On the rare occasion that Susie has a weekend off we are fortunate to have Rev Adrian Harbidge to step in. Such was the case on Sunday 19 October. We thoroughly enjoy welcoming him to High Cross and enjoy his incitive sermons as well as his dry sense of humour! Amongst many other posts, Adrian was Archdeacon in the Diocese of Winchester before his final living as Rector of Seale, Puttenham and Wanborough (in Guildford Diocese). He retired at the end of 2016.

Remembrance is rapidly approaching. The annual service is held at St Peter's Froxfield Green, 10.45 am with the Act of Remembrance taking place in front of the war memorial on the green. There is also a more personal service of Thanksgiving and Remembrance at All Saints, Steep at 4.00 pm on Saturday 25 October.

<u> Margaret Hall 1923 – 2025</u>

Margaret Hall, of Coles, Privett, who died in October at the age of 102 possibly ranks as the oldest person to live in the parish.

Margaret was a recent resident: her son Mike and his wife Shuna purchased Coles, with its renowned 26 acre garden, in 2014, and Margaret came to live in a cottage in the grounds in 2020. She had the good fortune to die quietly in her own home.

Until very recently Margaret enjoyed taking part in village life – she worshipped in the parish church, celebrated both the Platinum Jubilee and the Coronation in Privett Churchyard (she lived under five monarchs, and was older than the late Queen), and in July this year welcomed those visiting the garden at Coles for The Garden Club's Open Garden afternoon. She was blessed with good physical health and a razor-sharp mind, and as one of her regular visitors rightly said, after a visit to Margaret you always left more invigorated than when you arrived.

It could be fascinating speaking to someone who had lived, as an adult, in times which to most of us were "history", and who had such good recollection: at VE Day 80th anniversary she reminisced about VE Day itself – that morning she was taking a Finals exam at college in Southampton when the Principal of the college burst into the exam room to give the good news of the end of the war in Europe. Margaret and all the other students just threw down their pens and rushed out of the room there and then, into the street with the other college students marching into the centre of the town singing songs in the highest state of excitement. She passed the exam!

Margaret had a full and fascinating life, with a large family and spending time living abroad. She could chat happily about current politics, the adventures of her grandchildren and great grandchildren, life as a Westerner in Japan, or which players were progressing through the Wimbledon fortnight. She had a strong Christian faith, a genuine interest in the lives of others, and she loved life to the end.

ALLEN GALLERY

The Allen Gallery in Church Street, Alton was successful in receiving funding from multiple sources, including the National Lottery Heritage Fund, East Hampshire District Council and Alton Town Council for a redevelopment. The redevelopment project started in May 2025 and the project team at Hampshire Cultural Trust are now planning for the scheduled capital works to begin in early 2026.

This ambitious project will transform the Allen Gallery into a more welcoming, accessible and inspiring space for everyone, with new displays a dedicated community area, and a programme of ceramics-inspired creative workshops and activities for all ages.

The schedule of capital works being undertaken will mean **a period of closure** for this work to be carried out which will be as follows:

- End of December 2025: The Allen Gallery closes to the public
- Throughout 2026: work is carried out at the venue
- Early 2027: The gallery will reopen to the public.

During the closed period there will be a range of community programmes and creative activities, much of which will take place at the **Curtis Museum** and other local venues. These will include family workshops, volunteering opportunities, and special events designed to bring people together and celebrate Alton's heritage.





<u>Church Kneelers at St Peter's High Cross</u> (Tales Of a Fundraiser!)

Once upon a time a member of the PCC set out to seek ways to raise funds for a new heating system and discovered so much more when she asked Phil Chung from Privett if he would help her to produce some

Phil duly popped along to the church to look for inspiration and was struck by the beauty of the kneelers displayed on the pews and, subsequently, these became the subject of the notelets but along the way Phil's interest in the kneelers raised questions about the history of the kneelers: who had made them and when; why did they make them; how had they decided on the colours and the themes? And why were there 20 kneelers in the north aisle all roughly the same when the others were so diverse?

Come along on November 15th and discover the history of our kneelers and learn from a member of Winchester Cathedral's curators' team about an extraordinary Victorian woman called Louisa Frances Pesel (1870-1947) who became the inspiration for a book called "A Single Thread" by Tracy Chevalier.



How to help our shop and post office



'Use it or lose it' is a sensible way to think about a village shop, but there are some ways of 'using it' that are of more help to the business than others.

Small rural shops and post offices like ours are facing an uncertain future, and there is now talk of the government replacing their small subsidies with other models of funding. Now is therefore a great time to consider how else we might we use our village shop besides buying groceries and using the post office.

- 1. Pay for posting parcels at the Post Office. What I didn't know before talking to Howard recently was that when you pay for postage online, the local post office loses out. It costs a little more to pay for parcels at the counter, but a small cost difference to us as customers makes a big difference to the business.
- 2. Use the shop as a delivery point for Amazon parcels. Did you know that our local shop is an Amazon Hub? This means that Howard can look after your parcel for you until you are ready to collect it (for which the shop gets a small fee). And it could save you money! If you are not on Amazon Prime, for example, Premium delivery to a Hub can be up to £2 cheaper than home delivery.
- 3. Buy something, while you're there! Ok, this one is obvious, but I thought that having three tips made this piece seem a bit more substantial!

I found these things out when taking a small parcel to Howard that I had processed at home and discovered that not taking it to him in the first place meant that the shop got less money. I then thought that there might be others out there who would like this information. I hope it's helpful. Thanks for reading.

As half term approaches everyone at Froxfield CE Primary and Preschool can reflect on a very successful start to this academic year.

We governors had our first meeting of the year, and I am delighted to report that we elected Graham Madgwick as a new co-opted governor.
