From the ministry team

On 6 January the church celebrates the feast of Epiphany (which is also when our brothers and sisters in the Orthodox church celebrate Christmas). Epiphany marks when the wise men reached Bethlehem after they had travelled, following a star that they believed would lead them to a new king; the new 'king of the Jews'.

There is a lot about these travellers we don't know. We don't know where they came from (apart from somewhere in 'the East'). We don't know their names, or even how many there were (we always say there were three, but that is solely based on the fact that they brought three gifts).

Yet there are some things that we could surmise from what information we do have: They were intelligent - they knew about the stars, enough to identify a new star and to use the stars to navigate across a large distance; they were probably quite wealthy (or at least represented people who were); and they were brave. They would have been targets for robbers, travelling as they were with valuable gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh.

They were also persistent. We don't know how long their journey took them, but it could have been as long as two years (based on Matthew's account of Herod ordering the deaths of all male children in Bethlehem aged two and under, when he learns of the birth of a potential rival to his throne).

Two years, travelling (most likely on camels) across wild and treacherous terrains, far from home, to a foreign land. You might think that, at the end of that journey, finding the new king not in the palace in Jerusalem (as they had initially expected) but in a simple dwelling in a backwater town, they might have been a bit disappointed. Yet the bible tells us that:

"When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy. On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage." (Matthew 2.10-11a).

What joy may we find in unexpected places this year? What treasures might we find if we are persistent in searching out the good in this world? And what might the impact be on our own lives and the lives of others if we intentionally seek out Jesus? To seek out the King of kings; the one who made us, who loves us, who died for us, and who rejoices when we turn to Him?

I pray that 2026 may be filled with many blessings for you and your loved ones.

Have you ever wondered where the name ‘Jesus’ comes from?

The name Jesus is a transliteration of a name that occurs in several languages. It is of Hebrew origin, ‘Yehosua’, or Joshua. There is also the Hebrew-Aramaic form, ‘Yesua’. In Greek, it became ‘Ἰησοῦς’ (Iēsoûs), and in Latin it became ‘Iesus’.

The meaning of the name is ‘Yahweh delivers’ or ‘Yahweh rescues’, or ‘Yahweh is salvation’. No wonder the angel Gabriel in Luke (1:26-33) told Mary to name her baby Jesus: “... *because He will save His people from their sins.*”

All in the month of January

It was:

250 years ago, on 1 January 1776 that, according to tradition, George Washington raised the first American flag, the Grand Union Flag, at Prospect Hill in Charleston, Somerville, Massachusetts.

Also 250 years ago, on 24 January 1776 that E T A Hoffmann, German fantasy/Gothic horror writer, composer, artist and judge was born. Offenbach's opera The Tales of Hoffman is based on his stories. Tchaikovsky's ballet The Nutcracker is also based on one of his stories.

200 years ago, on 30 January 1826 that the Menai Suspension Bridge was first opened. It links the island of Anglesey to mainland Wales, and was the world's first major suspension bridge.

175 years ago, on 7 January 1851 that French physicist Leon Foucault set up the first Foucault pendulum in the cellar of his home, to demonstrate the rotation of the earth. On 31 March he created his most famous pendulum, hanging a 28-kilogram (62-pound) lead weight from a 67-metre (220 foot) wire from the dome of the Pantheon in Paris.

150 years ago, on 12 January 1876 that Jack London, American novelist and journalist was born. Best known for his novels The Call of the Wild and White Fang.

125 years ago, on 1 January 1901 that the Commonwealth of Australia was established when the six British colonies of New South Wales, Northern Territory, Queensland, South Australia, Victoria and Western Australia were federated.

Also 125 years ago, on 22 January 1901 that Queen Victoria died, and was succeeded by her son, Edward VII.

Also 125 years ago, on 27 January 1901 that Giuseppe Verdi, Italian composer died. Best known for his operas Aida, Requiem, Otello and Falstaff.

100 years ago, on 13 January 1926 that Michael Bond, children's writer, was born. He created the characters Paddington Bear and Monsieur Pamplemousse.

Also 100 years ago, on 14 January 1926 that Warren Mitchell, radio, TV, stage and film actor was born. Best known for his role as Alf Garnett in the TV sitcoms Till Death Us Do Part and In Sickness and in Health.

Also 100 years ago, on 26 January 1926 that Scottish engineer and inventor John Logie Baird gave the first demonstration of his TV system to members of the Royal Institution.

90 years ago, on 18 January 1936 that Rudyard Kipling, writer and poet, died. Best known for The Jungle Book, Kim, If, and many more. Winner of the 1907 Nobel Prize for Literature.

Also 90 years ago, on 20 January 1936 that King George V died and was succeeded by his son Edward VIII, who abdicated that December.

80 years ago, on 3 January 1946 that William Joyce, Lord Haw-Haw, British fascist politician died. He had broadcast Nazi propaganda from Germany during WW2. (Hanged for treason)

80 years ago, on 8 January 1946 that Elvis Presley received his first guitar on his 11th birthday. (Apparently, he would have preferred a bicycle.)

Also 80 years ago, on 10 January 1946 that the United Nations General Assembly convened for the first time, in Westminster Central Hall, London.

75 years ago, on 9 January 1951 that the UN headquarters in New York City was officially opened.

Also 75 years ago, on 30 January 1951 that Ferdinand Porsche, Austrian automotive engineer died. He designed the Volkswagen Beetle, the Tiger tank and founded the Porsche sport car company.

70 years ago, on 8 January 1956 that five American evangelical Christian missionaries were killed by members of the savage and isolated Huaorani tribe in Ecuador. The missionaries were attempting to bring Christianity to the Huaorani people, and had spent several months dropping gifts from an airplane. They had established a camp a few miles from the Huaorani settlements on 6 January, but were all killed within two days.

Also 70 years ago, on 31 January 1956 that AA Milne, writer, poet, humourist and playwright died. Best known for his stories about Winnie the Pooh.

65 years ago, on 20 January 1961 that John F Kennedy was inaugurated as the 35th President of the USA.

60 years ago, on 17 January 1966 that the album Sounds of Silence by Simon and Garfunkel, was released.

50 years ago, on 12 January 1976 that Dame Agatha Christie, crime novelist,

short story writer and playwright died. Best known for creating the characters Hercule Poirot and Miss Marple, and for the world's longest running play, *The Mousetrap*.

40 years ago, on 28 January 1986 that the US space shuttle *Challenger* exploded shortly after lift-off from Cape Canaveral, Florida. All seven astronauts were killed, including the first teacher in space, Christa McAuliffe.

30 years ago, on 20 January 1996 that the first Palestinian general election chose Yasser Arafat to be President of the Palestinian National Council in a landslide victory.

Also 30 years ago, on 22 January 1996 that a mass grave was discovered near Brcko Bosnia that contained the bodies of nearly 3,000 victims of Serb ethnic cleansing. They had been killed in May-June 1992.

Also 30 years ago, on 27 January 1996 that the first Holocaust Remembrance Day was observed in Germany. It became International Holocaust Remembrance Day in 2005 when it was adopted by the United Nations. It marks the day (27 January 1945) that the Auschwitz-Birkenau concentration/death camp was liberated during WW2.

25 years ago, on 12 January 2001 that Swedish football manager Sven Goran Eriksson became the first non-Briton to coach the England national football team.

20 years ago, on 12 January 2006 that at least 346 people were killed in a stampede during the annual Hajj pilgrimage in Mina, Saudi Arabia.


10 years ago, on 31 January 2016 that Terry Wogan, Irish radio and TV broadcaster, died. Known for his long-running BBC Radio 2 show, and for presenting TV's *Wogan*, *Blankety Blank*, *Come Dancing*, *the Children in Need*, and for his commentaries on the Eurovision Song Contest.

Sir John Rutter

Sir John Rutter is a composer perhaps best known for his Christmas carols. His music is written with cathedral, college and choral societies in mind, and best performed with the accompaniment of a string orchestra. Somewhat beyond the resources of our church choir. Those who attended our carol services at South Hanningfield or Ramsden Bellhouse would have heard me play a piano version of Rutter's work "The Angels' Carol". Towards the end of November I read on social media that he had just published a collection of his Christmas carols as piano solos and I purchased a copy straight away. If you attended one of the carol services I hope you enjoyed hearing *The Angels' Carol*.



She prayed silently.


