

## A Christmas Message

Canon Susie Collingridge Vicar of Steep and Froxfield with Privett.

This might not be a very Christmassy question, but how do you know if someone loves you? And if they are good?

I sometimes think that love is like fog. Not because love is damp and cold (which it isn't), but because love is so hard to grab hold of.

Love doesn't easily obey our whims, not like a perfectly trained dog that leaps to heel and sits smartly. You can't always predict how love will look, how it will feel, how it will work out.

Love can feel just out of reach, and hard to pin down. Difficult to understand.

We hear that 'God is Love', so that can be a problem too.

Perhaps we'd prefer God to be less like Love, and more like us.

We'd understand God better if that was true, and we could see eye to eye with God.

God would share our concerns about things.

God would be quick to agree with our opinions and our views.

Wouldn't it be great if we could see what God is really like, though?

What if 'God is Love' had a face we could see, or a voice we could hear! What if we could see what God's Love does, and what God would say?

And this is where we get to the Christmassy bit, because that's exactly what we believe was going on at Christmas.

There was a baby born, and this child is the face of God, the face of Love.

It's worth watching out for this baby – what does he do? What happens to him as he grows up? As a grown-up, Jesus explained it himself, "anyone who has seen me has seen the Father".

He is ordinary and like us in many ways – he has the same kind of body as ours, he has a human face, a human voice, actions that we can read about and understand. This is what the God of Love looks like in human form. Yet Jesus is distinctive too.

This Love doesn't choose to be born in a smart private hospital or a rich palace, full of swagger, but in a simple animal stall.

### **Steep Remembers**

As the King & Queen led the nation at the National Festival of Remembrance at the Royal Albert Hall on Saturday 8th November, 53 Steep residents held their own, smaller, but nonetheless equally poignant event in the village hall. Fran Box (Steep History Group) spoke about some of our civilian forebears who helped make the village we all love today. David Erskine-Hill (author of Steep's Roll of Honour 1914-18) referred movingly to some of our fallen and whether their sacrifice had been honoured. He quoted the words of an Air Vice-Marshal, who observed that our 'warriors' had in fact been betrayed by the whims of the modern world. We also remembered the maimed and disabled of modern warfare. Alan Smith, trustee of Stroud based Hounds for Heroes charity, gave us all a warm feeling as he described how support on four legs, a wagging tail and wet loving lick helps disabled servicemen of today.

By public demand, the talks concluded with photos and a video of the

Hands Around the Church ceremony to remember the 900 years of service All Saints has given to the community. It was a delightful reminder of that very special summer's day, when the event. superbly organised by FOSC (Friends of Steep Church), brought over 200 of the

Steep community together to do something which many said impossible. FOSC trustees presented framed photos of the event to Cllrs Nick Drew (East Hampshire District Council) and Alison Driver (Steep Parish Council), sponsors of the event, for public display. Proceeds from the event will go to Friends of Steep Church and Hounds for Heroes

This evening was the first in a series of events by Steep Parish Council intended to "better communicate with residents". By any measure, the council fulfilled its objective. They have set themselves a high bar for the future.





### **BOXING DAY CURRY**

Elizabeth Housden

Having cooked long and hard the day before this is a simple left overs dish you can prepare with the minimum of effort or time spent in the kitchen! You did that yesterday!

### Ingredients

Left over turkey or goose sliced and chopped (or hard boiled eggs or fish for those who don't eat meat. See note further down the recipe) - as much as you have left over. If you make too much to eat at this sitting, freeze and serve it another day. It should keep very well and probably be even more delicious a second time.

2 onions sliced

1 red pepper (deseeded and chopped)

1 chilli (deseeded and chopped) Garlic chopped

Stock (you can make your own out of left over gravy with water added to make it thinner if you haven't any stock already but not if you have vegetarian guests. That stock would have to be made separately or bought ready made in advance)

Frozen peas

Fresh coriander

A few sultanas, (soaked for half an hour first)

Spices, curry powder etc to taste. You will know how hot your guests or family will like their curry and adjust accordingly

Plain yoghurt to serve if liked.

(This should feed 4. Add more of any of the ingredients - meat, vegetables etc and extra stock, spices, if you have more guests.) NB. For a vegetarian version simply leave out the meat and

replace that with hard boiled eggs, if permitted. You can buy vegetarian stock if you don't make your own. Fish can also be substituted for meat if preferred. Use something like cod or haddock not fish like mackerel, for example (too many bones!)

### Method

Heat a large frying pan and add a good slug of oil. Add your chopped onions, garlic and chilli and spices and fry till soft. Add spices and the sliced, deseeded pepper. Stir in well and add your turkey/goose etc. Simmer for 5 minutes until pepper is softened and add frozen peas.

Add chopped fresh coriander and season to taste. Simmer a little longer till the frozen vegetables are softened and cooked.

While it is simmering cook your rice (or heat bought prepackaged rice. Microwaved packs of rice are very useful and work well and are quick and easy.) Pop the naan bread in the oven to warm.

Serve on warmed plates.

Yum! And very different from the day before!





## **RON'S NOTES**

Merveille du Jour and Clifton Nonpareil in Stroud and the wildflower patch.

The Merveille du Jour (Marvel of the Day) is a striking autumn flying moth that James Lowen\* aptly describes as 'intoxicating' with 'peppermint wings scrawled with black and etched in white'. Google translates 'merville' as evoking a sense of awe, astonishment, beauty, and extraordinary qualities. So wonderful to have this moth in our area.

In contrast, the Clifton Nonpareil is a rare, almost mythical moth, a giant in the moth world. It is a naturalist's dream to find a Blue Underwing (its other name) and this autumn my very first appeared in our Stroud trap. It may have been after midnight but demanded a call to Mary to come down to see such an amazing moth. How many other wives would do so? James Lowen\* explains that the massive 'perfect blue': 'sets the pulse racing', 'teases, torments and - for the lucky few - elates', a moth 'justly without equal'. Until the 1930s the moth was a rare, prized and sporadic immigrant. By 2018 it was starting to breed in southern England and, on 15th October 2025, here it was in Stroud.

## Wildflowers, bees, beetles and butterflies at Stroud village hall.

Sad to read in the last newsletter of the loss of one of the wildflower patches. However, the vegetation between the path and the stream and also the large patch of tall flowering wild plants just beyond the village hall are also wonderful biodiversity resources. I looked at these areas during National Insect Week in June 2025 when the flowers supported many pollinating and other insects.

Bees were Yellow-legged Mining Bees (which will be nesting in the ground nearby), Megachile Leaf Cutting Bees, a Resin Bee, three different Bumblebees, plus Honeybees. Also, the rather interesting Spiny Digger Wasp which provisions its nest burrows with flies. It is important to leave some bare ground for these various burrowing insects to use as a crucial part of their life cycle.

Other insects were the black and yellow striped Long Hoverfly, Dock Bug, Red Soldier Beetles and three species of ladybird. A few Small White Butterflies occurred, and a single Small Skipper Butterfly. A delight were the many House Martins swooping around and feeding on flying insects around the village hall.

During my 15-minute Big Butterfly Count on 1 August the village hall site produced four Large Whites, three Meadow Browns, a Gatekeeper, and a Red Admiral on the vegetable plants. I am sure a longer count would have produced many more.


### Repair of the Church roof
