FROM THE VICARAGE

In a house with two vicars the question "Are you excited for Christmas?" is rather a loaded one. Usually at the beginning of December both my husband Sam and I are feeling a mix of trepidation and excitement for this season of Church life. This year I found myself wondering how to make our first Christmas as a married

This year I found myself wondering how to make our first Christmas as a married couple special – even around the busy church events – especially now that my usual Christmas treats of mulled wine and unpasteurised cheeses are a no-go! Of course, we will make our usual annual trip to Winchester Christmas market, snuggle up to watch some terrible Christmas rom-com on Netflix, and enjoy the lead up to Christmas; but is this the best way for us to build anticipation for the big day?!

Many of you may know that Sam is a keen meditator, and his spiritual discipline during Advent is to spend more time in contemplation. As many of you know, I'm the busy beaver of the family and struggle to sit still for long enough to practise mindfulness to any degree of success. I am however hoping to practise more mindful gratitude in this Advent season, which is another spiritual discipline that can help you make this Christmas the most special yet.

I have so much to be thankful for personally in 2025, and as a church we have seen many things which I am so grateful for. We have welcomed new faces into our congregation, celebrated milestones big and small, and watched ministries take root in ways we didn't expect this time last year. God has been faithful in the quiet, ordinary moments as much as in the extraordinary ones, and Advent gives us time to recognise that. Gratitude slows us down just enough to notice where God has been quietly weaving grace into our days.

The season of Advent is often described as a time of waiting, but it is not a passive waiting. It is a season that invites us to look back with thankfulness and look forward with hope. When we pause to name what we are grateful for, we become more aware of God's presence already at work in our lives. That awareness transforms the way we approach Christmas. Suddenly the "to-do" lists, services, carol practices, and last-minute preparations don't feel like burdens to bear but opportunities to serve with joy.

For me, gratitude this year looks wonderfully ordinary: the kettle boiled just as I needed it; the kindness of someone who noticed I looked tired; a quiet moment with Sam between services; even the (sometimes not-so-gentle) kicks reminding me of the precious new life we're waiting for. These small things, easily overlooked in December's rush, are becoming stepping-stones toward Christmas joy.

So perhaps the best way to build anticipation for the big day isn't by squeezing in more festive activities but by noticing the gifts already around us. My hope is that this Advent, you too can find small, mindful moments of gratitude. As we prepare for Christ's coming, may our hearts be opened to the simple, beautiful ways God meets us every day.

LETTER FROM BISHOP STEPHEN

This December, Carol and I will visit the tiny Channel Island of Alderney. It is a beautiful but a heavily fortified place having been both the first line of defence historically and an occupied and evacuated community. Having marked the 80th Anniversary of Liberation in Guernsey in May, Alderney has its own unique act of remembrance on 15th December known as Home Coming.

Alderney was not liberated because it had been evacuated. The people of Alderney could not return until later in the year when the war ended because the island was in such a state having been brutalised by the German occupation. In particular there were three concentration camps to provide



forced labour. This December it is the 80th anniversary of the people of Alderney coming home which must have been both joyous and hugely challenging.

In these days of Advent we prepare ourselves for the coming home of our Saviour. Dark days prevail and I reflect upon what that darkness really means for those currently under oppression or war such as in Sudan and South Sudan. It can be difficult to imagine as we prepare for a happy English Christmas, what it must be like if your home is under threat.

At Christmas, wherever we are, and however full or fragile our lives are, we mark perhaps the greatest moment in human history. The very fact that God chooses to lower himself and to be born among us, and to make His home as one of us, marks out the Christian experience from any other in our world. Our preparations and our celebrations make it all too easy to miss the full meaning of the incarnation. The fact that God is with us is a liberation all of its own and calls us to make every home in our world as safe and as free as possible. This Christmas as families, and as some remain alone, let us remember before anything else that the God who made his home among us calls us to return to Him and to live lives that proclaim the good news. May the home coming of Jesus be with you this Christmas.



10 Fun Facts about Christmas trees

Even before the time of Christ, evergreen trees were seen in winter as a symbol of fertility.

It was the 16th century monk, Martin Luther, who is credited with the idea of having lights on Christmas trees. He added candles to his tree, to look like stars in a forest.

Windsor Castle got its first Christmas tree in 1800, brought by Charlotte, wife of George III.

It was in 1835 that the term 'Christmas tree' was first used in English.

It was in the 1840s, when Prince Albert, consort of Queen Victoria, began bringing trees inside, that led to their popularity throughout the UK.

It was Woolworths who first sold manufactured Christmas tree ornaments – back in 1880.

The tree in London's Trafalgar Square has been a gift from the city of Oslo, Norway since 1947.

The world's tallest Xmas tree, at 221ft high, was erected in a Washington shopping mall in 1950.

In a survey of the nation's favourite smells, real Christmas trees came eighth, just behind the sea, but ahead of perfume.

About five million real Christmas trees are sold in the UK each year.



CHRISTMAS UNWRAPPED!

All of us have received unwanted gifts at Christmas. For Joseph the gift of a child, as recorded in Matthew chapter 1, was not something he really wanted. Although he was engaged to Mary, her pregnancy would be grounds for divorce. Not surprisingly, with the associated social disgrace, Joseph wanted to divorce Mary quietly (Matthew 1:19). However, God intervened in a dream: 'The virgin will be with child and will give birth to a son, and they will call Him Immanuel, which means, God with us.' (1:23). In a scary and uncertain world, what does the message of **Immanuel** say to us today?

God is present with us

God assured Joseph that He was working in all that Joseph was going through. The eternal and creator God entered time and space as a baby. This baby is both uniquely divine but also fully human. This means that we can know God personally, not just know about Him. The Holy Spirit is committed to making Jesus' life and character real in us, and bringing meaning to our circumstances, just as He worked in Mary's life.

God is on our side

Christmas touches some raw nerves in our lives, including stress, family rows, loneliness and financial pressures. However, God does not remain aloof from our experiences. In Jesus He enters our world of hopes and fears, joys and disappointments. He understands what we are going through, as He is alongside us. By the cross and resurrection, He gave His life that we might know His love, joy, peace and forgiveness.

For Joseph, as well as us, the Christmas message is one of hope in an uncertain world. It is a time to re-consider the claims of *Immanuel* ('God with us') as we entrust ourselves to Him for the coming year.


