

## **VIEW FROM THE VICARAGE**

## Dear All,

One of the nice gifts I've been given during my time in Ryhope is a bird bath. It's great because I can look out of the kitchen window and see the birds washing themselves and having a drink. I also have a bird feeder, so they get something to eat too. So, there's been times when the garden just outside the kitchen window has been a hive of activity. Birds of all sorts come and go and it's great to see them. But that's when I remember to feed them and change the water. Sometimes I can get so distracted that I forget about the birds for weeks at a time. And it takes all the birds to disappear before I'm brought back to my senses. I think to myself, 'Where have all the birds gone?' And then I remember that I haven't done my duty by them, and they've gone somewhere else where they might be better served. Or perhaps something worse has happened to them.

I remember once reading a website about best practice when it comes to feeding birds. It suggested feeding them everyday and replenishing their water. Apparently, birds are creatures of habit and develop a dependency on us. So, failing to deliver the goods can be more than an inconvenience to them. It can be like losing a lifeline. Maybe I need to buck up my ideas.

If birds can develop a dependence upon us, it's also the case with our fellow human beings. People, as well as birds, also depend upon us for their daily bread. Of course, that's obvious with regards to our families. But we have wider social responsibilities too.

Jesus has a parable all about this. It's the Parable of the Rich Man and Lazarus. For your information, this is the only story that Jesus tells where one of the characters has a name. Lazarus means 'God has helped' which is just as well as no one else helps him in the story.

The story goes that there is a rich man who feasts sumptuously every day. And every day Lazarus sits begging at his gate, just hoping that some of the rich man's scraps might fall from his table. Well, just as I can be oblivious to those birds, the Rich man is also oblivious to Lazarus, who eventually dies and is taken away by angels to be with Abraham. The Rich man also dies and finds himself in Hades, maybe because of his lack of generosity to Lazarus. In the afterlife the tables have turned: Lazarus is comforted for all the pains he had endured while the Rich man is in agony. Perhaps the story would have been different if the Rich man had had his eyes opened to the plight of Lazarus in his midst.

Really, Jesus is telling this story against us. The poor are always with us and sometimes they are nearer than we think. But are we aware of them? Or are our minds preoccupied with other things? Sometimes our own problems make us oblivious to the needs of others. In many ways we can be like the

Rich man.

Last year I spent some nights in Glasgow. I went for a walk past Troon Church. Outside there's a bench on which is seated the statue of a homeless man. He looks like the sort of person that people would walk past regularly. But closer inspection reveals his identity. It's Jesus himself. It's there to remind us that what we do to the least of our brothers and sister we also do to him. And that includes being oblivious to them.

May God gives us eyes to see the needs of others in our midst.

The 106th Archbishop of Canterbury since Saint Augustine arrived in Kent from Rome in 597, Bishop Sarah will be the first woman to hold the office. She will be installed in a service at Canterbury Cathedral in March 2026.


## Licensing service at Durham Cathedral and Authorisation as a Lay Minister of The Word.

## Is There a Spiritual Revival Going on Among Our Young People?

A leading Roman Catholic professor of Pastoral Theology at the University of Vienna thinks that this may well be so. For the Revd Paul Zulehner says that while Church is still losing young people, it is also gaining them.

"We're clearly witnessing a protest against mainstream secularisation, as groups of youngsters yearn for re-spiritualisation or re-enchantment. Many are looking for meaning beyond material success, when such perceptions have become enfeebled in our pluralistic societies."

Professor Zulehner was speaking to the Church Times after the recent Roman Catholic Church's Jubilee of Youth, which attracted a million-strong gathering in Rome, led by Pope Leo XIV.

Meanwhile, in Britain, Youth for Christ, an international evangelical youth ministry, has reported that weekly church attendance by young people had doubled from four to eight percent in five years. YFC said that half of young people were now declaring a belief in God, and 96 per cent express an openness to "supernatural experience".

The report also said that the number of younger people claiming to pray regularly had also increased sharply, although it is still small. 65 per cent said that they now viewed churches "positively", compared with just eight per cent in 2020 — defying "every prediction about declining religious engagement".

Professor Zulehner added that while many young people are sceptical about institutional Churches, they have found a "medium and language" through social media for sharing their religious interests.

He told Church Times: "Gospel influences are at work through Instagram, TikTok, and the networks today's youngsters rely on, which may ultimately prove as important in finding followers for Christ as the Church's leaders and traditions."

## Families are living in 'daily anxiety' about finances, says Christians Against Poverty

Many parents on low incomes are worried about how they will cope financially this winter.

A recent report from CAP, Child Poverty: Insights into the real challenges families across the UK are facing, found that "the weight of responsibility and pressure to provide for children is a heavy burden" for many, and that "parents sometimes go without, so their children have what they need."

One of CAP's clients, Nicole, admits that "I used to have to skip meals sometimes so they could eat, and I'd just have some of the leftovers. Being in debt takes over your life. A lot of anxiety comes with it. I used to have physical panic attacks."

CAP's policy and public-affairs manager, Juliette Flach, says: "Families and single parents' financial situations and incomes can change significantly over time. Job loss, a relationship breakdown, or health issues can all mean some parents who could once afford the basics for their children may no longer be able to." \_

### Church-run bereavement course having 'profound and wide-reaching impact'

A church-run bereavement course is having a "profound and wide-reaching impact on adults of all ages," according to a recent independent evaluation.

The Bereavement Journey, run by the Christian charity AtaLoss, is "addressing a national need for bereavement support", and is "ideal for the significant majority — 85-90 per cent — of bereaved people who do not require or will not benefit from a clinical intervention".

AtaLoss was founded in 2016 by the Revd Yvonne Tulloch, a former Canon for Mission at Coventry Cathedral, whose husband died suddenly in 2008. She says: "We are a society where people have grown up not expecting death and where we have lost the art of support."

The course is made up of seven sessions of films and peer-group discussion. It is currently being run by churches in more than 400 communities across the UK.

## **Looking at God**

#### The Friend at Midnight

As we remember St Luke this month, let's note that one of the major themes in his gospel is prayer. Jesus tells the Parable of the Friend at Midnight (<u>Luke 11:5-8</u>) in the context of teaching His disciples to pray (1).

#### **Pray Shamelessly:**

In the parable a man approaches his friend at midnight and asking: 'Friend, lend me three loaves, for a friend of mine has arrived on a journey, and I have nothing to set before him' (5-6). Despite the hour, the rules of hospitality mean that this is not an unreasonable request. Jesus says, 'though he will not get up and give him anything because he is his friend, yet because of the man's boldness he will rise and give him whatever he needs' (8). Jesus is telling us to approach our heavenly Father in 'shameless boldness' with our needs. As adopted children we should have no hesitancy in coming to talk with our Father. It is not God who is reluctant to answer, but we to ask. Do we pray with shameless boldness?

#### **Pray Persistently:**

Like children we should be persistent in our requests: 'Ask, and it will be given to you; seek, and you will find; knock, and it will be opened to you.' (9). All three verbs indicate a continual habit: 'Keep on asking...seeking...knocking'. We will not be content simply to ask once and then move on. Jesus tells us to bring our prayers to God persistently. Do we give up too easily in prayer?

#### **Pray Expectantly:**

'For everyone who asks receives, and the one who seeks finds, and to the one who knocks it will be opened.' (10). Are we expectant in our prayers, believing that God delights in meeting our requests? Why not begin this adventure of prayer today!



# What's the Big Idea? An Introduction to the Books of the New Testament: Galatians

Canon Paul Hardingham continues his series on the books of the Bible

'Paul's letter to the <u>Galatians</u> has been described as the 'Magna Carta of Christian Liberty', because it emphasises the freedom that we have through faith in Jesus Christ. Paul vigorously defends the truth that people are justified ('made right with God') by faith in Jesus Christ alone. Our standing with God is not determined by what we do, but by dependence on what Christ has done.

It is generally believed that Paul wrote this letter in 48/9AD to the churches in the southern area of Galatia, which he planted on his first missionary journey. It was written before the Council of Jerusalem (Acts 15), making it the earliest of Paul's letters.

In response, Paul defends his apostolic authority and presents the true gospel, by emphasising the unique importance of Christ and His cross in salvation. He argues that 'a person is justified not by the works of the law but through faith in Jesus Christ' (2:16). He appeals especially to the examples of Abraham (3:6-9) and Hagar and Sarah (4:21-31), who stand in contrast as being a 'slave' under the law and 'free' in Christ.

'It is for freedom that Christ has set us free. Stand firm, then, and do not let yourselves be burdened again by a yoke of slavery.' (5:1). We are justified through faith alone and it is by faith alone that we live out our new life in the freedom of the Spirit.



## The Nicene Creed part 5: The Person of the Holy Spirit

Our series on the Nicene Creed continues this month.

Canon Paul Hardingham considers a bedrock of our Christian belief:

that Jesus is the Son of God

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son He is worshipped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets.

This month we are considering what the Nicene Creed says about the Holy Spirit.

'We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life': The original version of the Nicene Creed ended simply 'We believe in the Holy Spirit.' However, the phrase 'the Lord, the giver of life' was added to counter the teachings of Macedonius (Bishop of Constantinople), who viewed the Holy Spirit as a creation of the Son. The Holy Spirit is part of the Trinity who shapes us, according to Christ's image, through His fruit and gifts: 'the Spirit gives life...we are being transformed into His image with everincreasing glory, which comes from the Lord, who is the Spirit.' (2 Corinthians 3:6,18).



'who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son He is worshipped and glorified': In the late 6th century the Latin churches added the phrase 'and the Son' (the Filioque Clause), which was rejected by the Orthodox Churches. Augustine described the Spirit as 'love proceeding' from the Father and the Son, so we can know God: 'When the Advocate comes, whom I will send to you from the Father, the Spirit of truth who goes out from the Father, He will testify about me.' (John 15:26).

The Creed is clear that the Holy Spirit is due equal status and worship with the Father and the Son, as a distinct divine person: 'May the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God, and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you all.' (2 Corinthians 13:14).

'He has spoken through the Prophets': Why does the Creed include this activity of the Spirit? It is not just referring to the OT prophets, but the whole of Scripture. He has inspired Scripture, so that we have God's word communicated by human writers: 'All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness' (2 Timothy 3:16). When we read the Bible, the Spirit enables us to hear what God is saying to us.

## **Looking at The Church**



#### **Share a Little Light this Halloween**

Some parents aren't sure quite what to feel about Hallowe'en – is it just harmless fun, or are there aspects of it that don't fit in with how we want to see the world?

A child's christening service is very honest about the reality of good and evil, and Hallowe'en can be a good time to talk about those things and how the love of Jesus can be a 'Light in the darkness' for everyone.

The word 'hallowe'en' actually means 'the eve of all hallows' day' – in other words, the night before the church's festival celebrating All Saints. A Saint is sometimes thought to be an exceptionally holy person – someone really special, who did extraordinary things because of their faith in God.

The famous saints are all amazing examples of what it's like to live God's way. But in the Bible, St Paul calls all Christians saints – a saint is simply a friend of God, who seeks to live their life according to God's purposes. When someone is christened, they truly become a Saint, so All Saints' Day is a celebration of the whole family of God.

If you'd like to mark Hallowe'en, these are some ideas that will bless others as well as being fun too.

What's happening in church? Some churches hold special events around this time of year. There might be a 'Light Party' with fun activities for children and young people – these events are a lovely way to focus on all that's life-giving and positive around All Hallows.

Some churches also have a special service for All Souls Day – a time when we remember our loved ones who have died. There might be an opportunity to go and light a candle to remember someone – even small children grieve in their own way and may find comfort in this simple action.





Carve a pumpkin. Did you know that gargoyles (the scary looking faces carved in stone on churches) were originally made in medieval times to scare away evil spirits? The pumpkins with scary faces carved into them at Hallowe'en are a bit like that.

But Christians believe that you can't fight evil with evil – you can only fight evil with good, and that good will always win in the end. So why not see if you can carve a friendly looking pumpkin this year, as a sign that you and your family are going to be a force for good this Hallowe'en? (And you can always use the offcuts from your pumpkin to make delicious soup!)

You can do the same with Hallowe'en costumes. Superheroes make a great, positive alternative to scary witches and ghosts.

Give a treat. Not everyone is comfortable with the idea of children going round to neighbours' and just asking for treats. But if you don't want them to miss out on something their friends are doing, why not have a family baking session, and take a tray of cookies with you if you go out with them? Even little children can help stick a smiley face on an iced biscuit. That way, you have something lovely to give away to your neighbours, too!

Safety first. Many children's fancy dress costumes are highly flammable. Please, don't ever use real candles around your front door or in your pumpkins; use the small battery-powered candles instead. If you can afford to buy a multi-pack of these electric candles, you could lend them to your friends and neighbours.

Say a goodnight prayer. Even if you've steered clear of scary costumes, and even if your child has loved the evening, it can be reassuring to have a goodnight prayer that reminds them that love, and light, and good, are always going to be stronger than fear and evil.



The ancient service of Compline (Night Prayer) has been used as this reminder for centuries, and many of its prayers are still well known today:

Visit this place, O Lord,
we pray and drive far from it all snares of the enemy;
let Your holy angels dwell with us to preserve us in peace;
and let Your blessing be upon us always,
through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Amen.

Or, in a simpler children's version:


Be with us, Lord, and take away all fear, may your angels protect us and give us peace.

And bless us always.

Amen.

You can use these lovely prayers any time when you need a reminder that God is with you – especially at the end of a difficult day, or when something sad has happened, or when your family is worried about something.

## **God in The Sciences**

#### **Continuing the Celebration!**

Dr Ruth Bancewiczis, based at The Faraday Institute for Science and Religion in Cambridge, writes on the positive relationship between Science and Christian faith.

On 6<sup>th</sup>-13<sup>th</sup> October this year many people around the world will be celebrating the Jewish festival of Tabernacles, or Sukkot. They will celebrate the Harvest, and also remember God bringing the Israelites out of Egypt and through 40 years in the desert.

The biblical book of <u>Deuteronomy</u> contains a description of what Tabernacles should have been like back then. "Celebrate... for seven days. Be joyful... you, your sons and daughters, your male and female servants, and the Levites, the foreigners, the fatherless and the widows who live in your towns."


These festivals were not just a celebration, but also an expression of gratitude to God: "celebrate the festival to the Lord your God...For the Lord your God will bless you in all your harvest and in all the work of your hands, and your joy will be complete." Tabernacles was a proper holiday, with two whole days off normal work and seven days of feasting.

Farming looks very different today. Very few of us have had to sweat long hours over crops, so we're not as ready for (or deserving of) a rest and a party as our ancestors were at this time of year. That might be even more the case in future, as the agri-tech revolution unfolds. For example, small autonomous tractors are already becoming available that do less damage to the soil and make better use of steep or oddly shaped fields.

Many arable farms already hire contractors to do the routine work with large specialist GPS-equipped machinery. In future years those people might find themselves using very different kinds of high-tech kit, acting more as land-management advisors, helping farmers to gather data and to find ways of improving soil quality, biodiversity and the water cycle.

I'm very grateful for the food that arrives on my shelves. Instead of worrying about whether or not we earned it, our modern-day Tabernacles or Harvest celebration could include ways of encouraging those involved in agriculture and developing new agricultural technologies, as well as enjoying how we can learn about and benefit from God's creation through Science.

So, after you celebrate Harvest at church, why not follow it up with a trip to a local farm this month? Why not learn from the ancient Israelites, and follow it up with a meal together? It stands to reason that those of us who live in countries where food is plentiful and cheap could do with being proportionately more generous in our gratitude and giving. Should we throw better parties? Probably!

More than 80 groups have ceased meeting. Of fourteen churches only a few remain.

Ming who was detained and badly beaten was threatened not to aVend any further church meetings is now missing and open doors partner's cannot find him. Lord Jesus we pray for Ming. #### in Jesus most precious name, Amen.

Wayne's personal battle with homelessness began in 2019, when violence and racism drove him from his home in Northeast London. With nowhere safe to go his benefits ceased and he was forced into rough sleeping.

Determined to help others he connected with aid organisations and gathered together a team of Christian activists to petition the government. Only for them to tell him that homelessness couldn't be solved even within a decade. However along came COVID and everyone was magically cleared off the streets so it can indeed be done if the will is there to do it.

In 2021 a family tragedy sent Wayne over seas, when he returned he stayed with his sister in Sheffield. He felt a calling to Advocacy work. He has since developed counselling and evangelism programs helping individuals to navigate services. He continues to move between sofa surfing and rough sleeping.

In faith he urges the public to step up and push for real change because government approach isn't working. He is an inspired young man driven by faith to help those that can't help themselves.

May God bless him in all that he does for others.

May we work together in the strength and direction of the Lord to love one another as he has loved us.

I don't want to use the space I've been blessed with to overshare and complain, but let's just say it's been a difficult time recently. I've been grieving the unexpected loss of a family pet, as well as a few other stresses that sometimes seem unending. It hasn't been the easiest to deal with, and it's definitely taken a toll on me and my faith journey. I want to strongly emphasise here: my faith is solid. I believe with all my heart that Jesus Christ is Lord and died on the cross to save whoever believes in him from death and eternal damnation. I believe that he saved me, and I will carry that belief for the rest of my life. But even Jesus never promised that journey to be easy.

I'm not sure if I have a 'favourite' Bible verse anymore, but this one has been speaking to me recently:

'But those who hope in the LORD will renew their strength. They will soar on wings like eagles; they will run and not grow weary, they will walk, and not be faint.'

<u>Isaiah 40:31</u>.


This verse has become increasingly poignant over the last few weeks. I first came across the verse whilst watching a YouTube video that had nothing to do with Christianity at all, but the creator of the video chose to show the verse at the very end of it. That itself filled me with hope, as it's incredible to see that faith can be implemented so subtly into the most random things and have such a lasting effect. This verse definitely had a lasting effect on me, as I decided to write it on the back of my shirt whilst doing a charity walk for Parkinson's UK last month. During that walk, I remembered my Grandad, who suffered for the last three years of his life with Parkinson's, before his passing in late 2023. Although he kept his religious views private for the most part, he was a man of strong faith, and he wasn't afraid to let people know his standing when the moment called for it. When I was a kid, I used to think my Grandad's faith in God was a bit stupid. Today, his faith is the first thing I think of when I remember him, and it's now one of the things I admire most about him. Looking back at the time when he was ill, I find the verse above to be so fitting to him. I'm sure that, as stoic as he was, there were many moments in that time where his only sense of hope came from the Lord. In the Gospels, Jesus healed a woman who was herself suffering, telling her that her faith had made her well. I firmly believe that to be true for my Grandad; his faith has made him free of his suffering, and he is now with Jesus and will never grow weary again. 30 So why am I bringing all this up? Well, the simple answer is this: my Grandad was a stronger man than I'll ever be, and even he will have had his moments of despair. I try to write these articles with a message of hope, but how can you find hope when you're feeling hopeless yourself? Well, as I said before, Jesus never promised that life would be easy, but here's something he did promise:

'For I know the plans I have for you, declares the LORD, plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future.'

Jeremiah 29:11.

Sometimes it's easy to think that you'll never feel better, that it's just one thing after another and you can never catch a break, but that's only half true. It might be one thing after another, and it might feel like you can't catch a break, but it will get better. It absolutely will! If this is any glimpse of how you're feeling, you may be damaged, but you're not done. Not by a long shot. God wants you here for a reason, and that reason is to build you up into who He's created you to be. Give your worries and problems to Him in prayer and watch how He works in your life. It might not always be an easy road, but it's a road that's worth it in the end.

So yeah, I'm alright. Things are going to get better. My hope is in the Lord. He has a plan for me, and I'm certainly not done yet! Neither are you.

#### **Victims and Survivors**

Victims and survivors experience the timeliness and quality of Church bodies' responses to disclosures, and their subsequent support, as positively meeting their needs, including their search for justice and helping their healing process.

# Learning, Supervision and Support

All those engaged in safeguarding related activity in Church bodies receive the type and level of learning, professional development, support and supervision necessary to respond to safeguarding situations, victims and survivors, and respondents, effectively.

#### WHAT ARE THE STANDARDS?

- Broad statements of what the Church of England wants to achieve in its safeguarding work.
- Each one has several 'What Good Looks Like' Indicators, to identify strengths as well as areas for development.
- They are constructive development of good safeguarding practice, NOT a compliance-based exercise.
- The Standards and their indicators have been developed over a three-year period, working with dioceses, cathedrals, parishes and victims and survivors.
- They were approved nationally in 2023.
