From the Editors: Thankyou to all who have expressed their disappointment that this will be the last edition of "Contact". It is good to know that many people have enjoyed reading it. We would like to echo Peter's thanks to all who have been involved in its production and distribution - far too many to mention individually by name. If you are one of the helpers, please accept our thanks.

We have enjoyed producing it, but after 35 years we feel it is time to stop. We have relied on selling advertising space in the past to help with the cost of production, which would have meant a commitment for another whole year. We felt we could not do that.

"Contact" had existed for many years before we became involved. We were first aware of it when it was being produced by the Clergy; in 1981 the editor was the Rev Paul Oliver. Later, Harold & Benita Plant took over and did all the compiling and the printing on a very primitive and messy (by today's standards) Gestetner printer

We first became involved about 1990 when Chris Hedges (husband of Rev Anne Hedges, a member of the Team at that time) was editor. We soon took over full responsibility.

Then the magazine was professionally printed by the late Gary McGinty, a member of St. Cuthbert's congregation, who ran his own printing business. In those days electronic transfer of material was not immediately available, which meant taking hand-written or typed items to Gary who would deal with the layout of the magazine. The printed sheets still had to be collated, stapled and folded

When Gary retired we decided to take on the whole production, since we had computer facilities to handle the set-up process and a photocopier in church for the printing. although the collating, stapling and folding had to be done manually and we are grateful for the effort that Gerrit Kroon and his late wife Monica put in to achieve that, helped later by others like Margaret Pope and Sylvia Richens. A few years ago we acquired a photocopier that prints, collates, staples and folds the magazine. That made the printing easier in some ways, but was more time-consuming.

Thankfully our lovely volunteers were able to give her a lift home. One man delivered 10 boxes which his wife had packed and she was already buying items for next year. A lady from Chapel Green School, Old Buckenham also delivered 10 boxes which the children had put together after learning about the shoeboxes and poverty across the world in their RE lessons. In total 309 boxes were collected on Tuesday 18th November. This too was a moving experience as one of the collectors explained how he was exploring faith and that his son has been fighting a brain tumour for 5 years, prayer was offered.

Archbishop Designate, Sarah Mullally, sets out her hopes for the Church

Shortly after the announcement of her nomination as the next Archbishop of Canterbury, Bishop Sarah Mullally delivered an address at Canterbury Cathedral, reflecting on her calling, the challenges facing the Church, and her hopes for its future.



Rooted in her early vocation as a nurse and shaped by her ministry in London, she spoke of “*washing feet*” as a guiding image of Christian service, and of finding hope in the quiet faithfulness of churches, chaplaincies, and communities across the Anglican Communion. She addressed the Church’s responsibility in safeguarding, the need to confront power dynamics, and the importance of standing against hatred and antisemitism.

She said she would seek to be “*a shepherd who enables everyone’s ministry and vocation to flourish,*” and expressed her desire to nurture confidence in the Gospel. “*Held fast by the Lord’s hand,*” she concluded, “*please pray for me as I will pray for you.*”

Micah's Message look forward to the child born in Bethlehem *by Lester Amann*

Why is the news so full of depressing stories? Why can't they report some good news for a change? Indeed, our world is always full of troubles, and we may wonder if better times will ever come.

Similar comments might have been directed at many of the Old Testament prophets who nearly always said negative and gloomy things. The people of Micah's day had many problems. They were surrounded by warring nations and peace in their time was unlikely.

It was Micah's task, as God's messenger, to tell the people how it was and how it was going to be, no matter how painful the facts. Micah was deeply concerned with the social ills of his day and spoke out against false prophets who were leading the people into contrived hopes and errors.

Micah was quite forthright. He announced that God would punish the people for their sinfulness and their enemies would overcome them. Micah came with bad news and there seemed no end to his reprimands and denouncements.

But in the desert was an oasis. Amidst his descriptions of imminent pain and suffering, Micah looked forward to a time of peace with freedom from injustice, fear and war. Micah delivered God's promise that from Bethlehem there would come a ruler to free them from their oppression. Their Saviour would come. (Micah 5:2)

Of course, Micah's hearers did not understand about the Babe at Bethlehem, but they were told to stand firm in their faith no matter what troubles or disasters would befall them. They were to look forward to their deliverance, whenever that would be.

Amidst Micah's attack on the deplorable actions of leaders and the nation's wrong values and behaviour, he gave hope that God was with them in the failures and difficulties. Only God could take them through their troubles to a place of peace.

Micah's message still stands for us today. God wants us to mend our wilful ways; to correct bad attitudes and behaviour; to strive for heaven's values of justice, peace, equality, love and harmony.

As we approach a New Year, we would do well to respond to Micah's words: *What does the Lord require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God.* (Micah 6:8)

25th December - Where did Christmas stockings come from?

No one is really sure, but a story is told of St Nicholas, a bishop who lived in the 4th century, who may have started the custom by accident. St Nicholas was of a wealthy family, and of a generous heart. As Christmas approached one year, he wanted to help a poor family whom he knew, but he did not want them to know it was him. So, he climbed up on their roof on Christmas Eve and dropped some coins down the chimney.



The next morning the coins, to the great surprise of the family, were found in the stockings of the ladies, who had hung them to dry by the fire the night before. Every year after that they put their stockings out, in the hope that some more money would fall into them. They told the story of this amazing appearance to their friends and neighbours, and the custom caught on.

25th December - Why was Jesus born in a barn?



Our pretty Christmas cards do not do it justice – the stable that Jesus was born in would have been smelly, dirty, and full of mess. So why did God not provide something better for His beloved Son? Why let Joseph and Mary scrounge around until they ended up in a smelly stable?

Perhaps because the King of Kings being born in a foul stable is a perfect picture of redemption. Jesus came from glory into a world filled with the dirt, filth and darkness of sin. And Jesus was not put off by darkness in the least – instead, He came to be the Light of the World. Thank God for His unspeakable gift. No wonder the angels sang *“Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men.”* (Luke 2:14)

All in the month of December

75 years ago, on 25th Dec 1950 the Stone of Scone, the coronation stone of British monarchs, was taken from Westminster Abbey in London by four Scottish students. They transported it to Scotland but broke it. It was later returned to London and used in the coronation of Queen Elizabeth II. Since 1996 it has been kept in Edinburgh Castle, with the agreement that it will be transported to Westminster Abbey when needed for coronations.

70 years ago, on 1st Dec 1955 African American civil rights activist Rosa Parks refused to give up her bus seat to a white man in Montgomery Alabama. This violated the city's racial segregation laws, and led to the Montgomery Bus Boycott (5th to 20th Dec 1956) and the birth of the modern American civil rights movement.

70 years ago, on 20th Dec 1955 Cardiff was proclaimed capital of Wales.

65 years ago, on 9th Dec 1960- first episode of Coronation Street on ITV

60 years ago, on 22nd Dec 1965 Richard Dimbleby, journalist and radio-television broadcaster, died. The BBC's first war correspondent, he was one of the greatest figures in British broadcasting history. Father of the TV presenters David Dimbleby and Jonathan Dimbleby.

40 years ago, on 2nd Dec 1985 Philip Larkin, poet and librarian died.

30 years ago, on 22nd Dec 1995 the British 'rogue trader' Nick Leeson was jailed for six and a half years in Singapore for fraudulent financial dealings which had led to the fall of Barings Bank.

30 years ago, on 8th Dec 1995 Head teacher Philip Lawrence was stabbed to death outside his west London school while trying to protect a student who was being assaulted by a gang of youths.

30 years ago, on 15th Dec the European Council announced that the new European currency would be called the Euro

10 years ago, on 19th Dec 2015 Jimmy Hill, football player, manager and host of the BBC football TV series *Match of the Day* (1973-88) died.

Jane Austen – still loved 250 years later

It was 250 years ago, on 16th December 1775, that novelist Jane Austen was born. Over 30 million copies of her books have since been sold – 7000 in her lifetime.

She was the second daughter and seventh child of the Revd George Austen, rector of the village of Steventon in Hampshire. Two of her brothers became clergymen, two were Admirals in the Royal Navy and the other inherited substantial estates in Kent and Hampshire from a distant cousin. Neither Jane nor her sister Cassandra, with whom she was very close, ever married.

Jane had a sincere Christian faith which deepened as she got older and is reflected in her novels. She had sympathy with hands-on evangelicalism and a desire to abolish the slave trade, which she refers to particularly in *Mansfield Park*.

She lived at Steventon for 25 years and then moved with her parents and sister to Bath. Her father died in 1805, and they moved to Southampton and then Chawton in Hampshire, less than 20 miles from Steventon, where they had a cottage – now a Jane Austen museum. This cottage was where she devoted herself to writing, revising her first three novels and composing another three.

But it was here that she fell ill and died in 1817 – probably from Addison's Disease. She had been published only anonymously in her lifetime, and her style was not immediately appreciated, though its comments on the world of the landed gentry, to which she belonged, quickly became popular – as did her wit, irony and her realistic plots.

She is now more popular than ever, with a flourishing Jane Austen Society which has worldwide membership, plus numerous film and TV adaptations of her work.

There are some gaps in what we know about her private life, mainly because her sister Cassandra destroyed most of her letters.

The epitaph by her brother James on her tomb in Winchester Cathedral praises the *“extraordinary endowments of her mind”*.



25th December - Why the world was ready for Christmas

Ever wonder why Jesus was born when He was? The Bible tells us that *“when the time had fully come, God sent forth His Son...”* The Jewish people had been waiting for their Messiah for centuries. Why did God send Him precisely when He did?

Many biblical scholars believe that the *‘time had fully come’* for Jesus because of the politics of the time. The Roman Empire's sheer size and dominance had achieved something unique in world history: the opportunity for travel from Bethlehem to Berwick on Tweed without ever crossing into ‘enemy territory’ or needing a ‘passport’.

For the first time ever, it was possible for ‘common’ people to travel wide and far, and quickly spread news and ideas. And

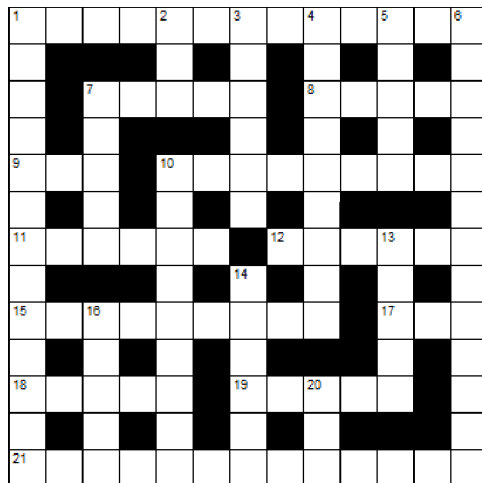
all you needed were two languages - Greek to the east of Rome, and Latin to the west and north. You could set sail from Joppa (Tel Aviv) and head for any port on the Mediterranean sea and Roman roads ran straight and true throughout the empire.

So, the Roman Empire achieved something it never intended: it helped spread news of Christianity far and wide for 400 years. After that, the Empire crumbled, and the borders shut down. Not until the 19th century would people again roam so freely. The time for Jesus to be born, and for news of Him to be able to travel, had indeed *‘fully come’*.

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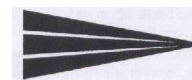
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
