



St Mary's, Billingsley

Our most recent service has been Remembrance Sunday. Due to a prior commitment (see Glazeley news...), the assistant curate was unable to take this, but the congregation responded magnificently. Before the event, the church had its monthly clean, with the poppy display on the altar and fresh flowers inside. A new development this year were poppies on the gate, which contrasted beautifully with the autumn colours in the hedges and trees. Dave and Amanda who



usually take care of the act of Remembrance were away this time, but arranged with congregation members Bob and Judy to take over. So, the bells were rung just before 11, the names of our local men who died in service in the First World War were read out and the two minute silence was observed and the bells were rung again to honour them. Another of our regulars, Sue, came to support. Best of all, the whole community could hear the bells, to know that we were remembering. Who needs a vicar?

By the time this article comes out, we will be in December and so looking to our Christmas services. We have our carol service at 6pm on Friday 19th December; on Christmas Day we will have carols and a short communion service at 10am. After that, our next service will be the 8am communion on Sunday 25th of January.

St Bartholomew's, Glazeley

We held our usual Remembrance Sunday service on the 9th November, starting in the church at 10.15 and then at the War Memorial at 10.45 for the two minute silence at 11am. We were joined by friends in church from Chetton; there were also people who joined us at the War Memorial just for the Act of Remembrance. The war memorial is now looking very smart thanks to the work of the parish council who have cut the hedge and also



planted new flowers and shrubs in the adjacent garden (with a memorial theme); they also gave a wreath for the memorial. At the service a second wreath on behalf of the church was laid by George Morley. Our normal wreath-layer, Roger Gabb could not be with us this year as he was required at the Cenotaph in London where he had been asked to march with, and lay a wreath on behalf of, the Paratroop section of the Guards that he led. We are delighted that he and his men have been honoured in this way! The font was also decorated with a model of a battle scene, made by Anita Morley.

We are pleased that the trees in the churchyard have been dead-wooded. There are now piles of logs; anyone is welcome to help themselves. If you want to give a donation to the church that would of course be welcome, but our main aim is for the wood to be cleared.

Our Christmas Carol Service will be at 10am on Sunday 21st December. In addition to carols in the service we will celebrate informal Holy Communion. Following that, we will meet again on Sunday 18th January for our usual service of Holy Communion.

My dear Nephew Darren



And so, the old year draws to a close, and you are packing to move to your own first parish in January. Let me give you some final words of advice.

Curates, you will have noticed, are forgiven everything. I hope you have appreciated this period of grace, because come 1st January, all that will change. You will then become responsible for everything that goes wrong in your church. You must be able to mend leaking taps, shovel snow, arrange flowers, mow the churchyard and run jumble sales. You will be expected to know the moment someone falls ill – preferably the day before. In addition, they will expect you to preach profound sermons - in seven minutes flat, and to lead a life of prayerful solitude while being the life and soul of the parish. From the day your predecessor left, he will have turned into a saint. *You* will be their new disappointment. Be assured that *whatever* you do, you will *always* disappoint someone.

Be prepared for phone calls at 3am telling you that someone has left a light on in church, and shouldn't you go turn and it off? You will be asked about car parking arrangements for the October Harvest Service by mid-January, while hymns for the 9 Lessons and Carols will be required by early summer. I suggest you buy in extra pullovers, overcoats and scarves for life in your vicarage. A good number of mousetraps may well come in useful too.

Welcome to your new life of an incumbent.

Expect that each Sunday morning, as you prepare for the service, there will be a straggling queue of people who want to tell you an astonishing variety of things: there is a large cobweb 30 feet up over the pulpit, they don't like the second hymn on the board, the flowers look rough this week, there may be a bat in the vestry, some child has left a shoe in the back porch, and the car park has broken glass in it.

You may find this a distraction as you prepare for a worship service. But remember that at least they have bothered to come to church at all. In my experience, congregations are always irritating, but at least they do take up a lot of space, and that looks good in the pews. The church would look empty without them.

Letter from Westminster

October has been Breast Cancer Awareness Month. I am inspired by how people have organised events, fundraised, and taken part in a range of activities to throw a spotlight on this vitally important issue. As part of my campaign, I have called for more Community Diagnostic Centres in rural areas and a Young Cancer Patient Travel Fund, after it emerged that local patients must travel 45 miles to access treatment in Birmingham. I was also delighted to meet with I am committed to enhancing public services in South Shropshire, including our



community hospitals. Having recently welcomed the news that Shropshire will become home to one of the first neighbourhood health services, I am campaigning to ensure community hospitals are at the heart of plans to make this a reality.

This month I was proud to graduate from the Armed Forces Parliamentary Scheme's Strategic Command Course. The scheme aims to foster better quality debate around matters of defence by equipping Members of Parliament with first-hand experience of life in the Armed Forces. I will continue to work with colleagues across Parliament to ensure that our military has all the support it needs and will push the Government to up defence spending in line with NATO targets as soon as possible.

I have enjoyed working with Shropshire Chamber of Commerce, which does so much to champion local industry. April's hike in employer's National Insurance contributions has cost the sector £1 billion and resulted in 89,000 job losses. I have written to the Chancellor in support f this sector, which supports 2,040 jobs in South Shropshire.

Despite record investment by the last government in children with complex needs, rising demand has outpaced increases in government funding. In Shropshire alone, the number of children on education, health and care plans has tripled over the last five years. Now, planned reforms in council funding could worsen this problem in rural areas like Shropshire. I have called on Ministers to seize this opportunity to deliver a system that genuinely ensures that every child receives the right support to succeed in education and beyond.

I was delighted to meet with Sanjay Johal from Flooded People UK, a national non-profit initiative led by a team with extensive experience in flood response and more than 40 years of experience in community engagement. They manage an online community which enables flood groups across the country to share advice with each other. They are one of several organisations that feature in my 'Be Winter Ready' Campaign, which aims to equip residents with the information they need as winter approaches.

It was great to meet with representatives from the newly opened McDonalds restaurant in Bridgnorth. The new site will bring much needed business and revenue into the town whilst also creating multiple job opportunities for local residents. It was great to see that the restaurant is already up and running and busy. It was lovely to enjoy my classic go-to McDonald's order of a Big Mac and fries, and I hope to be back soon to sample their newly released "World Menu Heist".

We have been in discussion with the railway for some time as the existing maintenance agreement with Shropshire Council and Sustrans has not been renewed causing a risk the path could be closed. We are getting closer to a conclusion and it looks like Highley Parish Council will be able to take on the maintenance, hopefully supported by people from the community. It would be a great shame if the path was to close because it is an accessible way to get close to the river and to enjoy some of the fantastic outdoor spaces we're so lucky to live near.

By the time you read this the Christmas Light Switch On is likely to have been and gone, hopefully very successfully and including the Highley Civic Awards and the grand unveiling of the winner of our Christmas Light Competition's entry made into a real Christmas light! We will be looking forward to welcoming Santa himself to The Severn Centre on December 11th though, accompanied by a fire engine! Look out for details in the run up as it'll be a great event to bring kids to.



News from our County Councillor

October was another full month working to support residents and raise local issues across Highley. One priority has been the footpath from Hawthorn Drive to the main road, where several people have fallen. I've also been helping a local resident through the Blue Badge application process and have challenged the Council's policy that refuses GP evidence, which makes it much harder for people with genuine mobility issues to qualify.



Following complaints about odours from Kinlet View and Netherton Lane, Severn Trent has now repaired a cracked manhole cover that was causing the problem.

I've also reported the overgrown hedge behind The Castle Pub that was blocking drivers' views – trimming is now scheduled. Hazelwells Road was resurfaced at the end of October, with white lines at Haggs Corner to follow soon.

I'm continuing to press Diamond Buses for timetable improvements and recently objected to a planning application on Cockshutt Lane that would change the character of that part of the village. I was also pleased to donate a laptop to a resident who needed help getting online.

UCB Word for Today

Relationships need rules'

If you look carefully into the perfect law that sets you free, and if you do what it says...God will bless you for doing it. James 1:25

Going to heaven is based solely upon having a relationship with Christ; one in which you place your total trust in Him. This relationship also involves rules you live by and guidelines that make you more godly. A tennis player isn't free to play tennis if there is no baseline to let him or her know whether the ball is 'in or out'. A football or rugby player isn't free to play without a touchline. A netball player is not free to play netball without boundary lines. You cannot be truly free without restraints.

For example, a fish is not free to wander through the jungle, and a lion is not free to dwell in the ocean. Neither was made for that. Freedom is having the benefits accumulate to you that you were created to receive. Freedom doesn't mean no boundaries. Freedom 'in Christ' means that within the right boundaries, you get to experience 'life more abundant' (see John 10:10).

James writes, 'If you look carefully into the perfect law that sets you free, and if you do what it says, God will bless you for doing it.' In 1215, the Magna Carta was signed by King John. It protected individual rights and civil liberties, while at the same time asserting that no one, not even the king, was above the law. Today, it stands as a symbol of justice and freedom within the law, reminding you that when you're in the UK, you can have freedom — as long as you agree to stay within the rules.

All in the month of December

250 years ago, on 16th Dec 1775 that Jane Austen, novelist (*Sense and Sensibility, Pride and Prejudice, Mansfield Park, Emma, Northanger Abbey, Persuasion*) was born. Over 30 million copies of her books have been sold, 7,000 of them in her lifetime.

175 years ago, on 4th Dec 1850 that William Sturgeon, physicist, electrical engineer and inventor died. He created the first electromagnets and invented the first British electric motor.

80 years ago, on 27th Dec 1945 that The World Bank, the International Monetary Fund, and the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development were founded. They had been created at the Bretton Woods Conference in July 1944.

75 years ago, on 25th Dec 1950 that the Stone of Scone, the coronation stone of British monarchs, was taken from Westminster Abbey in London by four Scottish students. They transported it to Scotland but broke it. It was later returned to London and used in the coronation of Queen Elizabeth II. Since 1996 it has been kept in Edinburgh Castle, with the agreement that it will be transported to Westminster Abbey when needed for coronations.

70 years ago, on 1st Dec 1955 that African American civil rights activist Rosa Parks refused to give up her bus seat to a white man in Montgomery Alabama. This violated the city's racial segregation laws, and led to the Montgomery Bus Boycott (5th to 20th Dec 1956) and the birth of the modern American civil rights movement.

Also 70 years ago, on 20th Dec 1955 that Cardiff was proclaimed the capital city of Wales.

65 years ago, on 9^{th} Dec 1960 that the first episode of the TV soap Coronation Street was broadcast on ITV.

60 years ago, on 22nd Dec 1965 that Richard Dimbleby, journalist and radio-television broadcaster, died. The BBC's first war correspondent, he was one of the greatest figures in British broadcasting history. Father of the TV presenters David Dimbleby and Jonathan Dimbleby.

40 years ago, on 2nd Dec 1985 that Philip Larkin, poet, librarian and jazz critic died.

Also 40 years ago, on 7th Dec 1985 that Robert Graves, poet novelist, critic, translator and classical scholar died. Best known for *I,Claudius*, and *Goodbye to All That*.

30 years ago, on 22nd Dec 1995 that the British 'rogue trader' Nick Leeson was jailed for six and a half years in Singapore for fraudulent financial dealings which had led to the fall of Barings Bank.

Also 30 years ago, on 8th Dec 1995 that Head teacher Philip Lawrence was stabbed to death outside his west London school while trying to protect a student who was being assaulted by a gang of youths.

Also 30 years ago, on 15th Dec that the European Council announced that the new European currency would be called the Euro.

Also 30 years ago, on 21st Dec 1995 that the city of Bethlehem passed from Israeli to Palestinian control. On 26th Dec Israel also passed dozens of West Bank villages over to the Palestinian authority.

10 years ago, on 19th Dec 2015 that Jimmy Hill, football player, manager and host of the BBC football TV series *Match of the Day* (1973-88) died.


Christmas gifts – Jessie


The Holly and the Ivy – Alan
