

### From the Vicarage

Dear Friends.

It is hard to believe but here we are at the start of a new Advent season with Christmas fast coming into view. Today Advent seems to have faded in our public imagination, often it's only noticed when chocolate filled calendars appear in the supermarket aisle, but traditionally it is a special season when we pause to get ready for Christmas. The word Advent means "coming" or "arrival" and it serves two purposes. First, it gives us time to prepare our hearts and minds to celebrate the wonder of the nativity story and the first arrival of



Jesus into the world. Second, it is a time of excited anticipation, when we look forward to the future day when Jesus will return again to bring justice and peace to all the world - and right now who doesn't wish for that? During these weeks of waiting we pray and meditate on the themes of hope, peace, joy and love, kindling them in our own lives and praying that we can share these gifts with everyone around us, as we in turn reflect on God's most incredible gift of all, the gift of Jesus Christ.

### **Two Advents**

Quietly dignified, lovingly attentive, the young man leads his fiancée, mounted on a donkey, along the hot, dry, dusty road to Bethlehem. Their destiny, a life of simplicity and toil: humbly and obediently they have accepted the responsibility for bringing the priceless gift to an impoverished world.

City centres teem with frenzied crowds persuaded by the marketing teams to purchase sophisticated gifts guaranteed to bring lasting joy. Crowds rush headlong through an arid Advent, deceived by a mirage, poignantly ignorant of the one perfect gift - God's free gift of love.

Twinkling lights and festive decorations seduce the unwary to purchase more than they can afford. Carols blast from every shop door proclaiming love, peace and joy. Harassed mothers and covetous children contradict the illusion and speak of tension - while the retailing magnates smile at their success.

There are no twinkling lights in Bethlehem, no welcoming hotel room, no special provision for the world's Saviour. The birth pains begin in a quiet stable, the animals alone witnessing the love and peace of the arrival of Jesus. Just one bright star tells of the joy of the world - but the world isn't looking.

### **Chesterblade Window**

A picture of the east window in St Mary's Chesterblade is on the cover of this copy of Evercreech News.

The window was filled with plain glass until a much-loved vicar Rev William Tylden-Dyne, decided to donate a stained-glass window. He commissioned a well-known designer Martin Travers to create one.

Martin Travers came to Somerset to make sketches, and we believe that many of the figures in the Nativity scene are local people. A close look soon reveals that the shepherds are wearing Somerset smocks, boots and gaiters. Down each side of the window are little vignettes of cottages, willows and a stream. The design was displayed at the Royal College of Art in 1913.

William Tylden-Dyne just lived to see his gift installed before he died unexpectedly at the age of 54 early in 1914, so the window became his memorial. Had another year passed the window might never have been put in place once the First world War had started. The Nativity scene is saved from sentimentality by the presence of local people and scenes. If you have never seen it do go and look.

May your Christmas be blessed with lasting gifts of love and friendship!



### Christmas joy for all people

We fear that we live in a world of increasing polarisation. Conflicts between and within nations play their part. The amplification of division and hostility by social media algorithms doesn't help. Culture wars exacerbate matters further. Sometimes it feels like common ground

is disappearing from underneath our feet like a sandbar being overwhelmed by the tide.

In such a climate, it's good to return to the message that heralded the arrival of Jesus. 'I bring you tidings of great joy which shall be for all people' says that angel who announces the saviour's birth (Luke 2:10). Jesus' story quickly includes all types and sorts of humanity. From local shepherds to exotic visitors from afar. I wonder what the conversation was like as they all crammed into the stable to see the newborn child?

Jesus's story quickly shows that not only is he for all people but that he needs all people. His family must have needed assistance when they fled as refugees to Egypt. Jesus must have needed help when his parents left him behind on a family outing to Jerusalem aged twelve. Jesus was constantly calling on and engaging with others as he went about his teaching and ministry.

What might counter the polarisation of our day? Amongst our greatest resource is to seek out the emotion that accompanied the news of the saviour's birth – joy. When we encounter joy – from that cup winning goal to the marriage of much loved friends – such moments are never the time for division and enmity. We're all far too busy shouting and hugging each other! The invitation of Christmas is to experience such joy afresh. Often, we see joy most obviously in children's experience of the season. Might we seek it for ourselves too? For joy breaks down divisions, overcomes barriers, reminds us that we are one.

'I bring you tidings of great joy which shall be for all people' says the angel. A very merry and joyful Christmas to you all.

I don't know about you, but as I get older, the days seems to flash by at an almost alarming pace. Amid the rush and bustle of December, let us be generous in prayer and in kind, and may I wish all our Christian friends a very happy and peaceful Christmas.

### **December in history**

**19th December 1843.** Charles Dickens' classic work, *A Christmas Carol*, was published. Dickens produced this iconic work in a six-week flurry of writing that began in October 1843 and finished on 19th December. By December 24th, the first edition of 6,000 copies had sold out and by 2nd January 1844, a second edition of 3,000 copies had also been sold.

**25th December, 1914.** During the First World War, when British soldiers heard German troops in the trenches opposite singing carols on Christmas Eve, a World War I Christmas truce was reached. British and German soldiers met in no man's land; they exchanged gifts, took photographs, and played impromptu football games. Both sides also took time to bury casualties and repair trenches. The truce wasn't observed everywhere along the Western Front, and in some areas, the fighting continued. This was largely because officers feared that a truce would undermine the fighting spirit. After Boxing Day, the friendly meetings in no man's land ended and the war continued.

The monument has been repaired and made safe, ensuring its preservation. Despite unexpected delays and significant costs, the Parish Council contributed to the repairs, although they do not claim ownership of the cross.

We thank SW Heritage, B2 Architects, and Minerva for their support on this project.

The Planning Application for 40 2024/0406/OUT houses Prestleigh Road was Rejected. The Parish Council was not given the appropriate time to arrange an extraordinary meeting on matter. This caused consternation with regards to ensuring that a Councillor could attend meeting and arrange to speak on behalf of the Council. However, we must thank Councillors Stanley and Williams for stepping in at such short notice. Also our Somerset Councillors Reed and Sully showed full support.



The PC agreed on the Draft Budget with some additions to earmarking items for maintenance. This will include the Village Cross/Preaching Stone, now that repairs are complete it will need ongoing care with regards to moss/algae build up over time.

Regarding The Millennium Gardens; we'd like to reach out to residents for ideas and suggestions regarding its future. It is an area of concern regarding anti-social behaviour and vandalism but belongs to the village, so your thoughts are important. Please email clerk@evercreech-pc.gov.uk with them.

The Parish Council is committed to ensuring the safety of all headstones at the Cemetery. A recent inspection has identified some headstones that were immediately unsafe, which have now been carefully laid down. There are several additional headstones requiring attention. We kindly request that you inspect your family plots and notify us of any unstable or loose headstones by contacting <a href="mailto:clerk@evercreech-pc.gov.uk">clerk@evercreech-pc.gov.uk</a>. Please arrange for any necessary repairs to be carried out by a qualified Stonemason and inform the Parish Council once this work has been completed. We ask that all required safety measures be implemented by the end of January 2026. If any headstone remains unsafe after this date, the Parish Council will be obligated to lay them down. Thank you for your cooperation.

The PC welcomed our newest Cllr Daryl Issitt. This means we have the full quota for Parish Council Councillors.

The next meeting will be 7pm Tuesday 2<sup>nd</sup> December in Evercreech Village Hall.

We had a lovely visit from the High Sheriff of Somerset, Janet Montgomery. She sent to us this message:


"It was wonderful to meet you on Saturday and also your wonderful team in Yeovil. I think you all provide a wonderful and caring service for the community of


