## **OUR GARDENING YEAR:** 2025



As we come to the end of the growing season, it is time to take stock of what we have achieved in the garden this year; but more importantly to thank those who have been involved. An important early development this year has been the laying of a **path** from the car park to the main gate, making access much easier and safer.

The garden has been extended in size, giving us extra space on the west boundary adjacent to 36 Larkhay Road and to the Gordon Rooms. Both extensions have involved the erection of new fencing, improving the look and feel of the garden. It is planned to grow flowers and shrubs in these areas.

The vegetable garden did well, largely thanks to Kate and Anita, in spite of a lack of water over the summer. The fruit garden thrived in the hot sunny weather. The damson tree had perhaps its best year



Nearly all the raised beds were used. It was encouraging to see the variety of vegetables grown and harvested.



We held a very successful open morning in June, selling garden produce, plants and bric-a-brac and providing teas and cakes. The resulting profit made a significant contribution to our running costs for the year.

The garden was open on two days in July as part of Hucclecote Open Gardens in support of the local Guides. We

experimented with additional opening hours in the school holidays but had few extra visitors so are continuing with just our usual opening hours for the time being.

We took part in a survey commissioned by the Royal Horticultural Society (RHS) to assess the impact and development of community gardens. Its resulting report 'Space to Grow' highlights the importance of such places for individual and community physical and mental health and well-being. Alison was interviewed by the RHS for the survey.
