One of the greatest gifts of the church is the Calendar that shapes the church year. It's a gift that had been sitting on the shelf of my Christian practice for a good many years and which I began to unwrap when I was training to be ordained.

The Protestant background from which I came saw every Sunday as Easter Sunday, so following Jesus' Passion through Holy Week leading to Easter was not a thing. Advent, the time of preparation and reflection for Christmas, that other great Festival of the Church was also not a thing. Thankfully, I did my on-the-job training (Curacy) in a Parish which did follow the Church Calendar and I was delighted with the multifaceted gift which emerged as we journeyed through the year together as five churches in one Parish.

I learnt that Christmastide didn't end on Boxing Day. The Christmas season continued for the Twelve Days of Christmas, from 25 December to the day before the Feast of the Epiphany celebrated on the 6 January. A full twelve days of celebration and feasting. This observance began around 567 CE. Jesus, the Son of God, entering human history in order to break down all the barriers between the created and uncreated so that God and humanity and all creation might move towards peace and restored relationship was a BIG thing. It couldn't be celebrated and absorbed in a day. So, twelve days were given to it so that we could rejoice in God's great gift to us, reflect on its meaning and its impact on our lives and realign ourselves with God's loving purposes for us, for humanity and the world.

Joy to the World is a Christmas song I love for the way it invites us to respond personally and as a church community to this extraordinary self-emptying and self-giving of God in Jesus the Christ: "Joy to the world the Lord is come! ...Let every heart prepare him room. ... No more let sins and sorrow grow! ... He rules the world with truth and grace..."

Contemplating and living these truths will anchor us and give us hope in our fragile worlds.

Let us rejoice and be glad all the twelve days of Christmas.

Longer-term Beckford villagers will remember Leo and her husband Bill, who lived at The Cottage, Court Farm Lane and who were such energetic supporters of village life, working for the good of the community. In fact it was through Bill's efforts that for many years surgeries were held at Beckford Village Hall twice a week.

Bill died in 1994 and after a while Leo moved away, first to Stratford upon Avon and subsequently to Battersea in London where she remained until her death. In spite of leaving the village, Leo always remained a keen and generous supporter of Beckford church which she loved and that generosity has been greatly appreciated over many years.

Along with our fond remembrances we send our condolences to Leo's family.

Beckford December Services

Our services in St John the Baptist, Beckford, this month comprise the two Christmas services. On **Sunday 21st December at 6pm** we look forward to welcoming you all to the Carol Service. This service will be lay-led as has become the custom and will include favourite carols and the candle-lit period which is so well-beloved, as shadows flicker on the ancient walls of the beautifully decorated church and the Christmas season takes hold.

Then, on Christmas Eve, there will be a late-night service of

Holy Communion at 11pm. This service usually only takes place in Beckford every two years so this is an opportunity to begin the actual festival of Christmas here in our own church.


Meanwhile we thank you for your support throughout 2025 and wish you all a very Happy Christmas and a good New Year.

This coupled with our strategy of not mowing the area under the trees and the perimeter of the field for the summer months should help encourage wild flowers and other wild life.

We will 'top' the area in March and September and will need some volunteers to clear the cut grass.

The rest of the field including the football pitches will continue to be mown regularly by the trusty village hall mowing club using the gang mowers or by the football club mowers.


This is an opportunity to support a dairy farmer from the Herefordshire area and also gain some income for the Village Hall as well as providing a service for the community.

Below is a photo of the vending machine set up. There is no expense for the Village Hall and the dairy farmer will pay the Hall for locating the machine in the Village Hall grounds.



What's happening in the cutting garden in December?

It's hard to believe another year is over and I have to say, I will be glad to have a new start in 2026! There are lots of things to look forward to, particularly Beckford Open Village in June. It certainly makes us focus on getting jobs done!

Here are some of the things I will be up to in the garden so that you can grow along too.

It's not too late to plant tulips so don't worry if you find a packet you've forgotten about – or the reduced packet at the garden centre! If you are planting in pots, keep them outside where they will feel the cold but not get soaked with rain.

The greenhouse is full of plants needing protection so I will keep a close eye on the weather in case I need to add the odd candle for warmth or throw a fleece over to protect seedlings. Below -5 is when I start to pay attention! It is important to open the greenhouse daily though to allow fresh air in and prevent damping off (a disease that can be caused with poor ventilation)

Don't worry about snow – its great for giving the garden a winter blanket - it's the frosts I'm not keen on.

Keep raking up leaves and feeding the birds. Don't forget about water for the birds too.

Outdoors I have covered a few of the beds with a porous covering to prevent weeds and give a little warmth. There is a layer of leaves underneath that I will dig in once the cover is removed in early spring.

It's a good time to wash and prep any seed trays. I try and make do year on year and have found some inventive trays to use. As long as there are drainage holes a tray should be good to use.

There are chrysanthemums still in flower so give me a call for local flowers. Talking of which, subscriptions and gift vouchers are available for that last minute Christmas gift which give you 3 or 6 months of monthly flowers - a real treat for yourself or a loved one.

To all the villagers and locals who have supported me or just enjoyed reading my monthly ramblings, Merry Christmas and a Happy and Healthy New Year.

I will see you all in 2026 Happy gardening!

Unexpected Treasures

What things do you most treasure? I wouldn't be at all surprised if they have little value in financial terms – things like a first painting or drawing brought home from school by a child, a letter from a loved one, or an irreplaceable photograph. Treasure is where your heart is.

The story is told of a prosperous businessman seen hurrying to a butcher's shop on Christmas Eve during the Depression of the 1930s. 'Buying your Christmas turkey?' a friend asked. 'No, hot dogs,' answered the businessman. He explained how a bank failure had suddenly wiped out his fortune. He faced Christmas with no money for gifts and less than a pound for food. Next day, he and his wife and small child said grace before dinner and then ate hot dogs – a whole kennel of them, in fact: his wife had given each frankfurter toothpicks for legs and dental floss for tails, ears and hair. Their child was enchanted, and her infectious delight spread merriment among them all. After dinner they gave thanks again for the most loving and festive time they'd ever had. 'Now it's tradition,' the man said. 'Hot dogs for Christmas - to remind us of that happy day when we realised that we still had one another and our God-given sense of humour.'

Christmas can be many things, but it is certainly an invitation to rediscover the treasure of being really human. What gives life meaning is not the accumulation of ever more material comforts, but a willingness to be open to those around: and that includes - unexpectedly perhaps - the vulnerable and marginalised in our society, not just family and friends. That kind of openness is risky, but our model and inspiration is the God who comes in the form of a defenceless baby. No centre stage, crowds or applause for him. Just a scruffy outhouse and a few oddball visitors. This king, it seems, needs to be looked for in unexpected places; but when anyone welcomes him, and in him all the world's vulnerable and defenceless, they find the greatest treasure of all.

So, look for treasure in unexpected places, and may you find unexpected joys this Advent and Christmas season.



Please pray for our partner dioceses

Diocese of Peru

In Peru, Bishop Jorge has asked for our prayers for all those in the population, especially in Lima, currently living in fear. Extortion carried out by mafia-style gangs is draining some 13 million soles (around £3 million) monthly from bus and taxi drivers, shopkeepers and business owners, and those not complying with the demands are being killed. This is causing widespread terror among ordinary Peruvians, and the police have not proved capable of dealing with the threat.

Failure to resolve a worsening situation was a key factor in the impeachment of President Dina Boluarte on 10 October, but political instability and violence has been a problem for many years. The new president, José Jerí, is the seventh president in the last eight years, and only two of these have been elected, the rest coming to power after impeachments or resignations. There have already been protests against Jerí as a result of allegations about his past. Young people, feeling marginalised and unprotected, are at the heart of these protest movements. It is thus a frightening time for most people in Peru, and our prayers for political stability and an end to the extortion and banditry are required.

Diocese of Morogoro, Tanzania

In Tanzania, an election on 29 October returned incumbent President Samia Suluhu Hassan. Her party has ruled Tanzania since independence, and the election was deeply flawed with all credible opponents imprisoned or disqualified, the winning tally received by Hassan (98%) an indication of the undemocratic nature of the poll.In addition to violence during the campaign, there have been violent protests since polling day and hundreds are feared dead, with curfews and government crackdowns creating a volatile atmosphere. An internet shutdown in place since election day means accurate news is limited, but it is clear that the political unrest is affecting Tanzanians and many young people feel disenfranchised and ignored.

Our prayers are therefore needed for all in Morogoro, and Tanzania more widely, who are afraid or marginalised.

BREDON HILL PROBUS CLUB

The Club for retired and semi-retired Professionals and Businessmen

One of the highlights of 2025 was when we recently welcomed former Concorde pilot Captain John Hutchinson who gave three talks, giving us the benefit of his long and personal association with the iconic supersonic passenger aircraft. John's first talk was a generic introduction to the history and development of Concorde in the 1960's and how the Anglo-French joint venture designed, developed, built and brought the aircraft into commercial service. The second talk concerned the tragic crash of the Air France Concorde in Paris in 2000 with a detailed analysis of the causes of the crash and in John's final talk he told us his memories of the people and personalities he encountered over three decades of flying the aircraft for British Airways.

Another speaker who provided us with his own direct experiences of his subject was Zak Coombs who was on the hospital ship SS Uganda during the Falklands war in 1982. He was stationed on the ship and described some of his traumatic experiences bringing aboard severely injured soldiers for treatment in the ship's operating theatres.

In total contrast, we welcomed Paul Murphy who described to us the life and times of Norman Wisdom from his hard days in poverty at home with a cruel and merciless father, running away from home, finding his way forward as a comedian and film star and becoming a rich man living in a mansion on the Isle of Man.

Another presenter who maintained the excellent standard of our speakers was retired Army officer Richard Jeynes, who described in detail the origins of the French Foreign Legion and the battles they were involved in. The Legion still operates today and although the Senior Officers are all Frenchmen, anyone from anywhere in the world can apply and be prepared to fight anywhere they are directed by the French Government. Most people think that men from dubious, sometimes criminal backgrounds make up the soldiers of the Legion, but Richard assured us that the selection process is very demanding and no-one with a criminal record would be admitted.



ANOTHER SEASON OF REMEMBRANCE AND CHANGES FOR OUR BRANCH

Another Poppy Appeal and national Remembrance event has been and gone – seemingly in a flash. The money raised by Ian Dickson's gallant team of house-to-house collectors and in the tins at shops, pubs, petrol stations and schools is, at the time of going to press, still to be counted but, whatever the result, we are profoundly grateful for the generosity shown by so many people.

The Beckford & Ashton under Hill Branch of the Royal British Legion was held on Thursday 6th November at Beckford Village Hall. We were this year faced with making a radical change to the way we function. It was agreed several years ago that the Officers would continue until 2025. Following the death in January of our Chairman, Anthony Hallett, Paul Jay kindly stepped up to temporarily assume this role as well as continuing as Treasurer — a combination that was clearly unsustainable; Ian Dickson has done ten years as Poppy Appeal Organiser, raising more than £60,000 over that period and Faith Hallett eight years as Secretary. With nobody available to step into our shoes it became clear that the present situation could not continue. In July it was regretfully agreed by the Committee that the Branch be closed altogether but it

was then suggested by the RBL's Worcestershire and Herefordshire Membership Engagement Officer that, rather than consign our Branch name and all its history to the dustbin (which is apparently what closure would entail), we transfer from being completely autonomous to County Supported status. This removes the requirement to produce accounts or to have Officers or even a Committee. It also leaves open the possibility of restoring the Branch to its full glory at some point in the future if the situation demands. The two options were laid before all the members and County Supported status was selected almost unanimously. We are now applying to Worcestershire for approval. If granted, we hope to continue to organise an annual lecture and a garden party BUT the Poppy Appeal will be externally handled by the County in future rather than locally by Ian.

The Remembrance Service was held this year at the church of St Barbara at Ashton under Hill, led by the Reverend Dr Gerard Moate who has come to live in Overbury since retiring in April. The event began with a well attended ceremony: the names of all those from our villages who died during the two world wars were read and wreaths were laid on behalf of the Royal British Legion, Guides and Brownies, parish councils and WIs. Bill Ettridge, former long-serving RAF officer and an "older member of the community" recited the first part of the famous Kohima Epitaph and William as a much "younger" representative recited the second. Derril Green, Branch Standard Bearer for so many years, was on duty yet again while Charlotte carried the Guides standard and Annabel the Brownies. Emily and Jenny laid the joint Guides and Brownies wreath. During the service itself Freddie, Millie, Tabby and Dorrie read the prayers and Lottie, Ember, Francis and Phoebe took the collection. It was so good to have more involvement from younger members of the community – to whom the baton of remembrance will soon be passed. The whole occasion was very moving and ended with welcome refreshments in the Village Hall. Many thanks to all those who took part and helped to keep this important act of remembrance alive in our increasingly uncertain and war torn world.




