PASTORAL REORGANISATIONMOMSS&G Benefice

The benefice consists of Middlezoy, Othery, Moorlinch, Stawell, Sutton Mallet and Greinton. It has been proposed that the benefice is split up. Middlezoy and Othery will merge with the Athelney benefice and Moorlinch, Stawell, Sutton Mallet and Greinton will join the Polden Wheel group.

The Athelney benefice consists of the parishes of Burrowbridge, Lyng, North Curry and Stoke St Gregory. The Polden Wheel group consists of the churches of Ashcott, Burtle, Catcott, Chilton Polden, Edington and Shapwick.

It is planned that nothing will happen until both ends of our benefice are ready to move. This is likely to happen sometime in the first quarter of 2026. Once the date of the split

is confirmed a special service will be arranged to mark the occasion.

In the meantime, the magazine will continue but without any commercial advertisements after this edition. After more than 20 years the magazine will continue to be produced and delivered free of charge to 1,040 homes in our villages until this benefice no longer exists. 
Planets

Saturn continues to fade and set earlier and is out of sight by 10pm as we enter January. Mercury is visible at the beginning of January but then along with Venus and Mars becomes too close to the Sun to be seen. Jupiter now rules the night, rising at 6pm during

December. It is at its closest to Earth on 9 January and reaches opposition the next day. On 3 January Jupiter is close to the full Moon which will be a supermoon, the first of the year. Jupiter is a brilliant beacon in the night sky and is visible all night. Look for its four brightest moons with a pair of binoculars and see how they change position night by night.

Constellation

While Jupiter is the planet of the moment, Orion the Hunter is the constellation. Unmistakable, high in the south look for the three stars that form his belt. Below this you will see the Sword, a glowing misty patch, being the Orion Nebula, a stellar nursery where stars are being born. Visible to the naked eye under less than





perfect conditions it is an amazing sight from a dark sky area. For an even more breathtaking view use a pair of binoculars through which it takes on an almost 3D appearance.

Phenomena

December sees the Geminid meteor shower which peaks on the 13th/14th with no Moon to spoil the view of the fainter meteors and then on the 21st we have the Winter Solstice giving us the shortest day and longest night.

January sees the first supermoon of 2026 which can be seen on the 3rd. Paul Adamson 01823 698156

Update from Tessa Munt, MP for Moorlinch, Stawell, Sutton Mallet and Greinton

Last month, I spoke in Parliamentary debates on several subjects – from Sudan to Business Rates, the Duty of Candour in the new Hillsborough Law to the Infected Blood scandal and prison sentences to Powers of Attorney. I've criss-crossed the constituency harvesting organic walnuts (!), visiting schools and businesses, attending meetings and events and speaking with many of you at my surgeries. To keep updated on my work as your MP, I can be found on Facebook and Instagram.

October marked Breast Cancer Awareness Month and I gladly attended a Macmillan Coffee

Morning in Parliament and Breast Cancer Now's Wear It Pink! event. It's good that progress has been made, awareness raised and I know the Prostate Cancer UK campaigns are becoming equally important annual events in Parliament too.

November is a more sombre month, with remembrance at its core. We honour those who lost their lives, particularly in the Great and Second World Wars, those physically and mentally injured, made homeless or stateless by war. Civilians are victims of war too, as our daily news broadcasts remind us. Every year I wear both a red and a white poppy. The red poppy reminds us to "never forget" the British military personnel and allied forces who died; the white 'peace' poppy - "never again". Ashley Fox, MP for Middlezoy and Othery Royal Mail Delays

Earlier this month I led a Westminster Hall Debate on the performance of Royal Mail - an issue that's been raised with me far too often. Before the debate I carried out a local survey to gather residents' experiences, and the responses painted a picture of a service that's falling short for too many.

In Othery, some households told me they went without deliveries for more than a

fortnight. In Cossington, one resident told me their magazine hadn't been delivered for seven weeks in a row. Across the constituency, only one in three households said they receive a postal delivery every day.


For many people this means missed hospital letters, late prescriptions and small businesses struggling to get orders out on time.

Royal Mail has a legal duty to deliver to every address in the country, six days a week. It's called the Universal Service Obligation, and it's vital for rural areas like Othery and Middlezoy. When that service falters, it's people in small villages - older people, those who work from home and those without easy access to online alternatives - who feel it most. In Parliament, I called on Royal Mail to be honest about the challenges it faces and to commit to a clear plan to ensure reliable daily deliveries. I'll also be meeting with the company's Director of External Affairs to press the case for better performance here in the constituency.

We all understand that times are changing and that more of our communication is now online. But that doesn't mean the post should become a luxury. Every household deserves a postal service they can depend on, particularly when doing things online is not reliable due to poor internet connectivity. So, I'll keep holding Royal Mail to account to make sure you get the service you deserve.

FARM DIARY

This is written for non-farmers who live surrounded by farm land.

In the Field. After a terrible harvest owing to the exceptionally dry summer, we have had a very good autumn. Every time we sowed a crop we had some rain. It was all up and growing well at a time in November when we had not started sowing the crops the previous year. Now at the time of writing we have had excessive rainfall – a balancing of the books.

The lambs are growing well on just forage with no supplementary feeding. It helps to have fields with grasses and other plants or herbs. In fact, they are currently on a ley mainly comprising a modern ryegrass but also including cocksfoot grass, various clovers including a red clover, burnet forage herb, parsley forage herb and ribgrass or plantain. This was sown in the autumn and has been growing very well on an arable field in its arable rotation. It will be down for a year.



30:50:50. This is an initiative of the All-Party Parliamentary Group on Science & Technology in Agriculture. The initiative aims to increase UK agricultural productivity by 30% by 2050 while simultaneously reducing the environmental impact by 50% per unit of output. The NFU are involved as are NIAB (National Institute of Agricultural Botany) to which we belong.

Crop breeding. Breeding new varieties is a very slow procedure but the breeders obtain about 1% yield increase year after year for wheat at least. There are many challenges including climate shocks, conflict and changing government policy. Also, over the last 25



years we have lost 4.4% of agricultural land. This is according to *UK food security; outlook to 2050*, an online published report from the Science for Sustainable Agriculture policy platform according to NIAB's *Landmark* magazine of autumn 2025. Domestic food production has fallen in parallel. The construction of vast solar farms is part of this. Can we feed ourselves with less land is the obvious question? NIAB are investing in biotechnology. Crops grown are currently destroyed. Gene editing is one method. Raising yields with fewer inputs is the aim. Also, some worldwide crops such as bananas are being hit by fungal diseases as well as climate change. More later... *Richard Graham*

The traditional Remembrance Sunday services in November were a reminder of the impact of WWI on villages such as ours. Of the 16,000 villages in England, only about 30 were 'thankful villages' where everyone at war returned alive. If you visit our little conserved church, please take a look and remember those who "for our tomorrow they gave their today".

This was supposedly started by St Francis of Assisi, who set up a nativity scene to remind people of the very ordinary origins of the Christmas story. 

OTHERY BOOK GROUP The Land in Winter by Andrew Miller

The novel is set in England's rural West Country during the memorably harsh winter of 1962. It focuses on two newly married couples, neighbours in a village some distance away from family and friends. They were each content to leave these people behind as they started new lives together.

Eric Parry, a GP, lives in a comfortable cottage with his wife, Irene. Across a field from them are Bill and Rita



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Simmons who are attempting to make a living from their recently purchased small dairy farm, although neither have any background in farming. Previously city dwellers, the four come from different backgrounds and carry with them pasts shadowed by the actions and expectations of parents and by war that lives on in scarred memories.

As the story develops, we're offered versions of events from alternating viewpoints, the timeline gradually moving forward from December to February. The first of the events is the suicide of a young man in the local asylum, a patient of Dr Parry. Further events include an affair, a party, and journeys to cities where pasts are revisited. However the story is mostly a study of characters and their development.

The sixties (Turkish Delight and Woodbine cigarettes), people expected to maintain the veneer of all being well, resonate and Miller thoughtfully explores prejudice towards foreigners, Jews and the mentally ill. His writing can be moving, funny and insightful and in my view is always good. The novel was shortlisted for the prestigious Booker Prize. The opinions of the reading group ranged widely: from disparagement, (the writing, characters and plot), to tepid, disappointment at an unresolved ending, through to wholehearted enthusiasm and even to a page by page epiphany.

January's book is 'Long Island' by Colm Toibin, which will be discussed at our next meeting on Wednesday 6 January. Liz Wall

BISHOP'S LETTERCHRISTMAS JOY FOR ALL PEOPLE

We fear that we live in a world of increasing polarisation. Conflicts between and within nations play their part. The amplification of division and hostility by social media algorithms doesn't help. Culture wars exacerbate matters further. Sometimes it feels like common ground is disappearing from underneath our feet like a sandbar being overwhelmed by the tide. In such a climate, it's good to return to the

message that heralded the arrival of Jesus. I bring you tidings of great joy which shall be for <u>all</u> people' says that angel who announces the saviour's birth (Luke 2:10). Jesus' story quickly includes all types and sorts of humanity. From local shepherds to exotic visitors from afar. I wonder what the conversation was like as they all crammed into the stable to see the newborn child?

Jesus's story quickly shows that not only is he <u>for</u> all people but that he <u>needs</u> all people. His family must have needed assistance when they fled as refugees to Egypt. Jesus must have needed help when his parents left him behind on a family outing to Jerusalem aged twelve. Jesus was constantly calling on and engaging with others as he went about his teaching and ministry.

What might counter the polarisation of our day? Amongst our greatest resource is to seek out the emotion that accompanied the news of the saviour's birth – joy. When we encounter joy – from that cup winning goal to the marriage of much loved friends – such moments are never the time for division and enmity. We're all far too busy shouting and hugging each other! The invitation of Christmas is to experience such joy afresh. Often, we see joy most obviously in children's experience of the season. Might we seek it for ourselves too? For joy breaks down divisions, overcomes barriers, reminds us that we are one.
