It has become increasingly challenging to keep the season of Advent. In our modern world the season of Christmas has now extended back to November and has somewhat swallowed up Advent. However, Advent is a wonderful and joyful season of preparation and one that we always keep in the Church. Advent is very similar to Lent and that is evidenced by the colour of purple which is used for both seasons.

In church we have our Advent wreaths and we light a candle each Sunday to help us to remember amongst other things, that before the birth of Jesus, the world was in darkness; however, that all changes when Christ, the light of the world, is born. Advent is a time for us to reflect and to prepare for the birth of Jesus; it is an important period of waiting and anticipation.

Waiting is something that our increasingly society is struggling to do. We have all become accustomed to getting things instantly and not having to wait for them. Our society changed dramatically has since the invention of email. In past times we would write letters to each other and not expect a reply for days. Today, and with email, we expect a reply to our correspondence within hours.

However, it is beneficial for all of us on occasions to simply wait. When we wait, we are increasing the anticipation; we are reflecting on the upcoming event. We are valuing and preparing ourselves for the occasion, therefore when the big day comes, we discover that we enjoy it even more than we would have done if we had not spent some time simply waiting. For Christians, Advent is that opportunity to prepare and to wait; and then to celebrate on 25th December when we will give thanks for the birth of the Son of God and the Saviour of the world. The waiting and preparation beforehand enhance this joyful experience.

To help us to prepare for Christmas, I shall be leading a Bible Study at the New Victory Hall on **Tuesday 2nd, 9th, 16th December,** starting at 1.30pm. Please do come along for a relaxed and informal opportunity that will help all of us prepare for the upcoming joys of Christmas.

Finally, I pray that you will all have a good and fruitful Advent; and that when the time comes and the waiting is over, a very joyful Christmas.

NVH Wildlife Group


The grounds of the NVH have supported good sightings of

wildlife this year. The lawns were left uncut during May which resulted in some beautiful displays of daisies and dandelions. When the dandelions seeded, they created a coat of lolly pop seed heads across the lawns which looked stunning. The meadow areas at the front near the hedge and the orchard have been cut once in early Autumn. This gave many flowering plants and grasses a chance to seed and they too looked beautiful, hosting many species of insect like grasshoppers. hoverflies, bugs and earwigs. The meadow behind NVH has similarly been cut just once and this has resulted in the first oxeye daisies to flower that I have seen. They should seed, spread and hopefully put on a fine display next year. We have extensively cut back the hedges near the back meadow to try and stimulate some growth at the base of the hedgerow. This is to encourage wildlife corridors and was suggested to us by the Norfolk Wildlife Trust. Thanks to everyone who has helped this year. 



Wildlife Notes

I have lived in Neatishead since 1987 and have been keeping records of the birds in my garden since around 1995. I thought it would be interesting to look at the species we have lost and those we have gained not just in my garden but in our locality. When we first moved here, we had House Sparrows in our lane. My records show that I recorded 24 one day in the summer of 1996. Now I rarely see one in our garden although there is a small colony not that far away. We had nesting Spotted Flycatchers, the occasional sighting of Lesser Woodpecker and even a record of Turtle Doves feeding on the ground under the bird table, all species which have almost disappeared from our villages.

I counted 23 Collared Doves in my garden in autumn 1996 but now seldom see more than 2 or 3 and on some weeks none at all, a downward trend which the BTO has noted. I recall seeing large numbers of Reed Bunting and Yellowhammer in winter flocks in the hedgerows near Alderfen every winter. Whilst I regularly recorded Reed Buntings in my garden at the end of winter (6 in spring 2015) I now only see the odd 1 or 2 perhaps a sign of warmer winters meaning that they no longer need to visit gardens, or perhaps a general decline in numbers.

On a more positive note, whilst I only recorded a maximum of 3 Goldfinches in winter 1996, I now regularly get double figures and numbers peaked at 20 in 1999. The BTO (British Trust for Ornithology) attributes this to increased garden feeding of seeds which Goldfinches enjoy like niger and sunflower hearts.

I now record more members of the corvid family visiting the garden with Magpies, Jackdaws, Carrion Crows and even occasional visits from Rooks and the number of Gulls visiting has included Black Headed, Common Gull, Herring Gull and Lesser Black-backed Gull. The Corvids and Gulls are usually attracted by food scraps left on top of my large, flat bird table but shows how these species have adapted. In the case of Gulls, they moved inland from the coast as fish stocks dwindled. Who would have thought that we can now record 3 species of Egret, Great White, Cattle and Little Egret in our locality and I have even seen the latter species in my garden on one occasion. Bitterns and Common Cranes are both now recorded regularly as are Buzzards and Red Kites.

Of course, with migration occurring twice a year the odd rarity may drop in. Even I was surprised by a Dark-eyed Junco in June 2017, an American vagrant which is recorded in the UK most years and a Great Grey Shrike in the winter of 2008. Firecrests have appeared twice and a Pied Flycatcher on one occasion in late summer 2007. Keep watching; you never know what may pop in.




