

A Christmas message from our Rector

We are in a time of great anticipation!

It began at the start of Advent (the last Sunday in November) which is a season in the Church where, as Christians, we prepare to celebrate the incarnation of Christ on Christmas Day. The incarnation is the moment when Jesus came to us in human form — as a baby, small and vulnerable. But Advent is also about anticipating the moment when Christ will return in glory. The word Advent literally means 'coming'. Over these next four weeks, we are encouraged to prepare ourselves, to examine our inner beings and see whether we are prepared for Christ to enter in and transform our lives anew.

Yet our sense of anticipation does not always end at Christmas. After all the festivities around Christmas Day, January can be a time of quiet and recuperation for many of us. It may be that during this month, some of you find yourselves looking ahead to what the new year has in store. You might be making plans, such as holidays, weddings, birthday celebrations, house moves etc, the list goes on!

At the start of any new year we are often filled with anticipation and expectation. Sometimes this can stem from plans you have made for the coming year that you are really looking forward to. Other times, the outgoing year might have been difficult and so we find ourselves looking forward to the new one and hoping it will be much brighter.

On the1st February we will celebrate the Presentation of Christ in the temple. That is the moment in Luke's gospel (2.22-40) when Jesus is presented in the temple by his parents. It is here that we meet two important characters: Simeon and Anna.

Simeon is described as righteous and devout, looking forward to the consolation of Israel and the Holy Spirit rested upon him (v25). He had been told that he would not see death before he had seen the Lord's Messiah.

Anna, is described as a prophet and widow who never left the temple but worshipped there with fasting and prayer day and night.

Both Simeon and Anna are filled with hope, expectation and anticipation. Neither Simeon nor Anna, know when the time will come that they will meet the Messiah but they are examples to us of faithful and hopeful prayer during periods of waiting... Simeon's only insight is that it will be before he dies. But as for Anna, she simply sits and prays and waits.

Is there anything joyful that you know will happen for you this coming year, but you are not sure when? How does the anticipation and waiting feel for you? Does it unsettle you? Does it leave you feeling frustrated?

I think as we begin each new year, and especially 2026, we can take heart in the examples that Simeon and Anna set for us. Their devout faith was rewarded when they met the baby Jesus. They recognised him as the Messiah and the hope, love and salvation he would bring through his life and death.

They put their trust in God and their faith was rewarded. It is my prayer for you all, as you begin this new year and anticipate all that is to come, that you will know Christ as he comes to meet each of you in the low and high moments of your lives. All we need to do is have true faith and hope and rest in the knowledge that God is most definitely always with us.

REORDERING PROJECT AT HOLY TRINITY CHURCH

referred to s the 'Re-ordering project' and it covers the redesign of sections of the church's interior as well as providing level access int the church. The work includes an improved

design of the kitchen area and the addition of a disabled toilet. The family/fellowship area is also being enlarged.

We expect that the work will complete on 12th December so we are planning to hold a Big Clean-up on Saturday 13th December. This will enable us to begin our annual Christmas Tree Festival on 14th December on which date there will also be our annual Christingle Service at 5pm.
