

#### PLAXTOL LOCAL HISTORY GROUP

#### **Exploring Kentish Castles**

A true castle is a fortified residence occupied by a lord or a king. David Carder began his talk with three royal castles in Kent - Dover, Canterbury and Rochester. He then divided other castles into three periods Norman, early and late medieval. Dover Castle has been in use for 2000 years, first as an Iron Age fort with Roman and Saxon additions. Its medieval underground tunnel earthworks were still in use in World War II. Canterbury Castle is a splendid ruin undergoing restoration. Rochester Castle has the tallest keep at 125ft high and was the scene of a siege in 1215 when King John undermined the tower and reclaimed it from the Barons. Medieval warfare was not pleasant. Rotten carcasses would be fired into the castle by a type of catapult called a trebuchet.

Other castles and fortified manor houses were built by wealthy families who feared the French, such as Tonbridge and Allington. The original wooden keep at Tonbridge was replaced by a stone shell as the wood was vulnerable to fires. Of the many famous late medieval castles David Carder chose Cooling which has towers with arrow slits and round holes which are thought to be the earliest gun loops. Along the coast Henry VIII built Walmer and Deal as linked fortifications. Sandwich was built earlier by Edward I. Kent's abundance of castles matched the enthusiasm of the large audience.



#### Dear Friends and Parishioners.

Isn't it interesting how the seasons change! Writing the letter for the Parish Magazine gives me a great observation point for the advance of the year. I am fortunate in that I can look out on our garden as I write, so the progression of colours is clearer, towards yellow and red, and then the loss of leaves. Whether the trees still have leaves in November, apart from the evergreens, will depend on the wind and how low temperatures have fallen.

From 30-degrees in August, and at best 16-17 degrees in October, November is likely to bring single figure temperatures which will feel distinctly chilly. We might still be picking the last of the apples and pears, but gardeners will be thinking more of the winter crops of cabbages, carrots and leeks, with climbing beans, courgettes and soft fruit a distant memory!

In years past, preserving food was an important way of providing for winters, which were often cold. Some of this tradition is continued in the jams and marmalades we prepare and fruit that is bottled or dried. The time for warming meat stews, fruit pies or crumbles with custard is getting closer!

It is also a time to remember and reflect on where our food comes from. Our farmers provide food for us in all weathers and fishermen go out to sea at enormous personal risk, throughout the year. Anyone who watches 'Saving Lives at Sea' will be aware of how quickly the weather can change endangering lives. Even experienced fishermen can have bad luck if they experience engine problems or very rough seas, requiring help from the wonderful volunteers of the RNLL.

Though we have passed Harvest, I would like to borrow some words from 'We plough the fields':



'All good gifts around
us, are sent from heaven above; Then thank
the Lord, O thank the Lord, for all his love.'

Where does all this bounty come from? I do believe that our Father God was and is the creator, not a chance coincidence of atoms that started a chain reaction through evolution.

In all our busyness, it can be hard to find time to pause and look and reflect. As autumn advances towards winter, it is good to look around and wonder, perhaps on a walk, before returning to a hopefully warm home

Each season has its beauty, if we can pause and have eyes to see. Winter will give nature a time for rest before the promise of spring. Let's enjoy autumn while it's here and say 'Thank You Father God' for all that you have given us. Amen. John Webster October.

### A NEW ARCHBISHOP OF CANTERBURY

The announcement came on 2nd October.

"His Majesty The King has approved the nomination of the Bishop of London, the Rt Revd and Rt Hon Dame Sarah Mullally, as the next Archbishop of Canterbury, Downing Street has announced.

The 106th Archbishop of Canterbury since Saint Augustine arrived in Kent from Rome in 597, Bishop Sarah will be the first woman to hold the office. She will be installed in a service at Canterbury Cathedral in March 2026.

Sarah Mullally has been the Bishop of London since 2018, the first woman appointed to that role, and before that was Bishop of Crediton in the Diocese of Exeter. Prior to her ordination in 2001, she was the Government's Chief Nursing Officer for England – the youngest person ever to be appointed to that role at the age of 37 – having previously specialised as a cancer nurse. Bishop Sarah has described nursing as "an opportunity to reflect the love of God". . . . .

Bishop Sarah said: "As I respond to the call of Christ to this new ministry, I do so in the same spirit of service to God and to others that has motivated me since I first came to faith as a teenager. "At every stage of that journey, through my nursing career and Christian ministry, I have learned to listen deeply – to people and to God's gentle prompting – to seek to bring people together to find hope and healing.

"I want, very simply, to encourage the Church to continue to grow in confidence in the Gospel, to speak of the love that we find in Jesus Christ and for it to shape our actions.

"And I look forward to sharing this journey of faith with the millions of people serving God and their communities in parishes all over the country and across the global Anglican Communion.

"I know this is a huge responsibility but I approach it with a sense of peace and trust in God to carry me as He always has."

The following day Bishop Sarah addressed a Canterbury Cathedral audience of school children from The Archbishop's School, a CofE school in the Diocese of Canterbury, and guests from across the Church of England, Anglican Communion and the Diocese of Canterbury. This is an extract from her address.

"Today, as I respond to the Call of Christ in this new ministry, I remain rooted in my first calling: to follow Christ, to know him – and to make him known to the world. . . .

"Washing feet has shaped my Christian vocation as a nurse, then a priest, then a bishop. In the apparent chaos which surrounds us, in the midst of such profound global uncertainty, the possibility of healing lies in acts of kindness and love.

"With humility and grace, we uphold and support those in need of our help. We do this to the best of our ability, in small ways and big, according to our own very particular gifts. That too is the service which I offer to the Church today.

"Given the many struggles of our Church and of societies here and around the world, I am often asked where I see hope. I have the privilege to see hope in communities, chaplaincies and churches in the Church of England and across the

wider Anglican Communion.

"In parishes across this nation, I see faithful clergy and congregations worshipping God and loving their neighbours. I see thousands of churches running food banks and homeless shelters. I see hospitals and prison chaplains caring for people and families in times of desperation. I see Church of England schools educating a million children across this country.

"I hear parishioners ringing bells and inviting people to pray. I hear the quiet hum of faith in every community, the gentle invitation to come and be with others, and the welcome extended to every person. In all of this, I see hope – because I see the person of Jesus Christ, reaching out to us all."

#### **IGHTHAM WI**

We had a full Village Hall once again for our October meeting with a couple of new members, visitors and those on zoom. After going through last month's Minutes, with reports on the WI eleven activities and other matters, the President welcomed three gentlemen from The Sevenoaks CPR registered charity. They were part of a team of volunteers providing lifesaving CPR and defibrillator training, advice and maintenance. They brought various dummies and defibrillators for everyone to practice on after a very informative and expert demonstration. At the end of the session it was felt that we all had greater confidence and understanding in dealing with an emergency should the occasion arise. The importance of the whereabouts of defibrillators was also emphasised; Ightham has three in the village.

Key statistics were as follows:



80% of cardiac arrests happen within the

home; there's a 30% chance of survival after CPR; a 70-80% chance of survival after CPR plus using a defibrillator. I in 10 survive after a cardiac arrest.

The CPR team emphasised that the life-saving work they carry out is all voluntary. They're always looking for volunteers so please look at their website if interested.

#### FROM YOUR MEMBER OF PARLIAMENT

All of us enjoy the quiet beauty of our countryside - the walks across the Downs/Weald, the still mornings, and the sense of calm that defines our corner of Kent. That's why the Government's decision to approve a second runway at Gatwick Airport will come as such a disappointment to so many of us.

I will continue to stand alongside the many local campaigners who have spent years working to defend our countryside and our communities. Growth in aviation should bring benefits to those who live nearby as well as to the industry itself - and at present, that balance has not been struck.

For us in Ightham, you might ask why this matters? The community I represent goes as far south as Penshurst and Hever. These villages, primarily between Tonbridge and Edenbridge, suffer greatly from noise and environmental issues caused by being directly under the flightpath. Much of this area is a designated National Landscape, recognised for its beauty and importance. If this were a motorway on the ground, it would never be approved.

The airport stands to see a major increase in passenger numbers, but there remains no commitment to reinstate the direct rail link from Kent to Gatwick - something I believe should be in place before any expansion is allowed to operate. I made this point clearly at the public inquiry, along with the need for stricter limits on night flights, stronger protections from aircraft noise, and firm



commitments to reduce the carbon impact of the airport. These are essential safeguards for those who live beneath the flight paths.

Despite my concern at the decision, I will continue to work to try and secure a direct rail link. The work to date shows this coming to Tonbridge, which is much easier to get to than Borough Green and Wrotham. This would help ease traffic on the M25 and M23 and allow us to get to the airport more sustainably.



## SHIPBOURNE FARMERS' MARKET

Clocks have now gone back and autumn moves towards the depths of winter. Appetites change too with the shortening days, as we all crave a little comfort. Slow-cooked casseroles, satisfyingly starchy creamy mashes, rich flavoured roasts and warming puds all fit the bill perfectly so wrap up and head out for a trip to the Market for inspiration.

Game is the meat of choice for cooks in November as the season is well under way for birds such as pheasant, partridge and wild duck. Venison and rabbit are also available. Our new piemaker, Liz, has now added venison pies to her popular menu. Don't forget her Shipbourne Pasty is also always worth a try, whatever the season!

Root vegetables are at their tastiest now and perfect for mashes, gratins and soups - they improve with the cold and you will notice a marked difference in flavour compared to supermarket specimens. Look out for parsnips, Jerusalem artichokes, swede and turnips. Main crop potatoes are full of texture and flavour and the varieties available locally are worth exploring. And red cabbage cooked with apple, spices and red wine is another seasonal treat to go with rich pork, or maybe a roasted wild duck.

better. At the luxury end of the scale Dover sole, turbot and halibut are rightly considered the very finest eating. Lower cost alternatives are also at their best. Brill is a firm white flesh full of clean flavour that only needs simple cooking. Or opt for healthy mackerel, full of valuable Omega 3 fish oils.

Bramleys are perfect for using in mincemeat and Christmas pudding so buy them ready for stir up Sunday at the end of the month. The eating varieties can be used in tarts and cakes or covered in chocolate or caramel for a bonfire night treat!

#### **COOKERY CORNER**

**BONFIRE NIGHT BAKED POTATOES** 

Serves 4 / Preparation: 15 minutes / Cooking: 1hr 30mins

#### **Ingredients**

- 4 medium baking potatoes
- · 2 tbsp rapeseed oil
- 25g butter
- · I large onion finely sliced
- 6 slices smoked streaky bacon, chopped
- 2 tbsp double cream
- 200g mixed good melting cheese e.g. reblochon, raclette or gruyere
- · Chopped parsley

#### Method

- Heat oven to 200 C / 180 C fan /gas mark 6.
- Prick potatoes all over with a fork, then rub with half the oil, some sea salt and black pepper.
- Arrange on a baking tray and bake in the oven for 1hr 15 mins, until their skins are crisp and they are completely tender when prodded.

- 4. Meanwhile heat the remaining oil and half the butter in a frying pan. Add the onion and gently cook for 15-20 mins until softened and golden. Remove from the pan and set aside, add the chopped bacon and fry until just crisp. Remove using a slotted spoon and place on kitchen paper.
- 5. Halve each potato lengthways, then scoop out most of the potato into a bowl, leaving a potato skin shell with a thin layer of potato. In the bowl, crush the potato with the remaining butter and the double cream. Season with salt and pepper. Fold through the onion, bacon, three guarters of the cheeses and half the parsley. Spoon back into the potato shells and top with the remaining cheese. Transfer to the baking tray and return to the oven for 10-15 minutes, until melting and golden.
- 6. Sprinkle with the rest of the parsley and serve with a crisp salad.

**BRAIN MATTERS...** 

closeness matters...

Autumn blew in with a bang and the mild weather has let winter gently creep up. The colours are glorious and the weather invites cosy comforts. As it gets colder we can start to look forward to winter festivities. The weather invites closeness.

In children and babies we understand the importance of secure attachment whereby a caregiver is the solid base for the child to feel secure and safe by the responsiveness they receive. As a baby this ensures they have their hierarchy of needs met when they cry; as a toddler it means being easily comforted when they need emotional regulation while exploring the world around them. Both involves responding to their respective needs and being helped to navigate their feelings. A child that can walk well but asks to be picked up and carried is not being lazy; they are signalling they need closeness for regulation. The same is true of infants who cry out in the night. The notion of self-soothing does not naturally occur until much later in development. When an infant 'self soothes' as a baby they're newly dysregulated as they have just learnt you won't come if they cry. Neuropsychological research shows that the first two years of life are the prime time for creating secure attachment

and emotional regulation that impacts adulthood, and the

likelihood of developing disorders such as anxiety. Research indicates that touch, holding and closeness all help to regulate a child's system by lowering cortisol and strengthening their sense of security. Most children only achieve theory of mind between the ages of 4-5. It's a major step, so it's not surprising

that whilst learning to identify their big feelings, gain impulse control and start learning a form of self control and regulation, children rely on us to help them navigate it.

Closeness is important for teens and adults too - it just looks different. In teens they have spikes in hormones and brain development. They crave independence but still need the security of boundaries, safe space support and understanding. In adults never underestimate the importance of a hug, a 'check-in chat' or little acts of kindness. They all add up to help lower cortisol and strengthen bonds. Giving time for closeness, bonding and kindness helps to regulate our loved ones. It has a knock on effect to improve our serotonin and dopamine, all of which help maintain a healthy brain.

This winter cuddle up, embrace closeness in all its different forms and remember to take care of yourself too.

# AN EXTRACT OF THE PARISH COUNCIL MINUTES Tuesday 16 Sept 2025

(Full Minutes can be found at www.ightham. org or by emailing the Clerk) REPORTS FROM COUNTY COUNCILLOR & BOROUGH COUNCILLOR:

County Cllr Rayner reported that the Reform Party are due to approve a mission statement about reforming Kent 2025 - 2028, at a meeting on 17th September. There have been some significant senior management changes at KCC; the contract for the Chief Executive will come to an end in November. The Chief Financial Officer and Director, plus several senior technical officers, have also given notice.

There will be some significant changes to the household waste, recycling and waste disposal arrangements in early 2026 when current contracts come to an end. Currently the black bin waste

goes to Allington where rubbish is burned; this is very expensive. Cllr



Emmett reported that some residents have recently had notices on their green bins rejecting cardboard. Cllr Rayner said that there is pressure to ensure that recycling lines are as clean as possible due to the cost of rejected loads.

On Local Government

Reorganisation, 2 proposals put forward by KPMG are being costed; they are for 3-tier and 4-tier Unitaries. Reform would prefer a single Unitary. A 4-tier Unitary would be made up of East Kent, North Kent, West Kent and Mid-Kent: there are some different options for borders. The cost of devolving to 3 or 4-tiers is estimated to be around £100m and would be covered by Council Tax. Current debt is £2.3bn; the debt free councils will end up picking up the tab for those that are unsustainable. It is estimated that 70% of homes in West. Kent will have a significant increase in council tax.

On Thursday 18th September, Reform are putting together a time limited motion on Climate Change to rescind the declaration of a climate emergency. The Liberal Democrats are also putting forward a motion to encourage residents to ensure that vaccinations are up to date and

#### **MATTERS ARISING**

Highways & PROW Matters: HIP update - The Clerk reported that the double yellow lines had been installed at Dark Hill. Ightham Common 30mph reduction - The Clerk reported that it was likely that there would be NO 30mph roundels and minimal repeaters on the roads around Ightham Common. Back Lane isn't due to be included in the speed reduction, but this may change at the design stage if the engineer determines that Back Lane should be included to avoid leaving a short section of derestricted road. Oldbury Lane 20mph - We are awaiting confirmation from a resident that we can use their verge for a 20mph sign on Oldbury Lane. Old Lane - We are awaiting a response from KCC. The Clerk reported that the Old Lane sign had been knocked down and there was a lot of mud on the lane; Highways have agreed to clear it and the sign has been reported. Mirror on Back Lane junction – It was agreed that the Clerk should purchase mirrors and then we can decide where they are positioned. Clerk to get approval from the landowner. Back Lane bus stop – update – This has now been cleaned, and the Clerk has requested KCC to remove the timetable. Cllr Holden also offered to see whether he could do it.

Miscellaneous: A227 Closures at Wrotham and Borough Green 18-26th October (half term). Clerk to ask James Hayward to



cut the hedges at Leathercote Corner. Tree down on Common Road junction with A25; Clerk to ask James to remove it from the pavement. Report: bollards at Common Road blocking sight lines, tree down on footpath by Haul Road, weeds on A25.

Allotments: Cllr Emmett reported that he had cleared a fallen tree and that the grass had been cut.

Recreation Ground: Playground repairs – The Clerk is awaiting a quote from Wicksteed. Surfacing quotes – The Clerk has asked Wicksteed to quote and will contact other contractors recommended by other Clerks. Ightham Sign – The planning application has been sent to TMBC and is awaiting approval. Cllr Emmett has replaced the gate latch saving us £700.

Village Hall: Update. A quote to remove moss from the steps, back wall and windows for £150 was approved. The contractor will also include cleaning the village sign. The Village Hall rebuild committee are meeting on 30th September to discuss the next project steps. Cllr Holden suggested that each member should visit another Hall and Fordcombe, Ide Hill, East Peckham, West Peckham, Chiddingstone and Paddock Wood



#### THINKING OF GUY FAWKES

#### - a cause for thanksgiving

I urge, then, first of all, that petitions, prayers, intercession and thanksgiving be made for all people - for kings and all those in authority, that we may live peaceful and quiet lives in all godliness and holiness. This is good and pleases God our Saviour. I Timothy 2:1-3

Guy Fawkes Night used to be more popular, and many homes had bonfire parties and made 'Guys'. Until the 19th century the law even said that you had to go to church on that day for a special service, and no doubt the day ended with bonfires and celebrations.

The Observance of 5th November Act 1605 was also known as the Thanksgiving Act, as it was a response to the deliverance from the Gunpowder Plot. It required church ministers to hold a special service of thanksgiving annually on 5th November, during which the act was to be read out in church. The act required that all "Ministers in every Cathedral and Parish Church... shall always upon the fifth Day of November have a service which all persons had to "diligently and faithfully" attend.

The introduction to the act described the "inhuman, barbarous and cruel" terrorist plot to murder the king and his government, which was prevented by the miraculous and timely discovery. The legislation said the country should always be thankful

and have a "joyful day of deliverance". The law was repealed in 1859 by the Anniversary Days Observance Act.

Thankfully we live in a somewhat more tolerant yet increasingly fragile era, but sadly are we less grateful for our blessings? How often do we have thanksgiving services in church? Now, more than ever, we need to pray for our nation and show our gratitude for the many blessings God has given us and our nation.


