

### THE REVD KAYODE OYEBODE WRITES

Dear Friends,

As I write this letter for our Winter edition — my first Christmas with you as Priest of St Barnabas — my heart is filled with gratitude. These first



few months and blessings. My wife and I have been deeply moved by your warmth, generosity, and faithfulness, all of which shine through so clearly in the life of this parish.

When I first read the Parish Profile during the interview process for this present role, three qualities stood out as some of the best things about St Barnabas:

- A strong sense of family embracing, encompassing and compassionate.
- A deep appreciation for tradition.
- A genuinely warm welcome.

Having now experienced parish life first-hand, I can say that all three are absolutely true!

The Profile also mentioned three key challenges:

- Finances.
- Vision for the future.
- Engaging more young people and families.

These remain real challenges — as they are for many churches today — but I firmly believe that, with God's help, we shall overcome. Has He not already met us at our point of need? The progress made with our Church Roof and renovation projects is a wonderful reminder of God's faithfulness and your generous support.

In time, as we develop our shared vision and seek to attract younger families, I am confident we will see fresh growth. With my background in HR, Learning and Development, and my passion for people and pastoral ministry — and, I hope, a sense of humour along the way! — I look forward to working with you all in a spirit of collaboration and creativity. Together we can continue to discover new and better ways to make a positive difference in our church and community.

I want to express heartfelt thanks to everyone with no exception — from the PCC and those who serve faithfully in the sanctuary, to our talented friend who leads us in the Gloria even when there is no choir, to those who make tea, arrange flowers, clean, visit, and pray. Every act of service, whether seen or unseen, helps to build up the Body of Christ here in Sutton. As St Paul reminds us, "We are all one body, and each member belongs to all the others" [Romans 12:5]. Truly, we are stronger together.

I have also come to appreciate St Barnabas' traditional "middle of the road" style of worship — it resonates deeply with my own background, even though we remain open to exploring other forms of worship where appropriate.

Our "Bible Stories for Children" group, organised by a dedicated member of the Mothers' Union and a team of volunteers, is such a blessing. My hope is that it will continue to grow and expand to serve a wider range of ages in the months ahead. Likewise, as we develop, I would love to see a return of regular Evensong — perhaps once or twice a month — providing another opportunity for reflection and prayer.

To encourage shared creativity, I plan to introduce "brainstorming sessions" at PCC meetings, and eventually at parish-wide gatherings, perhaps every six months. This will give us a chance to generate new ideas and explore together how we can strengthen our ministry and mission.

Of course, this winter brings its own challenges for many — rising costs, uncertainty, and pressures that weigh on hearts and minds. Some are feeling the strain financially, emotionally, or simply

trying to keep going day by day. Into that reality comes the light of Advent and Christmas — not to deny the darkness, but to proclaim that "The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it" [John 1:5].

That light is Christ Himself — born in simplicity, sharing our humanity, walking beside us still. His coming among us is God's declaration that we are never forgotten, never abandoned, and always loved. As Jesus said to Zacchaeus, "Today salvation has come to this house" [Luke 19:9]. That same message of grace and renewal is offered to each of us this Christmas, no matter how weary we may feel.

Advent calls us to wait with hope — hope that God is at work even in difficult times; hope that kindness and community can make a difference; hope that love, God's love, will always have the final word. So let us continue to encourage one another, care for our neighbours, and keep our eyes on the Christ-child who comes to bring peace.

As we prepare to celebrate through our Advent and Christmas services — from the Christingle and Carol Service to the joyful Eucharist on Christmas Day — may we rediscover the deep joy of Emmanuel: "God with us."

Thank you once again for your prayers, your support, and your patience as I continue to settle into ministry here at St Barnabas. It is a great privilege to share this journey of faith with you, and I look forward with hope and expectation to all that God will do among us in the coming year.

May "the peace of God, which passes all understanding, guard your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus" [Philippians 4:7] and may His light guide your path through these winter days and always.

### COMING OUT OF THE INTERREGNUM

During our Interregnum, we were blessed with lots of different, interesting and helpful clergy taking communion services and baptisms including the Revds Charles Cotton who took 9 services, Anne Doerr who took 12 services and was, as well, a

great help to our Churchwardens and John Burnistan who took five unusual (at least for us) services, with three sermons about the Creed and getting us to learn new choruses and doing things differently.

The Revd Anne Doerr returned to St Barnabas on Sunday 14th September as Kayode had already accepted a prior engagement that day before he was appointed to St Barnabas. The opportunity was taken to present Anne with some flowers as a token of our thanks to her for all her help and encouragement during our interregnum.



On his last service, on St Bartholomew's Day, on the last Sunday before the Revd Kayode Oyebode was licenced, **the Revd John Burnistan** gave a 10 part sermon on our new priest based on John 1. vv 45-51 where, when referring to where Jesus came from, Bartholomew, also known as Nathaniel, said, "Can anything good come out of Nazareth?

- 1. We should not be prejudiced that our new priest comes from Nigeria with its different culture.
- 2. The Revd Kayode needs to get to know the congregation and the whole parish personally.
- 3. We must change and be new people for Kayode.

- 4. We should welcome new people and be conscious that parts of our services may seem to them strange and out of date. (*Editor's Note*: As a congregation we have always tried to be welcoming.)
- 5. We are often judged by the smallest details. On the Memorial Chapel reredos is a painting of angels in the colours of the nations defeated in the First World War flanked by attendants wearing the cross of St George. It was painted in 1920, clearly a way of embracing reconciliation after such a terrible ordeal. Hope for the future depends on a willingness to heal memories of the past.



- 6. Make sure everyone can hear the voice of God at St Barnabas.
- 7. Make sure the church continues to be a pleasant place, in good repair, clean with nice toilets and a servery.
- 8. Ask God for his power to strengthen us when we are exhausted.
- 9. Be able to talk candidly, resistance to ideas should not tear us apart. Learning how to disagree is crucial.
- 10. Be encouraged by small successes and thank God that he has been with us over many of the last 25 testing years.

### THE LICENSING OF THE REVD KAYODE OYEBODE

On the evening of Thursday 28th August, the Revd Kayode Oyebode was licensed as Associate Priest of St Barnabas by the Revd Nicholas Peacock, Acting Archdeacon of Reigate, on behalf of the Bishop of Southwark.

The church was packed with members of St Barnabas. Kayode's family, local clergy and members of the churches where Kayode had been taking services recently. Our two Churchwardens, Sallys Bramdaw and Reed were there with their staves! They only carry




them when the bishop or one of his representatives is present.

A fitting beginning to a new era.




### FISH AND CHIPS QUIZ

### PEACE DOVES IN SOUTHWARK CATHEDRAL

During August and until 12<sup>th</sup> September, 'Peace Doves', an extraordinary installation created by internationally acclaimed sculptor Peter Walker was hung in the nave of Southwark Cathedral. The impactful installation featured more than 11,000 paper doves decorated with messages of peace, each representing a piece of a greater call for peace, making this installation a truly unique experience; some of the doves had been made on a Sunday earlier this year by children during 'Bible Stories for Children' and others by members of the St Barnabas congregation on VE Day.

The Dean of Southwark, Mark Oakley said spending time with the installation had a distilling effect as it asked people to look up, to

look beyond themselves and the destruction that can happen and to instead seek harmony, beauty and a shared future shaped by peaceful relationships and justice.

There were some special late night viewings when there was an opportunity for people to immerse themselves in the atmosphere of the Cathedral as day turned to dusk.



### **WHAT A START**

Sutton SchoolsWork is a local charity which the St Barnabas Charity of the Month regularly supports each year. It supports the provision of collective worship in Sutton's schools to increase the much needed knowledge and understanding of the Christian faith among our local children and young people which, in some cases, they will not otherwise ever receive. It employs two full-time schools' workers, one working in Sutton's primary schools and the other in Sutton's secondary schools. Their work includes Bible based assemblies and Religious Education lessons. Simon Ellingham, its director writes-

I cannot even begin to describe how exciting this academic year has been so far. I'll try, of course, but I don't think I've ever felt so positive about what God is doing in our schools. Maisie and Abby have kicked off in the primary schools with a bang. They had an amazing start to the new academic year with the new workshops now starting to take place in primary schools and 40 schools already booked in for primary assemblies

The most important thing to tell you about secondary schools is that we have given out, to people actually asking for one, over 200 New Testaments! I've delivered a session on a topic, and then invited all present to help themselves on the way out to a NT, but to only take it if they want to read it. I've specifically warned pupils not to do so if they have no intention of opening it up. And then they fly off the tabletop! I made a quick calculation and worked out that I've spoken in front of around 290 pupils now. What a success rate.....

And not just pupils; at least 3 teachers have taken one, and I've had one of them telling me about their need for something to give them meaning, and they've ended up saying they'll come to my church this Sunday..... Please pray that the word of God will be opened, questioned, examined and understood, and then accepted.

I've started my Knife Crime and County Lines series at Oaks Park, and, once again, have been delighted at the engagement of the pupils and the positive influence we can have on them to think about their choices and consequences. As a result of these sessions, we have struck up conversations about faith and I've have encouraged many of them to talk about church and even to find one to go to. Several children have approached me in the corridor as I've walked through and excitedly produced their NT telling me that they're reading it every day now.

I've delivered a Persecuted Christians lesson at Carshalton Girls, which went well as always and then watched in wonder as 5, clearly Muslim, girls picked up a NT as they left and immediately opened them.

We've delivered our annual GSUS workshop to Year 9 at Sutton Grammar, and have been delighted at the response of the boys to the message of hope found in Jesus Christ that Christians around the world know to be true.

I've booked in an entire year's worth of activity at Cheam High, Greenshaw, Oaks Park, Sutton Grammar and Carshalton Girls and I'm now trying to work out how I can possibly fit in others!

Our Christian Union groups have started up and, as always, we're finding a complete range of attendance numbers across the borough. Some are strong, with good numbers attending regularly, others have yet to really take off but we're keeping faithful in coming along, providing an opportunity for pupils to meet together to seek fellowship, encouragement, teaching and discussion. We have non-Christians attending at nearly all of them, so, please continue to pray that they will find answers to their queries.

I have spoken at Worcester Park Baptist and Wallington Baptist and been overwhelmed by the support for our work. At both venues, I had people approach me to offer their time and prayer, and I always come away from these times refreshed, invigorated and encouraged to keep going. We are visiting Sutton Vineyard and Cheam Baptist to let more know about our work.

So, please pray for:-

**Oaks Park** as I finish my County Lines series and that we may now find a way of starting a CU. Also, that the teacher who wanted to find an answer to their spirituality questions might find faith in Jesus, and settle into a church.

**Cheam High** as I commence the Knife Crime and County Lines sessions, offering NTs out as part of the workshop.

**Greenshaw, Carshalton Girls and Sutton Grammar** as we plan towards our new range of lessons.

**Carshalton Boys** as we find a new venue for our CU as the library is no longer suitable.

**And all of our Christian Unions**: Greenshaw, Overton Grange, Cheam High, Carshalton Girls, Carshalton Boys & Sutton Grammar – that, at each one, pupils may find a safe place to talk, ask and discover.

Thank you for your continued prayers. Without them we would be so, so much less than we are able, through the grace of God, to be.

# **LOVE MATTERS**

This is the fourth in our series on the Report of the Archbishops' Commission on Families and Households.



# 4. THINK CHILDREN & YOUNG PEOPLE

Every child should be valued, loved and supported to flourish from the moment of conception, through childhood and beyond. Christian teaching places emphasis on starting children off on the right path in life, respecting their vulnerability and fostering trust. The vast majority of parents want to do the best for their children but this is not always easy. Parents usually need help and this requires close collaboration between home, school, church and the community.

Adverse child experiences (ACEs), such as parental conflict, domestic abuse, mental illness, substance abuse and poverty, are associated with poor child outcomes. These are more prevalent among families who are poor, isolated or living in deprived circumstances. Certain groups of children are more at risk than others, including children born prematurely, those with a disability or complex health needs, children in care, and asylum seekers. Children and young people need to be protected from harm. Children as young as six are involved in carrying drugs as part of county lines activities. Children as young as ten access pornography.

Understanding the triggers that drive young people into criminal activities, gang culture, drugs and missing school is essential if the risks are to be addressed and safe environments provided where young people can socialise and be offered afresh beginning. Finding time to listen to children and young people,

taking their wishes, dreams, views and concerns seriously is essential if they are to be at the centre of the Church of England's vision for a younger, more diverse Church. This empowers them and builds their resources.

### WHAT THE CHURCH CAN DO

**Encourage and support** all parents in the raising of their children.

**Be alert to the needs of parents** who are struggling and children who are at risk of abuse and neglect, and provide loving, caring and non-judgmental support for mothers, fathers and carers to combat adverse childhood experiences.

Ensure a culture of openness and willingness to talk about parenting challenges, destigmatise help-seeking and promote cooperative working between faith communities, charities and local government, offering support in a kind, non-judgmental way.

Introduce programmes that support parents and children, such as the Parents' Promise, The Naked Truth, Safe Families and Home for Good in churches locally.

**Encourage and support current and prospective kinship carers, foster and adoptive parents,** and honour, celebrate and offer practical support to all those who are caring for children and young people.

Advocate for children and young people in the care system, supporting them to find caring, loving homes where they can develop a sense of security and belonging.

**Enable children to learn about relating well to each other as early as possible** in a child's life, and help children to develop skills which increase their resilience to stress and adversity.

Enable the voices of children and young people to be heard and respected, and make church buildings and open spaces safe places for children and young people, working in partnership with youth groups, local organisations, local authorities, schools, and other faith communities.

Be especially vigilant in respect of young carers in each community and find ways to support them and their families.

Walk alongside young people when they are worried or stressed, at risk of dropping out of school, or getting into criminal activities, and model kind and caring relationships.

Put children, young people and families at the heart of local mission and ministry

### THE EFFECT OF DOMESTIC ABUSE ON CHILDREN

At the October Diocesan Meeting of the Mothers' Union which was attended by members from St Barnabas, the keynote speaker was Micheline Ravololonarisoa from Madagascar and a member of St Barnabas, Mitcham Branch.

She began by explaining saying that domestic abuse is about control – how one person uses an intimate relationship to control another person, often their partner or former partner. The controlling behaviour forms a pattern, rather than being a one-off incident and, In the vast majority of cases, it is experienced by women and is perpetrated by men. The UK Government's definition is that it is "any incident of threatening behaviour, violence or abuse (psychological, physical, sexual, financial or emotional) between adults who are, or have been, intimate partners or family members, regardless of gender or sexuality."

It is very common and the statistics are shocking. More than one in four women in the UK have experienced domestic abuse since the age of 16. Refuge services in England supported an estimated 10,824 women and 12,989 children in 2022-23 and that all community-based support services supported an estimated 120,518 women and 156,673 children. However, 61% of all the referrals received in refuge services were rejected for various reasons, the main one being a lack of space or capacity.

She went on to say that domestic abuse is not just an issue between adults—it is child abuse in itself as it can have a devastating impact on the victims and their families, with children and young people at risk of serious harm to both their emotional and physical health. It undermines children's safety, development and well-being with effects that can last a lifetime if not addressed.

Short-term effects for children range from bed wetting in infants and toddlers; a drop in school performance and difficulty in

concentrating and guilt or self-blame for the abuse for school-aged children to risk-taking behaviours (alcohol, drugs, unsafe sex), aggression, truancy, or running away and withdrawal, low self-esteem and having difficulty forming friendships for teenagers.

The longer-term psychological and emotional effects can involve mental health disorders; a higher risk of anxiety, depression, PTSD, eating disorders and self-harm; and attachment and trust issues leading to difficulties in forming healthy relationships later in life, fear of intimacy or mistrust of authority figures. The cycle of abuse may lead some children to normalize abusive behaviour, increasing the risk of their becoming victims or perpetrators in adulthood. The Parent-Child Bond becomes damaged, the abuse undermines the non-abusive parent's ability to provide consistent care as their energy is consumed by survival. Coercive control may lead to children becoming manipulated or controlled by the abusive parent, creating fear and confusion. The home, which should be a sanctuary, becomes unpredictable and unsafe, eroding a child's sense of stability. In a nutshell, children who grow up in abusive households are more likely to experience domestic abuse in their own adult relationships and struggle with parenting, either becoming overprotective or replicating harmful patterns.

### What can we all do about it?

- Pray
- Bring the shocking facts to people whenever an occasion allows
- Support the Rise Up / Red Chair / 16 Days of Activism against Gender Based Violence Campaign which runs from 25<sup>th</sup> November [the International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women] to 10<sup>th</sup> December [Human Rights Day]. During this period, there will be a Red Chair on display in Church and there will be details of where victims can get help on the inside of the toilets in the Halls and the Church.

RIP Sally Steele (12<sup>th</sup> June 1951 – 24<sup>th</sup> June 2025) Sally Steele was known by many of the congregation for her work organizing Mothers' Union 'Away from It All' (AFIA) holidays for underprivileged families (she often came to talk at our annual Bring and Buys for AFIA) and her work with the Sutton Women's Refuge, including

collecting items and money to help women who had suffered from Domestic Violence. Over 300 people gathered for her funeral service at St Dunstan's, Cheam on Friday 29<sup>th</sup> August. The family, her four children and two grandchildren told us about what a wonderful Mum she was. We heard that she had been involved in Girl Guiding and Scouting (where she

met her husband), been a Barts nurse, joined choirs, been keen on amateur dramatics as well as her Mothers' Union work. There were many light hearted episodes especially jokes about her love of cheap Sainsbury's wine which is no longer produced and her bright pink fence around her home. She was buried with her husband in St Dunstan's graveyard.

After **Carole King**'s funeral on 25<sup>th</sup> April this year, her daughters dedicated an area of Woodland Trust Woodland to Carole and scattered her ashes there. They chose Stratton Woods near





Swindon, a spot roughly midway between where they live. There is a post with a plaque remembering her. It is a lovely spot and Carole loved trees and woodland. (See also Page 9).

Congratulations to Sarah Mullally, Sutton Team Rector from 2006 to 2012 whilst St Barnabas was one of the three churches which formed that team, who was appointed Archbishop of Canterbury designate on 3rd October. Her election will be confirmed on 28th January in a service at St Paul's Cathedral and this will be followed by an



Enthronement Service in Canterbury Cathedral on 25th March. At that service she will firstly be installed by the Archdeacon of Canterbury on the diocesan throne, signifying her role as Bishop of Canterbury; the Dean of Canterbury will then install her in the 13th century Chair of St. Augustine to mark her inauguration as Head of the Church of England and leader of the Anglican Communion. (Whilst, technically, the King is head of the Church of England, the person holding the role of Archbishop of Canterbury is the most senior bishop and is the spiritual leader of the Church and the worldwide Anglican Communion.)

During Sarah's six year involvement with St Barnabas, she instigated a Friday morning Mums' Bible Study Group which is now the Mothers' Union Bible Study Group and also a midweek Morning Prayer Service which is now held during Open Saturdays. Sarah also oversaw the complete electrical rewiring and major roof repairs projects at St Barnabas in 2011 and conceived the idea to re-open the South Path. She also cut the celebration cakes for the 125<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Consecration of St Barnabas Church on Sunday 29th March 2009 and the St Barnabas Big Diamond Jubilee Lunch in 2012 to mark Queen Elizabeth II's Diamond Jubilee, on both occasions using the silver trowel that had been used in 1882 when the foundation stone of the Church was laid.
