Rachel writes . . .

I think every family has its own Christmas traditions, and by the time you read this I expect you'll be looking forward to your own, and may even have started some of them already! And while some of our traditions might be shared with most of the country - for example, sitting down at 3pm on Christmas Day to watch the King's Speech - others might be special to only you and yours.

In Japan, Christmas is mainly a commercial opportunity, since most Japanese people are not Christian. It's not even a public holiday, but a regular working day. But after the post-WW2 occupation by American forces, some Christmas traditions emerged. It might sound hilarious, but the traditional Christmas Eve or Day meal is a giant bucket of fried chicken from KFC ordered weeks in advance, followed by a strawberry cream cake (because red is the colour of Christmas and strawberries are also red). But by the next day all signs of Christmas are gone, as the country gets ready for New Year, which is celebrated with a big clean of the whole house, traditional food, and visits to local shrines or temples to pick up a new lucky charm for the year ahead.

Much closer to us, our European neighbours eat and drink very different dishes to ours and in some European countries, Christmas is not the main event. One of my best friends is Dutch, and several years ago I visited her family towards the end of November, when preparations for *Sinterklaas* (the Feast of St Nicholas) were in full swing. In the evening we each left one of our shoes near the fireplace, with carrots for St. Nicholas' horse and oranges for him and his helper, and sang up the chimney. In the morning we found small gifts in our shoes, and each received a short letter from St Nicholas - in mine he remarked that he had not heard me singing along with everyone else. In my defence I don't speak (or sing) Dutch!

One of the best Christmas traditions I have heard of is the Christmas book flood or Yule book flood (*Jólabókaflóðið*) in Iceland. A lot of new books are published leading up to Christmas and people give each other books then spend Christmas Eve curled up with their new books and mugs of hot chocolate - definitely a tradition I would enjoy!

And of course, all over the country on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day, deacons, priests and bishops will be leading services. In recent years it has become popular for some clergy (but not your Priest in Charge!) to have a tipple when they get home, taking a selfie and posting it with the hashtag *clergymaltclub*.

Wherever you will be, and however you celebrate, I hope you enjoy your traditions and would like to wish you all a wonderful Christmas season.



NOTES FROM A SMALL ISLAND

REMEMBRANCE SUNDAY

Our Remembrance Sunday service was led by the Rev Val Hart. The names of all who died in both the First and Second World Wars from Milford and Hazelwood were read. A wreath was laid on behalf of the parish by Keith Walker.

MEMORIES OF WAR by Gina Clarke

My cousin Peter Moore (an only child) aged 19 years trained as a crew member of a Lancaster bomber – he was the wireless operator. His Captain was Dave from Australia and Buster, who was the rear gunner, came from New Zealand. On leave they both stayed at my grandmother's house. After many sorties over the Ruhr they were hit by flak from the ground. Buster went mad so they knocked him out. Dave steered the plane so that my cousin and a fellow English service man could be saved. They were picked up in a field in Holland and handed over to the Germans. He spent some time as a prisoner of war in camp 18 and later in 3 (scene of the Wooden Horse story). The war ended. My cousin and his English crew member returned. News came that Peter would be on a train to Matlock Bath Station. All the village went to the station to see the returning service men. He came down the platform, I still have his silver bracelet, he was wearing his flying jacket and his boots, carrying a bar of chocolate for me in his pocket. We hugged everyone. He said that he only wanted some fish and chips. My Auntie soon obtained these but about an hour later he was sick. At the station gate waiting for the train to arrive was Mrs Birks. She had only one child Ronnie while everyone was waiting on the platform she stood aside. He did not get off the train, she never knew what happened to him. I give my cross each November to him and look at his name on the war memorial.

THE ALPORT LOVE FEAST

In the 1970's, my Father purchased a book entitled 'Folklore Myths and Legends of Britain'. It contained a piece about the 'Alport Love Feast' which is held on the first Sunday of July, in the hamlet of Alport in the North Derbyshire moors. After over 50 years of waiting, I finally attended the feast this year. It's a simple Methodist service with unaccompanied hymns, and water and fruitcake instead of the usual communion wine and wafers. It is linked by association with the persecution of the Covenanters under the 'Act of Uniformity' in 1662. In this remote barn, both men and women assembled to worship God in their own way and kept quietly away from their enemies. Tradition has it that John Wesley himself once preached in the barn.

As I approached the farm, all seemed quiet, and I almost walked away, but I bumped into a Peak Park Ranger, who was also attending, and suddenly people appeared from nowhere.

The congregation sat on wooden trestles, supported by bales of hay, with the minister asking for hymns and personal thoughts. There was rousing singing of mainly Wesleyan hymns, but a classic by John Bunyan struck a chord with me - 'He Who Would Valiant Be'.

The word Pilgrim is repeated, and I suddenly had a revelation. I was brought up in the outdoors, and farms are no stranger to me. I worked on a relative's farm as a child and always loved nature, animals and the outdoors. Worshipping in a barn seemed normal as I've always felt closer to God when I'm in the outside, particularly when on expedition. I had recently returned from Alaska, to record the 25th anniversary of my life changing accident, which was more than an exercise in film making. I suddenly realised that it was a pilgrimage, and I felt overwhelmed in the moment. When the minister asked for thoughts and feelings, I had to speak out and share my revelation with the congregation. I felt that my life of expeditions and travels were all pilgrimages, and they had shaped me into the man I have become.

May there be many more...

November Well-Read Book Club at the Wonderful-Well-Kitchen-Cafe!

Thank you for making us so welcome, Amita, as always the food was delicious. This month the book out of the *Random Selection Box* was **The Stranger Beside Me by Ann Rule,** it was Lynn's choice. She shared her fascination with this true life story. It explores deception, lies and identity and is very frightening!

The themes for the November meeting were *Communication & Rebellion*. The following books were shared:

The Four Winds by Kristen Hannah A devastating drought shatters Elsa's life, her husband abandons her. She is forced to make a life-altering decision: stay and fight for her farm or take her children in search of a better future. A story of survival, hope, and the strength of a mother's love during a dark time in American history.

The Book Thief by Marcus Zusak Set in Nazi Germany during World War II, this is the story of a young girl, sent to live with foster parents. She develops a love for books and words, she steals books from various places, including a Nazi book burning and the mayor's wife's library. Her foster family hides a Jewish man in their basement, the two form a bond over shared stories. Read of her experiences, friendships, and the devastating air raid that destroys her home and family.

The Death Ray - The Secret life of Harry Grindell Matthews by Jonathan Foster Using disclosed files marked 'secret' held at the National Archives, newly discovered documents and personal recollections from those who knew him, this is a gripping account of one of the greatest, visionary, inventors of the twentieth century.

Olive Kitteridge by Elizabeth Strout explores Olive's relationships with her kind husband, Henry, their resentful son Christopher, and various community members. The stories, told over a span of 25 years, explore themes of grief, love, and the human soul.

The Lighthouse by Michael D O'Brien Ethan McQuarry is a young lighthouse keeper on a tiny island, on the Atlantic Ocean. He has no family, and sees himself as a vigilant, performing his duties courageously year after year. He cherishes his solitude and is grateful that his interactions with human beings are rare. Even so, he is haunted by his aloneness in the world and by a feeling that his life is meaningless.

The Bigamist by Mary Turner Thompson The true story of lies in epic proportions! Mary is happily married then one day the phone rings, and a woman introduces herself as 'the other Mrs Jordan'... A raw account of deception on a grand scale, Turner Thomson recounts what happened after she discovered every word he'd said, from the very first moment, was a lie.

Please Mr Postman by Alan Johnson The memoir covers Johnson's journey from a struggling young father to a trade union activist, which ultimately set the stage for his political career as an MP. A feel good read!

A History of the World in 21 Women by Jenni Murray From Hatshepsut to Marie Curie; Joan of Arc to Angela Merkel - Murray explores and celebrates the lives of some amazing and courageous WOMEN!




