder that re-offending rates are so high when those leaving prison are in a worse way than when they came in. Whatever stability people had in their lives before prison, whether it's housing or employment, is ripped away when you step inside and there is minimal help to put things back together".

These are the views of a 24-year-old man in prison for the first time who is serving two years for political activism.

Prisons' Sunday on 12 October marks the start of the annual week of prayer to raise awareness of issues faced by those affected by the criminal justice system. It will be marked, as usual, in the Cathedral with the diocesan Criminal Justice Affairs Group (CJAG) having an input in this morning's service.

On Prisons' Sunday and throughout the rest of the week, we pray not only for offenders and victims of crime (recognising that many people in prison are both) - we pray also for families, friends, prison staff, chaplains, police, probation and all who make decisions which impact people's lives. We are all created in the image of God who came to earth to be with us and to enter into our pain and suffering as well as our joys and delight. We will pause to reflect on Jesus Christ's encounters with people when he walked on earth, and his compassion, always offering hope and the possibility of transformation even in places of suffering.

Lord, you offer freedom to all people. We pray for those in prison. Break the bonds of fear and isolation that exist. Support with your love prisoners and their families and friends, prison staff and all who care. Heal those who have been wounded by the actions of others, especially the victims of crime. Help us to forgive one another, to act justly, love mercy and walk humbly together with Christ in his strength and in his Spirit, now and every day. Amen



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

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
