Dear Friends,

The Old and the New.

In the Church we begin the new year on Advent Sunday, which this year is 30th November. In the last few years the trend for something more than a chocolate Advent calendar for the children has developed into expensive 'treats', everything from whisky miniatures to luxury beauty products on offer. Whilst most of us enjoy the occasional treat, perhaps Advent is not the right time for this. Traditionally, Advent like Lent, is a time of fasting and prayer. A time when we can look back to what has been and prepare for what is to come.

In Advent we are, of course, preparing for the birth of a special baby — Jesus born in a stable, poor and with nothing, to earthly parents who would need to seek asylum. There are many in our world who can identify with this aspect of the Son of God's earthly beginnings. As we look back over the past year what can we do to change, in a small way, the lives of those around us and further afield? It isn't always about financial gifting, but a simple smile or 'Good morning' to a neighbour who is lonely, helping a stranger who is in need, caring for those around us, without counting the cost.

Janet Lees wrote this poem based on Isaiah 40:

The voice says 'Get ready for God!'

A Chance Encounter with Dr the Honourable Gilbert Greenall CBE

It was a Tuesday lunchtime a couple of weeks ago; I'd just completed a small task at the church hall, and I was on my way to my car. A rather well-dressed gentleman stopped me on the roadside and asked me for directions to the vicarage. He said he wanted to show his wife the inside of St John's because it had meant a lot to him and his family. I introduced myself and said that I was a church warden and that I had the keys. The gentleman introduced himself, and announced that he was Gilbert Greenall, younger brother of Lord Peter Daresbury our church Patron. As you can imagine, I was somewhat taken aback.



We then spent a delightful half hour or so wandering through St John's while Gilbert directed his wife Melisa to the several artifacts and stained-glass windows depicting memories of his family. Finally, we arrived at the inner vestry the walls of which are decorated with his families photographs and portraits. Gilbert's description of each was certainly an education for me but I doubt I'd be able to recall everything he told me; it was all too much for such an impromptu encounter.

An extract from Gilbert's very kind email to me (us) says:-

" My older brother Peter Daresbury inherited so I was free to find somewhere else to live and very happily so. We live on the Herefordshire. Gloucestershire. Worcestershire border and I am currently the Vice Lord-Lieutenant of Worcestershire. Like my grandfather and great uncle I also served in the Household Cavalry. By chance one of the previous owners of my house was a parliamentary colleague of my great-great grandfather Gilbert Greenall. I was always under the impression that it was my great grandfather who built the church but this cannot be true – his father is buried in the church yard!

I have been a lay reader for some years now at St Mary's Bromesberrow in Gloucester diocese as we have had no incumbent for the nine parish benefice for a long time. My great great uncle was rector of Grappenhall and Arch Deacon of Chester.


Please pass on my thanks to all at St. John's."

200 years ago, on 30th January 1826, Menai Straits Suspension Bridge was opened. 100 years ago, on 13th January 1926, Michael Bond, children's writer and creator of Paddington Bear, was born.

Be Still: 30 devotions for those who

feel anything but By Lucy Rycroft, BRF, £8.99

Stillness is an alien concept in today's busy world.

Communication, entertainment,

work and relationships seem accessible to us 24–7, and it can feel impossible to change the pace.

So this book is a series of reflections on the concept of being still. Made up of 30 Bible moments, it ranges from Moses leading the Israelites through the Red Sea, to the raw emotions of the Psalms, to Jesus calming the storm.

The book's aim is to help Christians living in the crazed busyness of the 21st century to discover what 'being still' looks like for us today.

Who was he?

On the 25th January Saint Paul is remembered by the Christian church. But who was he? The following article sheds some light.

January is a month of the beginning of great things! As well as the naming of the Son of God, we celebrate the conversion of the greatest ever apostle of the Christian faith. Many books have been written on Paul, and here is the briefest of introductions.

He was a Jew, born as 'Saul' at Tarsus, and brought up by the rabbi Gamaliel as a Pharisee. A devout, fanatical Jew, Saul persecuted the Christians, and watched with satisfaction the first Christian martyrdom, the stoning of Stephen. Then, on his way to Damascus, Saul had a vision of Christ that stopped him in his tracks. He realised that this Jesus whom he was persecuting was in fact the Messiah for whom he had longed.

Saul changed overnight. He was given a new name, Paul, and became an evangelist for the cause of Christ. He became a leader in the early Church, and his special calling was as an apostle to the Gentiles. He wrote epistles (*letters*) to the young churches that he founded - and thus, inadvertently, wrote a great part of the New Testament.

Life as the greatest apostle was hardly full of perks: Paul was stoned, beaten, mobbed, homeless, hated, imprisoned, and finally martyred. Tradition has it that he was beheaded in Rome during the persecution of Nero in 64AD, and buried where the basilica of St Paul 'outside the walls' now stands. His mighty faith in Christ has kindled similar belief in many hundreds of millions of people down the centuries.

Elderly and depressed this winter? Go to church.

Older people with depression can see a bigger improvement in their mental health if they start going to church than if they engage in charity work or sport.

Research from the London School of Economics found that joining a religious organisation is the best way of combatting depression. It may be both that having a faith gives benefit, and also because meeting up with other people of faith gives a sense of belonging. The LSE also found evidence that membership of some political and community organisations may have a poor impact on an older person's mental health.

And there were shepherds...

In his gospel, Luke tells how the shepherds in the fields were keeping watch over their flocks when they were terrified by the sudden arrival of heavenly angels, surrounded by the glory of the Lord. And the message of the angel that night has rung down the centuries:

"I bring you good news that will cause great joy for all the people. Today in the town of David a Saviour has been born to you; he is the Messiah, the Lord. This will be a sign to you: You will find a baby wrapped in cloths and lying in a manger." (Luke 2:10,11)

And so, the first people to greet the Saviour were not rich VIPS, but humble shepherds. And in turn, it was the shepherds who became the first evangelists: for they would have gone home to their families and neighbours that night with the amazing news of what they had seen.

Meanwhile, for Mary there followed a time of reflection. She gathered up in her mind all her impressions, and all that the shepherds had shared about the angelic visit. She knew it was treasure, and not to be squandered. Then she quietly pondered in her heart the meaning and significance of all that had happened, so that she would never forget.

Exuberant witness and quiet contemplation are not opposites. They are, in fact, good companions in the spiritual life!

So, this Christmas, let's be filled with the joy that the Saviour has also been born 'to us'. May our lives reflect the glory of His coming, even in a small way. May our interactions with friends, colleagues and families during this Advent season reflect the great joy that the angels brought that night, so long ago.

1st January - Have you ever wondered where the name 'Jesus' comes from?

The name Jesus is a transliteration of a name that occurs in several languages. It is of Hebrew origin, 'Yehosua', or Joshua. There is also the Hebrew-Aramaic form, 'Yesua'. In Greek, it became 'Iŋooũç' (Iēsoûs), and in Latin it became 'lesus'.

The meaning of the name is 'Yahweh delivers' or 'Yahweh rescues', or 'Yahweh is salvation'. No wonder the angel Gabriel in Luke (1:26-33) told Mary to name her baby Jesus: "because He will save His people from their sins."

Some words spoken about Jesus:

"Therefore the Lord himself will give you a sign: The virgin will be with child and will give birth to a son, and will call him Immanuel."

Isaiah Chapter 7 verse 14
