## ...on 25December we celebrate Love...

Many think that we give presents at Christmas because the three wise men brought presents to Jesus. Others go back to the stories about the original Saint Nicholas (Santa Claus) who filled the stocking of three poor girls with coins as an act of charity.

I would argue that it comes from something deeper than that, with in fact more in common with Santa than the three wise men.

As I write, we are in the season of Advent - traditionally these four Sundays before Christmas remind us of the four virtues of Hope, Peace, Joy and Love. Each week we light a candle and Love is the final candle because it is the most important virtue.

That comes from the bible -

"And now faith, hope, and love abide, these three; and the **greatest** of these is **love**." *1 Corinthians 13 v 13* 

In the King James version of the bible, this is translated as "And now abideth faith, hope, charity, these three; but the greatest of these is charity".

Most of us associate charity nowadays as giving money to a good cause. Anyone who watched last month's "Children in need" appeal on TV will know that this practice is still alive and thriving. But in the bible, the word "charity" is a translation of the Latin 'caritas' which means love. ⇒







⇒ Not *romantic* love. 'Caritas' is in fact a translation of the Greek word 'Agape' which is a Greek word for a very distinctive kind of love – sacrificial love, the love a mother might have for a child. The early church used this word to describe **God's love** when he sent His Son Jesus Christ into the world, to sacrifice himself to save us from our sins, defeat death and give us all eternal life. THIS kind of LOVE is what lies at the heart of Christmas! The season is all about that wonderful kind of love - still with us - enfolding us today. This is what we should think about when we see that tiny vulnerable baby in the crib.

That love should be reflected in us, not only in our giving to our friends, but to giving in general, to our favourite charities and to our community. On 25<sup>th</sup> December we celebrate that Love with joy, and with hope. This *Christmas Love - God's Love*, gives us the best kind of peace in our lives real Comfort and Joy.


A joyful, friendly morning full of laughter, music, and Christmas spirit.

One of Hixon's oldest residents, my father, **David Penry Williams**, sadly passed away peacefully at the age of 102 at Meadowfields Care Home on 20<sup>th</sup> October 2025. My father had been a resident of Hixon since 1971 and was well known around the village, especially at the Luncheon Club and

Community Café. It was truly heartwarming to see so many of his friends at his funeral at Stafford Crematorium on Friday 7<sup>th</sup> November, particularly those who attended from the above-mentioned village activities. It was therefore most fitting that the after-funeral refreshments were held at the Hixon Village Hall.

I would like to extend my sincere thanks to Mrs. Jane Garner and her team, whose professionalism and kindness made the event possible. Everyone who attended commented on how delicious and beautifully presented the refreshments were. The total amount of donations collected were... £353.00 which will be divided between Katherine House & the Air Ambulance



The November meeting was a talk on Cannock Chase and its Hidden History given by Steve Booth. Cannock Chase is the oldest 'Area of Natural Beauty' in the country and also the most popular with 2.5million visitors each year.

It is also the smallest, covering just 17,000 acres, of which 63% is forest. Here are a few facts from the presentation:

**Castle Ring** is a Hill Fort and was occupied by Celtic tribes until it was attacked in 48ad by the Romans who had travelled from London along

Watling Street (A5). The fort was so well defended, took 2½ years to capture.

**Beaudesert Hall** (right) was built in 1292 and later owned by the Bishop of Lichfield and used as a hunting lodge. Sir William Paget – the 1st Baron Paget of Beaudesert was born at Wednesbury in 1506 and became an ⇒









⇒ MP for Lichfield and held various Government roles. He was an Advisor to Henry VIII when the catholic monasteries were destroyed and purchased Beaudesert for £575 in 1546. The Paget family were involved in 'nail making' and the Chase contained ironstone and shallow coal seams which could be accessed from the surface by Bell Pits. A furnace was built in the Rising Brook valley, and later, Thomas Chetwyn took over the nail making and built a forge at Slitting Mill. The hall underwent rebuilding and remodelling until November 5<sup>th</sup> 1909 when it caught fire and was eventually demolished in 1935.

**Hagley Hall** was formerly a country house on the outskirts of Rugeley, built in 1636. It was later bought by the Curzon family, the estate became known as Hagley Park. There was also a folly under the house of several chambers leading to a basilica cut into the sandstone, probably used for worship.

**The Bloody Steps** at Brindley Bank, was where the body of *Christina Collins* was carried up by locals, who discovered her in the canal in June 1839. She had been travelling on a Pickford's narrowboat carrying freight (and also whisky) from Liverpool to London. Two of the crew were later convicted of her murder and were hanged in Stafford.

**The Tackeroo Railway** was constructed to link the two army camps, Rugeley and Brocton. A power station, water tower and a hospital were also built.

The last meeting this year will be on 2<sup>nd</sup> December at 8.00<sup>pm</sup> and includes a **'Magic Lantern' Show**. The first meeting of the history society in 2026 will be February 3<sup>rd</sup> a talk by **Bob Marsh** on **The History of Beaudesert.**

# From little acorns mighty oaks grow!

From our very first conversations in December 2023 to going live in September 2024, we are proud to say that we now have **SIX qualified** 



**Community First Responders**. Our dedicated volunteers are based across the area we cover: 1 in Hopton, 2 in Hixon and 3 in the Haywoods.

The aim of a CFR is to respond to 999 calls passed to us by the West Midlands Ambulance Service, providing vital initial care and assessment until paramedics arrive. This is achieved by working in a 10-mile radius of the CFR car's current location, helping ensure faster care for our rural communities.

To coincide with West Midlands Ambulance Service launching its annual recruitment campaign for new CFRs in January, we will also be recruiting. Our goal is to grow to a minimum of 10 responders, which will allow greater flexibility for shifts and more hours of coverage for our rural community.

Look out for us during January when there will be a "Come and meet your Community First Responders" evening at a village hall near you! The invitation is open to everyone, to find out a bit more about life as a First Responder. If you have ever wondered how to carry out CPR in an emergency or may be a bit concerned over having to use one of the many defibrillators dotted around the area, come along and watch a demonstration of both techniques.
